SAILOR ASKS FOR \$5,000 IN EXTORTION TRY

HOLLYWOOD, Dec. 10. (AP)—Determined federal attorneys proceeded today with preparation to try James Hall, 19-year-old sailor, for attempted extortion of \$5,000 from Ginger Rogers. Letters of appeal pouring in from the youth's friends "will have no effect on the prosecution," attorneys said. Hall, indicted by a federal grand jury yesterday, was reported as saying he was "ready to take my medicine."

ROME, Dec. 10. (AP)—Luigi Pirandello, 69, world famed playwright died suddenly today. Members of his household found him dead in bed early this morning. Pirandello's fame as a playwright in the last two decades has been equalled only by that of Geo. Bernard Shaw and Eugene O'Neill. All three have received the Nobel prize for literature.

MRS. SIMPSON CLOSELY GUARDED AS KING RENOUNCES THRONE

CANNES, France, Dec. 10. (AP)—Edward VIII of England will not see the woman for whom he renounced his throne until at least after Christmas, it was said today, at the Hermain Rogers villa, as word was flashed from London that the king had abdicated.

Rogers told the United Press that Mrs. Simpson intended to remain in Cannes through Christmas. He stated emphatically that Edward would not come here, nor to any other place on the Riviera.

News of Edward's act was telephoned to the villa, where Rogers received the call. At the exact minute, the abdication was announced, Mrs. Simpson was in her room. Simultaneously her famous limousine, its back seat loaded with baggage, sped from the garden.

Strong police reinforcements were sent to the villa where Mrs. Simpson is guest, because she has received hundreds of threatening letters, it was learned.

As she awaited news, she was permitted to taste no food that had not been tested before meals.

KING GIVES UP 'HEAVY BURDEN' OF KINGSHIP

LONDON, Dec. 10. (AP)—King Edward VIII abdicated today from the throne of Great Britain renouncing for love the rulership over the world's greatest empire and one-quarter of the inhabitants of the globe.

He gave up his crown so he could go into perpetual exile and marry Mrs. Wallis Warfield Simpson, twice divorced American. A breathless stunned house of commons received from the king an historic document, giving up the "heavy burden" of kingship because of the difficult, personal situation in which he found himself.

The Duke of York, his brother, will succeed to the throne, it was announced.

The Duke's daughter, ten year-old Princess Elizabeth becomes their presumptive to the throne—Britain's next queen if her father dies without a son being born to him.

The scene in the house of commons was one of the most solemn in England's long history. Never before had a king voluntarily given up that mighty throne.

But his majesty's government was determined not to permit a divorcee and a commoner to share it with Edward. The king was equally determined to make her queen or marry her in any case. He therefore decided against fighting his ministers.

The historic occasion came after Edward had been on the throne 324 days. The speaker at 3:42 p. m. called on Prime Minister Baldwin. In a voice which, by a mighty effort, he kept steady, Baldwin said:

"I, Edward VIII of Great Britain, Ireland, the British Dominions beyond the sea, King, Emperor of India, do hereby declare my irrevocable determination to renounce the throne for myself and my descendants."

"I am most anxious that there should be no delay; that all necessary steps should be taken immediately to secure that my lawful successor, my brother, his royal highness the Duke of York, should ascend to the throne. Signed, Edward VIII."

Only once more in all probability will he write that signature. That will be when he signs the act of abdication, which will be enacted immediately by the house of commons and the house of Lords.

SPANISH WAR MAKES LITTLE GAINS TODAY

MADRID, Dec. 10. (AP)—Rebel troops ventured forth on Madrid front today but were driven back to their trenches after an hour's fight.

Three rebel bombers flew over the city shortly after noon, scattering propaganda leaflets downtown, but the wind blew most of them out of reach. Heavy snows in the north brought the government drive on Burgos, the rebel capital, almost to a standstill.

"O God, who declarest thy almighty power in showing mercy and pity to all who call upon thee, and who reveal- est to men in each new discovery a part of thy truth; en- able with thy grace, we pray thee, the dullness of our blind- ed sight, and grant a new vision to all who serve thee in the search for the cause of cancer and its cure. Lighten their darkness, O Lord, we beseech thee, and mercifully direct them into paths of knowledge and truth; grant them the realization that through thee all things are possible; pour upon them the abundance of thy inspiration; and finally lead them to the attainment of victory, that the scourge of cancer may be ended, and that we, being freed from this burden of fear, may live continually in the love and service of thine only Son, our Savior, Jesus Christ, Amen."

And so we see, that contrary to what we have been led to believe by those who would add the weight of medical men's opinion to their damnable teachings to bolster their atheistic beliefs, scientific men, the really learned kind, do believe in Christianity and in the power of prayer. These scientists with all their knowledge do not seem to know of any reason why science and religion should not work together.

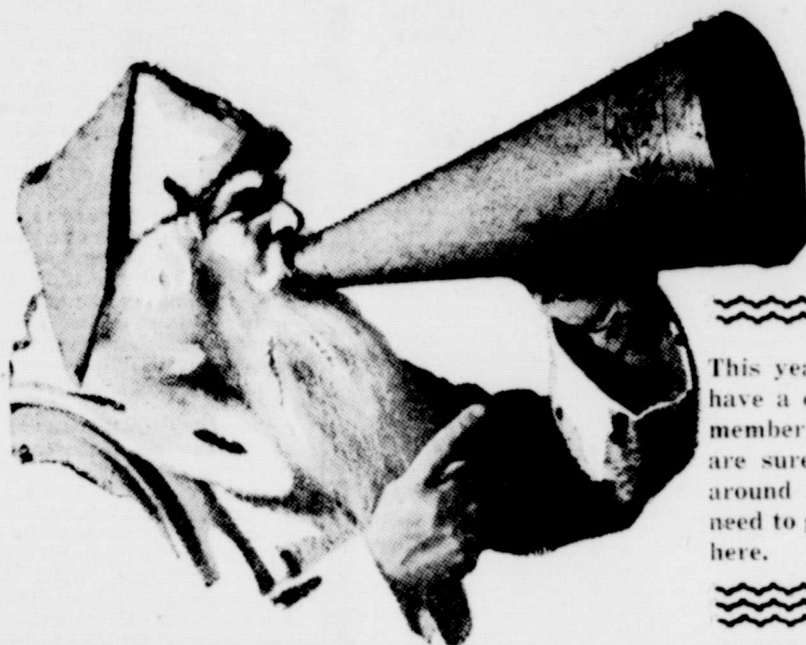

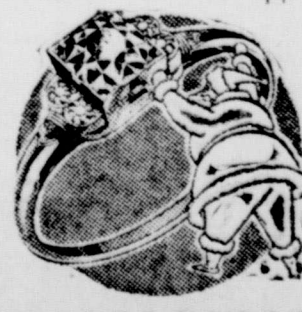

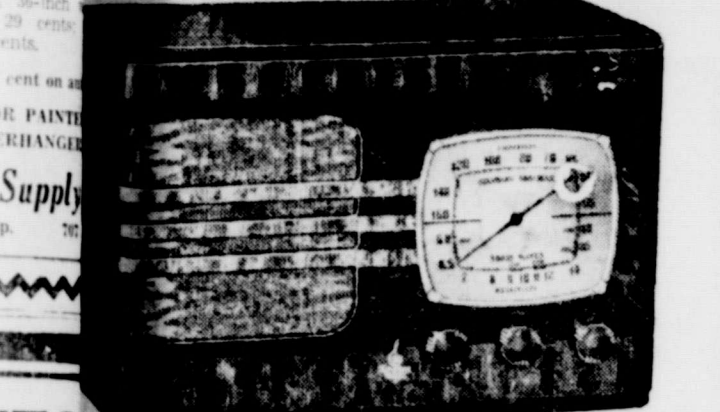
