### Argentina Capital Roars Welcome to FDR

#### TO ADDRESS CONFERENCE ON TUESDAY

BUENOS AIRES, Nov. 30 (U.P.)—President Roosevelt, greeted with roaring acclaim, stepped ashore at 1:56 p. m. from the U. S. S. Indianapolis which brought him to Argentina for the Inter-American peace conference opening tomorrow.

"Mi Amigo" (My Friend) he greeted President Justo of Argentina at the docks. President Justo headed the official delegation which met President Roosevelt and drove with him past wildly cheering thousands to the United States embassy.

President Justo grasped Roosevelt's outstretched hand and put an arm around his shoulder in a typical Latin greeting and the two men embraced.

The two presidents chatted in French as the crowd threw roses. President Roosevelt caught one rose and waved tossing it back to the thrower.

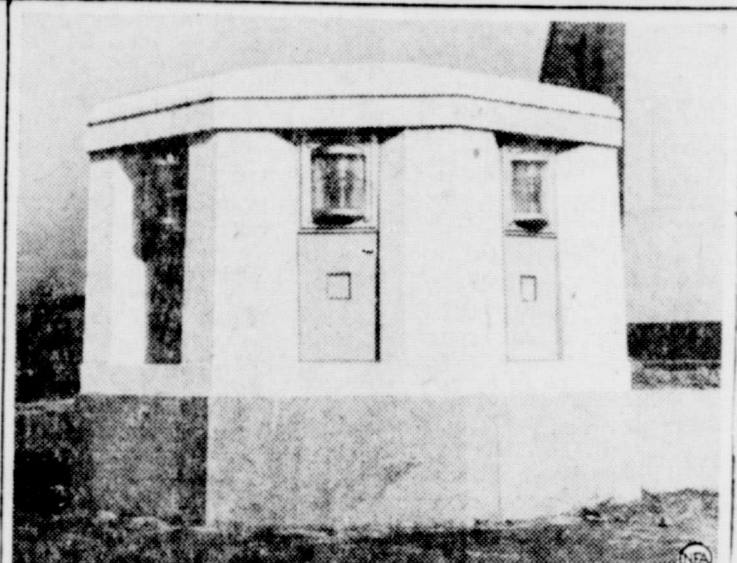
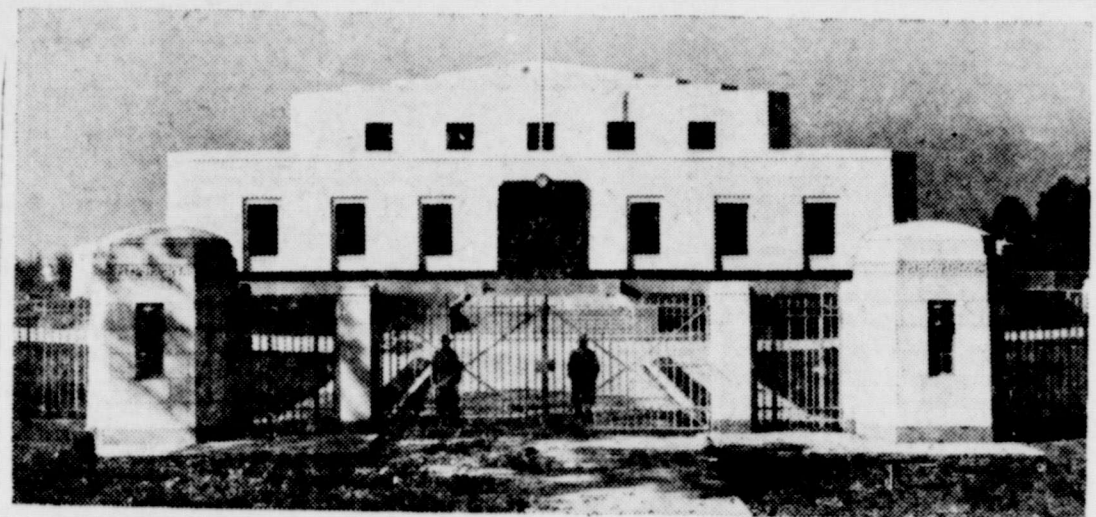

#### Old, New Contribute Defense to U. S. 'Gibraltar'



Defense measures dating to medieval days are combined with modern scientific ones to make impregnable the \$600,000 depository at Fort Knox, Ky., where the \$10,000,000,000 gold hoard of the U. S. will be stored in 1937 for safekeeping. Top photo shows sentry houses at the only gate into the "strong box." Beyond the steel fence, which may be electrified, lies an open moat. At each of the four corners of the building is a machine gun "pillbox," as shown in lower photo at right. Turret opening is covered with bullet-proof glass and steel armament. The vault within, made of steel which gives off poison gas under a torch, can be flooded. At lower left is R. T. Van Horne, chief clerk, who will be in charge of guards.

#### LOYALISTS GET MORE SOLDIERS, RESUME FIGHT

MADRID, Nov. 30 (U.P.)—The insurgent forces more on the defensive than at any time since the siege of the capital started, shelled the city heavily today.

The rumbling of cannon echoed throughout the city. Five rebel planes dropped several bombs on the outskirts.

Confidence mounted as Madrid awaited thousands of fresh reinforcements.

A third international column numbering several thousand was expected during the day. It was reported also that a column of Moss was on its way to Madrid to face the Moors fighting on the nationalistic side.

Loyalist troops, though hampered by rain, continued on the offensive on all areas.

Hobart White, 19, colored boy, was fatally shot in the stomach Sunday evening about 6 o'clock at a cafe in the colored section north east of the railroad by the proprietor, Bobby Lea Davis, with No. 6 shot in a shot gun as a result of trouble between the parties. Young White died 50 minutes later. He will be buried here today. Davis, 37, also colored, was lodged in jail here to await the examining trial at 10 o'clock this morning at which he was placed under a \$500 bond to await action of the grand jury.

#### School of Experience Found Closed So University Trains Apprentices

BERKELEY, Calif., Nov. 30 (U.P.)—The "lost generation" is at last coming into its own, provided it is equipped itself educationally, according to job-placing officials of the University of California.

They report that it is no longer possible to fill the ranks in various professional fields caused by the thinning out of the older men and the demand for properly equipped young men to take their place.

Depression unemployment, officials say, closed the "school of experience" for many young men and women ready to enter business. Employers have been unable to hire sufficient new help to insure adequate and continuous supply of experienced men and women needed to step into the gaps left vacant by retiring veterans.

Under the circumstances, they say, both employers and employees are turning to formal training of a sort that could reproduce in the classroom the experience of the office.

#### FRANCE WILL ALIGN WITH GREAT BRITAIN

PARIS, Nov. 30 (U.P.)—France has decided to align herself solidly with Great Britain and Belgium against any war aggressor and to back her decision with a \$700,000,000 navy building program, it was learned today.

It was a day for declarations of strength. In Moscow, Russia announced that its total of air force planes had reached 7,000. In Germany, Herman Goering, Germany's air minister, announced Germany was no longer "so weak" as she was in 1914.

Walls of Treating Plant Being Poured  
Pouring of concrete on the walls and beams at Lake Cisco on the water treating plant started today. It will require about two days to complete this phase of the work and will leave only the curving wall at the south end to be poured at a later time, it was announced today.

Lack of man power had hindered this work which was to have been completed last summer. It was done by relief labor with R. S. Glenn as engineer for the state and Wesley Harrell in charge for the city.

PALO PINTO FARMER GETS PRISON TERM  
PALO PINTO, Nov. 30 (U.P.)—W. H. Clapp, 60-year-old farmer today faced a two-year prison sentence for the slaying of Frank Griffin, 32, last August, in a neighbor's quarrel.

Clapp was found guilty by a jury Saturday midnight. The two men had lived on adjoining farms three and a half miles south of Mineral Wells.

Major George Sergeant officially closed the gates of the \$25,000,000 World's Fair which had been seen by 6,353,827 visitors. Plans went forward for re-opening the Exposition June 12, 1937.

50 Feminine CCC Camps Established  
WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 30 (U.P.)—Establishment of 50 feminine CCC camps to provide jobs and vocational training for 5,000 needy girls has been approved as a regular part of the government's work relief program, officials said today.

Editorial Workers On 3-Month Strike  
SEATTLE, Wash., Nov. 30 (U.P.)—Publication of the Post-Intelligencer, Hearst-owned morning paper, was resumed today after a three-month suspension, which resulted when editorial workers struck and the plant was picketed. The strikers returned under an agreement which provides shorter hours and pay increases.

CRASHES NOT ON CURVES LORAIN, O. (U.P.)—Lorain county officials, tabulating traffic statistics for the year's first nine months, found that a majority of accidents occurred on straight sections of road rather than on curves.

#### 3 MEET DEATH IN WRECK AT METCALF GAP

MINERAL WELLS, Nov. 30 (U.P.)—Three persons were dead today and a fourth was in a critical condition after the collision of two trucks and a car Saturday night near Metcalf Gap, Palo Pinto county.

The third person to succumb was Miss Eline Rhodes, Abernathy school teacher, who was visiting relatives after attending the State Teachers association at Fort Worth.

Miss Rhodes died in a Mineral Wells hospital Sunday night of burns and internal injuries.

Two men were killed, instantly. They were Henry Eleubee, 34, of Merkel, and Marvin Fitzgerald, 24, of Brad, Palo Pinto county. Erby Slemmons, 24, of Brad, uncle of Miss Rhodes, suffered serious burns and three broken ribs in the crash.

HARDIN-SIMMONS STUDENTS DIE  
ABILENE, Nov. 30 (U.P.)—Robert Marshall, Jr., 19, of Coahoma, Tex., and Wanda Day, 18, of Anson both students of Hardin-Simmons university, died today of injuries suffered in an automobile collision last night in a heavy fog.

Six other persons, five of them students, were injured. Marshall and Miss Day were riding on the running board of the car when the collision occurred.

FINAL COUNT MAY REACH 37,000  
CHICAGO, Nov. 30 (U.P.)—More people are being killed in automobile accidents this year than in any other years in history, the National Safety Council announced today.

The final count is expected to show 37,500 dead for 1936, an increase of 506 over the 1935 figures. The increase is mostly among children.

## "Eat a Turkey Clubs" Would Help

An "Eat a Turkey" campaign is being held for Cisco and other parts of Texas to relieve the congested market for turkeys over the United States which threatens to grow worse as the Christmas holidays approach and instead of the price getting better seems to point to a still greater decline as reports come of the enormous poundage of turkeys on cold storage and the thousands of birds still unsold.

Farmers have great flocks of fine turkeys all over Texas waiting for a rising market that may not come. The general trend of opinion is that turkeys should be worth 16 cents per pound. How this price came to be set in farmer's minds is not exactly known but they have been clamoring for that price and it is a very reasonable price considering the prices of other meats and the price and quantity of feed necessary to raise a turkey. Few animals eat more than do turkeys compared to their size.

But reports come that thousands of turkeys in south and southwest Texas are still unsold. It is said that just before the closing of the Thanksgiving market at Brownwood there were so many turkeys waiting to be weighed in turn, that many farmers took their turkeys and went home hoping for a better price for Christmas. But unless something is done in an unusual and radical way the price may be even lower for the Christmas markets.

If people all over the country would form "Eat a Turkey" clubs the surplus could be reduced and money put in circulation, that otherwise may never reach the farmer's hands, to the detriment of business in ours as well as other communities over the land.

The Junior Chamber of Commerce has taken the right step here. President Starling has already arranged committees to finance "Turkey Days for Cisco" during the holidays which will serve the double purpose of bringing crowds to Cisco and to give some money to be spent by the farmers here. It will only be a drop in the bucket to relieve the surplus but it will help.

There is no meat that compares in flavor with our own tame turkey. The quality is unusually fine this year all birds that we have seen are fat and in prime condition for the table. At the present price they are the cheapest food we can buy. If Cisco and other communities would start "Eat a Turkey" clubs it would start a campaign that would soon relieve the gutted condition, and those birds remaining could be sold for better prices. Lions and Rotarians should demand turkeys for their menus. Ladies should get off some of their obligations to their friends by having turkey dinners; church and civic organizations who stage benefit dinners could make it a turkey. In this way they would be helping themselves by helping Cisco farmers who would spend that money with Cisco business which helps everybody in Cisco.

Organizations that are in the habit of having supper picnics could arrange for a turkey dinner and help create sentiment by the publicity that newspapers would be glad to give to the event. So why not start "Eat a Turkey" clubs now?

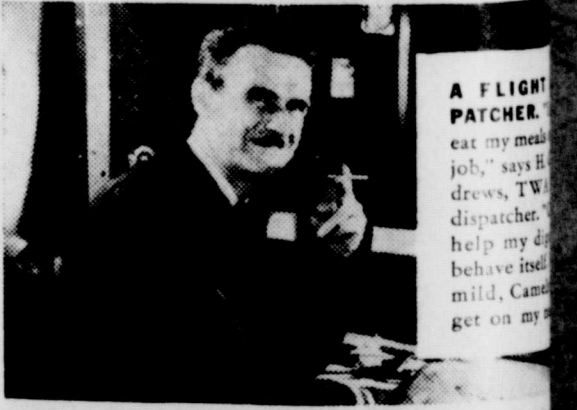
