LOUISVILLE'S DEATH LIST INCREASING

ESTIMATE 200 OR MORE DEAD; RIVER FALLING

LOUISVILLE, Jan. 28 (UP)—Louisville's death list mounted today as the yellow flood waters covering 30 of its 40 miles slowly were added to the 130 already listed. More bodies were reported found in inundated areas, and it was believed Mayor Neville Miller's estimate of 200 dead might be passed soon.

CREST AT MEMPHIS EXPECTED TO BE 48 FEET

MEMPHIS, Jan. 28 (UP)—The U. S. Weather Bureau predicted the flood crest at Memphis would be 48 feet, 5 feet under the estimate issued by U. S. Army engineers. "We think the probable crest barring further rainfall will be 48 feet at Memphis by February 5 or 7," the official statement said.

U. S. ARMY HURLING POWER AGAINST RIVERS

The United States Army directing tens of thousands of workers hurried its power against the raging Mississippi today to prevent repetition of the larger scale of disastrous floods which have claimed at least 255 lives, driven 1,000,000 persons from their homes and destroyed more than \$400,000,000 worth of property.

RAIN PREDICTED, PRECIPITATION SLIGHT

WASHINGTON, Jan. 28 (UP)—The Weather Bureau today forecast rain turning to snow and colder weather Friday for the flooded Ohio and Tennessee valleys. "Precipitation will be so slight, however, as not to effect flood conditions greatly," the report said.

NO EVACUATION IN 300 MILES OF NEW ORLEANS

NEW ORLEANS, Jan. 28 (UP)—Veteran river men were unmoved today by U. S. Army engineers predictions of a "super-flood" in the lower Mississippi. "It's an injustice to Louisiana," said State Engineer Harry Jacobs, Jacobs said no evacuations were contemplated for 300 miles north of New Orleans.

Allred's Message Scores Gambling Mania

WANTS LIQUOR LAW ENFORCED AS TO DRINKS

AUSTIN, Jan. 28 (UP)—Governor James V. Allred today called upon the Texas legislature for repeal of the race track pari-mutuel law, and for stricter liquor enforcement. In a prepared message, Allred launched a crusade against what he termed a "mania for gambling that has swept the state." He challenged advocates of liquor sales by the drink to submit it to popular vote. Instead, he proposed to divorce all "hard" liquor from beer and wine shops and enlarged powers by which liquor law enforcers can keep "joints" closed during appeal. "Bookie shops," he said, can be closed effectively by simple amendments to existing laws. Much dissatisfaction with the liquor law, Allred said, is due to failure of some sections to enforce it, especially in regard to sales by the drink. "Since the summer of 1933 an unparalleled wave and mania for gambling has swept the state," was the opening phrase of his discussion of races and gambling. "Legalized gambling has given spread to still wider illegal gambling. Bookie shops, gambling houses, slots and marble machines and almost every other form of gambling has flourished."

DOUBT EXPRESSED IN HOUSE CONTEST

AUSTIN, Jan. 28 (UP)—A first session of the house committee to report on a 99th district seat contest was scheduled for this afternoon with a question of the committee's power to act to come up for first argument. Rep. A. P. Page of Waco, chairman said there was some doubt if a house committee has the right to go into the alleged primary irregularities. E. E. Hunter of Cleburne, former member has contested the election of J. J. Russell, of Cleburne. Page said there was contention that the contest can be settled only by court action.

Quail for Stocking Hunting Preserves

D. C. Harper of the State Fish Hatchery at Lake Cisco announces that the department is again distributing quail for stocking purposes and proposes to give one for each one purchased, quail to be issued wherever the applicant desires. The quail come in crates of 24 and will be shipped in the next 30 or 40 days. Mr. Harper said. The cost will be about 65c to 70c each, he said. If the applicant buys 12, the department gives the other 12 in the crate. The price being P. O. B. Cisco. The purchaser may take them to his own hunting ground or ranch as he sees fit. An order will be made within the next few days and those wishing to make purchase will communicate with D. C. Harper, Lake Cisco, telephone 136W4.

UNITED AUTO WORKERS SUFFER INJURIES BY HIT-RUN DRIVER

FLINT, Mich., Jan. 28 (UP)—Sheriff's deputies and Flint police today sought the driver and occupants of an automobile that sideswiped a machine carrying five United Auto Workers organizers, sending four to a hospital. Occupants of the wrecked machine were union officials who had fled to Michigan cities in the face of vigorous protests against their attempts to arrange a union meeting. This disturbance was the only incident which marred the return of nearly 46,000 men to work in General Motors plants in eight cities.

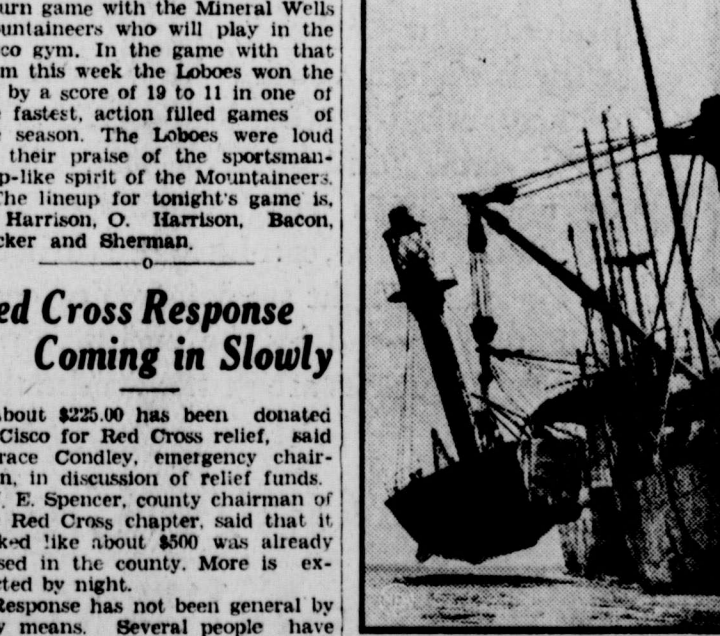
LOBOES PLAY DE LEON TEAM AT RIS. STAR

THIRD NORTHER PREDICTED BY DR. J. L. CLINE

DALLAS, Jan. 28 (UP)—Dr. J. L. Cline, Federal Meteorologist here, predicted today that a third norther, less severe than two previous ones, would strike North Texas tonight or early Friday. "This cold wave won't be as bad as either of the other two," Dr. Cline said, "unless it goes farther south than we expect." Dr. Cline said temperatures would drop to freezing as far south as Abilene and Dallas, and that temperatures below freezing were in prospect in the northern part of the Panhandle.

DALLAS, Jan. 28 (UP)—All Dallas hospitals, except one, were filled to capacity today and many were turned away as a wave of influenza and pneumonia swept the city. Four major hospitals reported 247 cases of influenza and 40 of pneumonia.

NATIONAL DRIVE URGED TO RUSH FEDERAL AMENDMENT TO UPHOLD MINIMUM FAIR WAGE STANDARDS

ALBANY, N. Y., Jan. 28 (UP)—Minimum fair wage legislation to improve working conditions for women and minors in industry is being considered in the New York State Legislature to replace laws held invalid by the U. S. Supreme Court. In his campaign for re-election, President Roosevelt declared that minimum wage legislation was essential. Early passage of a new law to meet the approval of the high court is assured. At least three minimum wage bills have been sponsored in the legislature. Supporters urge the Desmond-Brownell bill asserting: 1—To be constitutional, any minimum fair wage law must include men. 2—Men need the protection as much as do women and minors. 3—Women and minors will not be protected by a minimum fair wage law applying only to them. "Want No Discrimination" "Minimum fair wage legislation for women alone is a detriment," says supporters of the Desmond-Brownell bill. "If New York state wants to insure minimum fair wages for its workers without doubtful and lengthy efforts to amend the state and federal constitutions, it will do it this minimum fair wage bill." The state's minimum wage conference organized by Elmer F. Andrews, industrial commissioner, recommended amendment of the Federal Constitution "at the earliest possible date" and the enactment of a new minimum fair wage law. The conference called upon Andrews to appoint an "organization committee," national in scope, to work for the amendment. The committee is to organize forces throughout the country and to obtain "common action to attain quick passage of the amendment by the Congress and ratification by states."

JAYCEES PLAN FLOOD RELIEF DRIVE IN WEST

FORT WORTH, Jan. 28 (UP)—Fort Worth's flood relief program gained momentum today when the Junior Chamber of Commerce launched a west Texas campaign for 100,000 articles of clothing, blankets and shoes. The campaign includes all cities in north, west and southwest Texas, where bundles of clothing will be brought to Fort Worth free of charge by the Bowen and Greyhound bus lines. Contributors need only to take their bundles to local bus stations.

Leslie Horn Reported Hurt in Car Accident

scalliwags get any if you can help it by making a will.

Word of the huge estate without heirs spread to remote corners of the world. First dozens, then hundreds, and finally thousands of "relatives" demanded a share of the money.

Only Wife's Heirs Eligible.
The Pennsylvania Supreme Court clarified the dispute temporarily by ruling that only relatives of Mrs. Garrett were eligible—her husband's heirs had no claim on the estate. But for each claimant eliminated by the ruling, three others appeared.

The situation was so trying to Orphan's Court judges that one of them remarked that "just because we are all descended from Adam does not mean that everybody is an heir to Henrietta E. Garrett."

Whenever there is an official communication in connection with the case, it is necessary to hire a battery of stenographers to handle a mailing list of 30,000 claimants and their attorneys. And each claimant who is obliged to submit a brief must send a copy to every other claimant.

Administrator Cites Letter
Charles S. Starr, who helped administer the estate, has announced that he is entitled to "the entire residuary estate in question." Mrs. Garrett's incomplete will was in the form of a letter to Starr, telling him who was to get the \$62,500 disposed of. Starr said the letter "implied" that he should get the remainder of the estate.

In the background of the proceedings looms the State of Pennsylvania, represented by imposing legal talent, waiting to take the estate by escheat if no heirs are established. The state, in any event, will collect a huge inheritance tax.

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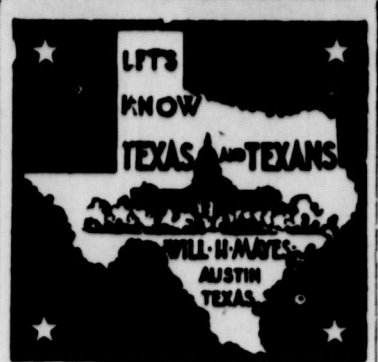

GEN. GOURAUD SOON TO END ARMY CAREER

By JOSEPH D. RAVOTTO United Press Staff Correspondent PARIS, Jan. 28 (U.P.)—Gen. Henri Joseph Eugene Gouraud, military governor of Paris, will be retired from active service next November at the age of 70.

Thus the beloved one-armed figure with the slight limp will pass from the scene after almost 50 years of active service to his government. So warm a place has this hero of the World and Colonial wars won in the hearts of his countrymen, that long after he has gone he will be remembered in his most characteristic pose: his left arm holding his flashing sword high overhead, as he took the reviews of the troops at all the military ceremonies held in the capital.

Gouraud, who is also a special member of the Superior War Council, will be retained on the list as a reserve officer after his retirement. This is a special mark of consideration to a commanding officer who saw fire before the enemy.

Known to A. F. F. Soldiers The retiring military governor is a firm admirer of Americans and is not unknown to them. It was as Commander of the Fourth French Army during the World War, that he led several American divisions including the famous 42nd, Rainlow, Division. After the war, he made his acquaintance with the United States when he visited several conventions of the American Legion as honor guest, later traveling through the country.

His successor has not yet been chosen but he is most likely to be General Garchery, presently military governor of Lyons. Also mentioned to succeed is General Billotte, member of the Superior War Council and like Gouraud, a former Colonial soldier.

Few army leaders have suffered more serious wounds and survived to parade their glorious mutilations. His limp is the result of old wounds in the knee and legs. At Gallipoli he lost his right arm.

Long Record Distinguished His military career shows a proud war record and his efficient and tactful administration as military governor of Paris which gives him command of all the troops garrisoned in the Paris region is no less distinguished.

It is as military governor of Paris that he took the salute of troops at the funeral processions of General Foch and Joffre, Brand, Clemenceau and all the World War and civil leaders.

Gouraud has earned an international reputation for his charm and good humor which has long endeared him to his soldiers. To Parisians his passage in a parade has always been the signal for hearty cheer and the doffing of hats.

A Parisian by birth on Nov. 17, 1867, Gouraud went through Saint-Cyr military school for infantry officers in 1882 and from then on until 1914 he served in the Colonies.

General Officer in 1912 After 24 years of duty, he reached the rank of brigadier general in 1912. During those years he saw fighting in the Soudan, the Congo and Mauretania. When French troops were sent into the Orient in 1915, Gouraud was placed in command of the expedition of the Gardanielles. It was there that he received the injury that cost him his right arm.

He then returned to France and took command of the Fourth French Army on the west front, which included several American divisions. After the War, Gouraud was sent to Syria as French high commissioner and narrowly escaped death in a political plot. In 1923 he was appointed military governor of Paris. He holds the Croix de Guerre and the Military Medal and the Military Medal and the Grand Cross of the Legion of Honor.

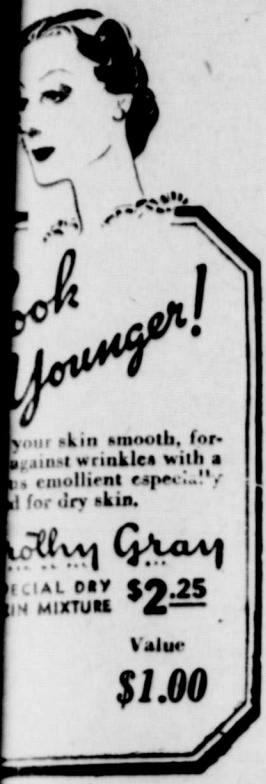

CANNED FRUIT GAINS YEARLY IN POPULARITY

LONDON, Jan. 25 (AP)—The English markets for canned fruit apparently is unlimited by the Imperial Economic Committee.

The report shows that the aggregate imports of canned and bottled fruits preserved in sugar, and fruit pulp preserved without sugar into the United Kingdom in 1935 reached a record total of more than 234,000 tons, valued at \$36,000,000.

"It seems probable that the extent to which this market will expand has yet to be discovered," the report states.

Total imports for 1935 were 21,000 tons higher than those of 1934. Empire supplies have been gaining a larger share of the market, but in 1935 this share dropped a few points in percentage. Imports from Canada reached a new high level, but supplies from Australia and Malaya were slightly smaller. Peaches and pineapples were equal first, with 24 per cent of the total each, while pears came next on the list. Imports of dried fruits in 1935 amounted to about 180,000 tons, or 6 per cent more than in 1934, with a declared value of \$28,000,000. Shipments of currants from Australia were the heaviest since 1930, and represented 23 per cent of the total imports of 57,000 tons.

Over 20,000 Bibles Are Handed Out

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla. (AP)—G. F. Wilson, who expects to celebrate his 80th birthday in April, has distributed 20,000 Bibles during his lifetime, although he is not a clergyman or a member of any church.

The Bibles he has either given away or sold at cost. He said he could quote thousands of passages from the Scriptures.

Wilson, who formerly was a traveling salesman, retired 33 years ago. Each man he meets Wilson addresses as "brother." He feels it his duty to spread the messages of the Bible, although he never took an active part in church work.

CISCO HAS NO NEWS FROM AREA AFFECTED BY DISASTROUS FLOOD

A number of Cisco people have relatives in Louisville, Ky., in the flood area, but none have been able to receive news from that section. Rev. Elwin Skiles is in Mullins Hall, at the Louisville Baptist Seminary, which has been made a relief station for the city. Mr. and Mrs. Ava Skiles, parents of Elwin, are concerned about him on account of the lack of lights, heat, drinking water and sanitary conditions, but think he would be safe at Mullins Hall which is away from the low area.

Mr. and Mrs. C. R. West have relatives in the flood area but have likewise failed to receive any news from them.

Their daughter, Mrs. Swinebroad, who recently married and moved to Lancaster is not in the flooded district and should be in no danger.

A number of other Cisco people have relatives in the menaced districts but none, so far, as we have been able to learn, have had news other than newspapers and radios since the disaster started. All wires are either down or commanded by the Red Cross and other relief agencies and hence are not open for private use.

Miss Bess Owens, manager of the Western Union, says her instructions are that any message directed to the flood area are subject to indefinite delay. She had a message today from Covington, Ky., but this is not in the major area, but thus far she has not had any wire news from people in the flooded districts, which cover parts of several states.

TRUCK LEGISLATION

Any change in existing Texas truck laws which will increase the present 7,000-pound load limit will affect adversely all communities in the state, both rural and urban. This statement is proved best by identifying the causes and effects upon Texas communities.

These are:

1. Increasing truck loads mean correspondingly increasing the distance which the truck can profitably carry its load.
2. Increasing the distance of profitable truck haul means bringing the small town wholesale houses and industrial plants, such as wholesale grocers, bottling plants, feed mills, oil mills, grain elevators, cotton compresses and retail lumber yards, into direct competition with similar establishments in large cities.
3. Such competition will inevitably result in further drying up the small country towns by taking from them the payoffs, taxes and local purchases represented by their present establishments. Property values, both residential and commercial, will decline; volume of re-

strator, I was to can for the entire family," says Essie Lou Marsh of the Romney Girls' 4-H club. I canned 56 quarts of English peas, 12 quarts of kraut, 32 quarts cucumber pickles, 18 quarts of string bean, 12 quarts Irish potatoes, 46 quarts tomatoes, 92 quarts of corn, and 48 quarts of black-eyed peas. I valued my canned food at \$50. My hotbed enabled me to have an early garden and a surplus to sell. Besides the canned food and supply for the table, I sold 9 bushels of English peas, at \$1.00 a bushel; 185 pounds of cabbage at 2 1-2 cents per pound; 50 pounds of onions at 3 1-2 cents per pound; 100 pounds of dried beans at 1 1-2 cents per pound; 200 ears of reastin corn at \$1.00 per 100; and 150 pounds of tomatoes at 10 cents per quart. The total amount sold came to \$28.87 which will buy by clothes for a year.

Closet Improvement
"My closet improvement cost \$35," says Rosa Mae Harbin, wardrobe director of the Flatwoods 4-H club girls. "The wire on which I hung the coat hanger was replaced with a tick. Three more shelves were added at one end of the closet for storing folded garments. Other I had to hang two dresses on the same coat hanger. The dress on the bottom looked like it had never been ironed. I added six more coat hangers to avoid this. The top of the closet was fixed with a separate door and quilts were stored there." The shelves were painted white and the entire closet papered. Since we did not have any paper like that used in the room, I used some with the wrong side out."

Filling the Pantry
"I was able to fill my pantry in spite of the drought," says Etoile Akers, garden coperator of the Romney 4-H Club Girls. "I had a variety of vegetables in my garden, such as beans, carrots, cabbage, English peas, lettuce, mustard, pepper, spinach, turnips, tomatoes and cucumbers. The total cost of the seeds was \$3.60. A new wire for the garden and the fertilizer cost \$10.50, making the garden cost \$14.10. The value of the garden was estimated at \$100.70 with a net profit of \$86.60. I canned 268 quarts of vegetables and fruits, dried 40

adding coat hangers and making a shoerack and two hat racks. The total cost of improvement was 25 cents. I have really enjoyed my club work and have tried to make a success of it. It has tried to take part in everything in order to be an all-round club girl."

TOWN GASSED ACCIDENTALLY

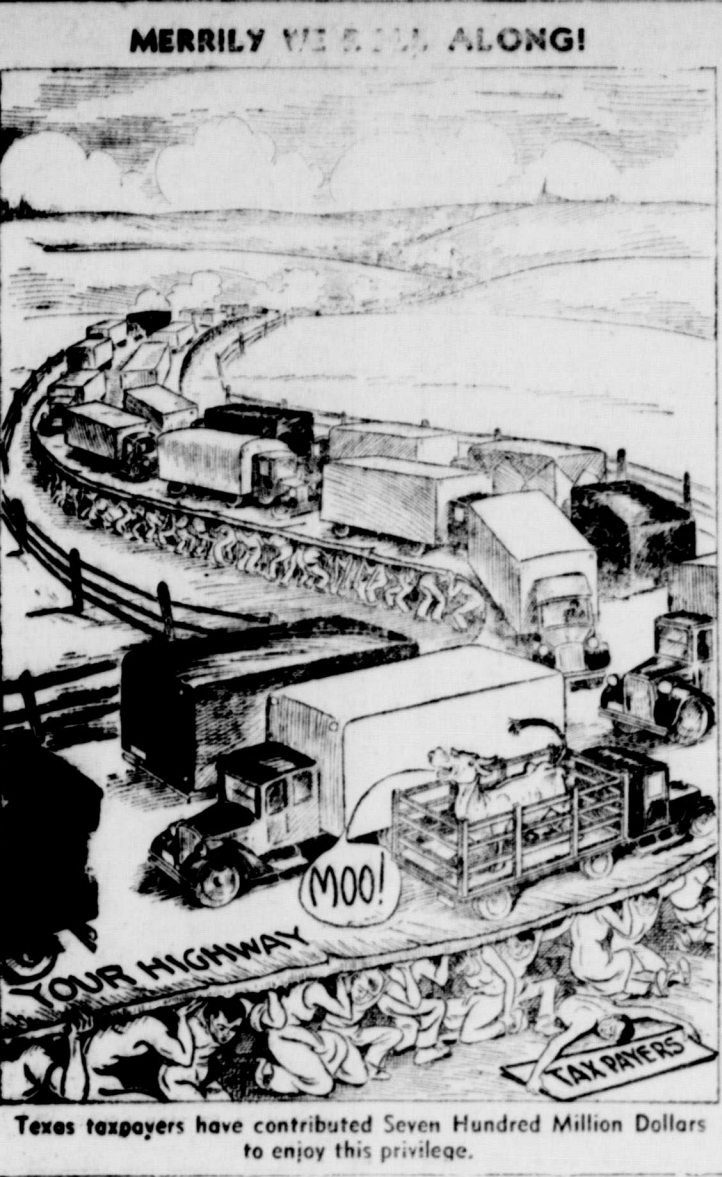

Food Preservation
"A demonstration is not completed until others are shown how to do it," says Johnnie Foster, garden coperator of the Girls' 4-H club at Carbon. "My brother that I visited in Louisiana had a very fine garden but the vegetables were ruining because of my sister-in-law's illness. I immediately tried to save them. She had never canned in cans so I went to the Home Demonstration Agent to borrow her sealer. With her help and equipment, I was able to can 250 cans of vegetables."

History of the 4-H Club Work
On the 10 day of February, I began my fourth year of club work, which has been one of the most enjoyable one to me. The garden was not such a problem because I had already helped mother plant all of our garden for the spring season. We planted a varied variety of vegetables including English peas, lettuce, mustard, turnips, radishes, carrots, beets, corn, green beans, crowder, black-eyed peas, spinach, onions, cucumbers, cabbages, butter beans and potatoes. After these vegetables were gathered, we had our garden plowed so that the winter snows and rains would give us a better season and kill the insects. We started our plant in February so we would have an early garden. We had some trouble with the lice eating our cabbage. By pulling up all the heads that had lice, we were able to save the rest of them. The careless weeds tried to take our garden but we finally got them killed. With the help of mother we canned 200 quarts of beans, spinach, corn and English peas. Later in the summer, I went to visit my married brother in Louisiana. They had a fine garden but the vegetables were ruining due to my sister-in-law's illness. I immediately tried to save them. She had never canned in tin cans so I went to the Home Demonstration Agent to borrow her sealer. With her help and equipment, I was able to can 250 cans of vegetables. While I was in Louisiana I had the pleasure of my brother's neighbors can in tin cans. I showed them how to can corn with little work and it had a better flavor. With the help of my brother, we built a pantry on the screened in porch. He lived in an oil field so we used scrap lumber to build it and the cost amounted to 15 cents. I enjoyed telling someone what I had learned in my club work. My clothes did not cost so much this year. From the clothing record I kept, my individual wardrobe cost \$34.92. I found that my shoes were my greatest expense. I took an old gray suit that my brother could not wear and made me a spring suit that cost 80 cents. I spent 53 cents in buying some navy material for a blouse. I also made a green silk dress. My three club garments cost \$1.19. I improved my closet space by
