OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., Jan. 16 (U.P.)—Governor E. W. Marland said today he had received a letter demanding \$5,000 on threats of bodily harm to him and Mrs. Marland. He posted a \$500 reward for the arrest of the sender. The letter in long hand was mailed to Oklahoma City Friday. It read: "You are a rich man, and I want you to give us a donation of \$5,000 in bills that are not marked. If you know what is good for you, you will not say anything about this to the police or anybody else. If you do it will be too bad for you and your wife. Marland turned the letter over to the State's Crime Bureau. Although not inclined to take it seriously, the governor was angered. Department of Justice agents were called in. Marland planned to rein-force the single executive mansion night watchman. "I have no idea," Marland responded when asked if he believed there is a connection between the letter and his drive against a man whom he described recently as the "King Pin of the Underworld" in Oklahoma City.

## Much-Married Mate with Much-Married

In selecting a second mate the average widowed or divorced man has a stronger tendency to marry a spinster than the widowed or divorced woman has to marry a bachelor, according to the statisticians of the Metropolitan Life Insurance company.

Divorced persons, more often than widows or widowers, take for their second consort a person who has not previously been married, while those who have been married two or more times, whether divorced or widowed, are distinctly less likely to marry a single person than are those who have been married only once before.

An analysis of the marital data of New York State, revealed these facts. In making their study the insurance company's statisticians called attention to the fact that the conditions influencing a second or later marriage are different from those governing individuals embarking on this enterprise for the first time. They point out that there is a different psychology, a different set of habits, a changed economic situation as a general rule, especially if children from the earlier marriage are present, and that the average age of those marrying a second time is naturally more advanced than those marrying for the first time.

Some of the percentages compiled by the statisticians are: 45.5 per cent of the widowers who remarried took spinsters for wives, while only 39.8 per cent of the remarried widows took bachelors for their spouses. The corresponding figures for the divorced were 63.7 per cent and 61 per cent. Less than half—42.2 per cent—of the widowers who remarried took widows for a second consort, while a little more than half, namely, 51.1 per cent of the widows who again became brides married widowers.

The study shows that when a divorced man remarries he is more likely to choose a divorced woman than a widow for his second partner but that the reverse is the case when a divorced woman remarries. The figures also show that of all the divorced males who remarried, 22 per cent chose divorcees and 12.4 per cent chose widows; divorced women, on the contrary, chose divorced men in 18.4 per cent of the cases, and widowers in 13.5 per cent.

"The much-married tend to mate with the much-married" is the apparent conclusion to be drawn from the following:

"Among the widowed who have been married twice or more, 14 per cent of the grooms and 16.2 per cent of the brides too as consorts persons who also had been widowed twice or more. On the other hand, of those who had been widowed once, only 3.4 per cent of the grooms and 4 per cent of the brides took as consorts persons who had been widowed twice or more. A similar situation is revealed when marriages between the divorced are studied."



An outstanding piece of work has been accomplished by Luellen Cris-ham, garden demonstrator for the Britton 4-H girls' club of Tarrant county, who has 322 quarts of food on her shelves for winter use.

Luellen does all the house work in addition to going to school. From the wide variety of fruits and vegetables in her pantry she is able to prepare a well balanced meal in a very short time.

In addition to her garden and canning work, Luellen has also been busy sewing. During the past year she has made four pairs of dresses and a silk dress, as well as 17 pieces of household linen.

Mr. and Mrs. J. H. Womble of Harpersville, Stephens county, have made a valuable addition to their pantry by canning a young beef weighing 290 pounds dressed.

In spite of a shortage of fruit and vegetables due to dry weather the 15 members of the Blue Ridge home demonstration club put up 3,900 containers of fruit and vegetables and 3,221 pounds of dried fruit and vegetables. This food is valued at \$1,095.25.

After Mrs. Bell Atwood, home food supply demonstrator of the New Hope club in Parker county, found that 6 hens, weighing about 3 pounds each, which she had culled from her flock, would only bring \$1.50 on the market, she killed the birds and canned them. A total of



### Unemployment Compensation in Texas

**Editor's Note**—Following are questions and answers prepared by R. B. Anderson, chairman-director of the Texas Unemployment Compensation Commission, which is an interpretation in simplified terms of the various provisions of the recently-enacted Texas Unemployment Compensation Act.

Further questions and answers in this series will appear from time to time.

#### What the Employer Pays

**Q 19:** "As an employer, how much do I pay, and to whom do I pay?"

**A:** The amount each employer pays to the Unemployment Compensation Fund is determined by his payroll, and on the basis of a fixed tax rate.

In the first report to the Commission, you must determine whether you were an employer during 1935 and 1936. If you were an employer during 1935—that is, during the year you employed eight or more people in 20 or more weeks—then you must report.

You have to pay the tax only on the 1936 payroll. But if you were an employer in 1935 and were not in 1936, then you must report this fact to the Commission, along with an application for the termination of your "employer" classification.

The tax payments will be made direct to the Texas Unemployment Compensation Commission, Austin, on tax return forms supplied by the Commission.

State contributions or taxes will be collected before you pay your Federal tax; and from the assessment made against you by the Federal government, you may deduct the amount you paid as a state tax.

During the first five years of the Act's operation—1936, 1937, 1938, 1939 and 1940—each employer's tax rate is set.

In 1936 it is nine-tenths of one per cent of the "wages payable" by the employer. In 1937 it is one and eight-tenths per cent; in 1938, 1939, and 1940, it is two and seven-tenths per cent of the payroll.

After 1940 the employer's merit system of rating becomes effective. This will be explained later in this series.

#### What Constitutes "Wages Payable"

**Q 20:** "In the preceding article, I noted the use of the term 'wages payable' in talking of the amount the employer must pay. Just what does this mean?"

**A:** Under the Act, the term "wages payable" is meant to include all forms of payment for services.

Ordinarily, wages is regarded as meaning money paid for services; but the Act includes, in addition to cash payments, the following:

1. All commissions and bonuses.
2. The cash value of all payments made in mediums other than cash—such as, for instance, stock or room and board.

3. When a worker customarily receives gifts or gratuities from persons other than his immediate employer, these gifts are considered a part of his wage, and constitute "wages payable" by his employer.

The value of any such gratuities or payments made in mediums other than cash, will be determined by fixed rules of the Commission.

If you have any questions concerning the operation of this law as it affects employers or workers, you can have your questions answered by writing to R. B. Anderson, chairman, Texas Unemployment Compensation Commission, Austin.

### Civil Appeals Court Reverses Decision

Judgment of 42nd district court of Taylor county in sustaining a plea of privilege for transfer of the garage out of Mrs. Elmer Beuchow against Virgo Foster, former Eastland county sheriff, and his bonding company was reversed and rendered Friday by the 10th Court of Civil Appeals.

Mrs. Beuchow brought the suit against Foster and the American Surety company for damages allegedly suffered by her as a result of the death of Stephen W. Beuchow, her husband, two miles west of Warsaw, Dec. 4, 1934. The company was surety on the sheriff's bond.

In an opinion written by Associate Justice Clyde Grayson, the court found the trial judge erred during the September term, 1935, in sustaining a plea of privilege of Foster to transfer the case to 28th district court at Eastland. The appellate court's action rendered judgment overruling Foster's plea of privilege.

Foster had filed his plea of privilege in 42nd district court at Abilene, asking to be used in Eastland county which was discontinued, and after a hearing the plea was sustained from which judgment Mrs. Beuchow appealed.

Mrs. Beuchow is seeking \$1,000.

She is asking for herself and children in the suit.

Thirty-eight district court records showed the case was dismissed in that county in July, 1935. Foster has been authorized by a district court grand jury which found the occurrence was an accident.

Beauchow & Ely of Abilene, F. E. Mitchell and L. B. Lewis of Baird were attorneys for the appellant Mrs. Beuchow and Turner Springer & Seabury for the appellee Foster.

### Assistant Agents To Be Retained

It is announced that the commissioners court has reconsidered its former decision to curtail expenses by eliminating the assistant county and home demonstration agents whose terms expire February 1 and March 1, and will retain both.

Assistant County Agent Hugh P. Barnhart and Miss Corneia Page Stewart, have rendered very efficient work over the county during the past year. In fact the work of 1935 has been outstanding and results have been shown by increased interest of men, women, girls and boys in clubs and the home work accomplished. They have planned well for making farm life happier more profitable to club members.

It is a wise decision of the commissioners court. The little savings that might have been accomplished in small indeed compared to the good they are doing among their constituents. We congratulate the action and trust that the work of these two young assistants will grow during the year to the extent that it will be impossible to eliminate it entirely.

### Layton Dismissed as One of Blanton Suit

ABILENE, Jan. 16.—Dismissal of a \$100,000 civil suit for libel brought by Thomas L. Blanton, former 17th district congressman, as to E. E. Layton, named as one of the three defendants in Blanton's original petition, was ordered in 42nd district court here yesterday by Judge Milburn S. Long. The action was taken upon request of Thomas L. Blanton, Jr., attorney for his father, now in Washington.

The action leaves Clyde L. Garrett, who succeeded Blanton as congressman last week, and J. W. Cockrell, Garrett's secretary, as defendants in the suit.

Yesterday's hearing was started for the purpose of considering a motion by Blanton to be allowed to file a controverting plea to Layton's plea of privilege, in which he asked trial of the case to be transferred to Eastland county, his home. Blanton had asked to be allowed to file the controverting plea after expiration of the legal period of five days prescribed for answers to such pleadings. Blanton, Jr. asserted that although he requested notification when Layton should file his plea of privilege, he was not notified.

After the court had heard testimony and arguments on Blanton's motion, and before it had acted upon the motion, Blanton requested that the action be dismissed as to Layton.

Miss Belle Wellborn, district clerk, said from the witness stand that no request or notice was received.

Thomas L. Blanton, Jr., testifying said "It is my honest belief that I made a request of the district clerk, asking her to notify me in case of the filing of any answer by any of the defendants in this lawsuit. It is my honest recollection and belief that she gave me some answer which would indicate that she had heard my request and assented thereto."

Miss Wellborn was questioned by Layton's attorney, Carl Springer of Eastland.

"It is alleged here that Mr. Blanton asked you to notify him if any of these defendants filed an answer. Did he make that request of you?" Springer asked.

"He did not," Miss Wellborn replied.

"It is alleged that you answered in substance that you would notify him. Did you make that answer?" the attorney asked.

"I did not," the witness said.

On cross-examination Blanton was asked: "Are you sure Miss Belle heard you?"

He replied: "I am not sure. I was sure at the time, but I am not sure now, because I know if she had heard me, as efficient as she is, she would have notified me."
