## Pacific Coast Strike Apparently Ended

### LABOR HEADS PREPARE FOR LOCAL BATTLE

Progress toward industrial peace was made on the west coast, with settlement of the Douglas Aircraft strike today as the American Federation of Labor made plans for its struggle with John L. Lewis' Committee for Industrial Organization.

Returning to Washington, President William Green of the AFL disclosed that he was considering calling an emergency convention of the federation to expel unions affiliated with the C.I.O. campaign to create subsidiary unions.

A major strike ended when Douglas Aircraft at Santa Monica, Calif., agreed to recognize the aircraft division of the United Automobile Workers union as bargaining agent for its members.

A new conflict arose between the U. A. W. A. and General Motors at Detroit. Both sides charge violation of terms of the February 11 strike settlement.

This tended to threaten the settlement of strikes affecting three other motor car companies and 78,000 employees in Michigan. Sidown strikers had 9 plants of the Chrysler Corporation which has taken court action to oust them. No progress was made in settling strikes in Hudson and Reo Motor Car company plants at Lansing.

### SENATOR WARNS COURT ACTION MUST BE TAKEN

WASHINGTON, March 12 (UP)—Senator George Norris of Nebraska, warned the senate today that some supreme court corrective action either by the president or by constitutional amendments must be taken or the court will lose entirely its right to declare acts of congress unconstitutional.

Norris' warning was uttered after former Chief Justice John Devany of the Minnesota Supreme Court had supported the Roosevelt plan before the Senate Judiciary Committee. He opposed constitutional amendments proposing to require a two-thirds supreme court vote on constitutional questions.

### OIL MEN PROTEST TAX HIKE; STEPS TAKEN TO CURB THEFTS

Directors of the West Central Texas Oil and Gas Association in a called session Wednesday night, at the Comelie hotel at Eastland voted to oppose proposed increased taxes on the oil industry.

A bill which would increase the gross production tax from 2 3/4 cents a barrel to 10 cents was viewed as inimical to the industry, directors pointed out in discussion, before a decision was reached to send representatives to oppose the proposed measure on which a hearing will be held by a Senate committee Thursday.

Directors of the association, representing 16 counties, viewed the proposed gross production increase as discriminatory to independents. With the suggested hike on the tax, it was said, independent operators would be paying from 14 to 15 per cent of their total gross income because of the myriad of other taxes. At the present, officials pointed out, the independent operator now is paying at least 7 per cent of his gross income out in taxes.

### TEXAS SCHOOL CHILDREN TO SEE EXPOSITION, WOOD SAYS

DALLAS, March 12 — Every school child in Texas will get to see the Greater Texas and Pan American Exposition next autumn if the education department can make it possible, Dr. L. A. Woods, state superintendent of public instruction has assured Exposition officials.

Ned Blaine, director of special events division, returned from Austin and reported that the state superintendent gave full approval to a plan of school children attendance. Dr. Woods will come to Dallas on March 27 to work out details with Exposition officials.

Blaine said Dr. Woods considered an Exposition visit for a school child highly instructive "and not to be missed if there is any way to make it possible to see this year's Pan American Exposition."

Arrangements already have been made for half-cent-a-mile fares of effective beginning September 10, for students and for their teachers and sponsors. The housing bureau is at work on an economical room plan for the school children, who will come to Dallas on designated days, to fit a schedule of holidays by zones over Texas. Half-admissions for concessions are to be granted all over the Exposition.

Flaws in Yarn Shown By Polarized Light

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. (UP) — Extensive research by Prof. Edward R. Schwarz, head of the textile laboratory at Massachusetts Institute of Technology, has shown that weaknesses and flaws in spinning yarn can be discovered by tiny rainbows caused by polarized light.

From these rainbows, of some times different shades of the same color, it is possible to determine the age and to discover imperfections in the yarn.

It is possible to tell positively the exact age of the cotton when picked in the fields. Cotton picked before it is ripe according to Schwarz, is useless for weaving because of its weakness.

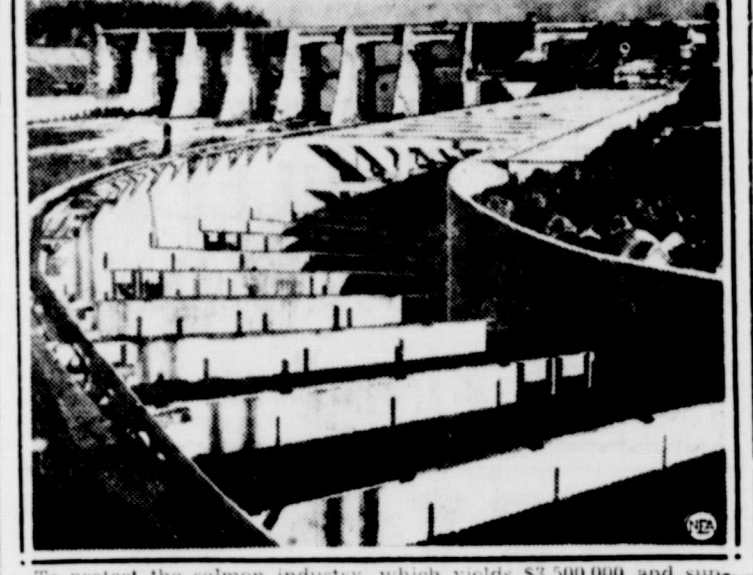

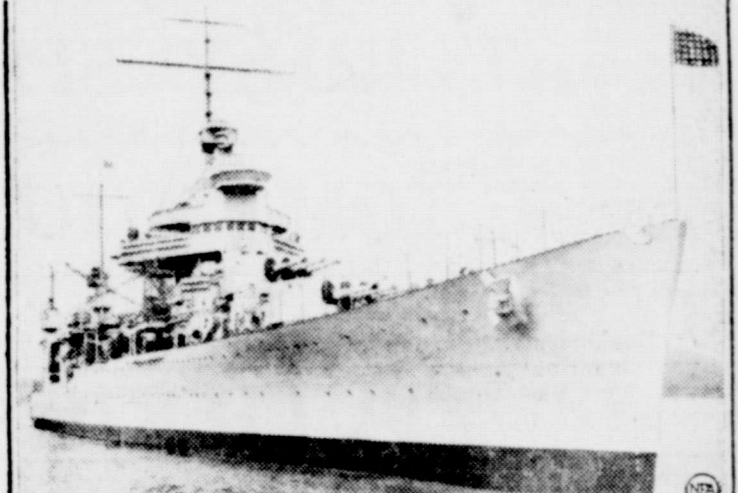

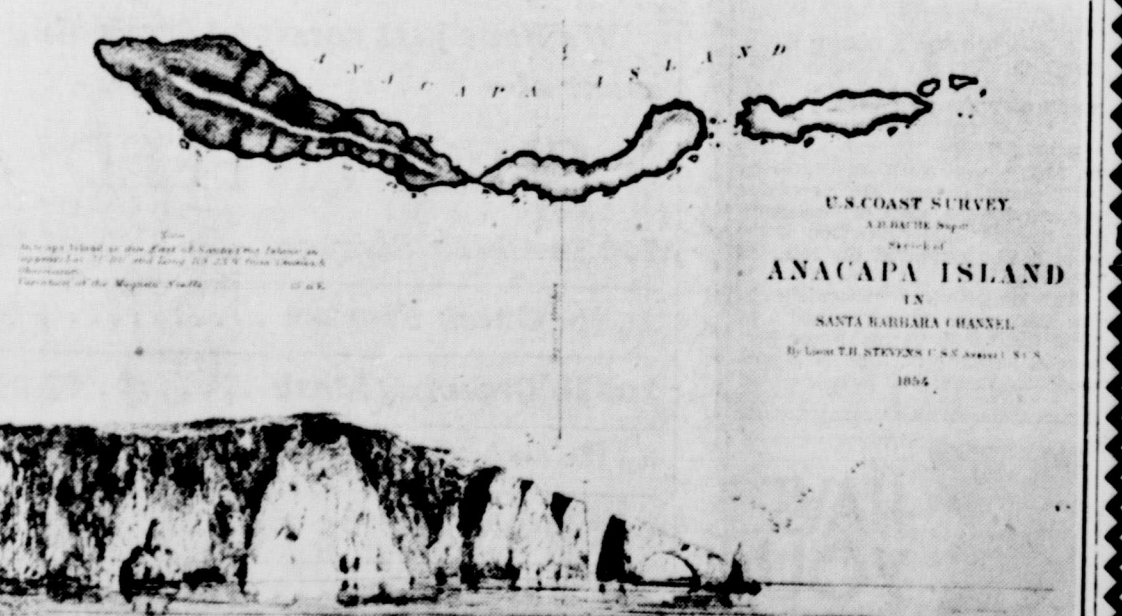
