



The survey entitled "who gets the national income?" showed nationl earnings hit a peak of \$79,000,-000,000 in 1929 and then dropped to \$45,000,000,000 at the depth of the depression in 1933. About 40 per cent of that loss has been recovered. All types of incomes — except from interest payments — suffered major slashes during the depression All incomes —except interest payments — have shown substanial recovery in the past three years.


