## What's News Today

The South American countries, quick to imitate our politics and advanced ways of civilization, also copies our ways of society, some of which are not so good. News comes of a wide search on the endless pampas of Argentina for the little 2-year-old son of a rich cattle baron kidnaped by bandits who have evidently heard of our advanced ways of getting rich quick. The enraged rancher and cowboys of the southern pampas will make speedy work of the bandits if they find them. A knife perhaps, between the shoulders, or a slit throat, or perhaps a lasso thrown about the neck and a swift dash across the pampas dragging the luckless victims behind those wild mustangs.

California police make quick work of ejecting sit-down strikers from the Douglas Aircraft factory, largest in the world, after a grand jury had indicted the strikers. However, the strikers said they surrendered only because they were assured they would be given a quick hearing. In California they do things in a big way and quickly.

A black ruler in one of Britain's African colonies puts his two sons in jail because they stole a crown from him. No fatherly weakness to temper with justice in this case.

The state's clemency board which has not functioned since February 1 will remain idle a few more days since the legislature failed to agree on a clemency bill Thursday. Governor Alfred had sent a second message urging speedy action on the matter. The house wanted the board stationed at Huntsville while the senate wants it housed at Austin. A committee will endeavor to adjust the differences.

Secretary Hull urges the world to follow the lead for peace but at the same time we are not throwing our guns and war vessels into the discard as we did a few years ago when we joined England, France, Japan and others in a treaty to discard certain class vessels and then found that other nations did not have any of these classes while we were the victims. The nation is safest which urges peace but emphasizes those feelings of friendliness by a well filled cartridge belt, we regret to say. The world filled with weak human beings is not yet ready to settle all its difficulties on a friendly basis. Might is still power among nations of the earth, we again regret to admit.

England and America are both racing to build a South Sea-airline in the Pacific which will connect those far flung spaces with the main seat of power and commerce. Whether the two countries are working together or against each other is not known. We do know that Lidbergh, residing in England, is charting an air route across to India and to the South Sea district. Meanwhile, the U. S. A. is rushing radio stations and air station buildings to the Pacific where we still have interests even if we have given up the Philippine Islands.

## BEHIND THE SCENES IN WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON — It develops that this nation, which constitutionally has only 96 senators, recently had 97 and that, while all other states had their customary two senators apiece, Minnesota was having three.  
The three were Henrik Shipstead, Guy V. Howard — the obscure Republican who served a two-month term in November and December because no other Minnesotan thought to run for the brief vacancy — and Elmer Benson, whose term as senator technically expired when he was elected governor on Nov. 3, but who kept right on fulfilling the duties of that office until Senator Lundeen took it over on Jan. 4.  
The terrible truth emerges in a resolution by Senator Lew Schwelbenbach of Washington which proposes to pay salaries of Benson and his staff for that period.  
It appears that while Senator Howard and his family were drawing all the pay and doing none of the work, Senator Benson and his staff were doing vice versa.  
Both had offices with their name plates on the door. Entitled to bestow four secretarial jobs for 60 days, Howard kept them carefully in the family and drew Treasury checks totaling \$3696.86.  
Benson asked Schwelbenbach to introduce the compensation bill, but it's doubtful whether the Senate will recognize Benson's last 60 days of service. You probably could have a hard time figuring how valuable to the nation Benson and his staff really were in those two months.  
SENATOR JAMES BUCHANAN of Texas, who re-

mained in the House so long that he became chairman of the non-fruitful Appropriations Committee, is sometimes considered a prosaic old gent who thinks only in long, dull columns of figures and dollar marks.  
But "Buck" got to talking about the flood the other day, assuring his colleagues that he "did not have sense enough to make a good farmer, but did have sense enough to make a good congressman."  
Once he had held of 3500 acres of Brazos river bottom land and put everything he had into it until he had 2300 acres of "land well watered, well equipped with houses, well tenanted, and well stocked." Then came the floods and after a while "all the houses had gone down the river, as well as the mules I had and my hogs and cattle and crops, with my tenants left starving on the bank."  
"I got myself a plank and I got some charcoal," he related. "I nailed that plank at the high water mark, and here is what I wrote on that plank: It expressed the way I felt then — and the way I feel now:  
"Farewell to the Brazos bottom, I bid you a long adieu;  
I may migrate to hell some day  
But I will never return to you."  
And after this outburst of pious Buchanan added:  
"From that day to this I have been the relentless enemy of flood water anywhere and everywhere, and if I can contribute by my voice or by my vote or by my work to the prevention of floods throughout this Union, I shall make that contribution more cheerfully than I ever made any contribution in my life."  
All of which speaks well for chances of big fat flood relief control appropriations.

## FT. WORTH FAT STOCK SHOW TO BEGIN MARCH 12

Presenting the greatest world championship rodeo in its history and offering many new attractions, the Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show is ready to celebrate



This is one of the 135 bucking horses to be used in the world championship rodeo at the Southwestern Exposition and Fat Stock Show in Fort Worth, March 12 to 21. He is among the 65 that have never bucked in the south. His name is "Red Shirt" and he is owned by Eddie McCarty and Verne Elliott who are furnishing the string for the championship event.

The million dollar livestock show will be seen in the \$200,000 livestock barn. The Midway attractions have been given larger quarters.

New and beautiful Rambeau Garden, the exposition's night club, has been placed in a large building near the Coliseum where the rodeo and horse show will be held. It will present Kathryn Duffy's floor show, interational revue, with a cast of 35. Wally Steffler's dance orchestra, brought here after successful engagements at night clubs and hotels in the north and east will furnish music. The garden will be open immediately after each matinee and night rodeo and horse show.

There are numerous other new and novel attractions that will be found on the grounds. Mail order rodeo tickets are being filled now.

The U. S. Bureau of Mines has announced a new method to determine to what extent a gas may be compressed without actually compressing it.  
Devised in the laboratory of the Amarillo, Texas, helium plant, the procedure has important uses in the natural gas and other industries, the bureau said. It employs the measurement of pressures and observation of temperatures and is simpler than the measurement of volume by actual experiment.  
Because industrial advancements required knowledge of the compressibility of a gas, such data were purely of scientific interest. Somewhat recently was computed under the "laws" of the early scientist, Robert Boyle and J. A. C. Charles, but no real gas followed those laws exactly.  
Now the error in computing compressibility by the laws and the complexity of the customary computational methods have been eliminated by the new procedure, devised under E. S. Burnett of the bureau.  
The method is expected to be of particular use in the development of deeper, high-pressure sources of natural gas and of increased pressure in transmission lines.

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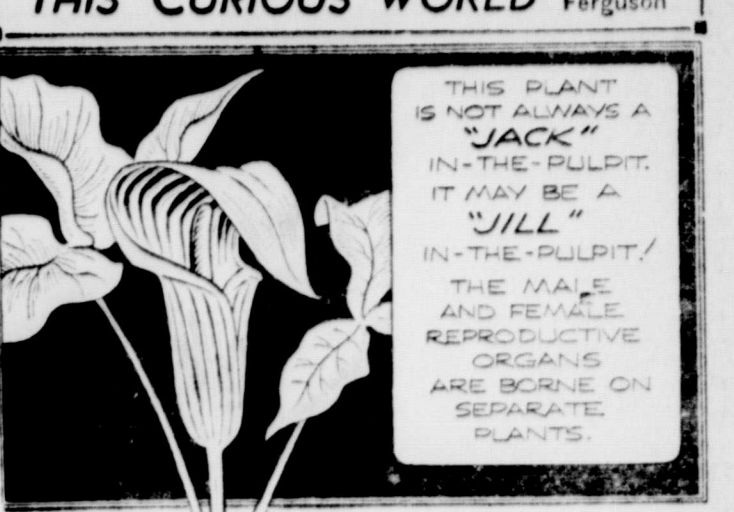
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THIS CURIOUS WORLD By William Ferguson
