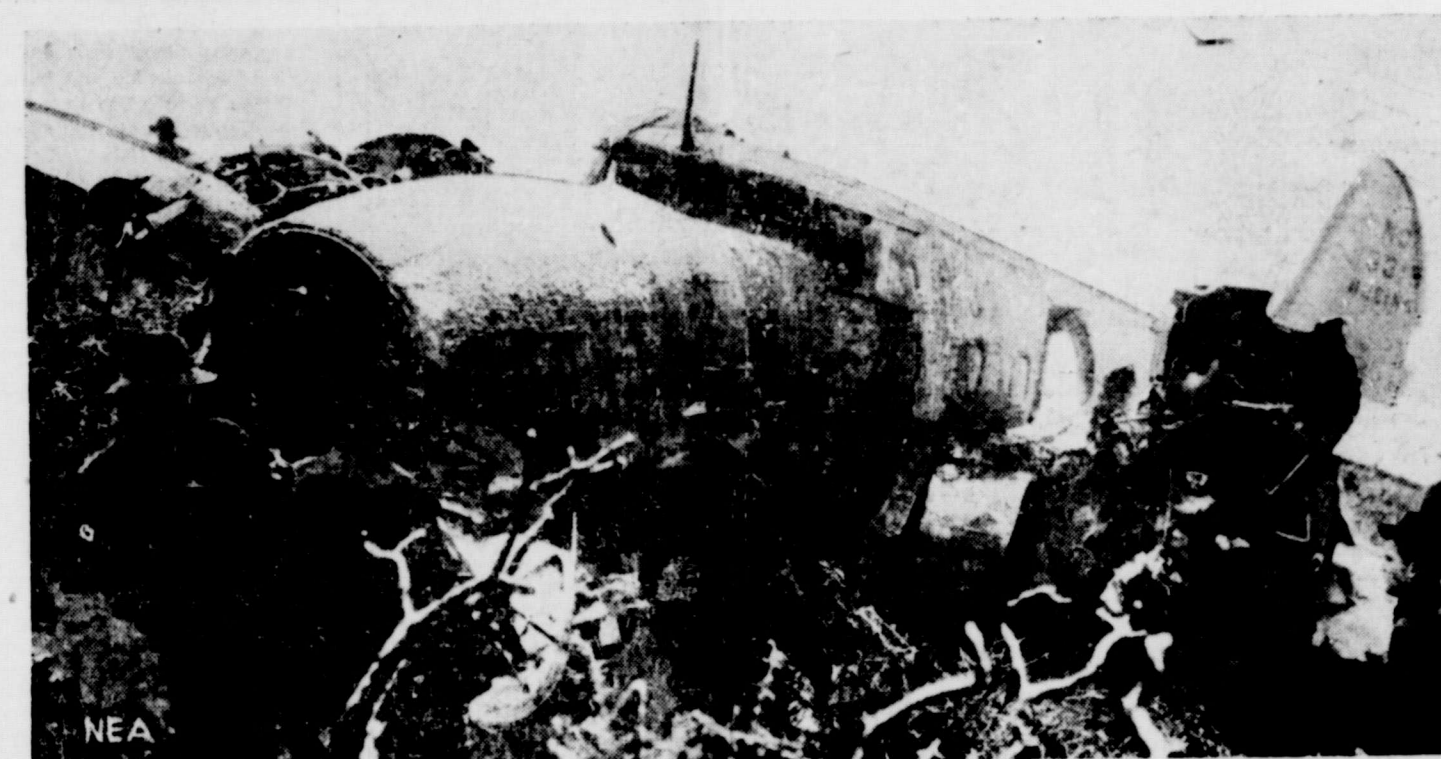

The explosion occurred late last night. The men, members of a pipe line crew, were welding a leak in the oil line. The women, wives of the workmen, were seated in an automobile nearby watching the work. They were covered with flaming oil and were burned beyond recognition.

Roosevelt's Work to be Aggressive

President Roosevelt begins his new reign as aggressive president of the United States with an attitude of knowing where he is going. In fact, Mr. Roosevelt has never given the slightest indication of hesitancy in his capacity of being leader for a republic that was in rather bad condition when he found it. Well versed in government economy, wide experience in politics, a great traveler and a highly educated university man, this man Roosevelt is superbly equipped to hold the high office given for the second term.

There is much of puzzle to confront the United States this year. War and confusion over the whole of Europe and threats in the far East, South American countries just emerging from constant states of revolution in their efforts to work out their destinies, bring a wide field for Mr. Roosevelt to exercise his unusual talents of diplomacy.

An outline of the president's activities during the next four years is given as the probable work to be accomplished. Some of the things will be daring, yet all safe and conservative. He is no socialist or innovator.

President Roosevelt's greatest achievements will be in the realm of foreign affairs but he will avoid involving this country in foreign political entanglements.

More effective neutrality legislation will be proposed and passed. First steps will be taken towards the complete nationalization of the arms industry.

The Roosevelt administration will keep pace with the international naval race.

There will be no inflation but a "regime of economy unmatched even in the days of Calvin Coolidge."

A new cabinet post will be created: The Public Welfare Department.

There will be no more New Deal legislation but tightened administration of the present New Deal laws.

Changes will be made in the Social Security Act, and the present crop-conservation law will be broadened to make a more adequate long-time program for agriculture.

Mr. Roosevelt will swing neither to the right nor to the left. He will continue in "that middle-of-the-road program which refuses to go the way of either the reactionary or the radical."

BEHIND THE SCENES IN WASHINGTON

 WASHINGTON.—Rex Tugwell tossed a last grenade among a group of his old enemies shortly before the midnight bell rang in the New Year and rang him out as Resettlement administrator.

Tugwell resigned recently to become executive vice president of the American Molasses Company. Soon thereafter his digestion began to be disturbed by published reports that his chief function would be that of a Washington lobbyist.

His name was bracketed with those of other men who had left the AAA to use their knowledge and influence in the capital in the service of private business.

Tugwell disliked some of these fellows intensely, having battled with them inside AAA at periods when he felt he was representing the farmer and the consumer and they were representing "predatory" corporations.

Finally, with one stroke, Tugwell underlined the fact that he was not going to be a lobbyist and at the same time moved to make life miserable for the large number of officials who have left the Department of Agriculture to take jobs in the food industries.

BEFORE departing, Tugwell signed an order which simply says employees of the department must not discuss matters pertaining to administration or to legislation relating to the department's work with anyone who is employed by or connected with affected commercial interests and who has been an employee of the department within two years.

He signed it "R. G. Tugwell, acting secretary," to emphasize the fact that he would be governed by the order.

If the order is obeyed—and violators are subject to possible dis-

missal—the style of at least a few present and ex-employees will be definitely cramped. It brought no holiday cheer to several minor officials who were on the verge of resigning to become lobbyists.

GOSSIP as to cabinet changes begins to take on a little more substance. All cabinet members will submit their resignations by inauguration day and the president plans to accept none except possibly that of Postmaster General Jim Farley, who may be ready by that time to carry out his announced intention of quitting.

Thereafter, the probabilities are that the next resignation will be that of Secretary of Commerce Daniel P. Moynihan. A large posse within the administration will be gunning for Uncle Dan and is sure to get his scalp sooner or later.

Likely to succeed Roper would be John H. Fuhey, chairman of HOLC. Fuhey is an able administrator and has appeared in the entire New Deal. Roosevelt wants him in the cabinet and you may be sure Fuhey will be there sooner or later, assuming he's open to offers.

There's also a healthy little movement to persuade Secretary of Labor Frances Perkins that the secretaryship of the International Labor Office at Geneva, said to pay \$25,000 a year, is just about the coziest little job in the world.

If Miss Perkins should be offered the post and succumb to its charms, as many hope and pray, it is commonly believed that she would be succeeded by Assistant Secretary of Labor Ed McGrady or Assistant Secretary of the Treasury Josephine Roche.

The movement to get Attorney General Cummings out of the cabinet isn't proceeding very rapidly and may fizzle completely.

Orchard Results

By Thrifty Farmers

The thrifty farmers of Central Texas usually think first about food for the home and for their animals, reports from county agricultural agents indicate. The home orchard of Mr. and Mrs. L. A. Kunkel of the McDade community in Bastrop county returned \$91.25 above cash expenses during the past year. In addition to the fruit used in the home, \$63 was realized through sale of the surplus.

Intelligent selection of an orchard site is the prime reason for the excellent record of the orchard, which is located on well drained southeast slope on a clay subsoil. Kunkel sandy soil with a year round spray schedule against insects and diseases. The Kunkels are enthusiastic about the Bruce, Happiness, and Durban varieties of plums and the Dixie peach. The five young berry plants in the orchard yielded eight gallons last season, and 50 Dallas blackberry vines produced 39 gallons.

When frost killed his grain sorghum, Robert Piller of the Perrin community in Jack county dug a 24 ton trench silo and filled it with bundle feed which will be fed out to his farm animals during the winter. Approximately 100 farmers attended a two day trench silo filling demonstration on the J. S. Isbell farm in Wichita county. The 80-ton trench was filled with hedges and cane sorghum at the rate of nine tons an hour.

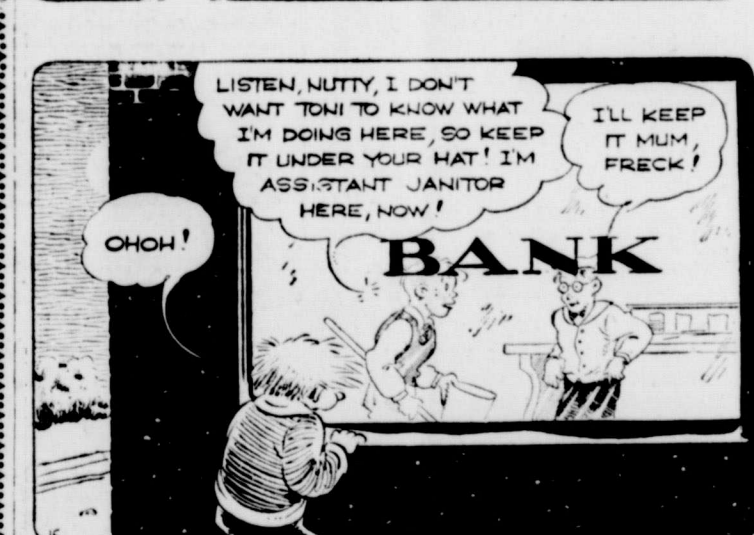
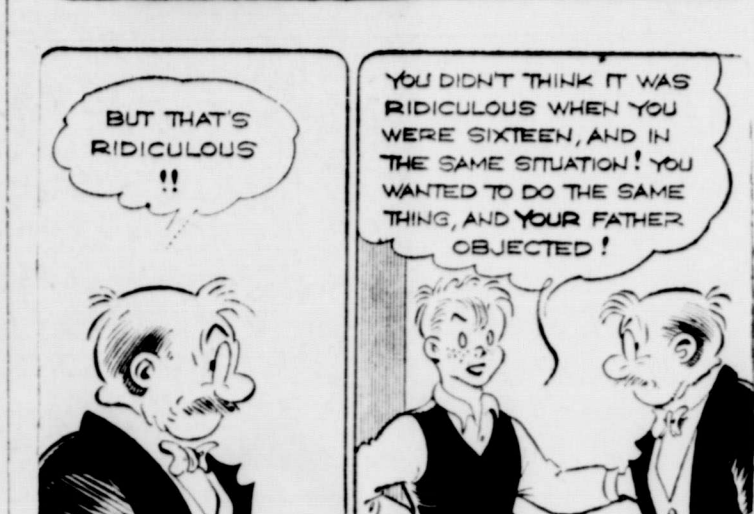
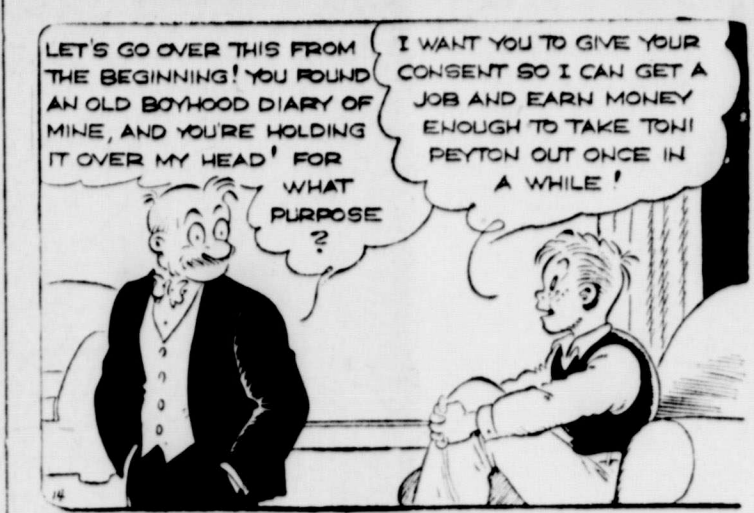

What is an Employer? Q 16: "What is an employer?" A. Briefly, an employer is any person or firm, who, during 1935 or after, has employed as many as eight persons for at least one day a week for any 20 weeks during the calendar year...

How Does the Law Affect Contractors and Sub-Contractors? Q 17: "I am in the contracting business. On job 1 sub-contract work is my payroll measured by the number of men working directly for me on the job, or does it also include the workers on the sub-contractors?"

How Can an Employer Volunteer to Come Under the Law? Q 18: "In my business I employ only seven men. Therefore I am not subject to the Unemployment Compensation Act. However, I want my employees to have the benefits of the Act. How do I go about voluntarily becoming a contributor?"

In all, meals were prepared in nearby restaurants by wives and other relatives of the strikers. 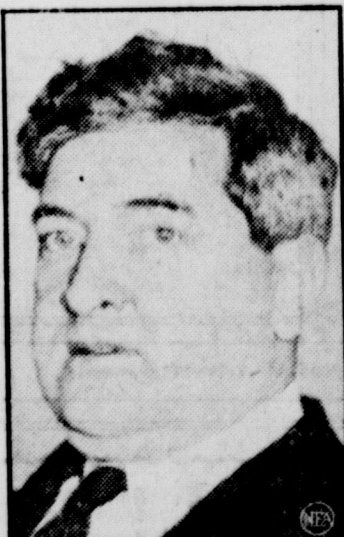

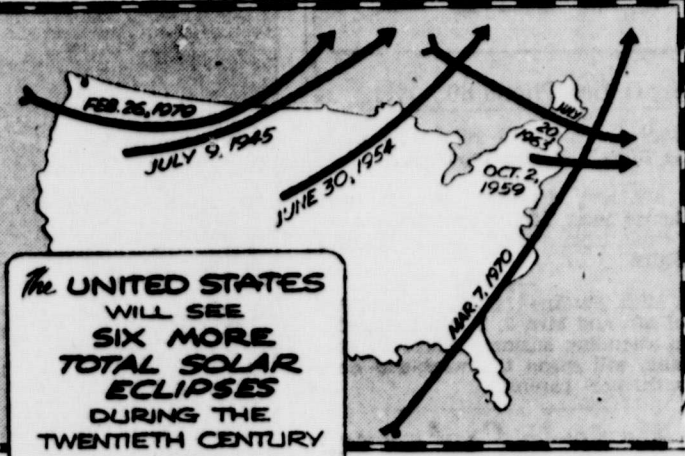

ECONOMIST IN RESEARCH ESTIMATES MILLION JOBS CREATED BY REPEAL,

PITTSBURGH, Jan. 14. (AP)—A million persons obtained employment as a result of legalization of beer, wine and liquor in 1933, Morris Victor Rosenbloom has computed in his book, "The Liquor Industry."

The book, written as a University of Pittsburgh thesis for a master's degree in economics, has become a handbook for the liquor industry. At the suggestion of Walter P. Grosscup, former chairman of the Pennsylvania Liquor control board, Rosenbloom has enlarged the book to bring it up to date.

He chose the liquor industry as the subject for his thesis because for several generations his family has been associated in that business. From various sources, he has computed that repeal put to work 1,000,000 persons.

"The dry movement in the United States is now far from dormant," Rosenbloom declared. "The United States Brewers' Association's survey of the liquor control situation in various states shows that substantial gains in local options throughout the country were effected in 1935 over the preceding year. An increase of 94 per cent in the number of dry counties and

149 per cent in the number of dry towns was divulged in the report. According to C. D. Williams, secretary of the United States Brewers' Association, out of the 48 states, 31 have provisions for local option, 13 have none for beer but do have provisions for hard liquor, and two have technical provisions for hard liquor and two have technical prohibition."

Rosenbloom, now 21 was the youngest Eagle Scout in the United States seven and a half years ago.

DRIVERS OVERCOME FOG WITH TOUCH OF AMBER. PORTLAND, Ore. (AP)—Oregon motorists have discovered a simple way of cleaving fog with their head lights.

Instead of smearing such compounds as onion oil on their windshields, or lighting candles just inside the glass, they now wrap amber colored cellulose material over the lens. They say it works, the colored light overcoming much of the white mist.






