R. L. PONSLER HEADS CISCO GENIUS SEARCH

Who will succeed Thomas A. Edison? One hundred scholarships will be awarded annually in the United States in this search for genius. These scholarships will be provided as a living memorial to the great inventor and will be made possible by a fund now being raised by public subscription from coast to coast. R. L. Ponsler, oil and gas operator, has been named chairman for the Cisco area by Col. W. B. Tuttle of San Antonio, state chairman, and the campaign will be completed before the end of June. Industry everywhere, especially those which have benefited or are based on Edison inventions, and improvements are lending a hand and are making substantial responses to requests for donations. A state qualification board will be set up in Texas to certify applicants for the Edison Scholarship and final awards will be made by the national board. However, there is a stipulation that at least one scholarship must be awarded in each state each year. Scholastic lines will not be followed in making these awards. Young men and women who show special aptitude in the field of science and invention will receive these scholar grants or scholarships. This plan for bringing unusual youth an unusual opportunity together was started in 1929 by Mr. Edison himself who offered a single scholarship. There were 100,000 applications for this honor. Last year the Thomas Alva Edison Foundation was organized and 100 scholarships annually was agreed upon as "a living memorial" to the great pioneer. The work of raising the endowment was immediately undertaken.

LANDON SPEAKS TO NATION

CLEVELAND, June 12 — (U.P.) — Governor Alf M. Landon sent his personal leadership echoing across the nation today by a bold and politically potent intervention in building the platform on which he seeks the presidency. The new republican leader, amid a burst of hardy enthusiasm for his courage and speculation on the political wisdom of his maneuver—when by remote control from Topeka he pressed his nomination by going beyond the platform to favor a constitutional amendment on hours and wages for women and children, if necessary; a potential future return to the gold standard and a drastic policy upon removal of government jobs from the revived the long shadow of a party conflict with senator William E. Borah, which leaders believed they had removed in the last hectic hours of platform building. The Landon declaration on gold and a constitutional amendment conflicted with Borah's strongly expressed

ECLIPSE STUDY ON JUNE 19 SET FOR 36 PARTIES

MOSCOW, June 12 — (U.P.) — Preparations are nearing completion in Soviet Russia for the observation of the total eclipse of the sun which will be seen June 19 in a zone extending from the Caucasus across the Southern Urals and Siberia to the Pacific Ocean. Foundations for celestials and other complex up-to-date installations have been erected in 16 main observation points in this zone. Days before the eclipse, 25 Soviet and 11 foreign astronomical and geophysical expeditions will arrive in the zone. Some now are installing instruments and completing preparations for photographing all phases of the eclipse and studying the spectrum of the solar corona, the microstructure of the chromosphere of the sun and its corona.

Plans For Harvard Party

The chief astronomical observation in Pukovo is sending its expeditions to Siberia and the Southern Urals. They will be joined by expeditions of the Harvard University and by Italian astronomers. A group of Soviet astronomers headed by V. G. Fessenkov and Professor I. A. Kazansky and also expeditions of the American Geographical Society and of the Paris Observatory have left for Kustanai (east southern Urals). Another group of staff members of the Moscow Astronomical Institute, headed by Professor A. A. Mikhalov, has departed for Kulybyshev (Far East). The program of this expedition is of exceptional interest, as it includes the checking of Einstein's theory of relativity by measuring the deviation of the ray of light in the zone of gravitation of the sun. The special instrument for observing Einstein's effect has been designed by Professor A. Mikhalov. Leningrad astronomers are leaving for Kalmukovo, near Urals, and for Krasnoyarsk, where an expedition of the Tashkent Observatory also will arrive. Astronomers of the Kharkov Observatory are leaving for the village Belorechenskaya, where an expedition of the French Astronomical Society also will work.

Zoologists to Make Study

Eight geophysical observatories and institutes of the Soviet are sending expeditions to the zone of the total eclipse to carry out studies in actinometry, dynamics of the atmosphere and its electrical properties. The Siberian Physical and Technical Institute will study the ionosphere by means of radio-signals. The Institute of Physics of the Academy of Sciences is sending scientists to the Caucasus to study the expansion of radiowaves in the atmosphere during the eclipse in the Urals, a party of zoologists will conduct biological observations. In Krasnoyarsk and near Orenburg, Soviet scientists intend to make high altitude flights in airplanes to study the cosmic luminosity of the sky and the optical properties of the atmosphere during the eclipse. The Moscow Planetarium is making preparations to photograph the eclipse from the ground and air.

TAHOKA, June 12 — (U.P.) — Justice of the Peace W. S. Swan today began an inquiry into the cause of the death of an unidentified man, believed to be a Mexican, whose skeleton was plowed up Thursday by R. L. Hagleron on his farm 20 miles east of Tahoka. Investigators estimated that the man had been dead at least six months. The skeleton was found in a cotton patch.

REV. ESKRIDGE ACTED QUEERLY IN EARLY DAYS

HOUSTON, June 12 — — Reverend C. Edgar Eskridge, Baptist preacher, began his erratic conduct in the early days of his ministry, witnesses said at his murder trial today. One of his eccentric actions was to conduct a burial service for empty extract bottles, and whiskey flasks, according to J. R. Sessions of Freestone county, a state witness. Eskridge is on trial in district court, charged with murdering police chief, Ed O'Reilly, at Orange, on May 29, 1935. His attorneys claim he was insane and unaccountable for his action when the slaying occurred.

STRIKES HARD AT MONOPOLY IN DALLAS TALK

DALLAS, June 12 — (U.P.) — The administration was restoring democracy in government, President Roosevelt told the nation today, as he struck hard at monopoly and pledged guarantees of government protection to small business and to labor. Standing bareheaded under a scorching Texas sun, the chief executive addressed an audience of 40,000 that packed every inch of the Cotton Bowl, the stadium on the grounds of the Texas Centennial exposition. Mr. Roosevelt's "democracy in opportunity" was hailed by friends as a rallying cry for the next campaign and symbolized to them a blanket reply to charges of the opposition that the government was slowly crushing private initiative. At the same time his blast at "control in the hands of the few" was interpreted as the serving of notice that the administration would move forward in its attempt at regulation. The address, the second major one on his tour of the southwest, was frequently punctuated by rousing cheers from the huge crowd that, in spite of the heat, paid close attention to his remarks. "The net results of monopoly," he told them, "the net results of economics and financial control in the hands of the few has meant the ownership of labor as a commodity. If labor is to be a commodity in the United States, in the final analysis it means that we shall become a nation of boarding houses, instead of a nation of homes. If our people ever submit to that, they will have said good-bye to their historic freedom. Men do not fight for boarding houses. They will fight for their homes." The president wished his spectators, and the Texas Centennial "all the luck in the world."

RANGE REPORT FOR LIVESTOCK GOOD IN TEXAS

AUSTIN, June 12 — (U.P.) — Range conditions are the best since 1932, and livestock is in "very good condition." This bright aspect for the cattle business was given in the U. S. Department of Agriculture, June Range and Live Stock report for Texas, issued today. Further cheering news is that prospects for summer and fall grazing are good. Statistically, the range is 88 per cent normal, compared with 74 per cent a month ago; cattle 85 per cent compared with 80 per cent last month. Sheep range was 90 per cent compared with 73 per cent for May. Sheep 87 per cent and goats 88 per cent of normal in comparison with 81 and 83 per cent in May.

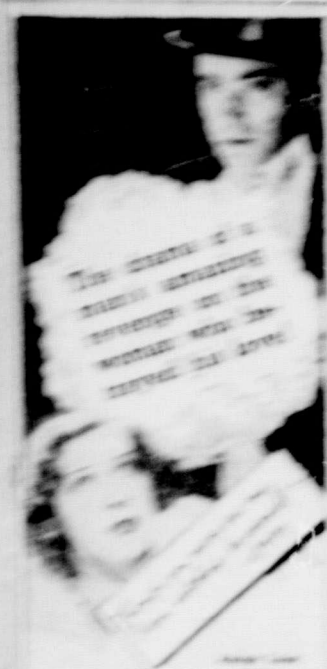

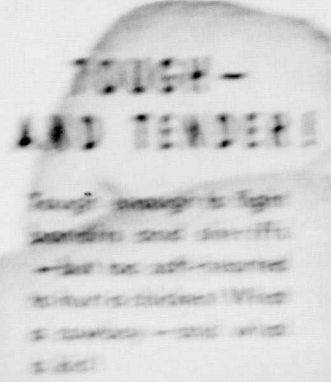

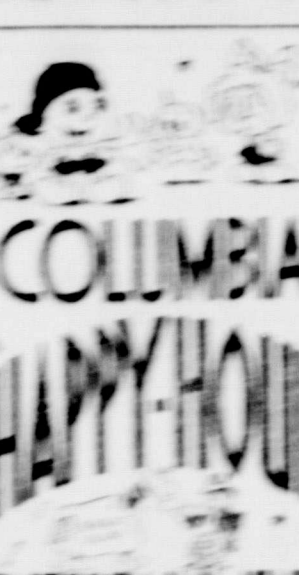
