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#### THAT POLL TAX BILL AGAIN!

From The Cotton Trade Journal  
(Memphis, Tenn.)  
For the fifth time, the House has  
passed an anti-poll tax bill. It is  
now in the hands of the Senate,  
where we hope it will die, for  
the fifth time, the ignoble death  
it deserves.  
We do not defend the principle  
of poll taxes, or any other levies,  
as a prerequisite for voting either  
in Federal or State elections. But  
we do point to the provision in the  
Constitution which empowers the  
several States to set their own vot-  
ing qualifications. Had the Con-  
stitution's framers thought it ad-  
visable to limit that power to elec-  
tion to State office only, they cer-  
tainly would not have hesitated  
to make that clear.  
Proponents of the measure point

to the fact that only seven South-  
ern States are directly affected—  
but in truth the proposed legisla-  
tion is of far greater significance  
to every American: if passed, it  
would serve as the entering wedge  
for the entire Truman "civil rights"  
program which would make a  
scrap of paper of the 10th amend-  
ment of the Constitution. It would  
be a long step on the road toward  
complete statism—a road which  
the Truman administration seems  
intent on following despite the om-  
inous warnings offered by exam-  
ples of Socialism in Europe.

We quote Thomas Jefferson—  
claimed by the administration as a  
political "patron saint":  
"I am for preserving to the  
States the powers not yielded by  
them to the Union. I am not for  
transferring all the powers of the  
States to the General Government,  
and all those of that Government  
to the executive branch."

Our thanks go to the gallant  
Southern members of Congress  
who are carrying forward the prin-  
ciples of Jeffersonian democracy  
against the attacks of an entrenched  
bureaucracy which seeks to ex-  
tend the hold of Federal govern-  
ment into every aspect of Ameri-  
can life!

and left to themselves, they ap-  
pear helpless and bored, while  
children who never went to  
camp and lacked the many  
camp advantages are much  
happier.

The above does not mean we  
should deprive our children of  
camp life; but it does mean that  
camp owners should overcome  
this drawback.

This correction is  
even more im-  
portant in con-  
nection with the  
recreational pro-  
grams which  
cities and towns  
are now putting  
on for children.  
Certain mornings  
each week I see a class of chil-  
dren following, like little soldiers,  
a teacher to the beach or a play-  
ground. They—like the camp  
children—are having their days  
planned for them during the sum-  
mer vacation as well as during  
the school terms. As these chil-  
dren will be entirely "on their own"  
after graduating from school and  
going to work, it seems only reason-  
able to let them take care of  
themselves for two months each  
year so as to get used to indi-  
vidual responsibility.

**Labor Leaders And  
Politicians**  
Certainly our public schools are  
not developing individual respon-

sibility. They have also been carefully  
watched in other towns. Tucum-  
cari, N. M., for instance, instal-  
led meters only to withdraw them  
after the trial period. Many other  
towns passed up the opportunity  
entirely.

Parking meters in Hereford, we  
would say, have been a success.  
Like most questions this one defi-  
nitely has two sides. People natu-  
rally resent regimentation and  
lament loud and long when they  
receive a red ticket. Furthermore,  
the streets sometimes look barren  
and deserted.

In contrast to these objections  
is the fact that store owners and  
employees have been forced to  
move their own cars off Main  
Street, leaving ample room for  
customer parking. Strange, too is  
the fact that rural customers fre-  
quently praise the parking meters,  
declaring that for one cent they  
are able to run in, make a pur-  
chase, and be on their way with  
a saving on gasoline and tires  
many times over the parking cost,  
which places them in front of their  
objective rather than two or four  
blocks distant.

Advocates on each side of the  
question can easily find plenty of  
support. The majority, however  
would object strenuously if the  
parking meters were removed.  
—Hereford Brand.

### Fat Calves Will Make Good Beef

COLLEGE STATION, Aug. 16.—  
Now is the time to start getting  
that milk pen calf ready for the  
locker plant this fall, says Roy W.  
Snyder, extension meats specialist  
of Texas A. & M. College. You  
want tender, juicy and tasty  
beef in your locker box and you  
can have it if the calf you butch-  
er is fat.

Snyder adds that a thin animal  
with no external fat usually pro-  
duces meat that is dry, tough and  
stringy but a fat calf furnishes the  
kind of meat that we all like to  
eat. There is fat mixed with the  
lean muscles and that is what  
makes a juicy steak or roast.  
Snyder says, he likes a calf that  
will weigh about 500 pounds on  
foot and is fat. It will dress out  
about 270 pounds—135 pounds to  
the side—and this does not include  
the heart, tongue and liver. It is  
easy, he says, to cut to fit any  
size family. The roasts can be cut  
either large or small and you  
can't do this with a thin small  
calf. The short ribs from this kind  
of calf are also very good. You'll  
find them juicy and tasty because  
of that mixture of lean and fat.

A beef type animal is desirable  
but a milk pen calf makes a good  
substitute and they are available  
on most farms, says Snyder. So  
long as the calf gets milk and  
good grazing, it will do well but  
when the grass begins to dry up,  
supplemental feeding is necessary.  
This is the feed that will make  
the good beef. The grain ration  
should be increased as the calf  
gets older and if grazing is not  
available, it is advisable says Snyder,  
to feed hay or other rough-  
age with the grain.
