Suggest Crop Insurance Be Substituted

LOUIS TABER GRANGE HEAD VISITS FDR

HYDE PARK, N. Y., Aug. 20 (UP)—Officials of the national grange suggested to President Roosevelt today that crop insurance be substituted for drought relief. Louis Taber, head of the grange, estimated that a crop insurance program could be initiated for \$25,000,000 a year. "The farmer does not want charity," he explained, "and the insurance scheme would go a long way toward the creation of an intelligent method of approaching the situation." He admitted the insurance proposal could not be enacted specifically. He said certain constitutional objections, both state and national, would have to be ironed out first. Taber discussed crop insurance several weeks ago with Gov. Alf Landon of Kansas, who at that time represented him as sympathetic to the aims of the grange. Taber's program would embrace state and federal cooperation, with the farmer contributing a nominal share, probably through registration fees.

Landon Heads Into Farm Belt On Tour

ABERCARD THE LANDON SPECIAL TRAIN, Aug. 20 (UP)—Governor Alf Landon headed into the farm belt on his first campaign tour today, after a rousing western farewell. Headed for Pennsylvania and New York the republican presidential nominee boarded his special train at LaSalle, Colo., and began with Colorado party leaders the first of a series of cross-country political conferences.

GARRETT REVIEWS CHARGES OF OPPONENT IN DUBLIN SPEECH

"It became such a racket, the way Blanton handled his postmasters, so ridiculous was his method in Eastland and Callahan counties that the Democratic Committees passed resolutions in censure of him," said Judge Clyde L. Garrett, candidate for congress, in his speech at Dublin last night before a large crowd of citizens on a down-town street intersection. "Blanton disfranchised the farmers by not letting those who live more than a mile from the post office vote in a community election for postmasters." Still referring to the postmasters, Garrett said, "I favor placing postmasters under the merit system, a plan by which the best qualified get the job." "Our great president did not ask Blanton to select postmasters who supported Roosevelt. There is a letter from John Garner in regard to the postmasters. Are you going to believe John Garner never been tried and ability have never been questioned, or Tom Blanton?" "Voters Not Trusted" "Some voters in this district asked for the privilege of voting on postmasters, and Blanton would not grant it. He knew the man he had promised would never get the vote. FORMER COACH OF OIL-BELT DIES OF HEAT

S. J. (Red) Petty, Jr., coach at East Texas Teachers colleges, died yesterday after he was overcome by heat from playing golf. He was stricken while playing on the course about 2 p. m. and was carried to a Fort Worth hospital where he died about 6 p. m. His wife was with him when he died and his body was taken to Decatur. Petty was a coach at Eastland high school in 1932 going later to Mineral Wells to serve in the same capacity. He played in the East-West classic at San Francisco in 1928 and became an outstanding conference basketball and football official. He was a star at Decatur high school and at A. & M. college. Petty is survived by his wife, a brother, Jim (Tom) Petty, who played end at Baylor university for three years and who is now football coach at Nocona high school, three sisters and his parents, Dr. and Mrs. S. J. Petty of Decatur.

C., Aug. 20 (UP)—The average American family may be given a saving next year of from \$10 to \$50 in luxury taxes, it developed today as treasury and congressional tax experts studied proposed repeal of various "high collection costs" in taxes. In the category tentatively, it was understood, are taxes on sporting goods, furs, creator of missions club dues and jewelry. Approximately \$50,000,000 in taxes of the nuisance variety are considered susceptible to revision by administration experts because of the high collection costs.

Crude Oil Estimate Is 2,864,000 Bbls.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 20 (UP)—The U. S. Bureau of Mines today recommended 2,864,000 barrels as the daily average production of crude oil for September. The figure was 72,900 barrels below August. Recommended production for Texas was 1,123,900 barrels.

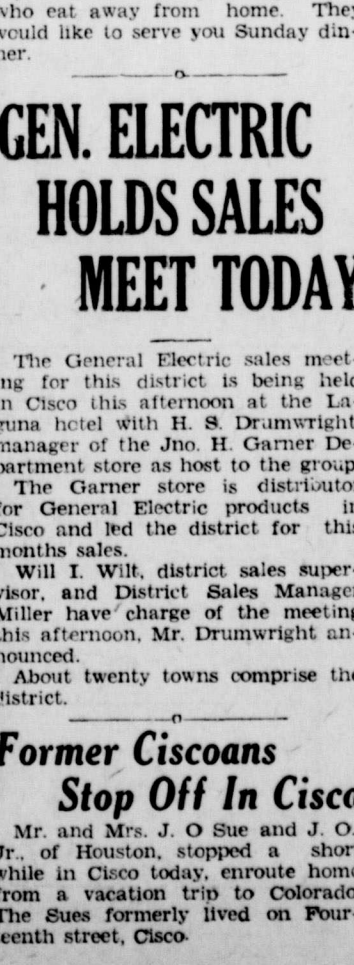
Housetop Sleeper Is Heart Victim

TAILOR JUMPS 20 STORIES TO MEET DEATH

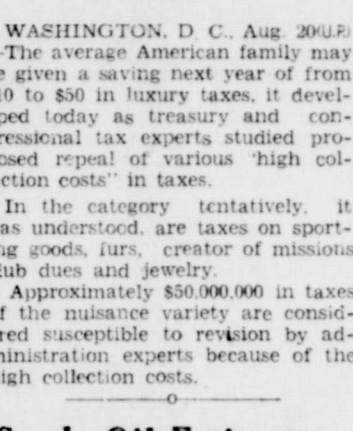

5,000 IN TEXAS INCLUDED IN DROUTH AREA

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 18 (UP)—Federal drouth relief officials planned today to expend more than \$10,000,000 to care for upwards of 500,000 farm families including 2,600,000 persons this winter. Appeals for additional aid from more than a score of states and continued drouth, caused officials to revise their estimates sharply upward. Estimates of the number of families that will need relief included Texas, 5,000.

State Revenue Fund Reported Increased

AUSTIN, Aug. 20 (UP)—Deficit in the state's general revenue fund had increased today to \$9,742,556 as outstanding warrants totalling \$432,046 were called for payment. Deficit at the time of the last call August 5, was \$9,087,672.

30 CARLOADS ENROUTE TO SPANISH GOV'T

MEXICO CITY, Mex., Aug. 20 (UP)—More than 30 railway carloads of war munitions are enroute to the Spanish government from Mexico City, reliable informants said today. Confirmation of the destination, and of the implication that the aid of the left wing government of Spain came from the left wing government of Mexico would be calculated not only to shatter any hope of a neutrality agreement, but to enrage Benito Mussolini and Adolph Hitler leaders of the government of Italy and Germany. It was learned definitely that the munitions left Mexico City for Vera Cruz in two special trains yesterday.

GERMANS TO ANSWER FORCE WITH FORCE

BERLIN, Germany, Aug. 20 (UP)—Rear Admiral Carlis, commander of German warships in Spanish waters in a message to the Spanish navy commander today threatened "to answer force with force" if there is a repetition of the incident in which two loyalist war vessels stopped the German steam ship, Kamerun, off Cadiz.

Casualties Great

HENDAYE—1,000 men are dying each day in the Spanish civil war, it was estimated here today.

GERMAN TO LEAVE DANGER ZONE

BERLIN, Germany, Aug. 20 (UP)—The German vice consul intends to leave San Sebastian with 25 German nationals because it is dangerous to remain there, it was announced today.

Rebel Ship Hit

HENDAYE—The San Marcos fort near San Sebastian hit the rebel ship Espana with a shell today tearing away one of its two funnels.

Rescue Workers Are Near Entombed Men

MOBERLY, Mo., Aug. 20 (UP)—Rescue workers seeking to reach four entombed men in the Esry coal mine renewed their efforts, with the goal in sight today. Sixteen feet of debris remained to be penetrated before they break into the main room of the tunnel, which is either the tomb, or the prison of four men trapped by a cavern and fire more than 48 hours ago.

There was no indication the men were alive.

MOBERLY, Mo., Aug. 20 (UP) — Miners working in short relays buried slowly through thousands of pounds of muck and burned timbers today toward the low level of the Esry gold mine where four men have been entombed more than 48 hours.

Fine Feathers Do Help

Every now and then when some woman tries to get her husband to take off a dilapidated collar, or discard a shirt with frayed cuffs and a split under the neckband, or wants him to black his shoes, or press his trousers, or dust his clothes, or brush his hat, she has to listen to him misquote a trite adage by saying, "Fine feathers don't make fine birds."

Take a poorly feathered bird to a poultry show and see how many prizes he wins. The first requirement of the judges of birds is fine feathers. And what the feathers of any bird should be is determined by the kind of bird he is. A Plymouth Rock hen feathered like a bird of paradise would be awarded no prize as a Plymouth Rock would get onto no lady's hat. If a man who wants a job hoeing a garden should apply in a Prince Albert, a silk hat, patent leather shoes with spats, and carrying a cane and gloves, he would be a joke.

I was seated on a veranda one afternoon chatting with a friend when a darkey came up and applied for the job of taking care of the yard. The applicant had on a pearl gray derby, silk shirt, bright blue suit, yellow shoes and brown spats. His collar was spotted, his shoes shined, his suit pressed. He twirled a little cane. But he got turned down.

"He looked too nice," said my friend to me as the darkey went out the front. "I want a man who can get down and wrestle with the soil. I want a fellow who can lean right up against a lawn mower and sweat, and who isn't afraid to get washing a car."

On the other hand if a man ran for the presidency of the United States wearing brogans, overalls, sweater and cap, he would not get far. We are a democratic people, but that does not mean we have not a sense of the fitness of things. Folks have various ideas about clothes. Some think that clothes make no difference one way or the other. They do not in some instances. Fine feathers or any other kind of feathers are of little value in a butcher shop. The butcher prefers his birds without feathers.

It makes no difference how modest one's station in life, or what kind of work he wants, it pays to look neat.

"That fellow," said a farmer, pointing to a man working in his orchard, "is the best man on my farm. And do you know I came within a cat's whisker of turning him down when he came to me hunting a job, he looked so rough and raggedy."

And the man who is seeking a white collar job would do well to see that his collar is white—very white—and that the rest of his get-up is as clean and neat as his collar.

While the fine feather may not make fine birds they help to get the bird by.

Screw Worms Work In Living Animals

Screw worm control depends a great deal upon a proper understanding of how screw worms develop. The true screw worm lives only upon the healthy flesh of animals. It is the young of a certain kind of fly, and is called the true screw worm because it is the harmful parasitic species. It is usually the first to lay its eggs on the broken skin of an animal. This injury may be a cut, scratch, tick bite, or wound of any kind.

The true screw worm fly breeds only in living animals. Otis Lerner, district supervisor of screw worm control in this area, with headquarters at Abilene, Texas, gave a few facts about the life history of the screw worm fly. From 10 to 400 eggs are laid on the wound; young maggots appear in 11 to 21 hours. They immediately burrow in the flesh and, feed in clusters, forming pockets in the wound.

Unless the animal is found and maggots killed, these maggots drop from the wound in 4 to 10 days and go into the ground, where they change into flies in 19 to 14 days. The flies then mate and the females are ready to lay eggs in 6 to 10 days. The total cycle requires from 18 to 27 days, usually averaging about 24 days.

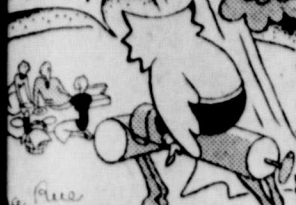

years. He says I've got money illegally and unlawfully. I have never placed any property in my wife's name. I've always ben open and above board. I let my home go to settle some obligations, and I moved to my farm near Eastland. I've had financial reverses, but I've never declared bankruptcy.

My opponent has his home in Washington in his wife's name. I've never done such. Blanton has two cars, a Cadillac and a Ford. They were both registered in Washington, D. C. where registration is as much as one-tenth as cheap as Texas fees. Recently, after being criticized, he registered the Ford in Texas.

Not A Tax Dodger
Blanton says I'm a tax-dodger. He came to Eastland to examine my record and found a judgment against a Christian preacher in another county by a person named C. L. Garrett. It was an unpaid judgment for 16 years. He took a certified copy of that and has been showing it in this campaign as evidence against me. But if Mr. Blanton had gone further in the records, he would have found an affidavit that the C. L. Garrett mentioned in the judgment was not Clyde L. Garrett of Eastland, but another individual who has been dead for several years. Blanton used that in his desperation. He is grabbing for straws!

Do all of you who were unable to pay your entire taxes during the depression consider yourselves tax-dodgers? You, the best citizens of each town?

I try to cooperate with my schools, city and county. I own two been used for church purposes for years. I have received no pay with the exception of having laundry done for my family and me. Garrett then started discussing Congressman Patman of East Texas. "He goes from district to district helping out his colleagues from congress. It seems to be a combination they do not want broken."

Garrett stated that Patman said he is a Townsend candidate. He continued, "I believe I'll get 90 per cent of their votes; certainly, they won't vote for Blanton after he called them fools."

Garrett told how an attempt was made to expell Blanton from congress. "The resolution lacked only eight votes to expell him."

W. L. Connell Builds 55-Foot Trench Silo

W. L. Connell, who lives one and one-half miles northwest of Olden, states: "I have stacked and seen bundle feed stacked for several years, but it never occurred to me just how much feed was lost in the stacks in Texas each year, which could have been saved by putting it in a trench silo."

He has recently finished constructing a six and one-half foot trench silo on his farm. After digging down about 18 inches, Mr. Connell struck a solid rock and rather than dig through the rock to make his silo deeper, or give up his idea completely of a trench silo, he made his trench longer and wider.

Mr. Connell filled 20 feet of his silo last with red top cane, and will fill the other 35 feet with hegari, as soon as it has reached maturing and is ready placed in the silo, said Hugh F. Barnhart, Asst. County Agent.

FRANK JUDKINS SCORES AGAIN ALSO BLANTON

ANSON, Aug. 18 — Frank Judkins, Eastland attorney, questioned the necessity Monday afternoon of sending to the piney woods of east Texas to go a man to tell the people of the 17th district about Tom Blanton and why he should be sent back to congress.

"Tom Blanton has been congressman from this district for 20 years," declared Judkins. "He has lived in this district for 30 years. Wright Patman probably has known him for six years. The people of the 17th congressional district know six times as much about Tom Blanton as Wright Patman does."

"Do you know why Wright Patman came into this district to stick his nose into our politics? He told you he came here because Clyde Garrett said Tom Blanton voted against the soldiers' bonus bill. Clyde Garrett didn't say any such thing. Patman was just setting up a straw man so he could knock it down. I think I know why he came into this district. He came here because he was afraid if Tom Blanton

got beat the people in his district might get hope that they could be rid of Patman. That's the reason Tom Blanton and Wright Patman and their congressional allies want to build up a congressional oligarchy in this country. They don't want to see one of their number beaten because of the effect it would have upon their own supporters."

Judkins declared that Blanton has lost the confidence of the farmer, "his erstwhile staunchest supporters," because of the tactics Blanton used in selecting postmasters in number of places. By refusing to allow farmers living more than a mile to vote at community postmaster elections, Judkins charged, Blanton disfranchised the farmers who have "learned Tom Blanton like the city people have learned him."

Judkins hammered Blanton for his "abuse" and "villification" of the Townsend supporters, declaring he had called them "Dillingers and racketeers" in his congressional records extracts and in statements before the election. He stated after the July 25 primary Blanton "came crawling on his stomach" to ask their support.

The Eastland attorney challenged Blanton to show him where one dollar of a "slush" fund supplied by the utilities the big newspapers and the Washington or Wall Street interest had been spent in the district to defeat him.

Judkins predicted Blanton would be buried under an avalanche of ballots Saturday.

MOTORISTS HAVE MORE CASH GLASTONBURY, Conn. (U.P.)—A new barometer of recovery has been found here. The roadside stand business is booming, farmers reveal, adding that there are more cars on the road and more money in the drivers' pockets.

TENANTS OUTGUESS LANDLORD TELEO (U.P.)—A Toledo couple pleasantly surprised their landlord by raising their own rent. They increased their check \$5 and explained they knew rents were going up.

CISCO SCHOOLS TO GET 200 NEW PUPILS; \$5,000

The renewal of contracts by four schools surrounding Cisco to send their pupils to Cisco schools and the agreement with three other schools to transfer to Cisco, and at the same time transfer all their state, county and special tax money to Cisco in return for teaching and transportation, were made Saturday with Superintendent R. N. Cluck, bringing about 200 pupils to Cisco and a school fund of near \$5,000 to supplement those apportioned to the Cisco Independent school district.

Renewal of agreements with Cottonwood and Bluff Branch who will send high school pupils, only, and Dotman and Sandy, who will send all their pupils, were renewed this year without a dissenting voice, thus showing that the experiment of past years was entirely satisfactory.

Reich school will send all grades this year, as will Friendship, two new schools who Saturday agreed to transfer all their money and pupils to Cisco in return for free tuition for the nine months term and transportation, to and from school. Shady Grove was expected to agree to the same arrangements at a meeting Saturday.

All these schools have a special tax which will come to the Cisco school along with the \$19,000 apportionment for the next term, and the state will pay the Cisco school for his transportation of pupils.

It is a perfectly good arrangement for all parties concerned said both Mr. Cluck, and W. F. Walker, school secretary, who explained that the communities would have a nine month's school in a well organized system, far superior to any thing

a small community could ever hope to maintain and have the advantage of superior scholarship and teaching ability.

At the same time Cisco schools would draw the extra money, which should about break even in the matter of expense. The transfers of state and county funds with the special tax funds will approximate \$5000 as a conservative estimate.

Mr. Cluck, who has given much time and thought to the matter and who is considered an expert in such matters as consolidation, says that the plan as practiced now of taking in the small communities, is the only same solution to the educational system at present. The country boys and girls are demanding the same training and advantages as the city youth and he can get it through this manner of consolidation.

Wherever such experiments have been tried it is unthinkable that they would ever desire to go back to the old small one teacher system of teaching a few pupils, when they can have the advantage of an affiliated school for the same money for a standard 9-month's term, said Supt. Cluck.

CISCO SCOUTS TO MAKE TRIP TO CENTENNIAL

Scoutmaster Ernest Hittson of Troop One for Cisco, has received a letter from the Travel division of the Texas Centennial at Dallas, explaining in detail the plan where by Boy Scouts may have the pleasure of seeing the fair officially and in Scout groups at a minimum of expense.

In the letter there are a choice of tours of the Texas Centennial at Dallas, trip, including a physician and police protection. Some of the tours arrange for camping out at Camp Wisdom, a park of several hundred acres of beautiful scenery and a splendid swimming place, near Dallas.

Mr. Hittson said he thought his troop would take advantage of one of the tours sometime during the first two weeks of September.

Aug. 21 Is W. O. W. Day At Centennial

DALLAS, Texas, Aug. 17—United States Senator Morris Sheppard, of Texas, will speak to 2,000 Texas members of the Woodmen of the World, a fraternal life insurance association, Aug. 21, at the Texas Centennial Exposition.

"Forty degree teams from all parts of the state, including 12 to 16 men in Woodmen uniforms from each team, will form a parade of 500 men and march through the \$25,000,000 world's fair grounds," announced R. E. Miller, state manager of the W. O. W. and program chairman.

Farrar Newberry, from the national headquarters in Omaha, Nebraska, and members of the national board of directors, and Senator Sheppard, who is national treasurer, will be the principal speakers on the program after the parade.

"A team of 40 Juniors of the Forest, from Wichita Falls, will perform a special drill, and exhibition drills will be done by several selected adult drill teams," said Mr. Miller.

"There are more than 1500 lodges in the state, and we expect to have at least 2000 members representing our order at the Exposition."

The parade will begin at 1 p. m. and the program which follows will continue until about 4:30 or 5 p. m., he said.

ROOSEVELT IS APPREHENSIVE OF WAR CRISIS

CHITAUQUA, N. Y., Aug. 15 (AP)—Through the foreign offices and the chancellery of the world rang today President Roosevelt's forceful preaching against war and his pledge to isolate the U. S. from all war dangers.

In a major pronouncement of American policy, the President told the crowd of several thousand that he had been bitterly disillusioned in the hope the whole world could be led into ways of peace.

He betrayed his grave concern with world conditions. "A goodly portion" of his every 24 hours, he said, was devoted to a study of foreign relations.

"We believe in democracy," he cried at the end. "We believe in freedom and we believe in peace. And so we offer to every nation of the world the handclasp of the good neighbor. Let those who wish our friendship look us in the eye and take our hand."

Some observers saw significance in four words appended to Mr. Roosevelt's pledge that this country was ready to defend itself. The words were a pledge to defend not the United States alone, but to "defend our neighborhood."

Mr. Roosevelt made four specific points in a program to maintain American neutrality and peace in a world of war, and threatening wars.

- (1) Insistence that American business, industry and agriculture forebear profits from foreign countries.
- (2) Cultivation of active and vigorous public opinions in favor of peace.
- (3) Greatest official caution to avoid any steps or actions which might lead toward embroilment of the United States in war.
- (4) Extension and development of the "good neighbor policy" in the western hemisphere, seeking to weld north and south America into an area, comprising half the world, in which peace will always reign.

The president was cheered lustily as he vigorously declared: "I hate war."

DIRECTOR COUNTERFEITER
BELGRADE — (AP)—Milivoj Boskovic, former director of the Yugoslav State Mint, has been sentenced to fourteen years hard labor for operating a private mint in his own home. Boskovic confessed that not only did he direct the State Mint, but that he used the official stamps to mint coins in his own home. Altogether he minted 800,000 dinars (\$20,000).

GYPSIES CAMP IN JAILYARD
KLAMATH, Ore. — (AP)—Authorities are hoping they will not be obliged to arrest any more gypsies for leaving camp fires unattended. When they jailed seven on that charge the 40 others of the band immediately encamped on the court house lawn and remained until the others were released.

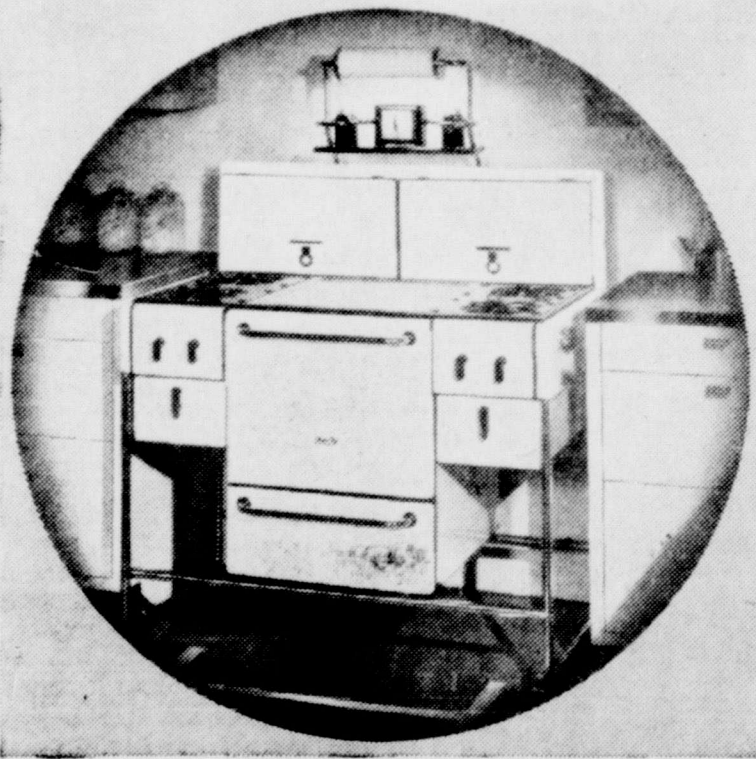

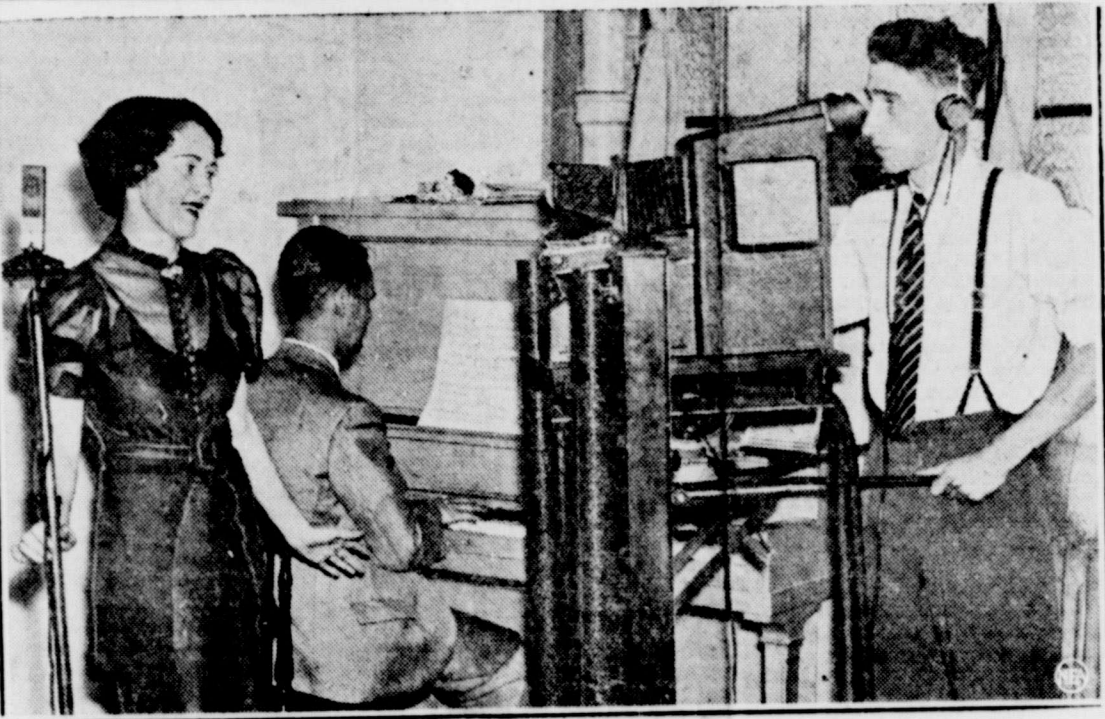

Suggest Crop Insurance Be Substituted 30 CARLOADS ENROUTE TO SPANISH GOV'T

LOUIS TABER GRANGE HEAD VISITS FDR

HYDE PARK, N. Y., Aug. 20 (U.P.)—Officials of the national grange suggested to President Roosevelt today that crop insurance be substituted for drought relief. Louis Taber, head of the grange, estimated that a crop insurance program could be initiated for \$25,000,000 a year. "The farmer does not want charity," he explained, "and the insurance scheme would go a long way toward the creation of an intelligent method of approaching the situation." He admitted the insurance proposal could not be enacted speedily. He said certain constitutional objections, both state and national, would have to be ironed out first. Taber discussed crop insurance several weeks ago with Gov. Alf Landon of Kansas, who at that time represented him as sympathetic to the aims of the grange. Taber's program would embrace state and federal cooperation, with the farmer contributing a nominal share, probably through registration fees.

You're Looking in on a Television Broadcast



"It works but it isn't quite perfect yet," was the verdict of engineers and spectators following a demonstration television broadcast in Philadelphia, held to show what progress has been made in experiments with transmission of pictures and scenes. Richard Wagner is shown training the television camera on Betty McNeillis while Norman Bean plays the piano during the epical broadcast. So sensitive is the camera that it will transmit by "black light" objects that the human eye cannot detect.

LUXURY TAX MAY BE LOWER BY \$10 TO \$50

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 20 (U.P.)—The average American family may be given a saving next year of from \$10 to \$50 in luxury taxes, it developed today as treasury and congressional tax experts studied proposed repeal of various "high collection costs" in taxes. In the category tentatively, it was understood, are taxes on sporting goods, furs, creator of missions club dues and jewelry. Approximately \$50,000,000 in taxes of the pulsance variety are considered susceptible to revision by administrative experts because of the high collection costs.

taxes on those buildings. But at Mineral Wells, ten days ago, Blanton made the charges that I had not paid taxes in twenty years. I have certificates from the tax assessor-collector stating that I have paid in excess of \$400 per month since 1920 to date.

Who is the Tax Dodger? "I want to show you who is the tax-dodger — my opponent, Mr. Blanton. He doesn't maintain a home and pay taxes on it. 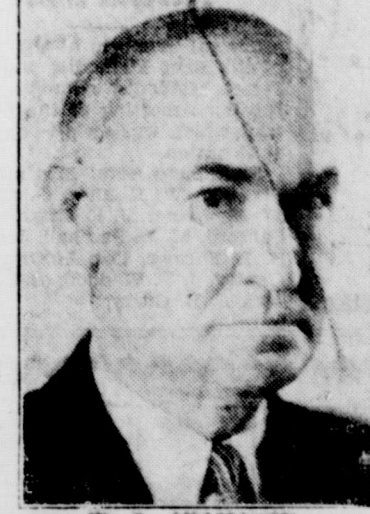

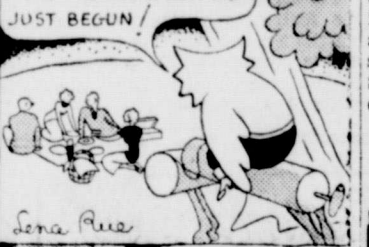
