## 15,000 DRIVEN FROM HOMES BY FLOODS

### 11 KNOWN DEAD, PROPERTY LOSS MANY MILLIONS

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22 (U.P.)—The American Red Cross placed virtually unlimited funds at disposal of its flood relief workers today after a survey of regions devastated by high water indicating that mid-western floods are assuming proportions of a major disaster.

#### FLOODS FORCING THOUSANDS FROM THEIR HOMES

Devastating floods swept into eleven states today, forcing upwards of 125,000 persons from their homes, isolating communities and bringing millions of dollars in damage.

Eleven were known dead. From the Ohio River at Pittsburgh which spilled over the famous "Golden Triangle" in the business district, flood damage was reported over thousands of acres, stretching to Cairo where the Ohio runs into the Mississippi. Indiana and Illinois Rivers flowed over Farmers along the Mississippi to the lowed delta left their homes, fearing damage similar to that of 1926.

Portsmouth, Ohio, famous wall which has prevented floods from reaching that city was useless. Waters rose above it despite opening of valves. Cincinnati feared the worst flood in history as the water rose steadily. Louisville was threatened with the worst flood in its history. Electric power may fail this afternoon. Thousands were reported leaving Wheeling Island at Wheeling, W. Va., as the water rose.

Evansville, Ind., was the scene of feverish emergency measures, with the wall still holding. The tri-state area around Memphis was a scene of desolation as water spread, with thousands forced from their homes. Pneumonia and influenza were spreading, although government officials, massing forces of workers boats and airplanes, said the real danger came when the waters receded. Food supplies were low in some communities.

Portsmouth, Ohio, warned that the water supply might be shut off if the waters continue to rise. Prisoners in two penitentiaries, one at Pittsburgh and the other at Frankfort, Ky., watched waters rise in prison yards, but in neither case was the situation considered dangerous. Rains and snows continued to day swelling the waters going into the main rivers and the crest; most points has not been reached.

#### RIO GRANDE VALLEY CITRUS GROWERS GET OUT SMUDGE

Winters' second severe blizzard whipped toward the Texas coast Friday, leaving snow in the Panhandle and highways coated with sleet and ice.

The new cold wave coated utility wires and trees with ice and covered the wilderness of automobile. Citrus growers of the lower Rio Grande valley, again fearful of damage to their bumper crops, get out their smudge pots to protect orchards.

Government forecasts warned of a probable temperature drop to 32-33 degrees in the Rio Grande valley Friday night.

Within a radius of 300 miles northward from Dallas, shippers were warned to guard perishables against a low temperature of 4-18 degrees within the next twenty-four hours. Amarillo had a minimum temperature of six degrees and clear skies Friday morning; Abilene, 18 and snowing; El Paso, 30; Del Rio, 30; San Antonio, 30; Austin, 26; Corpus Christi, 52; Brownsville, 74; Houston, 40; Galveston, and Port Arthur, 68; Dallas, 21, and sleeting.

### 'STRIKERS IN FOR FIGHT TO FINISH,—LEWIS

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 22 (U.P.)—John L. Lewis today ordered his automobile strike lieutenants back to Detroit to intensify organization efforts after President Roosevelt indicated he would not intervene in the General Motors strike.

Lewis ordered a "fight to the finish" on the Detroit battle ground shortly after Mr. Roosevelt publicly rebuffed Lewis' request that the government aid the strikers by every "legal means."

The President's remark answered the barrage of charges and counter-charges by Lewis and General Motors spokesmen.

"I think in the interest of peace, there come moments when statements, conversation and headline are not in order."

Commenting on Mr. Roosevelt's statement, Lewis said: "I cannot undertake to interpret the President's words. Of course, I do not believe the President intended to rebuke the working people of America who are his friends and who are only attempting to obtain rights guaranteed them by congress."

LEIPZIG, Jan. 23 (U.P.)—A new plastic form of glass has been developed which is not only shatter-proof but actively elastic. The glass is made of a synthetic resinous substance, is light, transparent and cannot be distinguished from real glass. Under pressure a pane of this glass will bulge but return to its original form. One of the first practical applications of the new elastic glass has been in the windows of the airship Hindenburg. The "Friendly Boys" organization, sponsored by the Lions and Esoterians and headed by T. C. Williams and Joe L. 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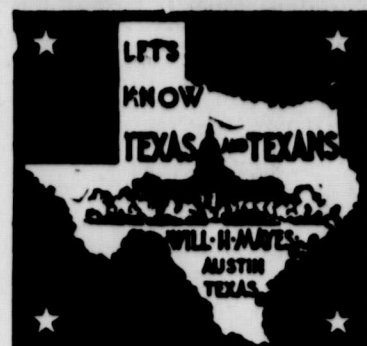

They flaunted and boasted of this new strength before the Comanches, who became bitterly hostile to the Spaniards and organized to defeat what they believed to be their new foes and drive them from the country.

Q. Under the Mexican constitution, Texans agreed that Texas and Coahuila should constitute a single state of the Mexican republic. How, then, did Texas justify its demand for separate statehood? K. L. S. A. The union with Coahuila was limited and subject to the vested rights of Texas. The change from a republic of states to a centralized government under dictatorship was one to which Texas under its vested rights could not and would not agree, even though Coahuila might consent.

Q. How did sentiment stand in Texas prior to 1836 with reference to submission to Mexican government policies? L. B. N. A. A large part of the people were for peace at any price so long as there was no direct interference with Texans in the conduct of their business. Others, foreseeing a military despotic rule over Texas, favored forestalling it by armed opposition. These were designated by Mexican officials as the "war party."

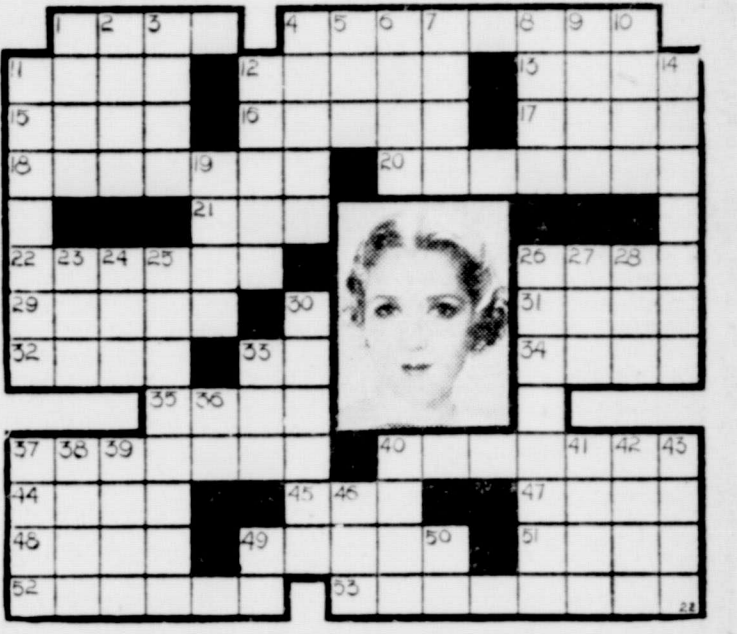

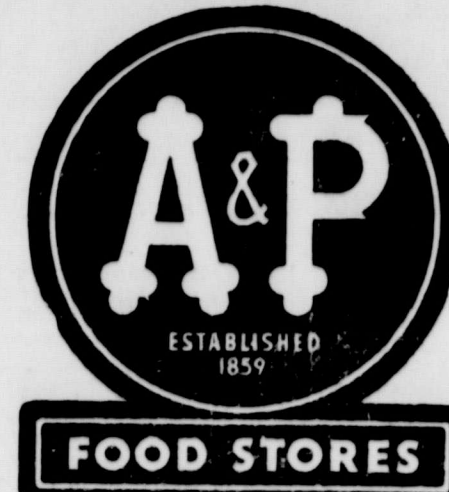
