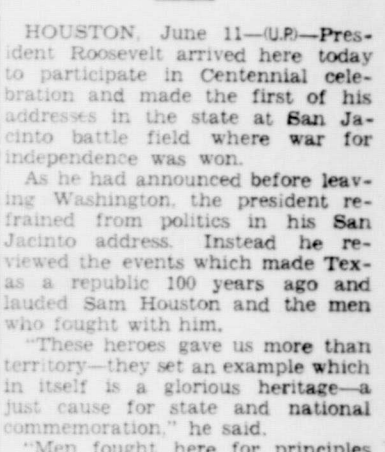

Poison Insect Pests


Some timely hints for gardeners, whether they grow flowers or vegetables, are given by L. A. Niven in The Progressive Farmer:

"Frequently insects injure flowers greatly. These pests may be controlled by spraying or dusting. During spring such sucking insects as plant lice and aphids frequently do great damage. Spray them with nicotine sulphate, using 1 1/2 teaspoons to a gallon of water in which enough soap is dissolved to make thin suds. Spray so as to come in direct contact with the insects, as they suck the juice from the inside of the leaves or tender stems and can be killed only by putting something on them that will burn them. Because they are usually on the under side of the leaves one must get the poison there and directly on them.

"For any of the eating insects, use a stomach poison such as arsenate of lead, Dutox, magnesium arsenate, etc. For a spray, use three teaspoons arsenate of lead to a gallon of water or five teaspoons magnesium arsenate, mixing in a small quantity of hydrated lime. With Dutox use two level teaspoons to a gallon of water.

"If one prefers to apply these poisons as a dust, mix one part arsenate of lead with four parts hydrated lime; one part magnesium arsenate to three parts hydrated lime; one part Dutox with two or three parts of lime or flour, and dust on thoroughly, covering all leaves and tender twigs.

"Everyone with even a few flowers or vegetables about the place needs a small spray pump or a hand dust gun. The directions given for dusting or spraying flowers are also correct for vegetables."



City Health Officers Ask For Cooperation

Are you troubled with mosquitoes? If so, do you desire to be rid of them? Then look around your premises for water in small or large receptacles, buckets, tin cans, fish ponds that contain no fish, or an insufficient number. If your house has gutters and some part does not drain but leaves a small amount of water in it, that may be the source of the trouble. Just a pint can of water will stock your premises. If you are tormented with the pests, look around your own premises, and those of your neighbors and you will likely find their breeding places. It is not possible for the sanitary department to find all these places. It is up to each householder to render all the aid in his power to prevent their getting a start, for they are difficult to eradicate when once your house and grounds have become infested with them. Mosquitoes may be carried to a considerable distance by wind, but of their own volition travel only a short distance from their breeding places. In the first three stages the mosquito is aquatic. It must of necessity have water in or on which to deposit the eggs. These, in a few days, hatch into wiggly tails. These in turn pass through another stage before being transformed into the winged insect. They do not breed in grass, weeds, or bushes. They rest or hide in vegetation. For the extermination of the mosquito the most effective measures are those which aim to destroy their breeding places and thus prevent their multiplication. For the best results, both individual and communal effort is necessary, but the importance of individual effort alone cannot be too much emphasized. The individual by attacking the problem on his own premises can not only rid his own immediate neighborhood of mosquitoes, but the example thus set may stimulate others to like effort. DR. W. P. LANDON-BORAH IN UNISON ON GOP PLATFORM

(Copyright, 1936, by United Press) CLEVELAND, June 11—(UP)—The subcommittee of fourteen, drafting the 1936 G. O. P. platform, agreed unanimously on all planks today after revisions had been made to satisfy Governor Landon. The full committee meets this afternoon for final approval. Borah who forced the drafters to include his views on foreign affairs, currency and monopoly in the platform appeared satisfied with it and said he had no plans to go before the convention. Clark and Sons to Have Modern Texaco Station With Latest Equipped Devices

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FIRST ADDRESS IN STATE AT SAN JACINTO

HOUSTON, June 11—(UP)—President Roosevelt arrived here today to participate in Centennial celebration and made the first of his addresses in the state at San Jacinto battle field where war for independence was won. As he had announced before leaving Washington, the president refrained from politics in his San Jacinto address. Instead he reviewed the events which made Texas a republic 100 years ago and lauded Sam Houston, and the men who fought with him. "These heroes gave us more than territory—they set an example which in itself is a glorious heritage—a just cause for state and national commemoration," he said. "Men fought here for principles they loved more dearly than their own lives. Liberty loving people will always do battle for principles they believe to be right. Civilization, alas, has not yet made it unnecessary for men to die in battle to sustain principle. It is however, my hope that in this generation the United States by its own example can maintain and help to maintain principles by means of peace rather than by means of war." In the audience which the president addressed was Andrew Jackson Houston, 81, the only living son of the military hero of the Texas Revolution. "It's a special pleasure to meet Mr. Andrew Jackson Houston," Mr. Roosevelt said. "Though you are many years my senior, I am proud to know that my father knew your father."

PLANS READY IN GREETING F. D. R. FRIDAY

DALLAS, June 11—(UP)—Plans to handle one of the largest crowds ever assembled in southwest were completed today on the eve of President Roosevelt's visit to the exposition. Mr. Roosevelt will speak to the nation from the cotton bowl exposition stadium at 10:30 Friday morning. In the afternoon will dedicate a statue of General Robert E. Lee erected in a suburban park. Many southwest dignitaries will meet the president in Dallas. Governor James Allred of Texas, Governor Park of Missouri, Governor Leche of Louisiana, and members of the Louisiana legislature are to arrive Friday morning. Poison Insect Pests

Some timely hints for gardeners, whether they grow flowers or vegetables, are given by L. A. Niven in The Progressive Farmer.

"Frequently insects injure flowers greatly. These pests may be controlled by spraying or dusting. During spring such sucking insects as plant lice and aphids frequently do great damage. Spray them with nicotine sulphate, using 1 1/2 teaspoons to a gallon of water in which enough soap is dissolved to make thin suds. Spray so as to come in direct contact with the insects, as they suck the juice from the inside of the leaves or tender stems and can be killed only by getting something on them that will burn them. Because they are usually on the under side of the leaves one must get the poison there and directly on them.

"For any of the eating insects, use a stomach poison such as arsenate of lead, Dutox, magnesian arsenate, etc. For a spray, use three teaspoons arsenate of lead to a gallon of water or five teaspoons magnesian arsenate, mixing in a small quantity of hydrated lime. With Dutox use two level teaspoons to a gallon of water. With Dutox use two level teaspoons to a gallon of water.

"If one prefers to apply these poisons as a dust, mix one part arsenate of lead with four parts hydrated lime, one part magnesian arsenate to three parts hydrated lime, one part Dutox with two or three parts of lime or flour, and dust on thoroughly, covering all leaves and tender twigs.

"Everyone with even a few flowers or vegetables about the place needs a small spray pump or a hand dust gun. The directions given for dusting or spraying flowers are also correct for vegetables."

Seeks Re-Election



To the Citizens of Eastland County
I think it eminently fitting that we should have a representative of the Forty-fourth Legislature in our legislative district, and that in making their support for re-election I think it behooves me to discuss at least a part of the issues I think most vital to the welfare of the people of Texas which must receive the consideration of the next Legislature.
During the regular session of the Forty-fourth Legislature it was my pleasure to sponsor a bill calling for the passage of an unemployment insurance act, designed to afford these unfortunate citizens of the state who find themselves out of employment a means of temporarily sustaining themselves, and compensation to make possible their return to work. This act I advocated in speaking with the program of a National Security bill providing for the payment of the State of Texas ninety per cent of the tax collected from the workers of this state in the event that Texas does provide for citizens with adequate unemployment insurance.
Believing firmly in the benefits of social security, it was my pleasure to participate in the writing and the passage of the present Texas Old Age Assistance Act. I recognize the deficiencies and inadequacies of this existing legislation, framed as it was, by a group of human legislators, and I can do no less than to pledge myself to do my utmost to see that the best effort is made in the next Legislature to correct those deficiencies which at present exist.
I think it well to call the attention of my people to the fact that during this past Legislature, it was my privilege to sponsor a dozen bills, and a bill designed to prevent the sale of worthless securities to the people of our state, and bills designed to curb the unscrupulous in our state through increasing depository institutions.
I call the attention of the people of my district to the fact that when my term of office began, the people of Texas were laboring under the heaviest tax burden that has ever been levied on this state. During my term of office, this tax rate has been reduced from approximately twenty to thirty cents a dollar of four and three-fourths to three and one-half cents on the dollar. While we have been making this substantial saving we appropriated five million dollars per year for the last year, four million dollars more than was ever before given to the state school children of Texas. Furthermore, we have this year had a net saving appropriation of \$1,250,000, the highest in the history of the state and even after this appropriation, the school fund will end this year with a balance of more than a million and one-half dollars in cash. At the beginning of my term of office, Texas had a bonded debt of \$1,000,000,000. At the expiration of my first term, Texas will owe less than fourteen million dollars worth of bonds and the interest on these bonds will have already been paid in August 11, 1937. This means that while we were spending five million dollars worth of bonds during the past two years, we were building up a fund to retire those bonds which now equal more than six million dollars.
Even a casual investigation into the finances of the state of Texas demonstrates its praiseworthy condition. I think it fitting that I call to the attention of the people of Eastland county that it was my privilege last year to write and pass an act to provide for the conservation of the water in Leon river and regulations of said river and regulations to be established by seasonal floods. The waters of the Leon river under the present act will now be conserved and utilized for the benefit of the agricultural in this county.
In making the people of my county for their support in the coming campaign, I dedicate myself to the proposition that the Old Age Assistance must be fairer and adequately supported, unemployment insurance must be successfully provided, and that the national program of social security must become a permanent part of the governmental structure in this state.
I dedicate myself and my policies to a program of economy believing that the revenue of Texas should be carefully guarded and wisely spent.
I assure the people of my district that I do not merely invite their suggestions, their assistance, and their help. Fundamentally, this government, being in democracy belongs to all of us and each man should participate in it.
I wish to express my most heartfelt thanks for the support given me for this office two years ago, and I earnestly and sincerely ask you to support the goals in the continuation of the policies which I have thus far begun.

WPA Projects in the County Have Filled Long-Felt Need

Survey of the Works Progress Administration projects, which have been completed and which are now in process of completion in this county, shows many permanent improvements that could have been made under any other agency than the WPA, aided by the local sponsors.

Improvements throughout the county, many remote sections have been "in the mud" for years, have been completed, and plans to connect these roads with other communities can be completed. Eastland county will better farm-to-market roads would have been possible out the WPA aid.

Only have the rural sections fitted by needed improvements, but Ranger, Eastland, Cisco and practically all the smaller roads in the county have been aided projects that otherwise would have been impossible and through deserving men and women have been given employment.

The survey of the projects in the county, which were inspected the part of the week, and which brought out the fact that the in this county has been amply supervised and that dollar-for-dollar value has been received on the projects.

A brief outline of the projects have been completed, or which nearing completion at this time, is the following accomplishment:

Refinishing inside and outside of building.

Improvements on the City Park below the Lake Cisco Dam have been completed. The total expenditure on this project was \$5,000.00, of which the WPA spent \$3,000.00, and the sponsor \$1,100. Twenty-five men were employed on this project over a period of six months. This project consisted of cleaning out the channel of creek below dam and swimming pool, preventing pools of stagnant water, lining of channel with rock and terracing banks of creek, building walks, drives and a small bridge.

A new water system has been installed in the Cisco Fish Hatchery at the cost of \$9,500.00. The WPA funds amounted to \$4,100 and the sponsor's \$3,400.00. This project provided work for 20 men over a period of six months.

Work was started a short time back on the \$30,000.00 water treatment plant at Cisco. Forty-five men are now employed on this project which is a most important project to the city of Cisco, which at present is using raw water from the lake.

Ranger

Repairs on the Girls' Dormitory and finishing the Auditorium and Recreation Building have been completed. This work gave employment to 20 men for two months and cost \$1,659.00, of which the WPA spent 1,009.00, and the sponsor \$650.00.

Work is now being completed on the streets of Ranger, 40,000 lin. ft. of gravel surfacing has been completed or approximately 75 miles. This work is 95 per cent complete and has provided work for 55 men for five months.

Eastland

Surfacing for the streets of Eastland has provided work for 65 men over a period of eight months and is 90 per cent complete. This

project is set up for 44,560 Lin. Ft. of street surfacing and 4,170 Lin. Ft. of retopping streets, a total of nine miles.

Carbon

Improvements and repairs have been completed on the Carbon School building and grounds. This project cost \$2,260.00, of which the WPA funds were \$2,929.00, and the sponsor's \$331.00.

Gorman

Four blocks are to be surfaced and 3,000 Ft. repaired on streets of Gorman. This project is 70 per cent complete and is employing eighteen men.

Precinct 1

Ranger, Cheaney, Ranger-Staff and Panhandle roads. Consisting of 15.35 miles. Seventy per cent complete. Rebuilding all drainage structures, replacing old wooden bridges with native stone, laid in concrete mortar with reinforced concrete tops with 28 foot roadways. Giving an all weather road from Ranger to Cheaney, from Cheaney to Eastland, and from Staff to Highway No. 1 west of Ranger. WPA funds \$37,566.62, sponsor \$5,493.58.

Eastland-Grapevine, from Highway 67 south of Eastland through the Grapevine community and from west of Manum where the proposed dam across the Leon is located, north by the Consolidated Booster Station to Highway 1. WPA funds \$28,248.75, sponsor, \$3,456.00, 13.8 miles.

Precinct 2

Desdemona, Eastland and Gorman-Ranger roads. Leading from Desdemona through Staff to Eastland and Ranger and from Gorman to Eastland and Ranger through Staff Fifty per cent complete. Consisting of 22.9 miles of road. WPA funds \$39,616.17, sponsor \$5,759.50.

Carbon, Okra and Long Branch community. Leading from Carbon

on highway 67 to Okra and on to Rising Star on Highway 23, also west to the Long Branch community. Eighty-five per cent complete. 8.55 miles. WPA funds \$16,938.00, sponsor \$3,572.00.

Gorman, Desdemona road. Replacing old asphalt road connecting the two towns. Consisting of 10 miles. Completed. WPA cost \$2,366. Sponsors \$1,313.00.

Precinct 3

Nimrod to Highway 23. Seven miles of roadway leading from Highway 23 to Nimrod connecting with road leading to Sabanno and Pioneer. Fifty per cent complete. WPA funds \$18,604.71; sponsor \$3,549.50.

Rising Star and Okra road. 12.2 miles, leading from Rising Star through Okra to Carbon. Forty per cent complete. WPA funds \$20,747.00, sponsor \$3,507.50.

Precinct 4

Scranton-Dothan road, leading north out of Scranton to Highway 1 at Dothan. 8.5 miles. Ninety-five per cent complete. Cost WPA funds \$11,705.13, sponsor \$1,914.50.

Cisco-Canyon leading from highway 23 north of Lake Cisco to the Stephens county line along the old Cisco and Breckenridge road. 4.4 miles. Seventy per cent complete. WPA funds \$13,072.46, sponsor \$2,957.00.

Cisco-Cottonwood and Dothan. 13.78 miles, leading north from Highway 1 through Cottonwood and Bluff Branch communities to Highway 23 and west by Cottonwood school and south to Highway 1 at Dothan. WPA funds \$33,238.68, sponsor \$3,840.25.

All lateral roads are being built on standard specification, with 60 foot right-of-way. All curves are being eliminated or flattened. Rock hills are being cut down to grade and graveled surface is being built 20 feet wide.

All wooden bridges are being replaced with native stone walls set in cement and mortar with reinforced concrete tops. All right-of-way dragged and fence rebuilt required. All ditches are being flattened and back sloped, and baffle walls built where necessary.

The lateral road work alone in Eastland county involves spending of \$259,232.30, and work for over 600 men for an average of six months. Projects already submitted and approved by the WPA for lateral road work is sufficient to employ the above number of men for another full year, if the men and money are available to do the work.

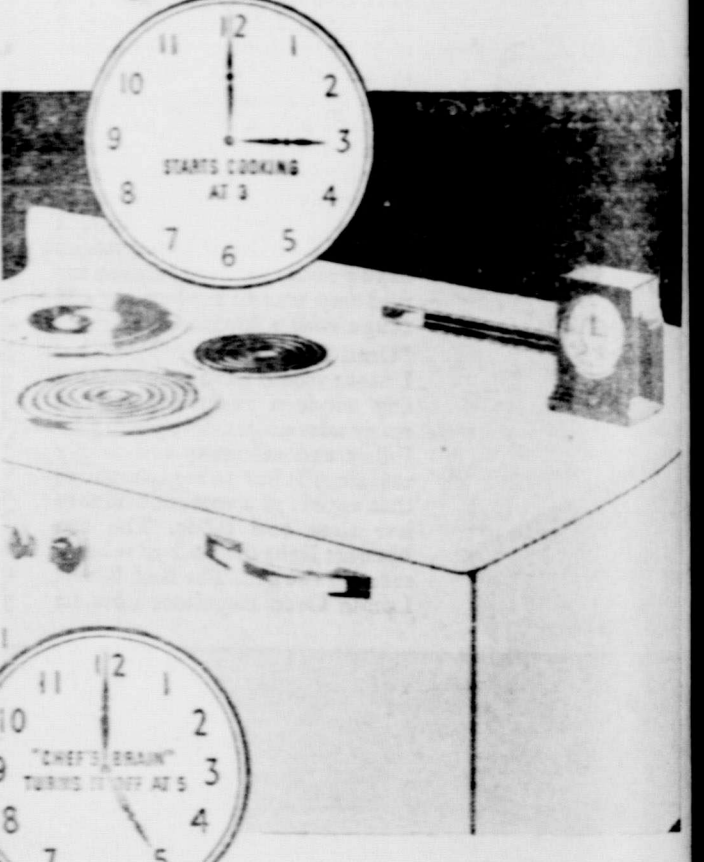

Cisco School Girls Get Instructions Appearance-Expense-Home-Yard Care

Cisco Home Economics Teacher
Girls taking Home Economics in Cisco are for the first time carrying on their work during the summer and are getting credit for that work. On Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, girls will meet at the high school to report progress and check their plans. This meeting will be followed by home visits by the home economics teacher, and a picnic at the close of the summer with the girls and their mothers present.

All three large projects being carried on by the 103 girls this summer have smaller sub-divisions. The clothing project includes keeping a clothing budget; caring for clothes; darning and mending; or buying new clothes; improving health habits, and improving appearance of hair, nails, and complexion. There are 43 girls at work on this project.

The home and yard improvement project may include home gardens; planting flowers, caring for lawns and porches; and rearranging and possibly remodeling certain rooms in the house. There are 36 girls carrying on this project.

The foods project is very diversified. It may include keeping food expense accounts and budgets; planning menus and serving meals; and rearranging or building storage place for foods. The more advanced girls are attempting to make and carry out adequate time schedules for their work in this field.

Three main projects are being undertaken. They are: first, improving personal appearance and keeping expense accounts; second, home and yard improvement; third, meal planning and serving.

Each project usually begins with one thing and gradually grows and expands until it takes in a large field. For instance, Bobbie Grace McWhorter's project began with the problem of cleaning up her closet. She did this and realized that open shelves and an open rack for her clothes was not very helpful in keeping her closet clean and orderly. She had a carpenter build doors and cover the shelves and build a cabinet for her clothes rack. She used beaver-board and old lumber and the work cost her nothing since the carpenter took his pay out of her mother's grocery store. Bobbie still had low open shelves that were not covered. She gathered all the grocery boxes that she could find and put handles on them. She labeled each box and it served as a drawer. She plans now to paint the whole closet and to remove the varnish from the floor in her bedroom. She will then varnish the floor and rearrange the room. From this piece of work, she hopes to go

on to rearranging the other rooms of the house. All of this work was carried on by the girl—with the interested and helpful cooperation of her family.

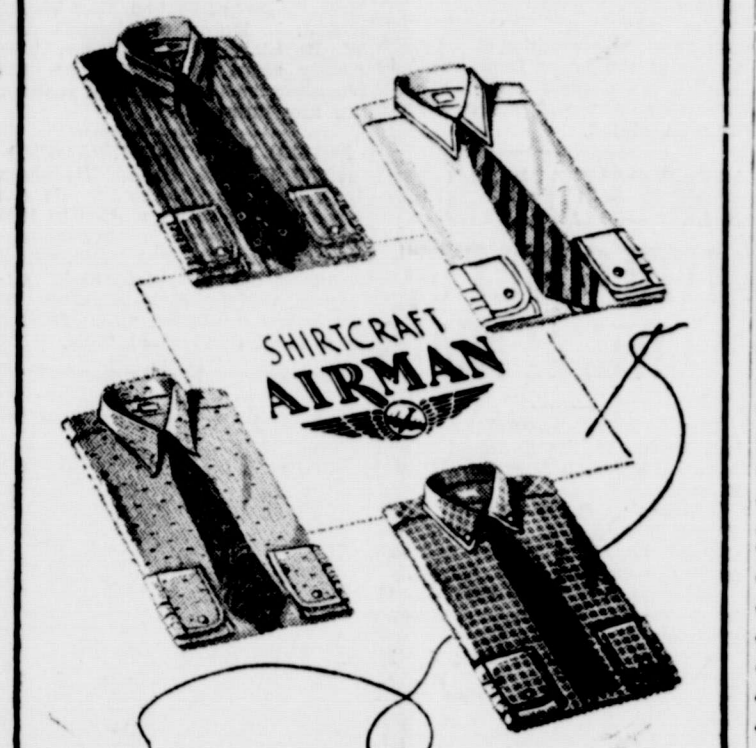

EASTLAND P. O. CONTRACT LET IN WASHINGTON

Farmers Experiment Inoculating Peas

Several Eastland county farmers are inoculating cowpeas, peanuts and other legumes to determine whether the practice pays in the county. The inoculant being used is a commercial preparation containing the necessary bacteria which is mixed with the seed before planting. The inoculant used was obtained by the county agent who is interested in learning the benefits and passing the information on to other farmers.

In speaking of using inoculants, Mr. E. A. Miller, extension agronomist, stated: "Judging from the reports of demonstration, especially cowpeas, soybeans, and peanuts, results of the experiment station at Nacogdoches where the inoculation of cowpeas last year gave a 42 per cent average increase in storage for all varieties, it is very important that we lay more stress on artificial inoculation."

The increase in size of vines is not the only benefit expected as the bacteria in the inoculant attach themselves to the roots of the plant, forming small nodules and taking nitrogen from the air adding it to the soil. Nitrogen is the most expensive element found in fertilizers and is very essential to normal plant growth.

Some of the growers who are inoculating are H. M. Gilbert and H. R. Gilbert of Carbon, Dick Weeks and J. L. Brown of Alameda and W. B. Starr of Dan Horn. The county agent advises that he still has some inoculant on hand if there are any interested.

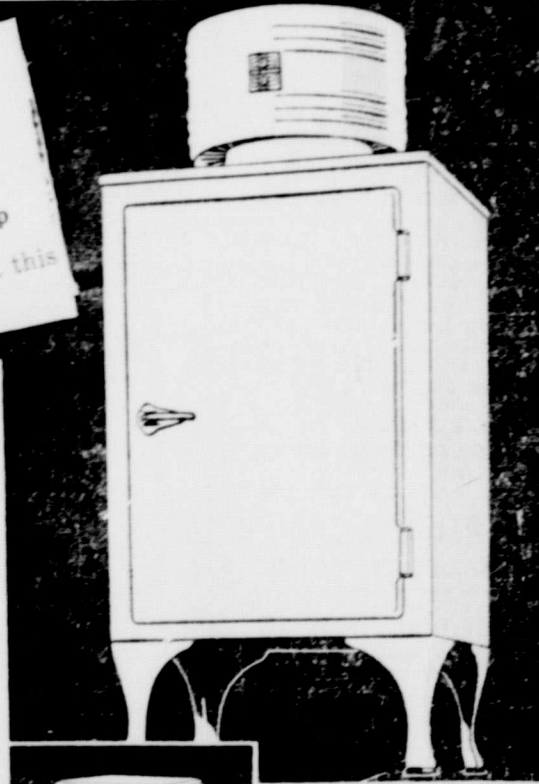
