Explorer to Hunt Rival of Everest

ROCHESTER, N. Y. (AP)—Harrison Forman, American explorer who recently returned from a trek through Tibet, believes there is a mountain peak higher than the Himalaya's lofty Mt. Everest.

He says he will return to Tibet in March with the sole intention of determining whether the mountain, charted on British War Office maps is actually higher than Everest.

"There is substantial evidence that it is," Forman said. He places the unknown "earth giant" some 1,500 miles northeast of Everest.

Minn. Urges Test for Iron Pavement Strip

ST. PAUL (AP)—Minnesota officials said they would be willing to share part of the expense of a sixteenth of a mile test strip of iron pavement if federal bureau of public roads officials would bear a hand in the project.

The short stretch of pavement would be laid in St. Louis County as part of a grade elimination plan. Iron paving would bring the total cost of the job \$27,500 higher than present, an increase in paving cost of \$5.50 a square yard.

Highway engineers have declared that iron undoubtedly wears longer and better than concrete pavement and a short test strip has been in place in front of a University of Minnesota building for several years.

SAFETY—OR THIS?

DEATH, in the guise of heavily loaded motor trucks, rides the highways of Texas every day and every night. The toll of human death and injury of those vehicles is appalling.

In the five-year period, 1932 to 1936, inclusive, trucks in Texas have participated in 8,416 highway accidents in which 2,195 persons were killed and 11,962 injured. In 1936 alone, their record stood 2,208 accidents with 3,323 persons injured and 576 killed. These actual records of people killed, as shown by Texas newspapers, compared with the number of deaths resulting from all motor vehicle accidents, as given by the Bureau of Vital Statistics in Austin, show that the average Texas truck participates in twice as many fatal accidents as the average passenger car.

Likewise, as might be reasonably expected from their greater weight and size, and as shown by the records of the Texas Railroad Commission, the Carrier-for-Hire truck accidents, during 1935, have resulted, vehicle for vehicle, in three times the number of fatalities as for the average passenger car.

Increased liability to highway accident forms an inseparable result of BIG truck operation. But even now, the threat of greater highway hazards hangs over the people of Texas. Newspapers report that operators of BIG trucks have organized for the purpose of securing an increase in weight and speed limits, already too large. These are the elements, weight and speed, which, in highway accidents, spell "D-E-A-T-H."

The right to grant, condition or deny the use of the highways for profit, belongs to you, the people of Texas, notwithstanding the attempts of the operators of BIG trucks to take it away and give it to the federal government instead. Your present laws, limiting the size, weight and speed of trucks, were enacted by reason of your insistence, and by your insistence they have remained on the statute books. Their amendment would serve the sole purpose of increasing the profits of operators of the BIG trucks, with the certain results of also increasing the mounting injuries, deaths and property losses now taking place on your highways.

Public welfare and public safety demand that existing highway regulations shall be retained and enforced.

DRYS PLAN FOR BEER ELECTION HELD IN APRIL

EASTLAND, Feb. 16.—Preliminary plans for an election to legalize 14 per cent alcoholic beverages from Eastland county were taken Monday morning at a session of the United Dry Forces.

Officers of the organization who were elected, were delegated to draft a petition for presentation to commissioners court for the calling of a vote after April 18—the date last year when 14 per cent beverages were legalized.

The January, 1936 election was called following the Nov. 1935, ruling of a high court in Texas that a dry county could not contain wet precincts, which had existed in Eastland and other counties.

COLLEEN MOORE BUYS EXPENSIVE GEORGIA ESTATE

CONYERS, Ga., Feb. 12 (AP)—Colleen Moore, whose flashing Irish eyes made her one of Hollywood's greatest stars of the silent films, has purchased a large tract of land near here on which she plans to build a home.

L. M. McDowell, clerk of Rockdale County Supreme Court, revealed that about 2,000 acres have been purchased over a period of several months, half the acreage being listed in the name of her mother, Mrs. Agnes Morrison, and half listed jointly in the names of Miss Moore and John H. Hewlett, Atlanta, the former actress' business manager.

The land is located about 30 miles from Atlanta. Miss Moore is reported to be planning a swimming pool, tennis courts and other conveniences for the estate. She also plans to farm a portion of the land and establish a cattle and sheep farm.

JO TIPTON IS VOTED IDEAL SCHOOL GIRL

Jo Tipton, Alice Slicker, Betty Je Kicks and Sue Witten, were selected, each to represent the four foods classes and then a ballot was taken to select one from this number to represent the department as a whole.

Miss Graves thinks that the rounded life of her girls has been placed on a higher plane on account of this contest and the constant thoughts in mind of becoming the embodiment of the ideal person before her classmates.

R. D. GREEN OF ABILENE DIES HEART ATTACK

ABILENE, Feb. 16.—R. D. Green, superintendent of Abilene schools, died unexpectedly last night.

He succumbed to a heart attack two days after he had been re-elected to serve another year in the position which he has held since 1917.

The veteran school man died about 11:30 o'clock at his home. He had suffered two heart attacks in the past year, the first in Fort Worth while he was attending a convention of the Texas State Teachers' association, of which he was a former president, and the second as he walked on Cypress street near the Woodson hotel a few months ago.

Mr. Green, with members of his family, had returned at 9 o'clock from a week-end visit in Austin with a son, W. M. Green.

He went to bed, and at about 11 o'clock he rang for Mrs. Green, complaining of feeling ill. Death came a few minutes later, with Mrs. Green, her aunt, Miss Ida Bright, and Mrs. A. B. Ruff of Los Angeles, a daughter of the Greens, at the bedside.

"I'm gone. Goodby to all of you," he was able to say before dying.

A son, R. D. Jr., Dr. and Mrs. W. J. Matthews arrived at the home within a few minutes. Numerous friends, members of the Abilene school board, and teachers in the city schools, also were at the home after midnight to express condolences.

Another son, Norval of Pickwick Dam, Tenn., another daughter, Miss Lottie Roe Green, a teacher in the Fort Worth schools, and three grandchildren, Nancy and Janice Green, and Billy Ruff, survive.

Mr. Green was 62 years old. Born at Elizabethtown, near Roanoke in Denton county, Nov. 21, 1874, he had spent all of his life since reaching maturity as an educator.
