



WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 18(U.P. -Federal drouth relief officials blanned today to expend more than \$100,000.000 to care for upwards of 500,000 farm families including 2,-000,000 persons this winter.

Appeals for additional aid from more than a score of states and continued drouth, caused officials to revise their estimates sharply upward.


Estimates of the number of families that will need relief included Texas, 5,000.
