## Dallas Kin Is Wanted For Questioning

### AGED WOMAN FOUND SLAIN IN HER HOME

DALLAS, March 13 (UP)—The middle-aged daughter-in-law of Mrs. Mary Knox, 93, wealthy real-estate, beaten to death and robbed in her home here, was sought for questioning today.  
Investigators said the younger woman, Mrs. Millian Knox, brunette and attractive, was under five indictments charging her with forging her mother-in-law's name to checks totaling \$1,150.  
She has been sought since the Dallas county grand jury returned the indictment last January 2.  
Although the wealthy Nonagenarian lived to herself and rarely saw any of her relatives except a granddaughter, Mary, investigators learned she had assisted the daughter-in-law financially from time to time.  
Mrs. Millian Knox operated a boarding house built by the late L. M. Knox, her husband, who was slain mysteriously in 1921 at Hemp-hill, Texas.  
Mrs. Knox had been dead more than six hours, when her body was found yesterday by a close friend.  
Investigators believed the killer struck swiftly, for there were no signs of struggle. The aged woman lay on the floor, three wounds showing where she was slugged on the head. An apron was knotted around her throat.  
Detective Inspector Will Fritz said he was "depending on fingerprints to break the case" and was convinced, from the size of prints obtained, that the slayer had exceptionally large hands and undoubtedly was a man.

### TWO MEN HELD IN MURDER OF BELL FAMILY

RANKIN, March 13 (UP)—Sheriff Bill Fowler and District Attorney Allen Freizer, prepared to file murder charges against two men in connection with the killing Friday of Mrs. Mary Bell 71 and her son, Wiley, 46, at their ranch home.  
Another son, Cody Bell of Crystal, was in a hospital at Texon, and a third son, Russell Bell of Fort Worth, was in a hospital here. Both were wounded.  
Sheriff Bill Fowler said Mrs. Bell and Wiley Bell apparently were shot to death as they lay in bed. He said James Horton, 18-year-old cowboy, told him he wrested a shotgun from Russell Bell after the shooting occurred.  
Russell Bell told officers he was in the kitchen of his mother's home preparing a meal, shortly after his arrival from Fort Worth, when the shooting began. He refused to discuss the matter further.  
Russell Bell, 4-year sentence for swindling at Bay Spring, was denied a rehearing Thursday by the court of criminal appeals at Austin. Cody Bell is at liberty under bond on a \$5000 charge in Upton county.  
Funeral services for Mrs. Bell and Wiley were held today at Midland.

DALLAS, March 13 (UP)—Warning of cold wave issued today by the government weather bureau, as the temperature dropped below freezing.

### GARDEN VILLAS PLANT STRIKE IS SETTLED WITH RAISE IN PAY

HOUSTON, March 13 (UP)—The strike which closed the Garden Villas plant of the Emco Derrick and Equipment company last Monday was settled today.  
Dr. Edwin A. Elliott, regional director of the National Relations Labor Board, announced the settlement.  
The strike was called by a local union of the International Association of Machinists, and American Federation of Labor affiliate, and the workmen held the plants until Wednesday night when they abandoned pending negotiations with Emco officials.  
Dr. Elliott said the union was granted a wage increase for journeymen machinists, overtime rights, a seniority agreement and recognition of his apprentices.  
The strikers had demanded a wage increase of 5 cents per hour.  
The strike began a sit-down after a 10-day deadline set by the workers for an answer to their demand expired. Approximately 125 men locked in plants for more than 55 hours and 75 others were affected.

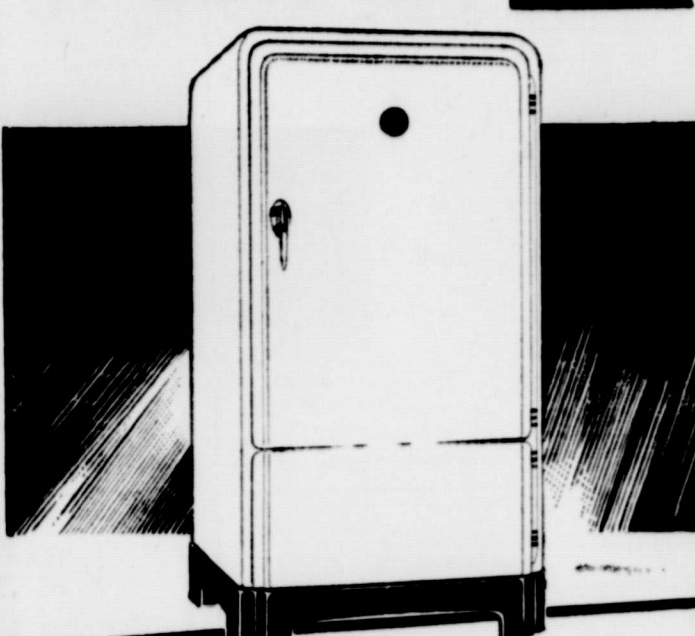

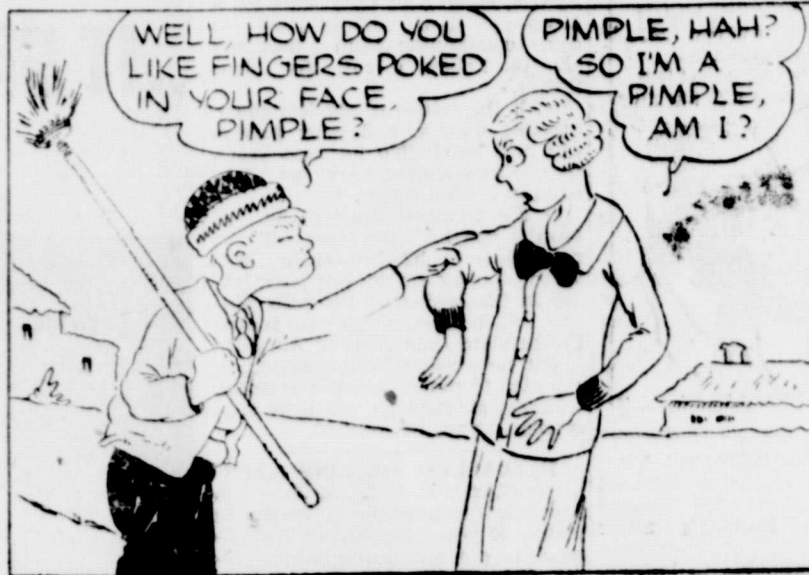
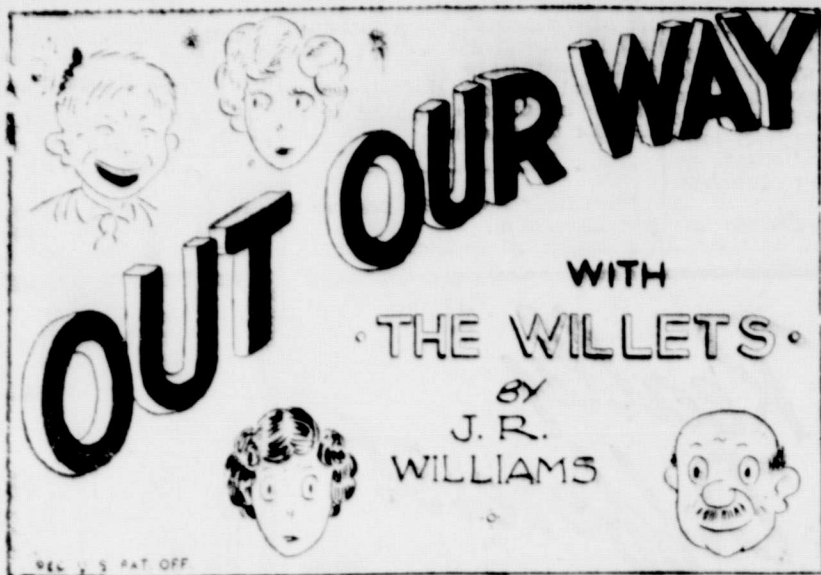

**PASSENGERS ESCAPE FROM BURNING SHIP**

SAN FRANCISCO, March 13 (AP) —Fire aboard the British motorship Silverlarch, kept in check for several hours, got out of control, forcing the Silverlarch to halt to transfer its eight passengers to lifeboat in the open sea, the vessel Master reported at 11:30 a. m. PST in a message intercepted by Globe wireless.

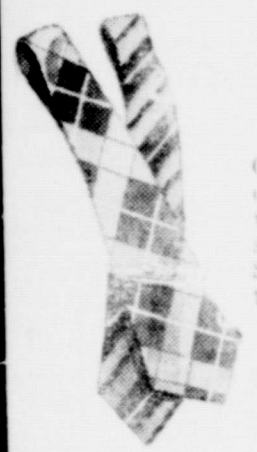

### Oil Development in Eastland County

**EASTLAND, March 13** — A 2,500-foot operation one mile southeast of Eastland is slated to begin immediately by Barnett Petroleum Corporation, Dallas.

Location for the test, No. 1A L. C. Downham, section 2, E. T. R. R. survey block 6, is 1,000 feet from the east line and 1,250 feet from the south line.

A bridge left after shooting was being cleaned out in Cox et al No. 1 O'Rear, four and a half miles east of Rising Star, J. W. Clifton survey. It had been shot with 20 quarts from 2,792 to 2,812 feet.

Although spudded last week, Hofmann & Page No. 1 J. S. Deert, subdivision 11 of the Brownson subdivision, William Van Norman survey, was resumed after a shut-down. This well is five miles south of Ranger and Eastland.

States Oil No. 1 H. S. Schmick one and a half miles northeast of Eastland, was drilling below 600 ft.

Shedown were Gallagher-Lawson, No. 1 Hearn, three and a half miles northeast of Carbon, and W. R. Seed et al No. 1 P. G. Wright six miles southeast of Eastland, at 1,440 feet.
