The vote for sending the question to the people to decide was 18 ayes

Lieut. Gov. Walter Woodul held that it can be voted on every day until the end of the session if proponents desire.

The proposal had been before the senate since mid-January. It was debated and a vote delayed six As voted upon today, it carried

two alternative propositions. Proposition one, calls for equal payment of old age assistance, not to exceed \$15 a month to all over 65.

Both authorize a sales tax not to exceed 2 per cent to finance old age pensions and to give aid to the blind, to crippled children, unemployables and to dependent mothers and children.

To defeat a sales tax under the plan, voters would have to defeat both propositions. The resolution provided that if both received a majority vote, the one that had the greater vote would prevail. If both were voted down by the people, the present limited old age assistance would continue.
