### Returned from Dead Is Sorry He Died

HOUSTON.—(UP)—Captain J. A. Klauhin, one of a group of seamen who "returned from the dead," was very sorry he "died" because of his family.

Klausein is the master of the S. S. Eglantine, a freighter reported lost at sea last February with 33 men aboard. The reported tragedy occurred in a terrific typhoon 160 miles east of the Japanese coast during a voyage from Houston to Yokohama.

"It's mighty funny not to think of being reported dead but when I sailed into Yokohama and read that I was dead it made me feel very sad on account of my family," said Klausein.

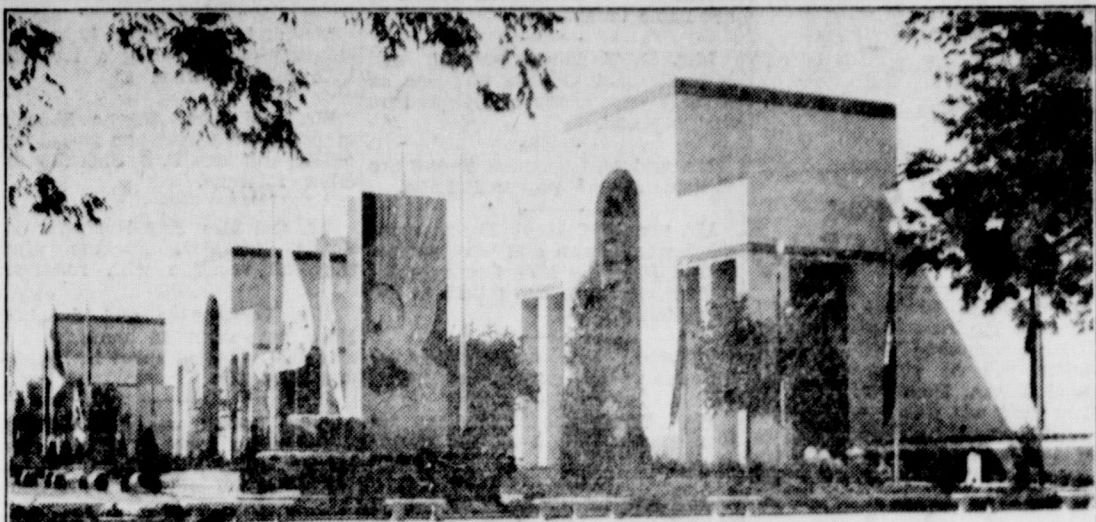
The storm, he related, brought the Houston sea captain a scroll of honor from the Japanese government for standing by a Japanese ship in distress. The foreign vessel was out of fuel oil and asked to be towed. A storm came up and the otw rope broke.

In the midst of the typhoon, the Eglantine circled the troubled Japanese craft to aid in case of emergency, while high seas decommissioned the Americans' radio. After waiting vainly for a relay from the Eglantine, company agents reported the captain and crew were lost at sea.

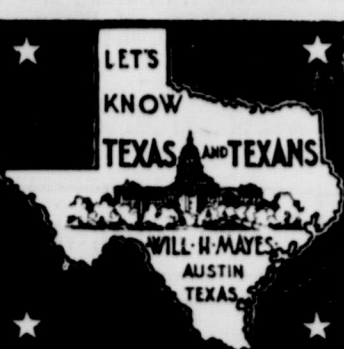
Captain Klausein has been a seaman for 36 years. He was born at Riga, Latvia.

**Q. Who are the Tiguas Indians, appearing at the Texas Centennial? T. A. Dublin.**

A. Probably spelled "Teguas," or "Taguas," a family of the Texas tribe, who were Caddo Indians.

**Q. In what year did individuals loan money to the State of Texas for financial support of the government? B. J. W. C. de Leon.**

A. The State has always secured funds by the sale of bonds or lands, but loans of \$200,000 or more were made by individuals at New Orleans early in 1836, through Col. William Cristy, to help in the Mexican campaign.

**Q. When was the first Episcopal Church in Texas founded? R. D. Stephenville.**

A. Episcopalians recently celebrated the establishment of the mother church by Rev. Caleb S. Ives, at Matagorda in 1858.

**Q. Tell something of Collin McKinney. E. B. Farmersville.**

A. He was a surveyor, 70 years old, when the convention of March, 1836, to which he was a delegate, from Red River municipality, was held, and served on the important committees to draft the declaration of independence and the constitution. He was a quiet, unobtrusive man and took little part in speechmaking. Collin county and McKinney were named for him.

### Bumper Crop Prize Turkeys Expected

CROSBYTON, July 6. — "The prospects for a bumper crop of prime turkeys from the Joe E. McDuff farm in Fairview community in Crosby county are extremely good when the turkey feeding practices of this farm are considered," stated Ralph Howe, county agricultural agent, in a recent report.

Mrs. Joe E. McDuff, who has charge of the turkeys on this farm, has 231 fine quality pouls that are already well feathered and making rapid growth.

"There are several reasons for this progress," the county agricultural agent commented, "namely, located in the brooder house are sanitary water fountains and hoppers for mash and cracked grain. In other hoppers there are oyster shell and grit. Also, the brooder house floor, which is well littered, is changed once a week."

Howe reports that around the brooder house, a green wheat pasture is being used and that Sudan grass is beginning to come up and will be ready before the wheat is gone.

### Detectives Fishing Get Herion Supply

DALLAS.—(UP)—Dallas detectives went fishing and caught several capsules of heroin valued at \$25,500.

The officers battered their way into a house in South Dallas, arrested two men, reputedly wholesale narcotic distributors, and discovered the cache of the narcotics in an open file.

By employing the use of a fishing rod and reel which they found hidden in a closet of the house, the detectives pulled the heroin out of the hiding place.

After searching the house, unsuccessfully for a time, Detective Dick Gardner noticed the rod, reel and line and found an open file.

"I'm going fishing," he announced, as he cast the line up the flue. The artificial lure with hooks attached at the end caught on an object and the detective began reeling in his catch. The catch proved to be a box containing heroin.

The arrest of the two men ended a six month search by Detective Gardner and his partner, Detective Fred Erlar, for one of the sources of widespread wholesale distribution of narcotics in Dallas.

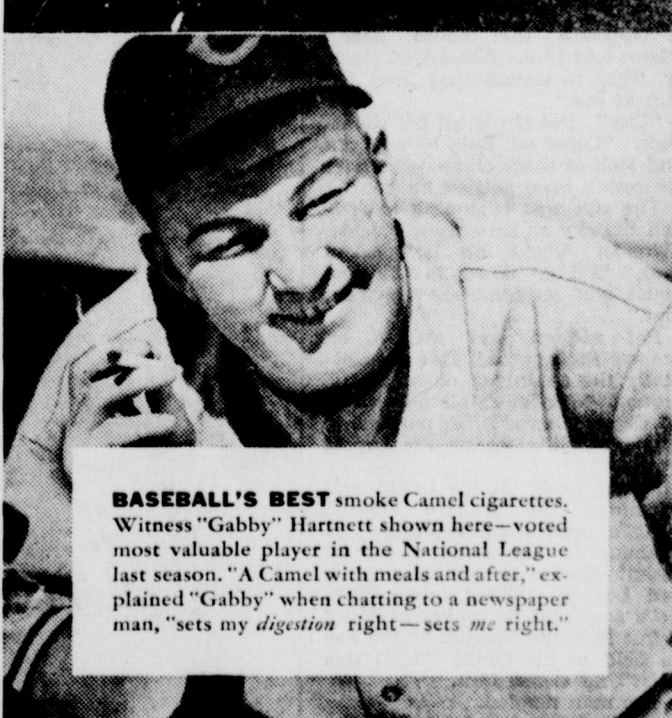

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Use Imagination in Night Lighting of Your Garden  
Properly-planned night lighting transforms the garden into a veritable fairyland of color and beauty.  
Rubber-covered, waterproof wiring equipment and clear or inside-frosted lamp bulbs are essential. These may be connected to an outlet on the porch or in the basement of your home. If you have some weatherproof Christmas-tree lamp strings, use them in flower beds, or inter-twined among shrubs, or even on the bottom of the fish pool. The first rule of the game in garden lighting is that the sources of light be concealed. The machinery of beauty must not show through. In most gardens it is not difficult to obey this rule. Floodlighting equipment can be hidden under a shrub or high in a tree top. But whether it comes from above or below, the light must be out of sight.  
Plants and shrubs should be lighted from two or more directions to emphasize their form, and to avoid a "flat" effect. And use colored bulbs anywhere except the fish pool, else the colors of flowers will be distorted.  
A small spotlight attached to side of, or concealed under the eave of the garage roof, may be directed onto a flower bed or into the shadows of a hedge. Sometimes these spotlights may be used in the form of individually-made houses. They look attractive and do a splendid lighting job.  
The insect problem need be a problem at all, for it has been found that the lights draw the insects away from the house, rather than attract them to it.  
A few light touches here, there will literally work magic in your garden, and enable you to enjoy its beauty long, long after sun goes down.
