





# "ELECTRIC EYE" STANDS GUARD AT FREE PORT

NEW YORK, March 12(U.R)—Shin-ing day and night, casting its piercing ray through fog and across 2,700 feet of water an ever-alert sentinel guards the entrance to the new Free Port at Stapleton, Staten Island, N. Y.

This sentinel, warning of any object no matter how large or small that breaks its intangible barrier, is the "electric eye" that protects the first and only free port of modern times in the United States. At present the port is closed to per-mit installation of a sprinkler sys-

tem. The work is expected to be completed by April 1.

A free port is a restricted for-eign trade zone where foreign goods may be repacked, graded, stored, mixed with other foreign or domestic goods, assembled and transshipped without going through customs. Regular import duties are paid if and when the goods ultimately are imported into the coun-

### Four Ports Proposed

About 40 free ports have been set up in various parts of the world. The Staten Island zone, the only such port in this country, possibly is the predecessor of four free ports in the United States. 
