## Poison Effective Against Rabbits

Replies received by the county agent from 12 farmers who have recently used poisoned grain in rabbit control indicates that this method of controlling jack rabbits is effective if properly used, and a very inexpensive method.

The county agent recently supplied 33 farmers in the county with a total of 100 pounds of poisoned grain to determine whether rabbits will take this type of bait. At the end of the week those farmers who answered a questionaire sent by the county agent stated that they had found an average of 12 rabbits which had been killed and had no way of estimating the number of rabbits which were killed but not

found. Poisoned grain for rabbit control can be obtained from the county agent's office, Eastland, with instructions for its use.
