Careful Living For Hot Weather

Keeping cool and standing the heat during the hot summer months is in a large measure dependent upon the individual, health authorities agree. Over indulgence in food or exercise may cause much suffering. The clothes we wear and the food we eat play an important role in keeping us comfortable during the hot season, said Dr. John W. Brown, State Health Officer. Summer clothing should be light in weight and color and of a porous texture. White clothes reflect the rays of the sun and therefore are cooler. Frequent change of clothing, particularly of that next to the skin, is especially conducive to comfort. The summer diet should consist of light, nutritious and easily digested foods. Fresh fruits and vegetables are particularly desirable as hot weather foods because of their ease of digestion and wide range of variety in the manner they may be served. Meat and heavy pastries should be eaten sparingly. A balanced diet may be maintained without these foods. Do not eat when you are tired. Exercise should be taken in hot weather but good judgment must be used in the amount that is taken. Swimming is fine exercise and is more refreshing than other forms of exercise. If sun baths are to be indulged in, care should be taken to accustom the skin by exposing the body for short periods in the beginning. Plenty of rest is necessary during hot weather. Sleep a sufficient number of hours and eat at regular meal times. Acquire regular habits of living and develop a cheerful outlook on life, and you will find that it will help you to spend a comfortable summer at home or on vacation.

ALLRED SCORES UNTRUTH TALK ON PENSIONS

ABILENE, July 14.—(SPL)—The next time he calls the legislature into special session it will be for constructive work and not for politics, Governor James V. Allred said here last night in answering critics of his failure to call a third special session to raise revenue for old age assistance.

He spoke at an "All West Texas Rally" under the floodlights on the Simmons University Athletic field, which was attended by hundreds of electors from all over the plains country.

Even if a third special session had been called immediately after the end of the second session, old age assistance payment would not have been started any sooner, Governor Allred said, because one of the men who is opposing me for a second term would have been lambasted for doing it," he said. "Having refused to call an extra session before the facts justify it, I am still being lambasted.

"I am being criticized now by the same men who would have criticized me for calling another session.

"I have the satisfaction of knowing however, that I haven't wasted \$150,000 or \$200,000 worth of your money on another futile session. When I call the legislature again it will be for constructive work, not politics."

No constructive plan for providing revenue for old age assistance can possibly be worked out until the needs are known, Governor Allred explained. He reminded his audience that the legislature already has rejected a tax program submitted by him which would have made adequate provision for all governmental needs, including old age assistance.

"I submitted a 16-page printed report to the legislature on my tax recommendations," he said. "It called for reasonable increases in taxes on oil, pipelines, sulphur and all natural resources.

"In keeping with my campaign promise, I asked the legislature to submit a constitutional amendment to provide old age pensions under the Federal social security laws. We did not know what amounts would be allotted for their needs in keeping with the terms of federal social security laws.

"If I had called the session the legislature would have wanted to know how much money was needed and no one could have answered. Then I would have been lambasted
