GEN. CHANG EXECUTED, IS JAP REPORT

TOKIO, (Wednesday), Dec. 15. (AP)—The Domei Japanese news agency reported today from Shanghai that Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek had been executed by Marshal Chang-Hueh-Liang, former Manchurian dictator because of Chiang's refusal to declare immediate war on Japan.
The Japanese agency said the "young general" broadcast the announcement of the execution of the generalissimo from Sian-Fu, capital of Szechwan province in far western China.
Marshal Chang earlier had been reported as assuring Madame Chiang Kai-Shek that he would be personally responsible for the safety of her husband, whom he made a prisoner in a bewildering revolt at Sian-Fu last Saturday.
W. H. Donald, an Australian newspaperman who served as Marshal Chang's advisor in Mukden, flew to Sian-Fu as Nanking's mediator in an effort to save the life of Chiang Kai-Shek.
Domei reported that the Nanking leaders were concerned also about the safety of Donald. They had expected word from him on the success of his negotiations with Marshal Chang, but none came.

PEACE WAS MISSION OF PRESIDENT

CHARLESTON, S. C., Dec. 15. (AP)—President Roosevelt returned to American soil today for the first time in nearly a month, terminating a history-making cruise of 13,000 miles to South America in the interest of peace.
He was tanned a deep brown from long hours under the tropical sun.
Mr. Roosevelt, hopeful that the Pan-American conference he formally opened Dec. 2 in Buenos Aires will achieve its objective, came home in excellent health, eager to tackle the many problems that require his immediate attention.
Between now and the first of the year he will be required to prepare his messages to congress as well as scan details of the inauguration program.
The president returned saddened by the death of Gus Gennerich, his personal bodyguard, who died in Buenos Aires. His body was brought back aboard the Indianapolis, and will be taken to the White House for brief funeral services tomorrow. Burial will be in New York City.

DUKE THINKS "LOVELY MARRIAGE" IMMORAL

ENZFELD, Austria, Dec. 15. (AP)—The Duke of Windsor, happier than he ever was as Prince of Wales or King Edward VIII, discussed with friends today his plans to marry Mrs. Wallis Simpson.
He telephoned her just after midnight and went to bed to rise at noon. The duke planned to play nine holes of golf this afternoon.
The duke believed, it was learned, that future generations, even if not his own, will agree that he did the right thing and many things in abdicating his throne to marry Mrs. Simpson.
His view is that his alternative to seeking Mrs. Simpson's hand would have been a loveless marriage. He argues that such marriages are immoral, unnatural and disastrous to all concerned.

SUICIDE SAYS JEALOUS MOOD MURDER CAUSE

MASON, Mich., Dec. 15. (AP)—Suicide notes found in her jail cell shortly after 25-year-old Hope Morgan hanged herself today explained that "jealousy" prompted her to kill her lifelong chum, Elizabeth Ann Giltner a week ago.
The notes were found shortly after jail attendants had cut down the body of the brown-haired slayer from a shower pipe in the cell.
"Forgive me for what I did in a jealous mood," one note said.
A week ago, Miss Morgan, sitting across a kitchen table in the Giltner home, had fired four shots into her friend, a bride-to-be. Unemotionally she told police her act was the result of a "homicidal fixation."

The third bout was between two heavier boys, Lander Cleveland and Jack Evans of Putnam. Lander had Jack on the floor three times and would have won the fight by a large margin had he not fouled Jack in the third round. Fighting in a weakened condition by a bad cold Tom Jones was out-punctured by James McQuary in the fourth fight. James brought blood from Tom's nose in the first round with a hard right to the face. Both boys' weights were 145 pounds.
In the fifth bout Chesley Tipton used his heavier weight to best advantage on his smaller opponent Waymon Johnson, to receive the nod by a slight margin. Tipton outweighed Johnson 25 pounds, but was given a tough scrap by Waymon. In the sixth bout of the evening, W. A. Walls floored Curtis Yancy three times to receive the winner's decision. James McQuary ended the evening's boxing by whipping Leo Calermain in the final frame.

James PWA head with offices at Abilene in regard to the matter and Mr. James stated that project had been approved, plans drawn and every thing necessary was ready for beginning the proposed encampment as soon as PWA labor was available. Mr. Schmid assured Mr. James that with the finish of the Eighth street highway and the water treating plant at Lake Cisco, both of which were nearing completion, plenty of labor would not only be available but would be in need of employment. Local funds of \$2,500 needed has already been subscribed and in the bank at Cisco. Rev. Applewhite stated.
Mr. James promised to arrange for the improvements to begin at the earliest possible time.
The erecting of this building will be the impetus needed to start several other buildings on the grounds by churches over the district, many of which already saved their money in hand ready to start their improvements contingent at this beginning.
Presbyterian interest in the Lake Cisco encampment is great all over the district, the encampment last summer being the success it was, has created enthusiasm for the center. Rev. Applewhite, who has been an enthusiastic worker for the development ever since the idea was evolved, sees a church recreational playground, out rivaling Kerrville, spring up here that will crystallize church playgrounds for Cisco a real playground for the community life of all West Texas.

Britain Carries On

The most noteworthy thing about the supposedly world-shaking abdication of the King-Emperor at a critical moment in British and world history, was the way the British people behaved.

Edward was immensely popular. The situation was full of danger. Britain and the "dominions beyond the sea" are "democratic," even more than many nations calling themselves republics. They keep the crown not as a political power but as a symbol to preserve sentimental loyalties and serve as a keynote of the "arch of empire." A common king holds together the self-governing dominions. Anything weakening the royal power of the crown might snap the bonds. What then would become of England, and of dominions and dependencies?

The lower classes of England, a majority of the voters, were obviously for Edward and resentful of what looked like an attempt to "smuggle the king off the throne over a week-end." There might be revolution at home. With Europe in chaos and another great international war in preparation, anything might happen. Observers in many countries began saying that England was done.

Then suddenly a political miracle, as many a time before in England's history. The "governing class" tightened their ranks. The labor party and other popular groups relaxed their opposition. The nation rallied not around Edward or the Duke of York, but around the "throne." Personalities were ignored. Principles were upheld. Dignity was maintained. The king and premier and next-in-line behaved like gentlemen. The dominions quietly played their part, each like a little England. The ponderous legal, political and moral machinery of the empire turned.

Suddenly one king was out of office and another in, the tension relaxed and life was resumed as usual. Kings may come and go, but the empire stands.

Edward Windsor as Author

Edward Windsor, ex-Rex etc., needn't lack for living funds, even if he is losing his royal salary and some of his duchies and castles and palaces and miscellaneous perquisites. He can make all the money he needs by writing. Before he was sworn out of office, an American publisher was credited with having offered him \$1,000,000 flat for his memoirs. Rival bids for his literary services are expected to be "the battle of the century" among publishers, editors and newspaper syndicates.

Not that Edward is supposed to be any world-beater in this line. He has never shown any particular literary inclinations, either as a reader or writer. He may have read an occasional book and written an occasional report or speech, but he is the type of person who learns direct from life and prefers the spoken to the written word.

This type, however, if intelligent as Edward is, usually gets more experience, makes more human contacts and has a closer grip on life than the more studious fellows. And anyway, as most people probably know by this time, it doesn't take literary talent for the productions expected of Edward. Whoever has as much to tell as he has can easily find "ghost writers" to put it on paper.

Edward may surprise people, though, by refusing to tell it—at least for the present. He has pride, self-respect and a sense of propriety in such matters.

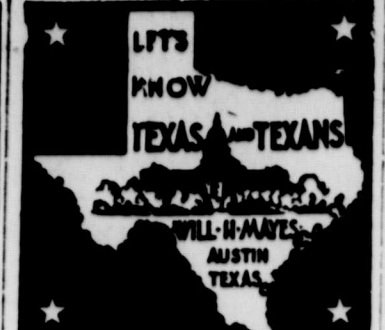

In this column answers will be given to inquiries as to Texas history and other matters pertaining to the State and its people. As evidence of good faith inquirers must give their names and addresses, but only their initials will be printed.

Q. Who built the first home in the present city of San Marcos?
A. William W. Moon, in 1845 three years before Mays county was organized.

Q. When did France cede the Texas territory to Spain and what was the effect upon the settlement of Texas?
A. All territory west of the Mississippi was ceded by Louis XV to Spain in 1762, following which the East Texas settlements were abandoned until 1779, when Gil Barbo led a number of colonists from San Antonio and founded Nacogdoches on the site of the old Guadalupe mission.

Q. Who was Antoine Crozat and how did he figure in early Texas history?
A. He was a French merchant at Mobile Bay, who secured a French government trade monopoly in 1712 covering Louisiana. He decided to push his trade into northern Mexico and sponsored the expedition to Texas led by St. Denis.

Q. What were the relations between France and Spain in the early 18th century in regard to East Texas affairs?
A. The French had established a strong post at Natchitoches by 1719 causing the Spaniards to withdraw to San Antonio. In 1721 the Marquis de Aguayo reestablished the Spanish missions around Nacogdoches and San Augustine and strengthened the presidios with little or no friction.

Q. When did the Canary Islanders reach San Fernando de Bexar (San Antonio) and how many were in the expedition?
A. The expedition, at the instance of San Miguel de Aguayo composed of 56 persons who had been brought from the Canary Islands under promise of a year's maintenance by the Spanish government reached San Antonio, March 9, 1731, having left Quattlan, near Mexico City Nov. 3, 1730.
