for the special session. Courts frequently have declined to go behind the House or Senate's own ruling on procedure.

The most persistent reverberations will be heard in future special sessions of legislatures. A special session may consider only matters submitted by the governor. Heretofore there has been a generally accepted view that when the governor submitted a subject, he submitted all its ramifications.

At the parimutuel repeal session, he specifically limited the first call on parimutuel repeal alone. Presiding officers ruled out of order regulation of bookies or dog racing. "A special session is a governor's session," ruled Lieut. Gov. Walter Woodul. "I hold that he can limit the legislation." The alternative, of course, is for the legislature to refuse to pass what is submitted and wait for an enlarged submission.

The limitation, despite all floor suggestions of insincerity, was to prevent muddling the main topic, and thus possibly block passage of any bill for 30 days. Sen. Frank Rawlings of Fort Worth said his complaint was not so much that the consideration of other gambling was temporarily withheld declaring a governor might so limit submission of a topic means that in future a governor can submit single-shot tax bills. He might call on the legislature to pass a 10-cents-a-barrel oil tax, for example, Rawlings said, and the legislators would be limited to that tax or none. They could not apportion the tax burden so part would fall on resources, nor on other industries.

Sen. Clint C. Small of Amarillo and Gov. James V. Allred exchanged sharp "compliments" over the parimutuel bill. Allred sat in the Senate gallery and heard Small link his name with that of Former Governor James E. Ferguson as a "demi-god." Small charged that parimutuel repeal was blocked two years ago by employment of an "Allred group" and a "Jim Ferguson group." Allred replied next day at his press conference. "I defeated him for governor in 1934. He's still ranking over it." Allred commented. Small had said he felt satisfaction in "smoking out the administration" on bookies, and Allred in reply likened the Amarillo senator to a little dog barking at a setting moon and bragging he had chased it out of the sky. Allred quoted a couplet about the dog baying at the moon. Strangely enough Rep. Bryan Bradbury, Abilene, writer of the race repeal bill quoted the same verse in his closing speech.

There are problems like this that harass the Texas legislature. For years impromptu and hasty committee meetings on uncontested bills while the House was in session have been held "at the foot of Jim Hog"—under the huge portrait of the former governor hanging to the right of the speaker's stand. Now committees must find a new place to meet. The calendar clerk's desk and the great volume of files which surround it have been moved from the north side of the House hall to all places—the foot of Jim Hog."

If taxation is submitted to a special session of the Texas legislature, it will be at a session with no other topic. Gov. James V. Allred has decided. "It would take 30 days to prepare and pass an adequate tax program," he said. That there may be none at all for some time is possible. Sen. John Redditt of Lufkin, experienced chairman of the Senate finance committee, now has a chance to say "I told you so." He predicted before the regular session was well started that no new taxes would be required. Governor Allred then said Redditt was sticking out his neck and would have to take it back. The session ended without additional taxes being passed. Redditt is making another prediction. He quoted figures to indicate that there will be ample money in the state available school fund without added tax to pay the \$19 per pupil appropriation voted by the State Board of Education—highest amount ever granted. Liquor Administrator Bert Ford has posted agents throughout the state to enforce the Texas liquor law. The men are spaced like chessmen on a huge board of unusual shape. The East Texas oil field district will have seven men. Longview will be headquarters. There will be two men there and two at Henderson and one each at Tyler, Rusk and Jefferson. San Antonio will have seven men stationed there in an attempt to keep it within the law. Five others will be stationed at surrounding places, including one at Gonzales.
