MORE DEATHS FEARED FROM TRAFFIC LIST

Automobile crashes, a drowning, a suicide and an electrocution left Texas with at least ten dead Monday and an injured list of more than a score from week end accidents.

Traffic officials feared other fatalities would be recorded Monday as motorists thronged highways on Memorial Day holiday.

Alfred Flowers, 36, was electrocuted Sunday night at Fort Worth while his father, 70, watched. The son climbed a tower carrying high voltage wire "for fun" and was tangled in the wires.

E. E. Edwards, 62, San Antonio school teacher, was riding alone when his automobile apparently went out of control and swerved into a ditch near Beville. He died there Sunday night.

An automobile injured fatally Mrs. Carrie O'Toole, 39, of Luling Sunday night.

John Thomas Davidson, 18, CCC worker of Pflugerville, died in a hospital in Austin Sunday from injuries suffered in an automobile wreck Friday.

Melvin Moore, who celebrated his 19th birthday Saturday, drowned Sunday when a log he was riding overturned in the Trinity River at Dallas.

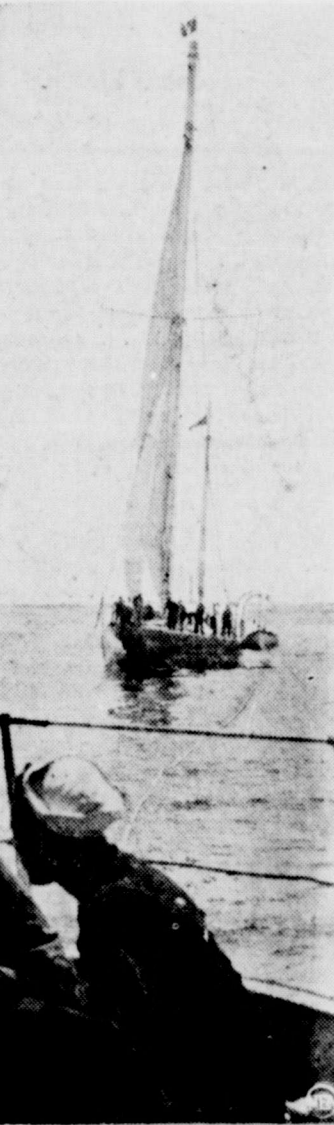
Mrs. S. D. Lambert, 55, and Miss Myrtle Ball, 29, both of Marathon, died after their automobile collided with a truck two miles north of Austin Sunday.

Justice of the Peace Tom Maes returned a suicide verdict in the death of Miss Lola Hall, 38 at Houston. The inquest said she died of poisoning after having swallowed roach powders.

James E. Walker, Jr., was killed instantly when the automobile in which he was riding overturned near Roscoe early Sunday.

OPPONENTS OF RACE REPEAL MAKING FIGHT

AUSTIN, May 31 (UP)—Opponents of horse racing waging repeal in the house of representatives with their backs against the wall, drew up another defense today.

Lead by Representative Emmett Morse of Houston, they asked that the speaker rule the bill out of order.

The Governor's special session call asked only repeal of wagering on horse races at the track, Morse said. "This bill would also outlaw bookie shops. It is therefore unconstitutional."

Speaker Bob Calvert said he was "inclined" to overrule the point, but it was still being argued when noon recess came.

The house refused several motions to adjourn for Memorial Day and appeared determined to settle the race repeal fight.

The senate was in session briefly, adjourning until tomorrow morning.

REAGAN'S BACK FROM FUNERAL OF SON-IN-LAW

Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Reagan returned from Chickasha, Okla., last night where they attended the funeral Sunday afternoon of Mr. Reagan's son-in-law, Otho Bray who was killed in an accident on the oil field lease in which he was interested.

The funeral was held at 3 o'clock and was the recipient of perhaps the biggest floral offering ever displayed at an occasion of that kind in that city.

The accident was occasioned, said Mr. Reagan, by Mr. Bray's turning on of the gas pressure in a safety valve on the lease. Evidently, the pressure had been building up and the loose end of the pipe literally beat him to death. There was no clothing left on his body except his shoes, said Mr. Reagan.

He was showing a friend about the lease and turned on the gas pressure in the pipes.

Mr. Bray was well known and very favorably connected in Oklahoma and many friends from Texas and Oklahoma points attended the services.

NEARLY INCH RAIN FALLEN IN SECTION

About 7 inches of rain has fallen in Cisco during the past few days, greatly aiding crops and gardens besides renewing stock water and grass for pastures. It came too late for grain.

A big grain crop is being harvested in the hard land section toward Moran. Some farmers in that territory making as high as 30 bushels of wheat to the acre, it is reported, and many averaging 12 to 15 bushels, which is an unusually large average. Oats were already too ripe in some parts of the trade territory on account of the dry weather. The berry crop is almost harvested but the last on the vines will be slightly larger from the rain.

Corn will be greatly aided as will Irish potatoes and other truck crops.

LONDON, May 31 (UP)—Germany and Italy withdrew today from the Spanish Non-Intervention Committee and the International control scheme threatening a grave European crisis.

Germany withdrew after her ships had bombed the Spanish port of Almeria, causing many casualties. In retaliation for the bombing of the German battleship Deutschland by loyalist planes.

Italy, co-operating with Germany, withdrew until she is given satisfaction for the loyalist bombing of the Italian merchant steamer Bartolotta at Mallorca on May 24.

Neither German nor Italian delegates attended a meeting of the conference's subcommittee scheduled this afternoon, so a called session was cancelled.

SEC HULL BREAKS HOLIDAY ON CRISIS

WASHINGTON, May 31 (UP)—Secretary of State Cordell Hull and Under Secretary Sumner Wells broke their Memorial Day holiday to return to the capitol today to consider the critical Spanish situation.

Senator William Borah of Idaho, gravely concerned, called upon Americans to display tact in the Spanish crisis.

From all reports it appears an act of war has been committed," Borah said. "We should apply our neutrality law to all participants."

GERMAN WAR SHIPS BOMBARD SPANISH PORT

VALENCIA, Spain, May 31 (UP)—Five German warships bombarded the port of Almeria today causing many casualties and shore batteries in replying were reported to have hit a German destroyer.

Casualties were estimated unofficially but reliably at 36 dead, 65 wounded and 100 missing. Women and children were among the casualties. More than 40 buildings were destroyed.

"This is an act of war, and we are prepared to defend ourselves," a high official of the Valencia government declared. "Germany finally has come out in the open."

The cabinet was reported to have decided unanimously to demand immediate withdrawal of German and Italian ships from the international control of Spanish waters.

A Spanish news agency reported "several hundred" were wounded in the bombardment. Several shells fell on the buildings occupied by the International Red Cross, which was destroyed.

A Spanish agency correspondent who witnessed the shelling, telegraphed as follows: "Almeria is in ruins. There would have been thousands killed and wounded if we hadn't had a false alarm at 1 a. m. That alarm saved most of us."

WILBUR SHAW WINS ANNUAL 500-MILE RACE

INDIANAPOLIS, May 31 (UP)—Wilbur Shaw of Indianapolis won the 25th annual 500-mile race here today, outlasting the field of 33 cars in terrific heat which overcame several of the drivers.

Shaw held the lead ever since the first 75 miles, except for a period, when he went into the pit for tires and fuel.

Bob Swanson of Los Angeles, who relieved Ralph Hepburn when the latter was overcome by heat, held a temporary lead at 400 miles.

WIDER ATTACK BEGUN AGAINST WHITE PLAGUE

MILWAUKEE, May 31. (AP)—The 2,000-year-old battle to whip the white scourge of tuberculosis will receive fresh impetus at the National Tuberculosis Association's 33rd annual convention here May 31 to June 3.
The meeting is expected to attract 1,500 physicians, research scientists, nurses, social workers and laymen to plan a stronger frontal attack against the disease on behalf of its 600,000 victims in the United States. Revitalization of the attack is planned through wider distribution and more general application of knowledge about tuberculosis gleaned through centuries of painstaking study. Eradication of the scourge of generations is believed possible if this knowledge can be applied intensively and consistently according to experts in the field.

Spanish Port Is Blasted by German Guns

BERLIN, May 31 (AP)—Germany, inflamed to a fighting mood by the bombing of the battleship Deutschland, blasted the Spanish port of Almeria with its fleet today and withdrew from the international non-intervention agreement on Spain.
A foreign office spokesman announced that the bombardment of Almeria was considered sufficient reprisal for the Deutschland incident.
"We will ask no further restitution or make any further claim," he said.
"While reliable private quarters maintained that Germany is ready to undertake further moves against the Valencia government, some in cooperation with Italy, government officials emphasized that the actual stand is that Germany is prepared to take further reprisals only if provoked by further aggressive acts."

Violence in Steel Strike Wounds Many

CHICAGO, May 31 (AP)—The Steel Workers Organizing Committee today announced it would ask murder indictments against police who participated in a clash Sunday which resulted in the death of five strikers and injuring more than 100 unionists and police.
Shocked by reports of the battle waged between 15,000 steel strikers and 150 city police, Governor Henry Horner asked for a settlement of the strike which has crippled three of the largest independent steel companies.
A recapitulation today showed five strikers dead, 41 unionists in hospitals, 22 police in hospitals, 37 unionists treated but discharged from hospitals, 6 police less seriously injured, and 36 unionists under arrest.
