WRECKS MOST MONEY SPENT

The nation today counted its toll of lives in mishaps during the Independence Day celebration at more than 400.

A United Press survey by states showed at least 408 had died by accident. The number of fatalities resulting from fireworks was abnomally small; only 8, and in view of the record-breaking movement of the population to resorts, parks, lakes and beaches, the toll from other accidents was considerably smaller than predicted by insurance company statisticians.

Millions crowded highways to sunseek relief from the hot July 4th at resorts and at least 207 were killed in automobile mishaps; of the hundreds of thousands who went to rivers, lakes and beaches, 111 were drowned; 5 died in airplane accidents and other accidents, claimed a total of at least 78 lives.




