MARION COUNTY SHERIFF IS MURDERED

SHOT FIRED THRU WINDOW BY ASSAILANT

JEFFERSON, March 10 (UP)—Sheriff J. A. Brown of Marion county, was killed today by an unidentified assailant who fired through the window of the officer's home. Sheriff Brown was preparing to return when a charge of buckshot killed him. He was partly undressed. His wife sitting on the bed and cradling with him, saw him fall. A posse was hastily formed and bloodhounds brought to the Brown home in an attempt to pick up the trail of the slayer. The dogs followed a scent for a distance of three blocks. It was believed that the assassin escaped in an automobile. Sheriff Brown had been leading a drive against bootlegging and pen-handling in this East Texas town, which, during the past two months, has experienced an oil boom. The 42-year-old peace officer had patrolled the streets of Jefferson until midnight, and then went to his home on the ground floor of the jail building. O. B. Baird, a prisoner in the jail, said he saw a man approach the building. He heard a shot and saw the man running. State Rangers hurried to Jefferson during the morning to assist in the search.

Sen. Borah Leads Attack on Court Reforms

BORAH HEARS CUMMINGS IN 4-POINT PLAN

WASHINGTON, March 10 (UP)—William Borah, veteran Idaho senator, today led foes of President Roosevelt's court plan in an attack upon Attorney General Homer S. Cummings's plea before the Senate Judiciary Committee for prompt action on the proposal. Borah listened intently to the plea of Cummings that action was imperative to inject new blood in the nation's judicial system. Cummings declared the need for the president's plan rested upon four propositions: 1. The impossible situation created by the reckless use of injunctions in restraining federal laws. 2. The presence on the federal bench of aged judges. 3. The crowded condition of the federal docket; the delays in the lower courts and the heavy burden upon the supreme court. 4. The need of an effective system to infuse new blood into the judiciary. He denied sharply that the plan held any implication of dictatorship, or set a dangerous precedent.

SWEETWATER, March 10 (UP)—Night Patrolman D. C. Fulkerson was in a serious condition in a hospital here today from injuries inflicted when his car struck a light pole while in pursuit of an automobile allegedly stolen at Pecos. The police car hit a dip in the pavement and crashed into the pole out of control. Fulkerson was thrown from the car, sustaining a brain concussion. The other car sped away.

Water Survey Undertaken for Eastland County's Supply

EASTLAND, March 10.—A water survey of Eastland county, scheduled to require two months' work, will be started Thursday, March 25, by Howard Samuels, engineer for the U. S. Geological survey. The project is designed to offer complete information on Eastland county's underground and surface water. Chemical analysis will be taken of all the water. In the underground water division of the work many wells will be drilled throughout the county.

COMPROMISE EFFORTS IN STRIKE FAILS

HOUSTON, March 10 (UP)—Efforts to bring representatives of 100 sit-down strikers and officials of the Emco Derrick & Equipment company together for a conference failed today. The Committee for Industrial Organization announced today it was beginning its drive to unionize the textile mills with a \$500,000 fund. This development came shortly after rivalry between the CIO and the American Federation of Labor was so clearly drawn that it appeared every union worker in the nation would have to choose between the two groups. The CIO prepared to establish a series of local unions. The AFL move to combat the CIO in the steel industry was rejected today when the Carnegie-Illinois Steel Corporation union vetoed a proposal to become affiliated with the federation. At Chicago, 56 strikers who were arrested on disorderly conduct charges following the first violence in the taxi drivers strike were released on bond.

Hickok Bridges Being Drilled and Cleaned

The Hickok No. 2 airport well was shot with 320 quarts of oil well explosive Tuesday afternoon at 3 o'clock and formed a bridge at about 700 feet from the top, said Field Superintendent Frank Bond today. This is being drilled out and cleaned will continue until Thursday morning at which time something definite may be known as to its results. This well was drilled and given a shot early in its history and great promise was held for a heavy producer. However production and gas pressure dwindled and later reappearance of gas and oil led to the pulling of five inch pipe and the shot at 3,344 feet yesterday.

Youth Enrolled in CCC Camps Soon

According to C. J. Sweeney, Administrator for the Texas Relief Commission in Abilene, word has been received that there will be an enrollment the first part of April for youths for CCC camps. "The same requirements of eligibility as formerly are in force, i. e., the applicant must be from a family receiving assistance from some government agency, and between the ages of 17 and 29, and able to pass a physical examination." Mr. Sweeney further stated, "Actual quotas have not been established, and will not be until an accurate estimate can be made of the number of boys available. Consequently, all those who desire to go at the next enrollment should immediately call at their county welfare office and make application."

Wyoming Senator To Offer Amendment

WASHINGTON, March 10 (UP)—Senator Joseph O'Mahoney of Wyoming announced today he would introduce a constitutional amendment requiring two-thirds of supreme court agree before any state or federal legislation can be declared unconstitutional. "It seems to me there is a real possibility that an amendment of this kind could be ratified now," O'Mahoney said.

Fail to Hold Bill

AUSTIN, March 10 (UP)—Old age pension liberalizers failed to hold their bill in the Texas House of Representatives today and further consideration of the measure was postponed until April 6. The vote was 68 to 66.

TEXAS SENATE CONSIDERING RACE REPEAL

AUSTIN, March 10 (UP)—Race repeal was re-referred to committees by the Texas Senate this afternoon by a vote of 15 to 14. Senator Will Pace of Tyler, presiding for absentee Lieutenant Governor Walter Woodell, held that the race bill amended to prohibit parimutuel bets was the business for the day. Senator Frank Rawlings of Fort Worth moved to re-refer the race bill to the committee on criminal jurisprudence for public hearing. Last week the amended bill received a 20 to 8 vote in the senate. After senate action, the bill must go back to the house for concurrence in the amendment. The amendment's provision has previously been passed by the house in a separate bill.

Eastland County Gets Road Funds

SAN ANTONIO, March 10.—Jobs for 1,649 needy Texans released from completed Works Progress Administration projects have been made available by recent allocation of \$232,945 in federal funds for the operation of 67 twenty-six new WPA projects. Robert J. Smith, deputy state administrator, stated today. Local sponsors will expend \$123,967 for the operation of these projects, Smith said. Eastland county has been allotted farm to market road improvements approximating \$23,846 for 120 workers.

County Gets Road Budget WPA Project

SAN ANTONIO, March 10 (UP)—Allocation of \$232,945 in federal funds for 28 new WPA projects has made employment possible of 1,649 needy workers, Deputy State Administrator Robert Smith said today. Local sponsors will spend \$123,967. Projects include, Eastland county farm to market road improvement, Federal funds, \$15,870; sponsors fund \$7,276; workers 120. Paul Pinto county: farm to market road improvement, Federal funds \$4,351; sponsors fund \$2,617; workers 52.

CISCO LIQUOR IS RETURNED; ACT HELD ILLEGAL

Two hundred and forty-one gallons of liquor seized recently by the Texas Liquor Control Commission were returned under the authority to a drug store at Cisco after receipt of an explanatory telegram to Sheriff Woods from C. Paxson, chief supervisor for the board at Austin. A copy was as follows: "Since there is grave doubt and lay in court rulings on right of return of liquors under nuisance statute and that seizure of liquor is probably unlawful would suggest return of same to drug store. Such action not subsequently taken until courts have decided issue involved." Paxson said the drug store had been changed in court with operating license.

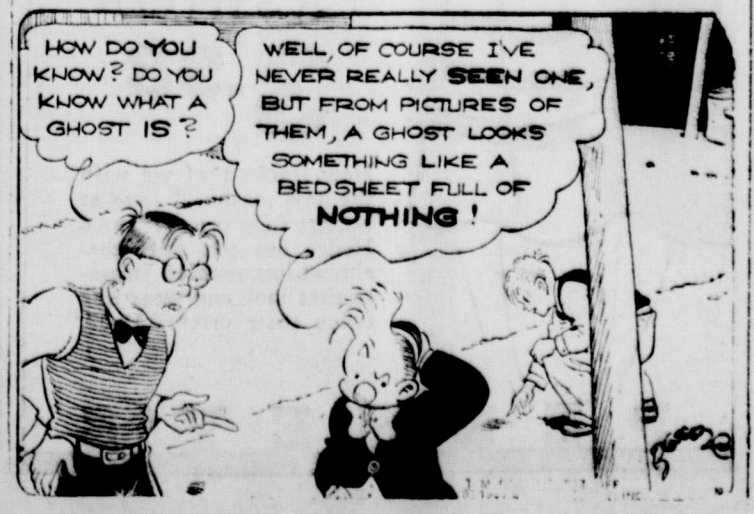
