Hosiery Workers Threaten Strike On Mills

MONDAY GIVEN AS TIME LIMIT FOR RECOGNITION

READING, Pa., Feb. 27. (UP)—Hosiery manufacturers were given 48 hours today to accede to union demands for recognition, and avert a strike of 12,000 workers in 18 mills. Amli Rieve, national president of the American Federation of Hosiery Workers, said final plans for a general strike Monday were being made, and would not be halted until manufacturers expressed a willingness to negotiate with his union.

FACTORY ORDERED CLOSED BY JOHNSON

CAKLAND, Calif., Feb. 27. (UP)—L. A. Johnson, vice president of the million-dollar National Motor Bearing company, ordered the factory closed today to forestall what he said was a threat of a sit-down strike.

THREATENED WITH PRISON TERMS

Two years' prison term for leaders of the sit-down strike in the Douglas Aircraft Corporation plant at Los Angeles were threatened today by the district attorney's office. Court action was prepared by the United States attorney at Waukegan, Ill., against the Committee for Industrial Organization and the sit-down strikers who had held its plant since February 17.

700 CHILDREN DETAINED IN SHOW

MEXIA, Feb. 27. (UP)—The latest wrangle in sit-down strikes was that today of 700 children attending a morning performance at a motion picture theatre. The children held their seats almost an hour after the performance ended, complaining loudly. The theatre manager explained that the feature film which had been advertised was delayed, and did not reach the theatre in time for showing.

Mrs. Watkins Buried Saturday at Nimrod

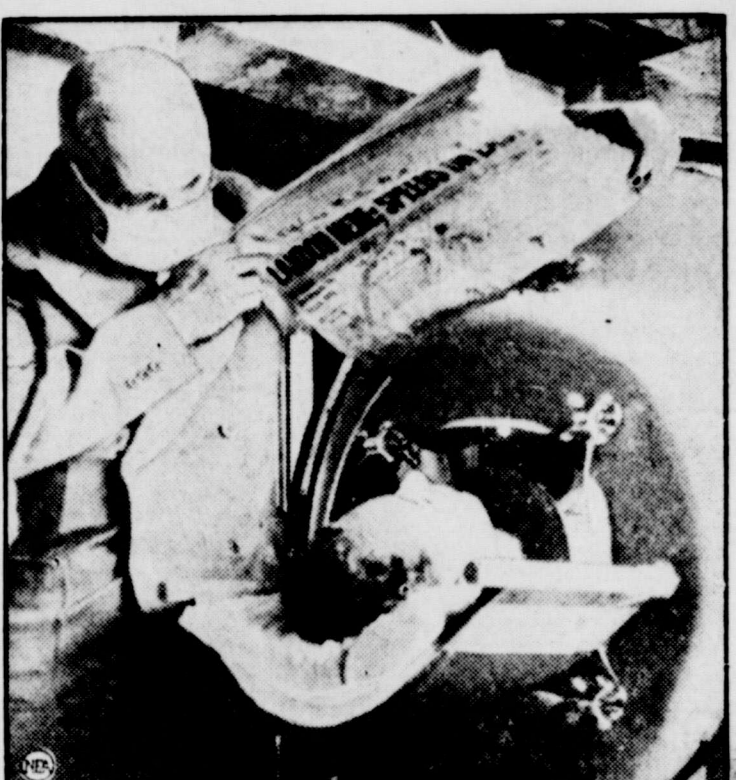

EASTLANDITE TRAPPED IN TRUCK CAB; BURNED TO DEATH SATURDAY

EASTLAND, Feb. 27.—Trapped in the cab of his truck which collided with an automobile and a concrete bridge east of Sweetwater, Ed Hayslip, 44, Eastland truck contractor, and oil pipe dealer, burned to death early Saturday morning.

The party which had attempted to warn him of an accident involving two automobiles on the bridge, stood by helpless to aid after an explosion of gasoline which immediately set the truck aflame. Loaded with over 2,000 feet of two inch tubing which as a result of the impact was forged toward the cab, the truck was telescoped. Officers from Sweetwater who investigated the accident could not discern the truck license plate so badly was the destruction of the vehicle which was turned into a mass of metal by the flames. From the license plate on the trailer, it was probable for Sweetwater officials to contact Eastland officials and County Tax Collector-Assessor C. H. O'Brien, who checked the number with plates issued last year. Hayslip left Eastland at 8:30 Friday night with a load which was taken to Royalty. He had been a resident of Eastland three and a half years. Formerly he resided at Westbrook, where he was in the garage business 12 years.

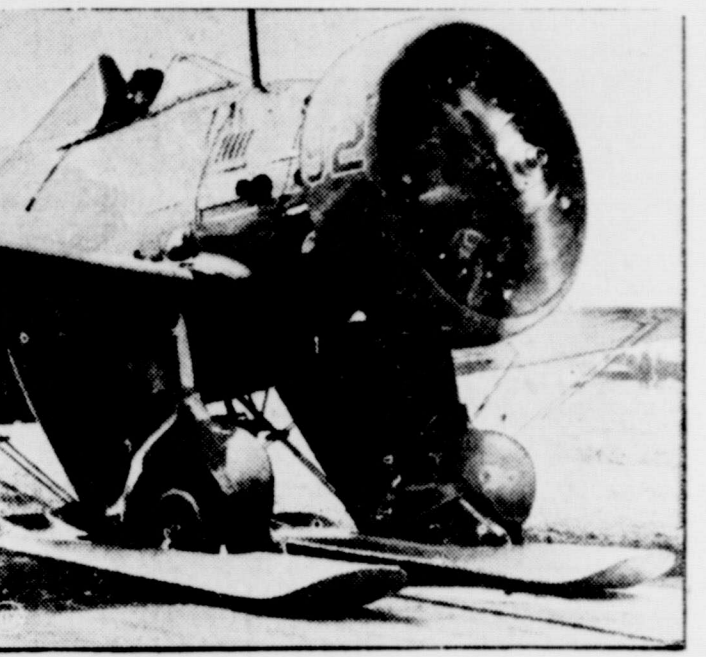

DENIES HE WILL TAKE STUMP FOR MEASURE

WASHINGTON, Feb. 27. (UP)—The administration prepared today for a vigorous campaign the second week in March to rally support for the supreme court reorganization program. President Roosevelt is expected to take personal leadership of the drive.

Mr. Roosevelt already has scheduled one of his famous "fireside chats" the night before the senate's Judiciary Committee opens hearings on the plan. There was a persistent, but unconfirmed report, that he was considering "stumping" the nation if necessary to win public support for it.

White House officials vigorously denied again today the report that the president might stump the country. They claimed the suggestion originated from hostile sources. Congressmen asserted, meanwhile they had traced the source of thousands of protest slips against enlargement of the supreme court to Reverend Gerald Winrod of Wichita, Kansas.

Broadcast Will Fight President's Judicial Reform

WICHITA, Kan., Feb. 27. (UP)—Rev. Gerald Winrod, whose printed petitions against President Roosevelt's court plan has aroused talk of a congressional investigation, is preparing to broadcast in his fight on the presidential proposal, it was learned today.

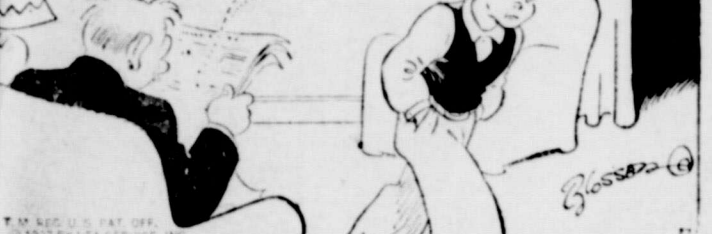

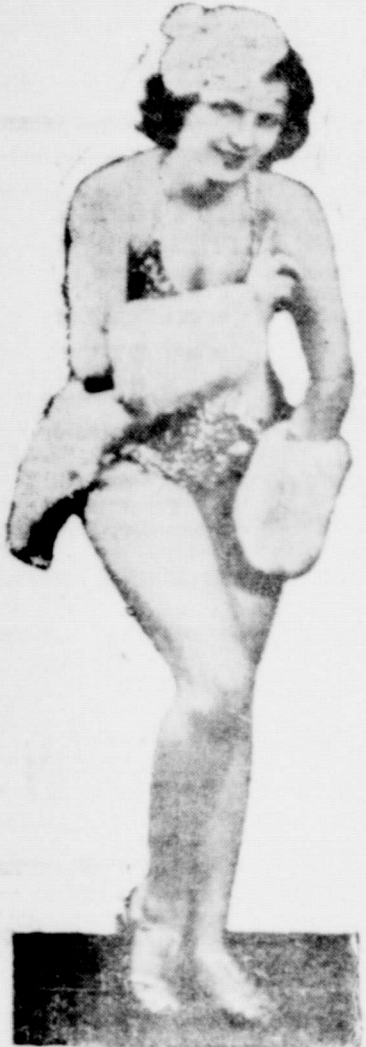

RAILROAD RATES TO BE REDUCED

Dedicated railroad rates which will be in effect during the Southwestern Exposition and Fair Stock Show which will be held March 12 to 21 were announced today.

Round-trip week-end coach tickets will be sold at one current one-way fare which will allow week-end coach passengers to travel at one-tenth cent a mile in each direction. Tickets on this basis will be sold for trains scheduled to arrive in Fort Worth Saturdays, March 13 and 20 and prior to 1 p. m. on Sundays, March 14 and 21. Each ticket will be limited on return trip to departure from Fort Worth not later than evening trains on the first Monday following the sale date.

Round-trip 30-day limit coach tickets will be sold daily at one current one-way coach fare plus four-fifths for the roundtrip. This will allow individual coach passengers to travel at one and one eighth cents per mile in each direction. Roundtrip 30-day limit first class tickets will be sold daily at one current one-way first class fare plus one-third for the roundtrip. This will allow passengers to travel first class at two cents per mile in each direction.

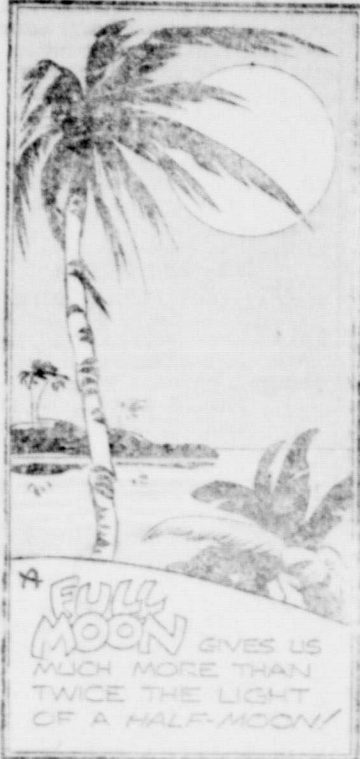

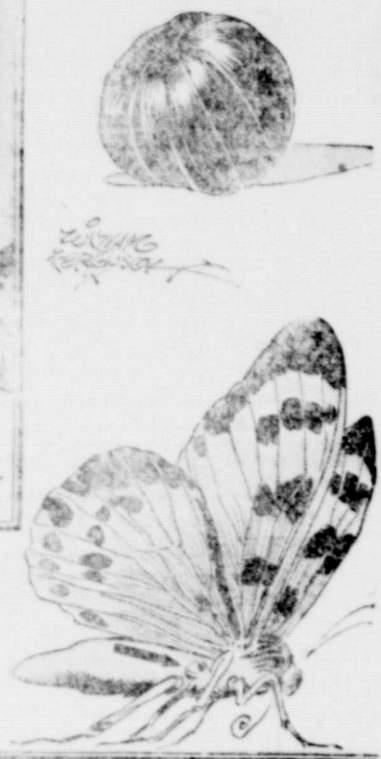

Greater Texas Pan-American Exposition

LALLES Feb. 27—International significance is added to the fifth annual observance of Texas Week, the first week in March, with Dallas announcing a continental Pan American program as timely acknowledgment of enthusiastic receptions tendered Greater Texas and Pan American Exposition goodwill envoys in the Latin American countries.

Proclaiming Pan American Week, March 1 to 6, in a colorful ceremony on City Hall steps at noon Friday (Feb. 26), Mayor Clegg announced that Dallas leads the way for Texas in taking advantage of this opportunity to study Pan American history and contemporary affairs and their relation to state and national interests, theme of the Greater Texas and Pan American Exposition, opening here use 12 in response, Dallas will swing into a city-wide observance of Pan American Week beginning Monday, March 21.

An elaborate program, in which all civic and women's clubs, churches, business clubs, the 47 public schools of the lower grades, seven high and two junior high schools, Southern Methodist University, Hockaday School and all sectarian colleges will participate, has been arranged to cover activities from March 1 to March 6. Joining in the celebration will be the consular staffs of five Latin American nations maintaining legations in Dallas. Representatives of these services have an important role in the ceremonies accompanying the mayor's proclamation. Working with the committee on observance in Adolfo G. Dominguez, consul of Mexico, speakers from

the exposition will appear at different times during the week before school assembly, and all clubs stress the importance of furthering the "Good Neighbor" policy through the medium of the Exposition.

Inauguration of Pan American Week in Dallas will find the Exposition envoys, Dr. Roscoe R. Hill of the Department of State and Charles H. Abbott of Dallas, in Panama, seventh nation visited in the 36-day airplane tour of Mexico, Central and South America begun February 14th. The purpose of the tour is to follow up the formal invitations from President Franklin D. Roosevelt to the presidents of 20 Latin American republics to participate in the Greater Texas and Pan American Exposition.

Texas Exes Program Held Here Tuesday

Madrid Under Heavy Bombardment Today

MADRID Feb. 27, U.P.—The central part of the capital was under heavy rebel shellfire late today with many casualties.

As in previous bombardments the telephone building, Madrid's only skyscraper, was principal target. Sixty-eight 16-inch shells were fired into the center of the city. Preliminary estimates gave casualty as 3 dead and 20 gravel-wounded.

Children were playing hide-and-seek among the fallen stones of a wrecked building 15 minutes after the bombardment ended.

The loyalist government today took the first of a series of drastic moves to centralize control, stamp out treason, and mobilize man-power.

And in the great Reception Room beyond are other magnificent mural paintings and other works of art, each one appropriate to the memorial character of the structure.

The whole aspect of the Memorial is majestic and commanding. Artists, poets, critics and laymen alike have acclaimed its perfection. Truly a great dream has been realized in the beauty that has here been wrought. Truly a great purpose has been achieved in that all who behold it, and realize its patriotic and fraternal significance, are inevitably inspired to higher and nobler concepts of service to country and to humanity.





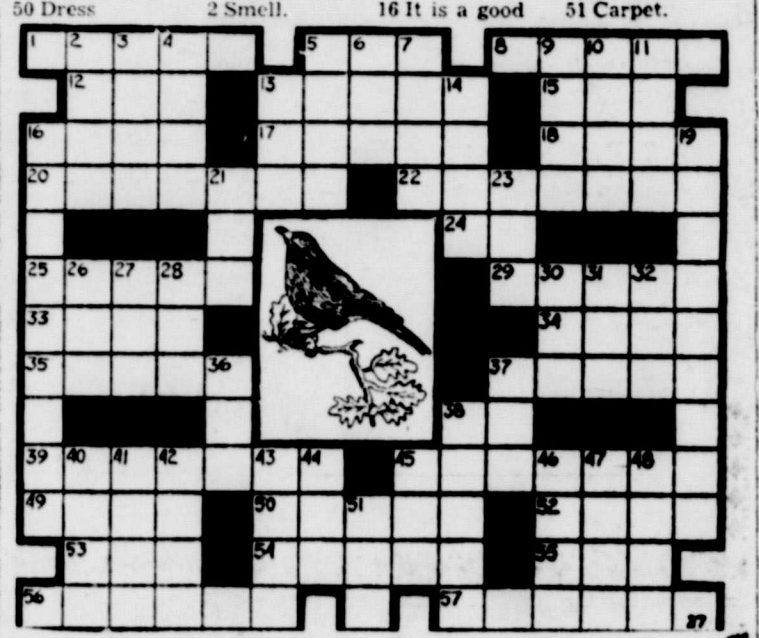
