Human Clocks

Many persons are able to go to sleep and wake up at any time they want to. Others religiously set an alarm clock, but always awake in time to turn the blamed thing off before it starts ringing. How do they do that?
Human beings have a "time sense," psychologists say. It can be trained to a high state of accuracy, or it can be lost through disuse. Occasionally a person is discovered with what seems an "absolute sense of time," comparable to the "absolute sense of musical pitch" found in perhaps one person out of a million.

Bill Jenay, employed in a London hotel, is known as the "Human Clock." In a recent test, conducted by British scientists, he proved that he could tell instantly what time it was, out of his own mind, at any moment of the day or night, within half a minute.

Such accuracy seems miraculous. Many will say that the fact that Bill takes care of 1,500 clocks, and winds them all every week, has a good deal to do with it. He couldn't very well help winding up his own mental clock.

Usually, however, it seems to work the other way. The more we use clocks or watches, the less able we are to tell time intuitively. A French writer says that, just as writing has enfeebled our memory, "clocks have given a mortal stroke to the time sense." You will find more persons outdoors than indoors, far more in the wilderness than in cities, who know what time it is without machinery to help them. Often people pick up this faculty when on camping trips, only to lose it again when they get back to a world of clocks.

It is the same with various other faculties. Our minds, like our bodies, depend more and more on machines.

Evil Of Partisanship

In the midst of a political campaign involving much prejudice and bitterness, it is well to have such a plea of tolerance as this, made by a prominent American the other day before a big association of school teachers:

"To what end shall our schools teach arithmetic and geography and literature and science, if we cannot banish the spirit of bigotry and blind partisanship, and put in its place the spirit of intelligent fair play and just appraisal of every aspect of the perplexing problems which confront our generation?"

Fortunately there is not much political partisanship shown in our schools and colleges. But isn't there an unnecessary and mischievous amount of partisanship along other lines? Wholesome organization and competition are all right; but isn't the frenzied competition in athletics particularly, and also, in other matters of inter-school rivalry, growing very unwholesome?

We have vast numbers of people today growing up with undeserved prejudices against other high schools and colleges, extending to the whole life and work of those institutions, and preventing "intelligent fair play and just appraisal," as a result of the blind partisanship fostered by athletic rivalry.

It is bad enough to let children get the notion that the prime purpose in life is to "beat" other people instead of improving themselves. It is worse to cultivate a state of mind which makes it hard to be intellectually honest, clear-sighted, tolerant and generous to those whose environment or view point differs from ours.

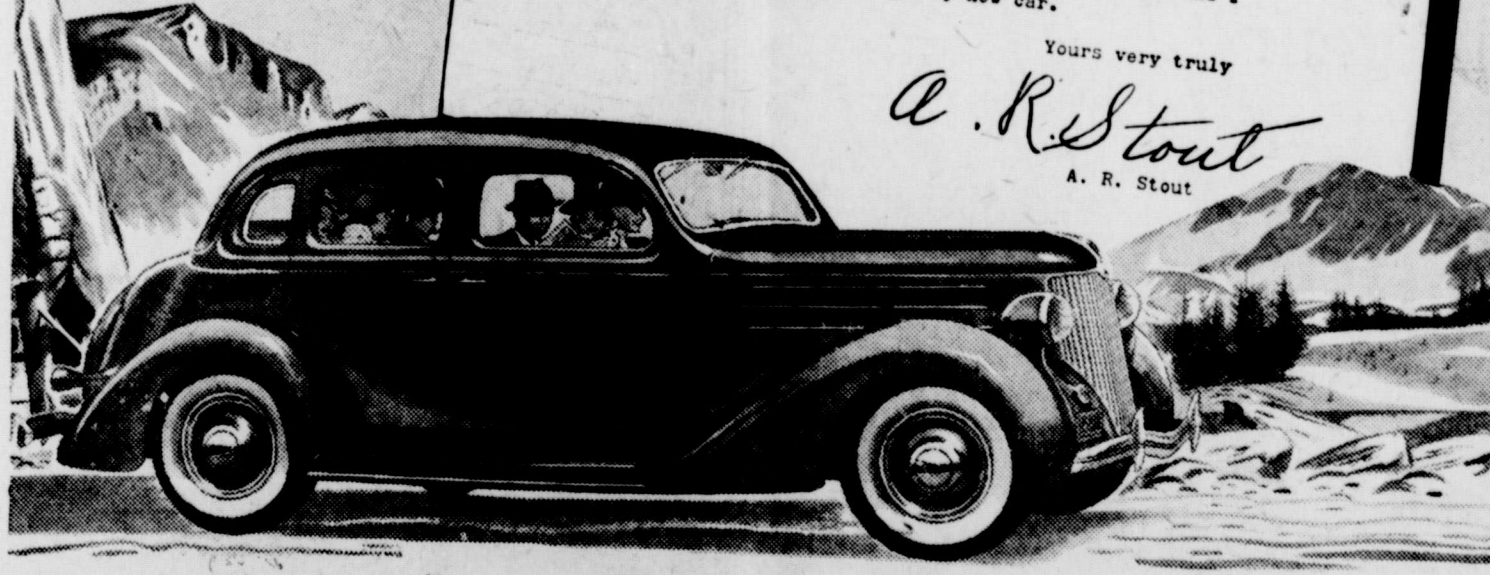

RETRIAL NEARS FOR MOTHER IN MERCY KILLING

ALBANY, N. Y., Aug. 22 (AP)—Granted new trials by New York's highest tribunal, 27-year-old Mrs. Dorothy Sherwood, charged with the "mercy" drowning of her infant, and Manning Strewel, charged with participating in the O'Connell kidnaping, will fight for acquittal in mid-September.

Coincidentally, both trials will be on session simultaneously along the Hudson River within a distance of 55 miles.

At Newburgh, Mrs. Sherwood, a former showgirl and Salvation Army Lasses from the West, will face a new supreme Court jury. She was convicted at her first trial, and although the jury recommended mercy, she was sentenced to death in the electric chair. She was to have been executed at Sing Sing prison last month.

The Court of Appeals came to her aid after it was shown the jury was not aware of mandatory death in returning a verdict of guilty despite a recommendation for mercy.

Strewel, who was convicted of participating in the abduction of John J. O'Connell, Jr., a nephew of the powerful Albany political leaders, in 1933, will be given a new trial at Catskill. At his first trial in Albany, he was sentenced to 50 years in prison. He failed to convince a Supreme Court jury that he acted only in the capacity of intermediary during ransom negotiations.

O'Connell was held in New York City for \$40,000 ransom. After serving two years of the sentence at Dannemora prison, Strewel was granted a new trial by the Appellate Division. The Court of Appeals affirmed the ruling.

Strewel's attorney also obtained a change of venue. The attorney is George Smith, of Schenectady, who has superseded Attorney Daniel Prior of Albany in the case.

The abduction still is unsolved. Federal and local authorities are searching for three Albany fugitives for questioning.

Meantime Strewel is held in Green County jail. Mrs. Sherwood is in the Orange County jail at Goshen. At her first trial she confessed

drowning her 2-year-old son, Jimmy, because she was destitute and "couldn't see him go hungry." She surrendered, carrying the body of her child into a police station.

For five months Mrs. Sherwood remained at Sing Sing prison before being returned to Goshen jail. She was the first person to embrace Mrs. Frances Creighton who was executed for the murder of a Long Island woman.

She abandoned the stage to wed a laborer, who died, leaving her destitute.

Mrs. Sherwood has hopes of acquittal, according to her attorney, Stanley R. Johnson.

200-TON SEAPLANE PLANNED
