

"Gradually we are coming to understand," remarks a thoughtful columnist, "that government is science. That is a new theory, born of a new age-an age which though rooted in politics will eventually sidetrack old political doctrines and percedents.'

Yes-to some degree. But there are sciences and sciences. To be precise, there are material sciences and human

The material sciences, such as chemistry, physics, geology, etc., are concrete. There is a definite body of knowledge, and when you learn that, you've got it. There isn't much ground for argument. You simply learn it and apply it. Everybody can do the same and get about the same re-

The "human sciences," which includes economics and politics, are different. They deal with human beings, and human beings are infinitely variable in make-up and behav-

There is no agreement even regarding the nature of the raw material of these sciences. What is man himself? What is society? What is the relation of the individual to the crowd, of the citizen to the nation? Every scientist in this field has a different idea about it.

Even when people agree on the principles of governmental science, there is the problem of applying them, which is still more difficult. Givernment is not only a science but an art. The scientific part is the theory. The art is the application. The ablest political scientist is likely to have trouble when he begins putting his political theories into practice. 




