## Allred Will Veto Betting Appropriations

### REPORTS SAY TWO PERMITS TO BE ASKED

AUSTIN, June 5 (UP)—A 13-day permit next to last of the licensed pari-mutuel horse races in Texas opened today at Pampa, in the Texas Panhandle.

The State Racing Commission has issued but one other permit for a pari-mutuel meet. It will be held at Harlingen for ten days beginning June 25.

As the death blow was given to the pari-mutuel which has flourished under \$68,000,000 of bets placed in four years, reports were current that either Arlington Downs between Fort Worth and Dallas, or Epsom Downs at Houston would ask a permit for a final fall meet.

Governor Allred, exultant, over his successful battle to stop race track betting, announced that he will veto the appropriation for the State Racing Commission whose supervisions of race meet is required. These appropriations are for the fiscal year beginning September 1, 1937.

"If the pari-mutuel repeal bill had been passed at the regular session as it should have been, there would have been no time for a fall meet," Allred said. "I want to stop race betting as quickly as possible."

The Governor began work on a message to go to the legislature Monday calling for an effective law against bookies and against dog racing with pari-mutuels.

The pastor, Dr. E. S. James, will be the principal; Miss Mary Beth Langston, head of the juniors division; Mrs. J. A. Smith in charge of primary department, and Mrs. G. B. Langston, charge of beginners.

Mrs. J. A. Smith will be in charge of primary work with Mrs. Chumney in charge of Bible Story Telling; Mrs. H. J. McArdle, Character Story; Miss Billie Cole, music; Miss Willie Frank Walker, pianist; Sarah Mayhew, secretary; Memory Period, Mrs. John Smith. The primary department includes children of the ages 6, 7, and 8.

The school will be in session about two weeks, beginning at 8:30 each morning with a general meeting in the auditorium followed by sessions to continue until 11 o'clock.

### MAYOR PARKER IS RELATED TO MRS. ASA SKILES

Mayor A. J. Parker of Roscoe, who was shot Friday afternoon by Bill Dawson, night watchman, was a brother-in-law of Mrs. Asa Skiles, Mr. and Mrs. Skiles went to Roscoe Friday night. Mr. Skiles returned to Cisco Saturday morning but again went to Roscoe Saturday night to be with their relatives in this tragedy.

Dawson, former Roscoe night-watchman, who, according to Sheriff Tom Wade, received letter from Mayor Parker notifying him he was discharged as a nightwatchman, refused to make a statement.

The shooting occurred in the business district of Roscoe and Dawson was disarmed by B. S. Sanders, a merchant whose store was across the street from where the shooting occurred, Sheriff Wade said. Sanders took the man to Deputy Sheriff Pat Mayes.

Sheriff Wade and Sanders told him he heard the shooting and saw Parker running down an alley. Parker was shot once in the breast bone, once near the heart and once in the upper intestine.

Sheriff Wade said the city council had been dissatisfied with Dawson's services as watchman and gave him notice the first of the year but Dawson refused to quit. Wade said the council cut his salary \$10 a month but Dawson stayed on.

Dawson had been nightwatchman two years.

Parker has been mayor of Roscoe for 17 years. He was reported in a critical condition Saturday but with a chance for recovery.

Bond of \$3,000 was set for Dawson by Justice of the Peace S. H. Shook.

District Attorney George Outlaw said the charge would stand pending outcome of the mayor's wounds.

### ROCKEFELLER LEAVES ENTIRE ESTATE TO GRANDDAUGHTER

WHITE PLAINS, New York, June 5 (UP)—John D. Rockefeller revised his will three years before his death and left the entire income of an estimated \$25,000,000 estate to his granddaughter, the Marquesa de Cuevas, was disclosed today when the will was filed for probate.

The relatively small size of the onetime billionaire's estate brought no surprise since he had given hundreds of millions of dollars, but the naming of his granddaughter as virtually the sole heir created a stir.

The Marquesa is the daughter of Prof. Charles Augusta Strong and the late Bessie Rockefeller, daughter of the billionaire Mrs. Strong died in France in 1906.

The former Margaret Strong was married to the Marquis de Cuevas, member of a prominent Spanish family in 1927. They have two children, Elizabeth and John, and spend most of their time in Europe, although their legal residence is Lakewood, N. J.

It estimates of the net estate of \$25,000,000 are born out, federal and state taxes will cut deeply into the sum.

The Federal Bureau of Internal Revenue calculated that it would receive inheritance taxes of \$15,112,800 and the New York State Tax officials estimated they would claim \$4,350,000 provided the estate conforms to predictions.

### NEW REQUEST CLAIMS VOTE WAS ILLEGAL

Milton Lawrence, attorney for Beer Retailers and Wholesalers who contested the May 1 prohibition election, Saturday amended his original petition in 91st District Court to grant an injunction restraining putting into effect the order of Commissioners Court which May 27th canvassed results and set June 27 as date for appearance of results.

The result was declared by Commissioners Court as showing favor of prohibition of sale of all liquors in the county. The new application for an injunction will be heard when the election controversy case is heard up its merits. The date for the application will be heard will be set when the docket is called for the June term Tuesday morning at 9:15 District Court.

The amended petition, it was observed, is materially the same as the first petition filed by Lawrence for the Beer Retailers and Wholesalers who were granted a temporary injunction restraining Commissioners Court from canvassing returns but which was later dissolved by the court which held it was without jurisdiction. The amended petition makes members of Commissioners Court parties to the suit, but adds Criminal District Attorney Earl Conner, Jr. whom they seek to restrain along with members of Commissioners Court and the County Court from putting into effect the result of the election.

The new petition claimed the election was illegal because of improper posting of notices by the County Clerk and the alleged submission of an improper issue in the election.

The petition develops a theory the voters should have decided upon legalization of prohibition of 14 percent beverages, legalized last year.

The petition states that under terms and provisions of the Liquor Control Act the Commissioner's Court failed to submit to the voters of the county one or more of the issues which were heretofore legalized.

Ciscoans who have been active to secure a park designation for the canyon north of Cisco, adjacent to lake and fish hatchery, will be glad to learn of the elevation of Wendell Mayes of Brownwood to the head of the state parks board, his becoming chairman on June 4 to succeed Pat M. Neff of Waco.

He was chosen at the first meeting of the board since its membership was increased six by the legislature. J. V. Ash of Bastrop, the new members, was elected vice-president.

The group urged Governor James V. Allred to approve a \$150,000 appropriation for a Big Bend park development.

Mr. Mayes has visited the Cisco park site several times and has lent encouragement to Cisco by his favorable work for the project. Renewed efforts and contracts will now be made by the local committee to secure an early recognition for the worthiness of the project.

The Time-Card of Business

When congress reconvened on June 2, it entered upon the sixth month of its present session, which opened January 5. This congress has passed little new legislation of major importance in five months, aside from some of the appropriation bills and the CCC bill, the Neutrality bill, and the Bituminous Coal bill.

The relief bill has been held up in the house by the fight for "earmarking" certain appropriations—that is, for requiring some of the funds to be spent for "heavy" public works. President Roosevelt ended his special budget message to Congress on April 20 with an expression of his hope that a \$1,500,000,000 work relief appropriation would be "made available early in June so that its expenditure can be properly planned prior to July 1."

The great delay in the present Congress has been in committee. Majority Leader Robinson said in the Senate on May 26: "The Senate has kept well up with its work during the present session, as is indicated by the small number of bills on the calendar."

The House met on 97.78 per cent of the 125 weekdays from Jan. 5 to May 30; the Senate, on 73 (58 per cent). The average length of each meeting has been 2 hours and 50 minutes in the Senate, 4 hours and 15 minutes in the House.

The House convened 99.9 of its 97 meeting days at 11 a. m. instead of at noon. The Senate always convened at noon, except on one day when the session opened at 11:45.

The Senate: Sat until after 5 p. m. on 7 days. Adjourned before 2 p. m. on 25 days. Adjourned before 1 p. m. on 16 days. The House: Sat until after 5 p. m. on 31 days. Sat until after 6 p. m. on 5 days. Adjourned before 3 p. m. on 21 days.

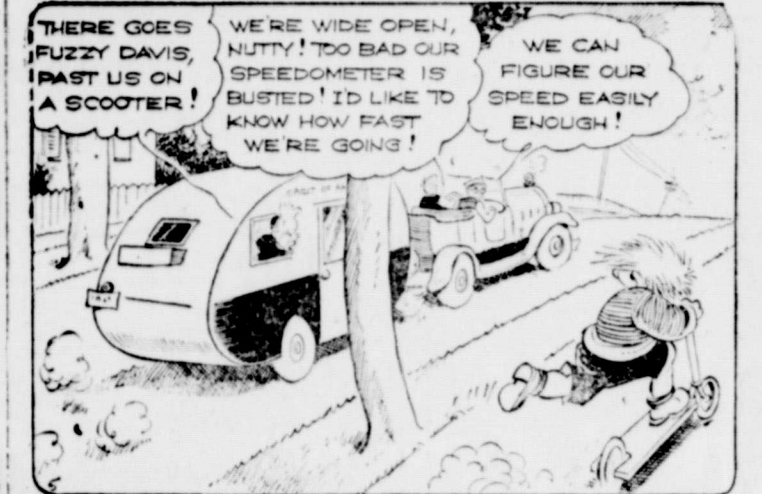

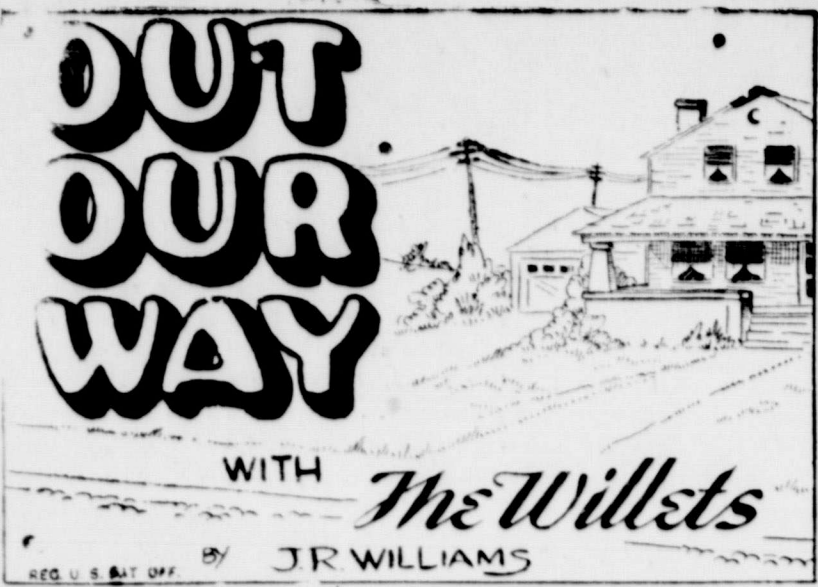

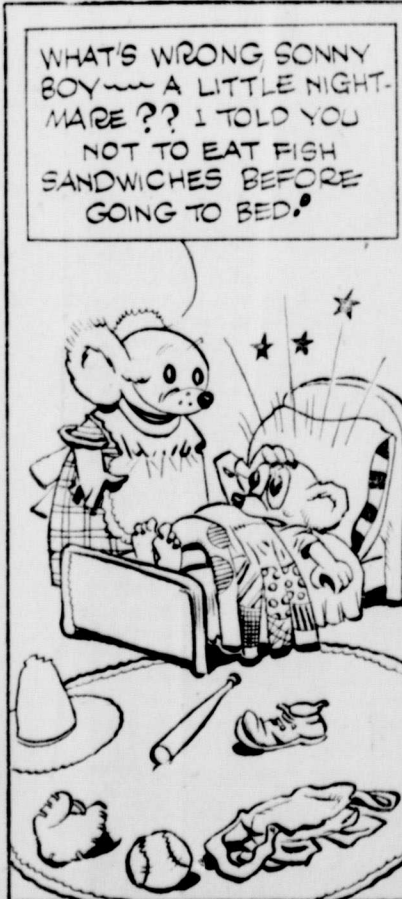

### LOVE ESCAPADE ENSNARL ARTIST

VIENNA, June 5 (AP)— Johann Proel's colorful career has come to a premature end, at least temporarily.

Proel, a talented 42-year-old painter, may be a dangerous crook, but he is also a lovable fellow, and women of all ages fell easy victims to his fascination.

Early in life he started out as a "never-do-well." At 14, Proel ran away from home to become a sailor, or as cabin-boy he crossed to New York in 1900. There, after serving as dish-washer and waiter, he established himself as a hotdog vendor. For some reason which he does not like to explain, he attracted the displeasure of the New York police and returned to his family in Vienna in 1913. Here he was boy-writer for one year.

When the war broke out, he im-

mediately joined the colors and fought in many parts of the world, collecting wounds and medals.

**Found War Glamorous**

The war was over much too soon for his tastes and he was glad when he found a chance to join the French Foreign Legion, which, for eight years, he fought rebellious tribes in Morocco, receiving more wounds and medals.

As he had always been a good craftsman, he then decided to become a painter and went to Paris, where he joined an academy of arts. During his four years in Paris he became an excellent artist. But one day a few valuable paintings were found missing after Proel had visited a gallery there.

After an interlude in a French prison he went to Dresden without a penny. There he had the idea of introducing himself to a native young American girl, who studied art in Dresden, as the famous French painter Henri Matisse.

**Lead Him Money**

The girl, who was tremendously proud of her acquaintance with

the world-known post-Impressionist artist, gladly helped the great man out when he was in "temporary financial difficulties."

After lending him about \$800 she thought of looking up what the encyclopedia had to say about the great painter. To her surprise she found that Matisse was born in 1869, while her "Matisse" did not look more than 40. That meant the end of her romance and also the end of Proel's sojourn in Dresden.

He returned to Austria in Salzburg and Vienna, the black-eyed, athletic man with graying temples and the many scars easily found women, ranging from 18 to 57, who were only too glad to marry the interesting artist and, for this purpose, to finance his alleged divorce in Paris and a lawsuit for 500,000 scullings which he asserted he was conducting in France.

But his last bride, a wealthy middle-aged Viennese, had a thorough inquiry made into Proel's life through a private detective agency. That led to Proel's arrest.

### UNDER THE DOME AT AUSTIN

AUSTIN, June 5 (AP)—Texans pay as much to have their hair cut correctly and their shaves sanitary as to operate the governor's office.

The next year's appropriation for barber licensing and inspection is \$62,430. The cost to pay the governor and run his department will be \$51,170.

Safety and law enforcement lead in cost to the Texas taxpayer. Biggest item in the appropriation bill for the year is \$1,861,908 for Texas prisons, although convicts have been made to contribute to their own support by farming and industrial employment.

The Department of Public Safety gets \$1,185,600 (including a long sought raise in pay for the Texas Rangers) and the Adjutant General's office will get \$265,915. The total thus paid by Texans to live in comparative security for a year is \$3,346,285.

not include Sundays or any of the days designated as state holidays. In addition, department heads may reduce the force at work Saturday afternoons.

Judge Ben Cathey, Quitman, does not find this "horse race" session of the Tex's legislature any more exciting than that of the 31st Texas legislature which barred horse race betting in 1909.

Cathey is only member of the present legislature who was a member at the time the tax was put on race betting. Rep. T. S. (Tip) Ross, Gorman, was also a member of the 31st Texas legislature but he was not elected until after its regular session and so did not participate in its battle over horse racing.

Cathey voted to ban horse racing in 1909. He voted to repeal the parimutuel law in the regular session of this legislature and says he will vote for parimutuel repeal in the present special session.

Jack Chevigny, former Notre Dame football star and football coach at St. Edward's University and the University of Texas has resigned as attorney for the state tax board. He will be employed by H. H. Weinert, Seguin, regent of the University of Texas.

Chevigny was appointed attorney for the tax board when he resigned while the University of Texas was negotiating with Dana X. Bible to bring the former Texas Aggie coach from his Nebraska triumphs to head the University of Texas athletic department.

Probably will be John Wallace of Teague.

Wallace now does the purchasing as member of the Board. Gov. James V. Allred, recently announced the appointment of Former Sen. Tom DeBerry, Bogota, to succeed Wallace as board member of Jan. 1. It is expected DeBerry will take over public welfare supervision, to be lumped into a division of the Board.

DENVER, June 5 (AP)—Denver will be the host city this summer to the 73rd national Elks convention, expected to be one of the largest fraternal meets ever had.

More than 40,000 members and their families, representing the 1,800 Elks lodges in the United States and insular possessions, are expected for the week-long gathering which opens July 11.

Final arrangements for the big national reunion, were completed at a conference here attended by David Sholtz, grand exalted ruler of the Elks, and former governor of Florida. He predicted the con-

vention will be one of the largest and most colorful in the history of the organization.

Principal features of the convention include a gigantic parade, the national Elks golf tournament for \$2,000 John J. Doyle perpetual trophy; a trap and skeet shoot, and national contests for drum and bugle corps, glee clubs, bands and drill teams.

July 16 has been set aside for a pilgrimage to the Will Rogers Shrine of the Sun on Cheyenne Mountain, near Colorado Springs. The shrine was erected by Spencer F. House, Colorado capitalist, in memory of Rogers, an Elk of New York Lodge No. 1.

Several state departments are near the million-a-year mark in cost. Appropriation for the Texas Liquor Control Board is \$969,870; for the state comptroller's office, \$933,222; and for the state railroad commission \$879,079.

The Livestock Sanitary Commission, operated independent of the Department of Agriculture, will get \$635,184. 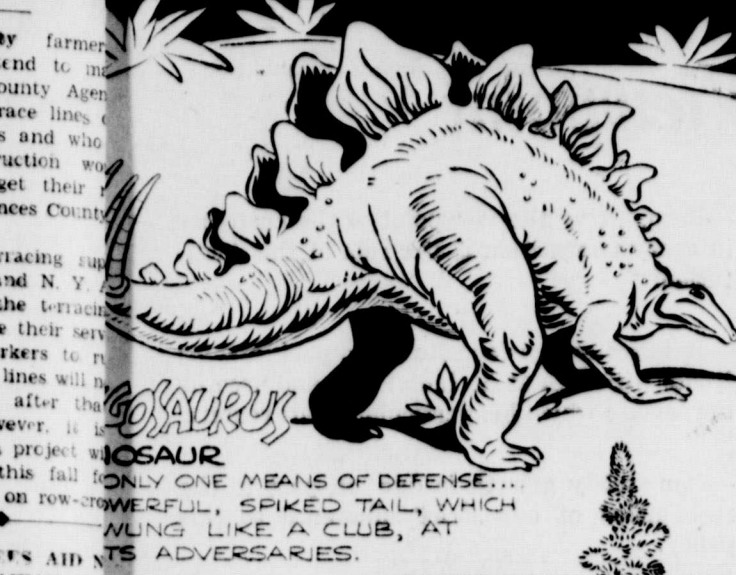

# OIL DRILLING OPERATIONS FOR COUNTY

**EASTLAND June 5**—Hoffman & Fage company this week spudded No. 1 Mrs. M. E. Holcomb, two miles northeast of Eastland, which today was drilling at 106 feet in search of small gas production at 1,500 feet.

In the John House survey, the test in 205 feet from the east line and 463 feet north of the south line of the 65-acre Holcomb tract. The operation marks the first for many years in that vicinity, it was reported. Last well completed in the immediate vicinity of the No. 1 Holcomb was a gasser.

For consideration understood to be approximately \$20,000, R. W. Russell purchased from Murry & McDavid of Abilene their property about five miles southeast of Eastland.

The property included 100 acres on which eight wells on pump make about 38 barrels daily. On the 60-acre J. W. Clark lease are three wells making 10 barrels daily and on the 46-acre on the T. F. Murrell land are four wells making about 18 barrels daily. The land is in section 29, H. & T. C. Survey Block 2. The wells in the deal were drilled about three years ago by Contractor Wiley Harbin.

The deep test being drilled to a proposed depth of 5,500 feet by Gallagher-Lawson et al, one-half mile south of Desdemona, was skidded nine feet east after losing the bit at 110 feet in the first location. The test is about 100 feet over in Comanche county.

States Oil Corporation No. 9 G. T. Parrack, nine miles north of Eastland, SE 1-4 section 7, H & T. RR company survey block 4, was drilling 1,700 feet on its way to the contract depth of 2,000 feet.

# Batting Average In Soft Ball Scoring

By W. E. COOPER

In figuring a batting average of a player the number of times he is at bat is divided into the number of hits multiplied by 1000 that he gets. When a batter is walked that does not count for or against him in his batting average, as it is not considered as a time at bat. The scorekeeper is the sole judge of how a hit is scored. If, in his judgment the player hits the ball and gets on base through some miscue on the part of the team in the infield he hit is scored as an error and not as a hit. This counts as one time at bat against the player. If the ball is hit with a runner on base and the fielder catching the ball elects to throw the advancing runner out and this the hitter go to first base safely by this is scored as a fielder's choice and counts as one time at bat against the hitter.

If a ball is hit where no fielder touched it or is hit so hard that in the opinion of the scorekeeper, it could not be handled, a hit is scored for the batter.

In batting averages many times a player's name will be at the top of the column that has only been at bat a few times. This player should not be considered as the real batting leader but the player that has been at the bat the most number of times and has the highest average is the real leader. This is because the more times a player is at bat the more chances there is of lowering his batting average.

# Old-Fashioned Plow Blamed for Injury

**ROTAN, June 5 (UP)**—If citizens hadn't decided to change the site of Dowell, pioneer village of Fisher county, Texas, in 1906, it now would be one of the towns famous for having a pool of oil under it.

Dowell was established 50 years ago a cow country village was moved two miles and the name changed to Rotan. Where old Dowell stood, cotton was planted.

Last month, Southern Oil Company of Dallas brought in a gusher on well, Joe Robinson No. 1, on the very spot that the town once occupied. High gravity oil was found and major companies rushed into the area to lease the lands for mineral development. First estimates on production at the new well gave it 3,000 barrels a day without treatment.

Royalties jumped to more than \$150 an acre. The Fisher county clerk's office, accustomed to handling routine farm and ranch transactions was swamped with business. Because of the fire hazard, operators have prohibited the public from the vicinity of the new producer.

Joe Robinson No. 1 came in as a surprise to operators. Drillers expected to go 3,700 feet into Fisher rav. Instead, the well blew in at 3,565 feet in producing sand that could not be classified immediately.

The new well will bring prosperity to a section harassed by drought and dust storms during recent years. Dowell, the town that might have become rich, is remembered now only by the Dowell school. The school district will benefit greatly from increased taxes, as have many schools in East Texas.

### Smothered Armadillo Is A New Delicacy

COLLEGE STATION, June 5 (AP)—Two field men of the Texas Co-operative Wildlife Service have discovered a new food delicacy—smothered armadillo.

Judge R. E. Minton of Lufkin, Tex., introduced the new dish to the field men during an inspection tour. "Pres." Negro cook, prepared the dish.

The following is the Negro's recipe for smothered armadillo:

First, catch the armadillo, then dress it. Parboil until tender, using water freely sprinkled with salt, pepper and seasoned with vinegar. Place a small amount of grease in a heavy skillet and sear well. Cover the armadillo with a sauce of tomato paste or catsup, mustard, vinegar, salt, pepper and a sweet bay leaf. Simmer the meat in the covered skillet, adding water occasionally to the sauce. The dish is ready for serving after the meat begins falling off the bone and the sauce becomes thick.
