





FORT WORTH. Feb. 2 (U.P.) Members of the Texas Game, Fish and Oyster Commission today voted 3 to 2 to retain Will Tucker of Austin, as executive secretary, over-riding a previous vote to ask his resignation.

The Commission was in session less than an hour. rejecting all applications for Tucker's job, after hearing an opinion by Assistant Attorney General Vernon Coe that the "ouster" asked at San Antonio recently, was illegal. At that time the ballot was 3 to 2 against Tucker. Coe said 4 of the Commission's 6 votes were needed to effect such a removal.

No mention was made of the controversy between Jack O'Brien, sports editor of San Antonio News and Governor Allred.




