Seven-Man Mediation Strike Board Named

BOARD FORMED TO AVERT ACTS OF VIOLENCE

WASHINGTON, June 17 (U.P.)—Secretary of Labor Frances Perkins today named a three-man board to seek to mediate the seven-state steel strike.

Miss Perkins named Charles Taft of Cincinnati, as chairman. Other members are Lloyd Garrison, former chairman of the National Labor Relations Board and Assistant Secretary of Labor Edward McGrady.

Miss Perkins said she acted with "consent, approval and recommendation" of President Roosevelt. She said the board would begin work immediately.

Miss Perkins' action, taken after a conference with President Roosevelt, followed a telegraphic appeal by Governor Martin Davey of Ohio that the president intervene in an effort to avert widespread violence.

Miss Perkins acted in the face of threatening developments on a broad front. They included:

Davey's "urgent request" that Mr. Roosevelt intervene to "avert enormous economic losses and the potential danger to thousands of people."

New violence along steel picket lines. One picket was shot and his companion set loose the engine of a freight train and sent it driverless down a track at Canton, Ohio.

Joint general strike action by the Committee for Industrial Organization and the American Federation of Labor was threatened at Canton.

John L. Lewis, CIO head, cancelled a scheduled appearance before a steel workers mass meeting in Chicago in order to remain in Washington.

Miss Perkins made it plain that the board was a mediation group and could not compel arbitration. She said, however, there was "not the slightest doubt" that the board would end the conflict of more than 70,000 workers.

PENN PREPARES FOR 200th YEAR

PHILADELPHIA, June 17 (U.P.)—Scientists, scholars and educators representing the world's leading minds will meet here in 1940 as the University of Pennsylvania commemorates its 200th anniversary and reviews human progress over the past two centuries.

Plans conceived by Joseph Wayne, Jr., chairman of the university's national bicentennial committee, include a symposium of outstanding intellectual leaders in the principal fields of human knowledge. The scholars, foreign and American, will deliver a group of integrated major lectures.

"The lectures will cover intellectual progress since the founding of the university," Wayne said, "and will evaluate the present state of knowledge and indicate what the future may hold."

The celebration, lasting throughout the year, will enter the field of sports. Old football rivals will meet Penn on the gridiron. A regatta to which the chief American Colonial colleges will be invited will be held on the Schuylkill River.

Philadelphia will be decorated to fit the occasion, Wayne said.

The celebration will end in the fall with a series of important lectures by famed scholars and presentation of Bicentennial Degrees to distinguished visitors.

ROADS CHOKED WITH FLEEING FAMILIES

OUTSIDE BILBAO, June 17 (U.P.)—Insurgents advance on shattered Bilbao from all sides today under cover of heavy artillery attack and heavy bombing of loyalist positions.

Tanks and armored cars were brought in steady streams for entry into the Basque capitol as soon as General Franco gives the word.

Aerial observers reported that refugees were fleeing from Bilbao towards Santander in a steady stream. The roads were choked with families carrying scanty possessions. Ox carts and old automobiles vied for right-of-way in the confusion and the exodus moved slowly.

WORLD NEWS FLASHES ON WIRES TODAY

MEXICO CITY, June 17 (U.P.)—Leon Trotsky, the exile who is regarded by Soviet Russia as its arch enemy, today urged a return to democracy in the Soviet union in a telegram addressed to the Central Executive Committee of the Union.

BEEVILLE, Tex. June 17 (U.P.)—Laciano Santano, 25, shot and killed his 20-year-old wife today, then shot himself through the head, a Justice of the Peace said in a murder and suicide verdict.

The bodies of the couple were found fully clothed this morning in their home.

LAGRANGE, June 17 (U.P.)—Murder and suicide was recorded in the death of Gertrude Treibig, 19, and Alfred Domel, 22, former sweethearts.

The couple left a dance together last night and were shot shortly afterwards. Domel was found alive, but died without regaining consciousness.

A coroner held that Domel shot Miss Treibig twice in the forehead, and once in the back with a small rifle, then fired a bullet into his own head.

GROESBECK, June 17 (U.P.)—Tony Moore, 26, negro hotel porter, was convicted of murder and assessed the death penalty today for the shotgun killing of John Braduante, 57, Thornton merchant.

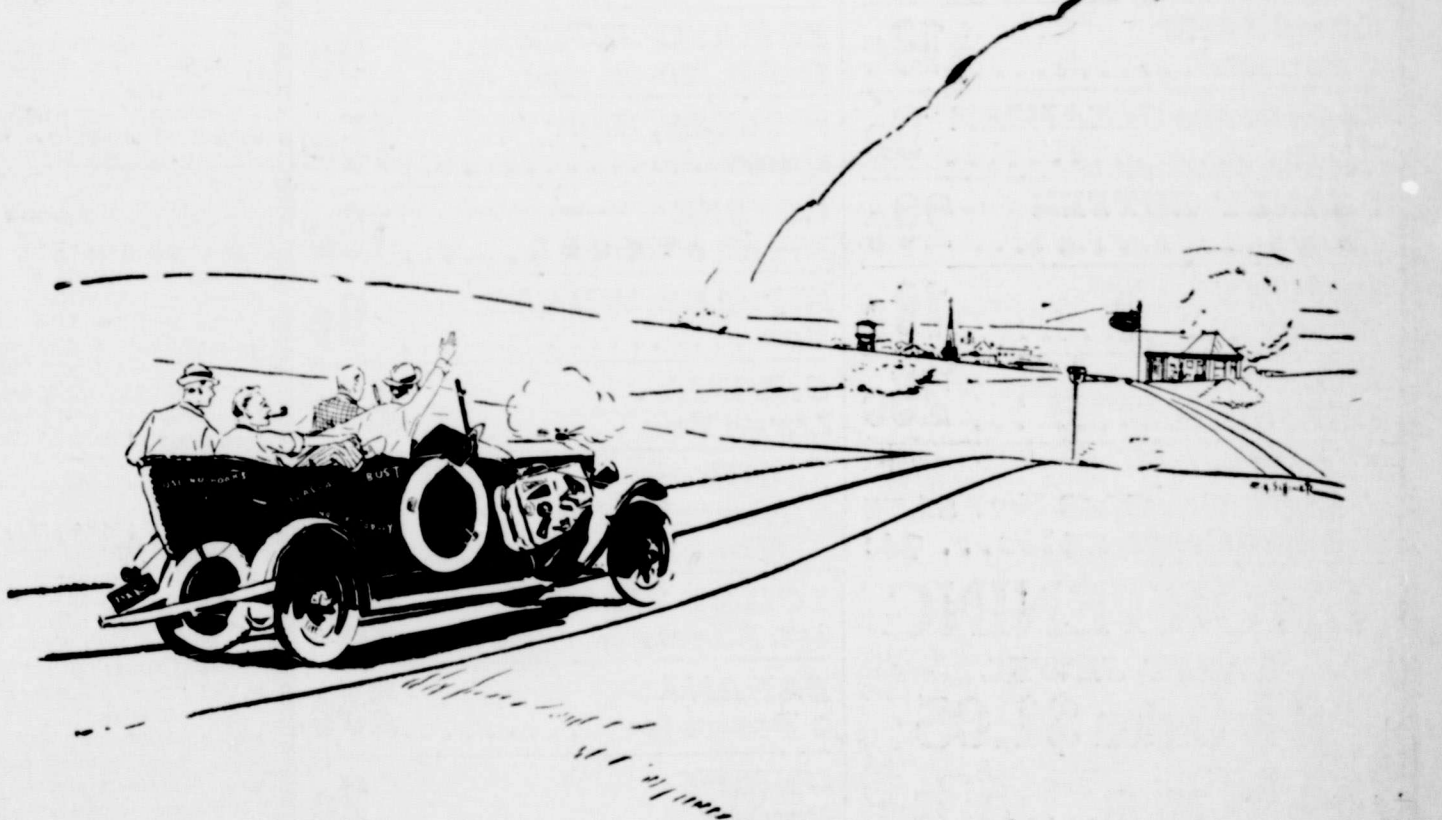

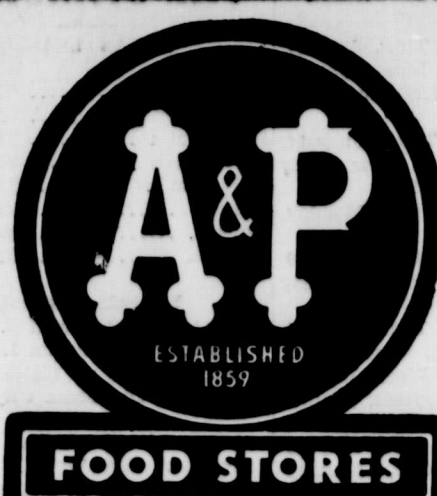

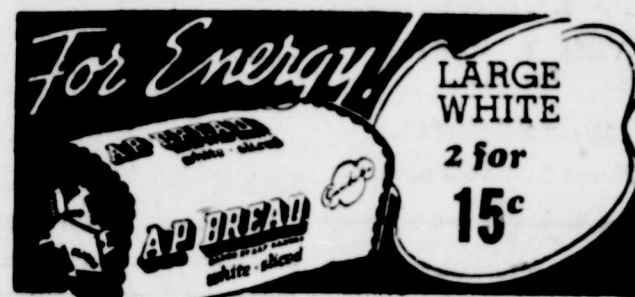

Ranchers Receive 25 Million Proceeds

FORT WORTH, June 16 (U.P.)—Texas ranchers received more than \$25,000,000 for livestock marketed through the Fort Worth Stockyards officials disclosed here. The income was the highest in 10 years for those who raise cattle, calves, sheep and hogs. Sheep provided the real "golden harvest," as Fort Worth took the lead as a sheep center from Chicago, Omaha and Denver. A total of 748,879 "woolies" were unloaded at Fort Worth yards during May, compared with 313,506 for May, 1936. The total was almost twice as high as that of any other American market. The total number of cattle, calves sheep and hogs received during the month was 1,391,642, more than 400,000 greater than for the corresponding month of 1936. Hogs receipts were 191,856, about 20,000 less than for May, 1936.

East Texas C of C Places Young Men

RYE MOONSHINE REPLACES CORN
JACKSON, Miss., June 17 (UP)—Corn "likker" no longer flows in its once great abundance from the copper stills along the wandering streams and among the pine-covered hills of Mississippi.
 E. S. Chapman, head of the Mississippi office of the federal alcohol tax unit, estimated that "at least 90 per cent of the whisky illegally distilled in Mississippi is made from rye mash."
 Chapman based his estimate on still seizures by federal agents. These seizures average 15 to 20 stills a week, ranging from 60 to 500-gallon capacity. And, he pointed out, thousands of gallons of mash are seized weekly—and most of it is rye. A few years ago, nearly all of it—except in South Mississippi—was corn.

For Local Consumption
 Most of the local product is for local consumption, Chapman said. Agents destroyed 11 stills in Rankin county, just across Pearl River from Jackson. The daily capacity of the 11 stills—and no one knows how many more there are that haven't been destroyed—amounted to three quarts for every man, woman and child in the county seat.
 "The local market, and that includes Jackson, of course, absorbed it," Chapman explained. He scoffed rumors that rye whisky is trucked outside the state for "foreign" consumption.
 The fact remains that the Mississippi moonshiners—many of whom are the third and fourth generation—have deserted their traditional corn.
Repeal Caused Change
 The "shiner" still fires up his still with his shotgun tucked under his arm, his faithful hound-dog trotting lazily at his heels, but it's amber-colored rye that runs from the coil.
 The Mississippi moonshiner has adopted co-operative marketing and standard formula. Only the force of circumstance caused him to break away from time-honored tradition but repeal ruined the demand for uncamouflaged "corn." Competitor from "store-bought" and bonded whiskies in every county proved too strong.
 Corn "likker" has become almost as scarce in Mississippi as genuine Bourbon. Few of the moonshiners make it. It becomes increasingly hard to get by those who prefer it to the daintier distillations. It almost has vanished under the flood of rye and tax-paid beverages, now dispensed by the more than 1,200 federally-licensed Mississippians.

Skilled Labor Shortage Found
NEW YORK (UP)—The State Department of Labor reports that 900 jobs went unfilled in New York during April because its public employment service was unable to supply men for the positions from among the 450,000 names registered with the Division of Placement.
 Sixty per cent of the unfilled jobs called for skilled or semi-skilled labor, of which the country faces a definite shortage. The virtual shutdown of apprentice training programs during the depression was one of the reasons advanced by the Department for the shortage in skilled labor.
 The most consistent shortage of applicants was found in the metal trades where no takers were found for 125 jobs at wages ranging from 80 cents to \$1.25 an hour.
 The figures were announced by the State Department of Labor after a study made to indicate to what extent reported shortages of skilled labor actually existed.

Auto Horn Saves Man From Suicide
PALO ALTO, Cal. (UP)—Auto horns can serve other purposes than blasting at the man ahead who is blocking the traffic. A local resident after deciding to commit suicide attached a garden hose to his exhaust, put the other end in his mouth and awaited death by carbon monoxide poisoning. As he became unconscious he fell against a horn button and the horn kept blowing until help arrived in time to save his life.

Wholehearted Cooperation

Commenting on a recent example of cooperation between the New York Stock Exchange and the Securities and Exchange Commission, in which the exchange established new and stringent rulings dealing with margin trading, the Wall Street Journal said: "The interesting and important point in the matter is not the terms of the rules but the fact that they are laid down by the exchange authorities themselves and not by the commission."

One of the most notable features of late financial events has been the fine spirit existing between the exchange and SEC. The exchange has in many instances voluntarily gone farther than the SEC requires to eliminate what might be termed "borderline" cases.

The exchange's service to the investor—especially the small investor, without highly organized facilities for gauging the merit of securities—has been of inestimable value. Financial manipulations are now next to impossible. "Wash selling" has been banned. Dealings on dangerously small margins are outlawed.

'If You Want to Do It Right'

Many years ago when the railroad industry was still suffering acute growing pains, a certain railroad president became aware of the inadequate and obsolete equipment which his company owned, and decided to do something about it.

This incident is illustrative of the aggressive leadership and farsighted ability that characterized the "behind the scenes" development and growth of the American railroads.

BEHIND THE SCENES IN WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON—The fight for control between Roosevelt and Congress has now reached the point where the President speaks privately of a "purge" of anti-New Dealers from the Democratic party and where his chief opponents in the Senate hope to humiliate him as Woodrow Wilson was humiliated in the League of Nations fight.

There is cockiness and grinning on each side. In essence the prime issue comes close to being a question of whether the people elected members of Congress to do what Roosevelt tells them to do or to use their own judgment. An increasing number of members have begun to chant: "Are we mice or are we men?"

FACING now what is mainly a conservative effort to reduce his power, Roosevelt tells friends the court fight is a good one in which to separate sheep from goats, that the Democratic party would be better off without some of the senators who oppose him and that he is ready to campaign against some of those senators in the primaries next year.

UNDER THE DOME AT AUSTIN

SHEARER, United Press Staff Correspondent AUSTIN, June 18 (UP)—The procedure of the parimutuel repeal session of the Texas legislature will be discussed long after repeal has been accepted as a settled incident. Predicates were laid in both House and Senate to attack the repeal act in court, but there is little expectation that a court ruling will be made.

for the special session. Courts frequently have declined to go behind the House or Senate's own ruling on procedure.

The most persistent reverberations will be heard in future special sessions of legislatures. A special session may consider only matters submitted by the governor. Heretofore there has been a generally accepted view that when the governor submitted a subject, he submitted all its ramifications.

At the parimutuel repeal session, he specifically limited the first call on parimutuel repeal alone. Presiding officers ruled out of order registration of bookies or dog racing.

The limitation, despite all floor suggestions of insincerity, was to prevent muddling the main topic, and thus possibly block passage of any bill for 30 days.

Sen. Frank Rawlings of Fort Worth said his complaint was not so much that the consideration of other gambling was temporarily withheld declaring a governor might so limit submission of a topic means that in future a governor can submit single-shot tax bills. He might call on the legislature to pass a 10-cents-a-barrel oil tax, for example.

Sen. Clint C. Small of Amarillo and Gov. James V. Allred exchanged sharp "compliments" over the parimutuel bill. Allred said in the Senate gallery and heard Small link his name with that of Former Governor James E. Ferguson as a "demigod."

Allred replied next day at his press conference. "I defeated him for governor in 1934. He's still ranking over it." Allred commented Small had said he felt satisfaction in "smoking out the administration" on bookies, and Allred in reply likened the Amarillo senator to a little dog barking at a setting moon and bragging he had chased it out of the sky.

There are problems like this that harass the Texas legislature.

For years impromptu and hasty committee meetings on uncontested bills while the House was in session have been held "at the foot of Jim Hogg"—under the huge portrait of the former governor hanging to the right of the speaker's stand.

If taxation is submitted to a special session of the Texas legislature, it will be at a session with no other topic, Gov. James V. Allred has decided. "It would take 30 days to prepare and pass an adequate tax program," he said.

Sen. John Redditt of Lufkin, experienced chairman of the Senate finance committee, now has a chance to say "I told you so." He predicted before the regular session was well started that no new taxes would be required. Governor Allred then said Redditt was sticking out his neck and would have to take it back.

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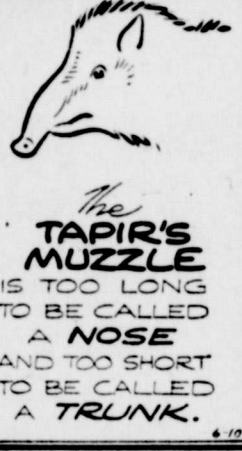

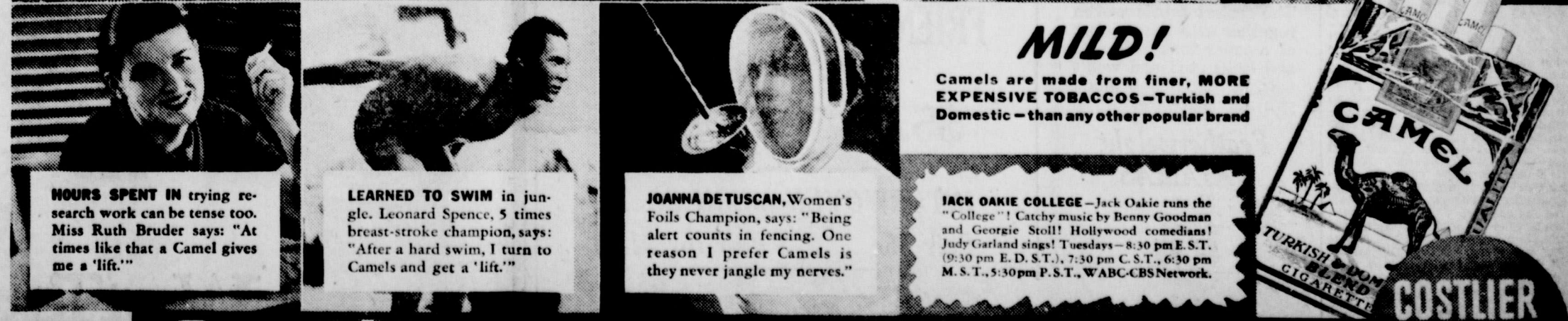

OIL ACTIVITY IN EASTLAND COUNTY AREA

EASTLAND, June 17 — Eastland county oilmen's attention this week was directed eight miles northwest of Cisco, where Hickok Producing company announced it would drill to 4,000 feet No. 2 Grover S. Cleveland for prospective gas production.

The test is 660 feet from the west line and 330 feet from the south line of the N 1-2 of the NE 1-4 section 477, S. P. R. R. company survey.

No. 1 Cleveland, the same footage as the No. 2 although it was in the S 1-2 of the 80-acre lease, was completed March 28, 1935, as a 1,955,000 foot gas well between 3,804-62 feet.

Possibly the county's most eagerly watched test, Gallagher & Lawson et al No. 1 Bobbie I. Terry, one half mile south of Desdemona, Eastland county, but over 100 feet in Comanche county, was making rapid progress, drilling at the last report below 725 feet.

Hoffman & Page company No. 1 Mrs. M. E. Holcomb, drilling two miles northeast of Eastland for gas production at 1,300 feet, was drilling below 760 feet.

In the same area as the 5,500 foot Desdemona test being drilled by Gallagher & Lawson et al, the Hickey et al No. 1 W. M. Martin, two miles southeast of Desdemona, but in Brath county, was slightly under 100 feet, shutdown for repairs.

Barnett Petroleum corporation and J. L. Reeves No. 1 A. L. C. Downtown, a 2,500 foot test one mile southeast of Eastland, section 2, FTFR company survey set eight-inch casing at 800 feet then was forced to shutdown for repairs.

Anderson-Drewery No. 1 Kate Grist, section 36, Lavaca county school land, block NW 1-4, 14 miles southwest of Cisco was setting five-inch casing at 3000 feet.

New operations, three, in this immediate area were heaviest in an adjoining county, Brown. In a proven territory, J. L. McMurray heirs et al was to drill No. 16 J. P. Newton, William Swain No. 145 survey, two miles south from Cross Cut, Brown county. It is 2,123 feet

from the east line and 220 feet from the south line of SE 1-4 William Ewam survey.

Jamison, Pollard and Foster made preparations to drill No. 3 E. W. Arledge, N. B. Mitchell No. 150 survey, three miles from Cross Cut, a 1,900 foot operation, it is 450 feet from the east line and 300 feet from the south line of the Arledge 100 acre lease.

E. H. Hamilton was to drill No. 1 J. V. Sewall, five miles west of Brooksmith, J. M. Stinch survey block 15, to start immediately. Location 1,500 feet from the east line and 1,300 feet from the south line.

As a 1,600 foot activity, A. S. Hickok is to drill No. 3 Guy U. Robinson and J. D. Collett five miles northwest of Strawn, section 68, T&E RR company survey, block 3, Palo Pinto county.

550,000 Gallons of Milk a day for London

LONDON (AP) — Approximately 550,000 gallons of milk come into London daily, according to the Minister of Agriculture, William S. Morrison, in a statement he made in answer to a question in the House of Commons.

Of this amount, about 53 per cent comes from within a radius of 100 miles of London, 30 per cent from within 100 to 150 miles and 7 per cent within 150 to 200 miles.

The 140,000 school children in London are supplied with one-third of a pint of milk daily for the nominal sum of a cent. Another large demand for milk in London has been caused by the increasing number of "milk bars" throughout the city within the last two years.

SCRAP IRON DEMANDED AT PORT HOUSTON

HOUSTON, June 17 (UP)—Boom days have returned to Port Houston because of the heavy export demand for scrap iron.

During the first five months of 1937, more than 160,000 tons of scrap iron and scrap rails have been exported.

The five-month total was compared with the entire 1936 total of 153,000 tons.

The scrap iron rush caused the port to establish a record for the number of locomotive cranes in operation on American waterfronts according to Director J. R. Wait.

The eleven cranes, nine owned by the navigation district, are working 24 hours a day," he said.

"Although I checked closely the records of other ports, I could not find any one port having as many in operation at one time."

Wait discounted re-armament as the cause of heavy exports from the United States.

"War has something to do with it, but many countries which are leading in exports do not seem to have much ambition to enter war. Countries not having their own iron reserves are the leading importers from America."

"Our industry progresses so rapidly that new processes follow one another and daily require new machinery for production, he continued. "From these industries come the millions of tons of scrap iron and steel that is exported."

Wait said it was impossible to forecast the duration of scrap movement.

"General building programs in all countries were curtailed due to the depression, and these nations are attempting to catch up now."

Consequently, as long as they demand iron for commercial enterprises and armament, it will continue at a high rate."

Sailor Safest on Ship, Navy Reports

SEAN PEDRO, Cal., June 17 (UP)—Medical authorities of the navy are unanimous in declaring that the safest place for a sailor is on board his ship instead of on land on shore leave.

The tendency of sailors to take trips on motorcycles when ashore has proved more fatal than the guns of enemy ships in several past wars. Latest statistics just completed by the fleet's medical authorities show that for a number of years approximately 30 per cent of the deaths in the navy are caused by motor vehicle accidents.

Another 10 per cent are due to drowning, but even half of these occur when the sailors are ashore swimming at beaches instead of swimming about their respective ships under rigid surveillance.

Disease accounts for 50 per cent of the deaths in the fleet. While medical authorities find that every year the sick bay loss in the navy is being slowly decreased, nevertheless they find that deaths due to disease are decreasing more rapidly than those due to motor vehicle accidents.

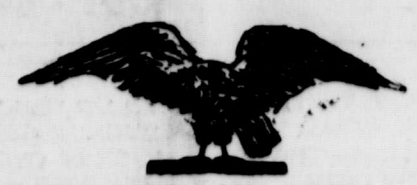

Later a known hijacker was caught in another holdup in the same part of the state. Officers noted the resemblance and decided the first conviction might have been a mistake.

Application was made to Gov. Miriam A. Ferguson for a furlough for the convict. He was taken back to the county where the holdup occurred and placed in the same jail but in a different cell from the known hijacker. Then the two victims of the holdup were called to the jail. Both picked the known hijacker rather than the man they had identified at his trial. He was released.

More recently a Wichita Falls matron was identified in numerous towns in Texas as passer of forged checks on an oil company. She was convicted in several cases and appeals filed.

Before final ruling was made, a woman in prison in Arkansas admitted that it was she who passed the checks. She gave such a complete account of the places visited, the persons seen and other details that officers became convinced they had made a mistake. Charges against the Wichita Falls woman were dropped. The other cases were dismissed. Photographs showed a startling similarity of appearance of the two women.

An amendment to the federal bill creating a new federal judgeship in South Texas provides that the judge appointed must be a resident of the district. That is expected to end the recurrent rumor that Gov. James V. Allred was to be appointed federal judge. His residence is Wichita Falls.

Young Democrats of Texas will have the period of June 20-26 set aside as a "week" by proclamation of Gov. Allred. The time will include the two-day convention of the Young Democrats clubs, to be held in Houston on June 25 and 26.

The proclamation designating a week in honor of the clubs was issued "in recognition of the importance of the Young Democrats in the household of the Lone Star State Democracy," and "in tribute to the party service rendered."

Several bills affecting insane persons were passed at the recent regular session of the Texas legislature. Chief was an act carrying out the constitutionality amendment that received a favorable vote several years ago. It permits temporary commitment for observation, without having a person formally declared insane by a jury verdict.

Another bill of the session provides for appointment of guardians to represent insane persons in divisions of estates. One says that if a person later declared insane enters into a contract before being declared of unsound mind, the contract shall continue in force, in

absence of fraud, until the innocent contractor has been reimbursed for any loss due to voiding the contract. One additional hospital for insane persons was authorized. The State Board of Control members shortly will begin a search for a desirable site in West Texas for the hospital.

Another session act calls for commitment to asylums of persons found criminally insane at the time of committing an offense and still insane at the time of trial.
