25 KNOWN DEAD IN EAST TEXAS BLAST

MILITARY BOARD TO MAKE INQUIRY AS TO CAUSE OF NEW LONDON SCHOOL BLAST

NEW LONDON, March 19. (UP)—A Military Board of Inquiry was established today to determine the cause of an explosion that wrecked the world's largest rural school, and killed approximately 411 school children, and 14 of their teachers, a total of 425.

The board said it would inquire into reports that the explosion was caused by a deliberately set dynamite charge, and not accidental explosion of accumulated natural gas, the generally accepted theory.

Approximately 1,000 workers of the surrounding East Texas oil field neared the bottom of the ruins at mid-morning, and it became apparent that few more if any bodies, would be found.

Only five bodies had been found since dawn, and all so badly mangled that they could not be identified. It was believed that the final toll would not vary greatly from 425.

The toll of injured stood at 125, of which 8 were seriously hurt. Little hope was held for them.

Colonel Clarence E. Parker, absolute ruler of the disaster scene, under the authority of Governor James V. Allred's proclamation of martial law, ordered a Military Board of Inquiry to meet at noon.

It was generally agreed by all authorities including C. E. Shaw, superintendent of the school whose own 17-year-old son was one of the victims, and national guard officers, that an accumulation of natural gas in the building's sub-basement caused the explosion.

At the same time that the Military Board meets, members of the New London school board, officials of the oil companies operating in the East Texas field, and military authorities will inspect the ruins.

PRESIDENT ORDERS RELIEF AGENCIES STAND BY

WARM SPRINGS, Ga., March 19. (UP)—President Roosevelt marshalled government relief agencies today "to render every assistance in their power" to the community of New London, Texas.

"I have asked the Red Cross and all government agencies to stand by. Mr. Roosevelt said from his vacation headquarters, "and render every assistance in their power to the community to which this shocking tragedy has come."

THREE TRUANTS ESCAPED DEATH AT SCHOOL

OVERTON, Texas, March 19. (UP)—Three boys played truant from death yesterday when the ceilings of the New London school crashed down on their empty seats.

GAS INSPECTOR SAYS GAS CAUSED EXPLOSION

OVERTON, Texas, March 19. (UP)—"Nothing but gas could have caused the New London school explosion," Mortimer Jones, Fort Worth gas inspector said here today.

"In the first place," said Jones, "there is no explosive but gas that could have wrecked the entire building with one blast. In the second place, only gas has the spreading and the area to be capable of lifting the roof from the building. Other explosives act much differently. The gas must have been in the basement, seeping upward through the hollow tile wall, Jones pointed out.

"There are scenes that would tear your heart out."

R. G. Waters, State Insurance Commissioner, was preparing another investigation to determine if safety laws had been obeyed at the school.

Funeral services for the victims began at nine-thirty a. m. Individual funerals will be conducted in a continuous procession as fast as facilities will allow.

U. A. W. HEAD ARREST ORDER WAS ISSUED

The writ instructed the sheriff of Wayne County to make the arrests.

Sitdown strikers have ignored a previous writ of injunction commanding them to leave the Chrysler plant Wednesday. Today they still held the plant.

DYNAMITE FOUND IN SCHOOL BUILDING

Reports that there had been a dynamite explosion arose from the finding of 15 sticks of unexploded dynamite in a school building not touched by the blast. The dynamite was intended to remove rocks in preparing the school's athletic field.

A large ground work of identifying the bodies of children progressed, an ironic note was added to the tragedy by the community radio station, which broadcast a request for 60 grave diggers.

Albert Evans, Regional Director of the Red Cross, arrived and set up relief headquarters at Henderson, five miles from the disaster scene.

A large supply of anti-tetanus serum arrived from Dallas and will be administered to the injured.

Charles Richards, a grizzled, red-headed wrecker was added to the time of the explosion.

"It was awful. It seemed that the ground bounced. I saw a cloud of dust rising above the school. I helped pull some of the kids away from the building. Some were dead and some were worse than dead, mangled but still breathing. Some were screaming, begging to be picked up. There were bodies half buried under bricks, and others we couldn't see at all, but could hear the pitiful cries. The sight will stick with me as long as I live."

The school was known here as the biggest rural school in the world. "There were seven producing oil wells on its campus."

Hospitals placed their nurses, physicians and complete available equipment at the services of the mangled who might need hospitalization and attention. Local trucks and men toiled all night long to tear away the crumpled mass to uncover whatever might be found beneath.

Organizations and private firms offered their services and whatever they had in equipment, food, blankets, medicine supplies for use if needed. All local oil corporations placed their forces at the disposal of those in charge.

Perhaps you think this is an unhappy picture of youngsters with braces and crutches. Well, don't try to convince them. If they go only five miles into the country and return within an hour, it will be a gay occasion.

For these are boys and girls who have spent many hours in bed, too many hours away from the sunlight and the scenes which the ordinary child accepts casually. Crippled by accident and disease they face a long, hard road, beset by hazards and hardships which do not confront others more fortunate.

This is just one illustration of the benefits which some of these children are receiving through the generosity of persons who realize their predicament. Presumably doomed to move in a small circle because of their misfortune, they are shown here starting on a short trip which will open a new world to them.

There are other more pressing needs, of course. They must receive treatment which will give them the maximum use of their crippled bodies. They must acquire somehow an outlook on life not distorted by their afflictions. In short, the way must be opened to give them the "Joyous Life," which is the slogan of this year's Easter Seal campaign.

To bring all crippled children in our State into contact with the fine facilities available is the laudable purpose of the International Society for Crippled Children and its affiliated State and local groups. Easter Seals provide the medium through which funds are raised for this work.
