## Money is Sequestered, But Mystery Lives

INDIANAPOLIS (U.P.) — Nearly 17 years ago a man walked rapidly up to a city policeman in the Union railway station here, handed him a package with the request: "Hold this."

Curious, the patrolman took him to headquarters where the package was opened and found to contain \$4,617 in small bills.

The stranger identified himself as John Janosh, real owner of the currency. Police placed him in a room and placed the money in trust in a local bank.

From time to time Janosh made small withdrawals for living expenses. Finally, in March, 1921, he with drew \$250 and disappeared.

Unable to find its ward, friends or relatives, the bank had him declared legally dead by a probate court, turning over to the state treasury the estate with accrued interest.

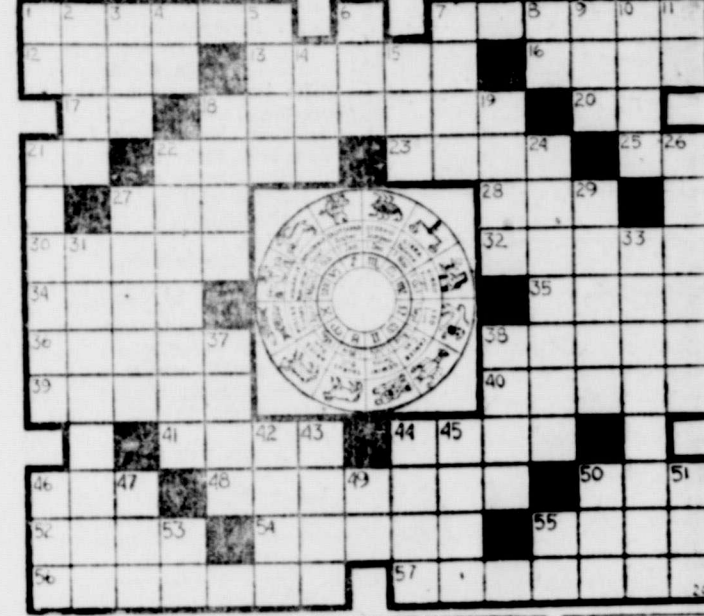

## Grizzled Indian Deplores Education As Ruinous To Morals of Red Men

TUCSON, Ariz., March 29 (U.P.) — A rugged grizzled old Papago Indian, who says he did the work of four boys, rested on a stool in the University of Arizona chemistry laboratory and expounded a philosophy based on hard work and strict honesty.

Sham-a-rea Jose Alvarez, oldest employe at the university, said: "I tell no lies or stories. I do my best at my job, and I never say anything to hurt someone's feelings. This is my life and I am one of the old Indians with Indian ideas."

Sometimes Jose hears rumors among the students that he is about to be retired. "If my bosses tell me to get out, I go. But I stay here as long as they want me. And they say they can't get along without me, because when I go away for a few days they hire four boys to do my work. Those boys bump into each other like they play football."

The aged Indian, who says it "is hard to tell" when he was born, has been employed cleaning laboratory equipment at the university since 1902.

He originally was assigned to the work when officials decided the Japanese "assistants" broke too many dishes. First he worked for a year taking care of stock in the university barn. About his birth, Jose says, "Indians didn't put it down like the white men do." Jose's long observation of the white man has given him a critical opinion of his brothers. "I am still an Indian at heart," he began. "These young Indians think they are smart when they get educated. They steal, lie and

## NATION OF OLD PEOPLE FORESEEN 50 YEARS HENCE, WITH CHILDREN REDUCED BY PERHAPS TWO-THIRDS

WASHINGTON, Mar. 29 (U.P.) — Unless the birth rate or immigration increases, the United States may hear its maximum population in about 19 years, according to Dr. C. E. Baker of the Bureau of Agricultural Economics.

"The birth rate has declined more than 25 per cent during the last 10 years," Dr. Baker said. "If the birth rate continues to decline at this rate a maximum population will be reached between 1945 and 1950."

Thereafter, Dr. Baker said, the population will decline slowly at first and then at an accelerating

rate. By 2050 the population of the United States may be under 100,000,000.

"A declining national population with rural surplus and urban deficit in birth, will have serious economic and social consequences," Dr. Baker said.

"Fifty years from now," he said, "there may be only a third as many children in the nation as now, and only half as many women of child-bearing age."

There will be nearly three times as many old people. Many unemployed urban people will seek shelter and sustenance with relatives and friends on farm. Many of these

### BEHIND THE SCENES IN WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON.—It might be easier to guess the outcome of the Senate fight over the President's Supreme Court bill if the issue did not so often rest with politicians.

Two major categories of uncertainty complicate any attempt at prophecy.

First, outsiders are unable to tell how many senators in the pro, con and "undecided" groups are taking their positions for the purpose of trading with the administration, and how many are swayed by their intellectual convictions.

Second, the extent to which the administration is willing or able to use patronage and political pressure, and the extent to which the latter will be effective are equally unpredictable factors.

**INSIDERS** are beginning to get some light on the first factor, but the full story of the backstage movements never will be told.

Here is one pretty well authenticated story.

Senator A, senior senator from a certain state, is listed against the plan. He has persuaded Senator B, junior senator from the same state, who originally declared in favor of the plan, to reverse his position and come out against it. Political enemies say A was able to bring various pressures on B. At any rate, it appears that A is willing and able to deliver two votes to the President if he can have a certain \$15,000 a year federal circuit court judgeship. Senator A sent at all once about his reelection two years hence and the judgeship, now held by an ex-judge just who would like to resign on full pay, looks good to him.

At this point Senator A's political enemies come in. Themselves hungry for federal patronage in the old home state, they tell the President they can build enough fires under the senator not only to frighten him into voting for the plan, but to bring Senator B's vote back into camp along with it. The President must decide whether to offer Senator A the judgeship, or to depend on back home pressure. He also has the possible threat to lead administration aid to have A defeated in 1933.

Most insiders are betting that the President will not appoint Senator A, whom he doesn't like, to a judgeship, and that both Senator A and Senator B will vote for the plan in the final pinch.

The dangers of prophecy operate in both directions. Pressure also is being brought upon the group which has declared for the Supreme Court change proposal. Members of that group, as well as some senators who have refused to commit themselves, are beginning to make it clearly understood they expect genuine reward in return for their support. And some of those who aren't promised what they want are likely to be with the opposition, or conveniently absent when the final vote comes.

At least two senators are staying out of town because of "illness," which is commonly attributed here to a sad sensitivity to political pressure in the current backstage battle.

One prominent senator, who has declared vehemently against the plan, has privately conceded a willingness to permit the President to appoint three new Supreme Court justices—but not six. He feels certain that if there were six appointments, one of the men in whose name public life would be sure to get one of them.

### GREAT ELEVEN CALLED MAJOR COLLEGE EVIL

**PITTSBURGH, March 20 (U.P.)**—A great football team is a detriment to a college, Dr. Ralph C. Hutchinson, president of Washington & Jefferson College believes.

Declaring that "football must be taken from the gamblers and the rah-rah boys," Dr. Hutchinson said:

"Football is of such significance that it deserves to be taken back into the colleges and universities as part and parcel of the educational project. It deserves the leadership of the best in the university has to offer.

"The evils of football will not be corrected as long as athletic associations and directors and coaches are left to do the job. They cannot do it.

**Stronger Leadership Urged**

"Subsidization is a small problem which will be cleaned up over night when and if the college presidents and trustees and faculties sense the importance of football and give it their unstinting leadership.

"Until that happens," Dr. Hutchinson asserted, "and as long as presidents and chancellors and others say, 'I know nothing about it—just so long as we bat our heads against a stone wall.'"

Dr. Hutchinson is a leader among those seeking non-subsidization of college football players. His college, once a "football power," has instituted a "simon-pure" athletic policy.

**Decries Evil of Deceit**

"Possibly the greatest evil of football is deceit," Dr. Hutchinson said. "All the other problems of subsidizing gambling, drinking are small in comparison with this one of academic dishonesty in high places.

"The subtle development of this dishonesty is amazing. Its ramifications have spread through players, coaches, directors, presidents and trustees.

"Of those universities and colleges now subsidizing players, only negligible proportion, if any, will admit it openly, frankly, honestly," he said.

"Give us some straight thinking and a little unequivocal honesty and the minor problems will be solved in no time."

### Condemned Plan to Discontinue Program

**SAN ANTONIO, March 20 (U.P.)**—M. S. Yoemans, Georgia entomologist, in an address before the convention of Texas Entomologist Society and the Cotton States Branch of the American Association of Economic Entomologists here recently, condemned the plan of the United States Secretary of Agriculture to discontinue the screw worm program.

Yoemans argued that, according to the Federal Bureau of Entomology, in 1925 Texas had 3,245,296 reports of screw worms. A year later, under the program, this figure had been reduced to 183,616.

Yoemans plans to continue his fight against discontinuing control program, he said.

on his farm, secured by a mortgage on five horses and mules, 10 and all his farming tools.

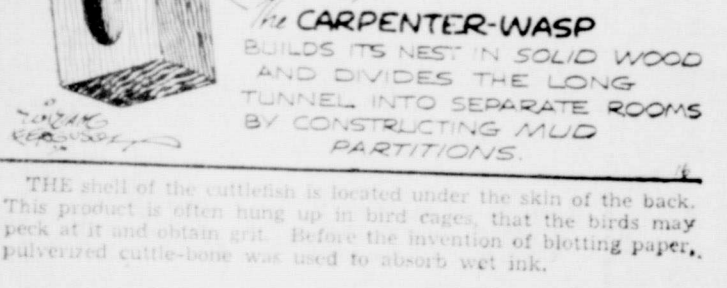
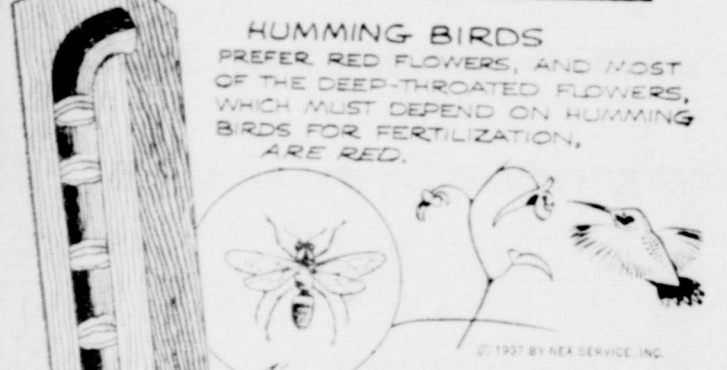

### Highway Department Seeks Cooperation

Obb Gilchrist, state highway engineer, laments the lack of cooperation being given by motorists to plans by the department for highway betterment. His letter which is self explanatory follows:

With approximately 8450 vehicles affixed to the registration tax, car owners of Eastland County have returned to the Highway Planning Survey only 63 of the post cards that were handed to them at the time they paid their 1937 automobile license fees at the office of Mr. C. H. Gibson, County Tax Assessor and Collector. Car owners of Eastland County have failed to respond to pleas of the Highway Planning Survey to provide information on which highway programs of the future will be based, a tabulation of returns received to Wednesday disclosed. The number of car owners sending in information on cards received when they registered their vehicles is insufficient to provide an adequate picture of the road needs of this County. The information which is being collected will be used by the Highway Department and the U. S. Bureau of Public Roads in planning the future construction and maintenance of roads and highways in this County and in this section of the State. Local motorists should be sufficiently interested in improving the road system of this County to ask for these cards at the time they pay their license fees and should fill in the cards and mail them, because information collected by the Highway Planning Survey will be used in designating federal funds which soon will be spent on improving the secondary road system of Texas.

The cards on which this information is being collected are self-addressed and require no postage. The Highway Department and the U. S. Bureau of Public Roads have gone to considerable trouble in order to offer highway users the opportunity of helping to plan their own roads. Just as citizens were long ago given the right to vote, car owners are now being given a similar right and should take advantage of their opportunity. It is to the advantage of each County to return at least as high a percentage of these post cards to the Highway Department as are returned by its neighboring Counties.
