EFFORT MADE TO RECONCILE LABOR STRIFE

WASHINGTON, March 11 U.P. An eleventh hour effort to bring bout a reconciliation between the Committee for Industrial Organization and the American Federation of Labor was sponsored today by Frank Powers, president of the Commercial Telegraphers Union.

By United Press Officials of the Reo Motor Car Company closed their plant at Lansing, Mich., today and refused to confer with United Automobile Workers, and in Chicago a series of new strikes started today, as settlement of several other labor disoutes were effected.

In the far west, outbreaks violence marked labor difficulties the California Packing Corporation Plant and 13 persons were injured and ten arrested after a riot. A crowd of 300 pickets fought police, trying to protect 20 carloads of strike-breakers.

Just before Governor Frank Murphy of Michigan reached Lansing, after interrupting a Florida vacation to help settle strikes at the Chrysler and Hudson Motor Car plants, Reo officials announced would not confer with the U.
