Congressman Hance Endorses Sarpalius

"I seldom get involved with other races," said Congressman Kent Hance, speaking in Muleshoe Friday morning. "But, I know what it takes and know Bill Sarpalius to be well respected by persons, even while he was still in high school at Boys Ranch.

"I personally believe he would be effective in Austin. Every bill passed in the State Senate affects the property owner, and what Bill Sarpalius does will have a big impact in his district."

Hance was in Muleshoe for a coffee to honor Bill Sarpalius, Democratic candidate for State Senate. The employees of First National Bank made many telephone calls, and more than 50 persons were on hand to greet Congressman Hance and Candidate Sarpalius during the hour they spent in Muleshoe.

Water Depletion Tax Refundable?

(Editor's note: Arnold Price, from Capbell Irrigation, found the following story in the October 6 issue of High Plains Journal from Dodge City, Kansas. He thought it may be of local interest.)

"Irrigators in the High Plains area are celebrating a federal court settlement that allows them to claim millions of dollars in income tax reductions based on depleting water supplies.

"The suit was filed in early 1978 by Dean, Gerry and Terry Gigot, three Garden City, Kansas brothers in the irrigating business. The Gigots asked that more than \$30,000 in income taxes be returned because the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) erroneously denied their deductions for water depletion.

"The suit, filed in U.S. District Court in Wichita, was settled September 30

by Justice Department attorneys and lawyers representing the Gigots. The settlement requires the Justice Department to seek a formal ruling from the IRS allowing irrigators to claim the tax break.

The agreement covers water taken from the Ogallala Aquifer, an underground water deposit that runs from southern South Dakota to Texas. The settlement affects irrigators and the landowners in Kansas, Nebraska, Oklahoma, Texas, New Mexico, Colorado, Wyoming and South Dakota.

"Wichita attorneys Pat Regan and Mike Doering represented the Gigots, and called the settlement one of the most significant tax decisions to affect mid-west farmers.

"We could easily be talking about more than \$1 billion in potential depletion deductions over the life of the aquifer, just in Kansas," Regan said.

"Regan said the settlement may lead to more than \$50 million in annual income tax reductions for Kansas irrigators, and added that 1981 deduction claims may be staggering because deductions can be made for the past three years.

City Police Are Seeking Small Cat

The child was bitten at 810 West Avenue K, and Muleshoe City Police Chief Johnny Richards has asked that anyone spotting what they believe may be the brown, yellow and white (calico) cat or kitten, notify the Muleshoe City Police Department at 272-4569.

If the cat can be found, and kept for observation, the youngster may not have to undergo the entire series of rabies shots.

Chief Richards said the police department would appreciate reporting of any cat (or dog) that seems to be acting in a strange manner.

Following a scoreless first half, the Lazbuddie Longhorns got on the boards in the third to tally the only points of the game as they eased by the Nazareth Swifts 7-0 in a District 2A game played at Nazareth Friday night.

A five yard ramble by "horn Quarterback Terry Steinbock put the Longhorns on the scoreboard. Steinbock also kicked the extra point.

Johnny Gonzales was leading rusher for the Longhorns with 42 yards on 10 carries in the game and Virgil Huseman was leading rusher in the game when the Swift tallied 59 yards.

Lazbuddie had eight first downs and Nazareth had nine; the 'Horns had 89 yards rushing and no yards in the air while the Swifts had 71 yards rushing, 19 passing and three interceptions.

first two games of the season, the Mules dejectedly saw victory slip from their grasp for the next three straight games, then broke the losing streak in the homecoming game before a packed house at Benny Douglass Stadium.

In the Mules first two possessions in the game, they bogged down around the Lockney Longhorns 30 yard line each time, the same line that has been plaguing the Mules for the last few games. However, the 'Horns were also failing to advance the ball, and most of the time consumed on the clock during the first quarter went to the Mules.

With just 56 seconds left to play in the first, Quarterback Monty Hysinger set his team down on their own 45 yard line to begin another drive. Six plays and 55 yards later, Hysinger connected with Benny Pena in the end zone for a Mule TD. The 19 yard Hysinger-Pena pass put the Mules on the scoreboard and although the PAT attempt by Hysinger failed, the Mules were still leading going into halftime by a 6-0 score.

At halftime, the Mules were leading Lockney with 73 rushing yards to seven for Lockney. Muleshoe had 19 aerial yards to 20 for the Longhorns, and the Mules were leading the first downs six to three.

Fidel Blanco missed a 35 yard field goal for Lockney in the second with 4:17 on the clock and ended Lockney's only serious scoring threat during the first half.

Lockney's sole score came with 3:34 left to play in the third quarter, when Longhorn Quarterback Jeffrey McCormick sneaked over from the two to make it 6-6. Fidel Blanco booted in the extra point and the Longhorns were leading the Cont. Page 8, Col. 1

No one likes to pay those large utility bills, however, you can do something about them if you evaluate your home and find areas where energy is being wasted.

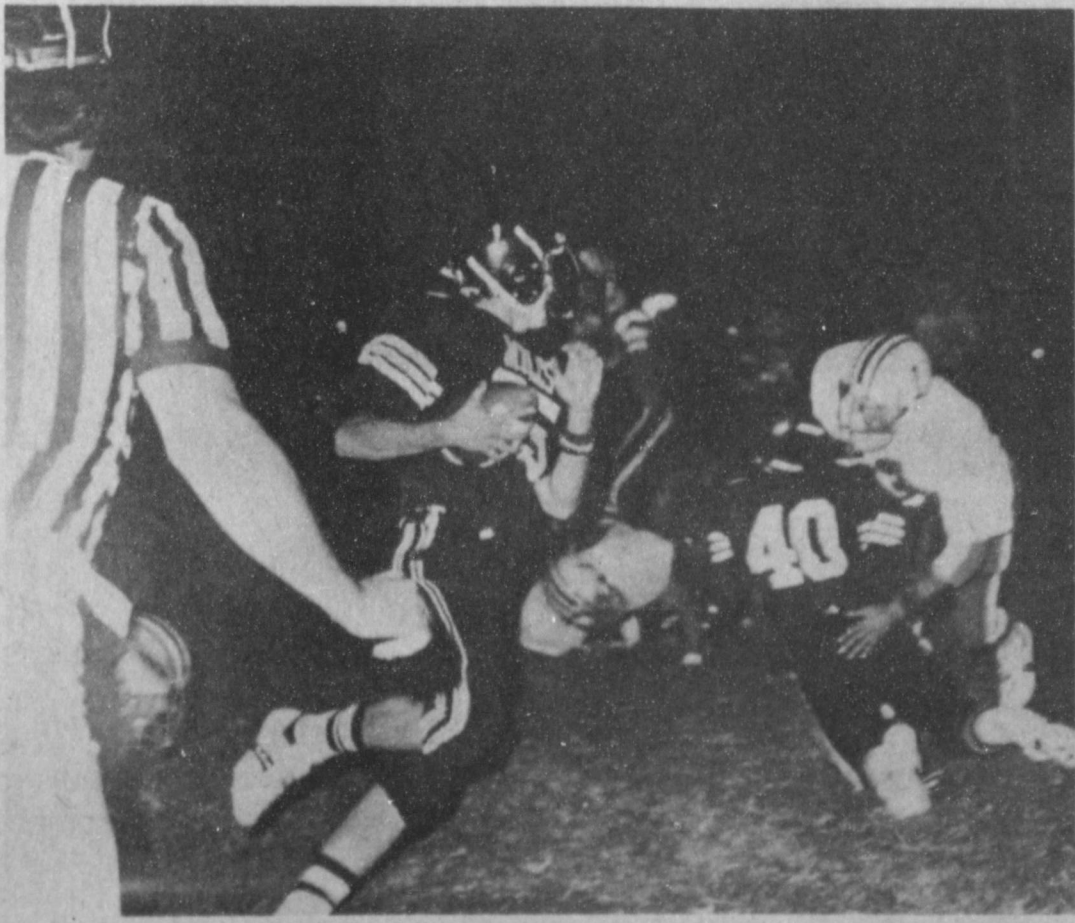

Former Resident Robbery Victim; Killed By Firearm

Yesterday, as usual, Clarence Temple went jogging for his health. The 62 year old Bellflower man was up before 5 a.m. to take his dailey two mile jog around the neighborhood, a routine recommended by his doctor after he suffered a heart attack and had to undergo surgery four years ago.

He would never go very far. Just a leisurely jog-walk around a few blocks and then home to shower and prepare for work. His neighbors said it was a routine he enjoyed.

But yesterday, shortly after 5 a.m., a neighbor of Temple's found his body lying on a sidewalk in front of a trailer park just about a mile from his home. He had been shot once in the head.

Temple moved to California in 1942 with his wife Catherine. A native of Oklahoma, he moved to Stegall in southwestern Bailey County in the late 30's.

His wife is a sister of

Mrs. Delbert Watson and J.L. Phipps, who reside in Muleshoe.

Funeral services for Clarence Temple were conducted Monday, October 6 at Memorial Chapel in Bellflower at 11:30 a.m. with Rev. V.L. Hopper officiating.

Burial was in Rose Hills Memorial Park.

Los Angeles County sheriff's office homicide detectives were still checking the scanty clues into the October 2 death of

Clarence Temple. It was suspected that robbery was

a motive as Temple had no wallet or identification on his body when found.

lowances other declining sources--such as oil-- enjoy in the tax system. Scientists have said that the water supply is being drained off by extensive irrigation.

"Neither Justice Department officials nor plaintiffs in the suit are revealing the specific formula to be used for the tax deduction in the Gigot case.

Justice Department officials also declined to say how much the tax break would cost the government.

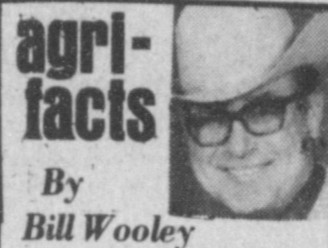
"For Terry Gigot and his brothers, the settlement ends a long battle that he said has resulted in benefits for landowners across the midwest.

"Anybody can file for water depletion now," Gigot said, regarding the settlement. "For the landowner and the irrigator, it has opened up water depletion."

"Although he hopes the water neaver leaves the Ogallala Aquifer, Gigot said a drop in the water level entitled irrigators to the kind of tax break oil men and others have enjoyed for years.

"Our feeling was if the water never leaves, there will be no tax deduction. But if the watertable does continue to decline, we're allowed water depletion for each foot it goes down," Gigot said.

"The land isn't worth a whole lot without water," he said.

Whether producing it or consuming it, there is still no topic getting more attention from farmers than energy. And indeed, there is good reason. Today's farming is an energy-consuming business. It takes a lot of fuel and fertilizer to continue to produce food and fiber at the rate demanded by the world's population. Research by agricultural engineers is in high gear in developing new methods of converting plant matter to usable energy. In a test in North Dakota, researchers have successfully operated a turbo-charged diesel tractor on blends of sunflower oil and diesel fuel. Mixtures went as high as 75% oil and 25% diesel before any significant loss in horsepower was detected. Those conducting the tests say any vegetable oil should work equally well.
