Wholehearted Cooperation

Commenting on a recent example of cooperation between the New York Stock Exchange and the Securities and Exchange commission, in which the exchange established new and stringent rulings dealing with margin trading, the Wall Street Journal said: "The interesting and important point in the matter is not the terms of the rules but the fact that they are laid down by the exchange authorities themselves and not by the commission Behind these rules there stands the plenary authority of the governing body of the exchange, which by its nature is both absolute and flexible, besides being unhampered by cumbersome legal processes, so that it can act promptly and with complete effectiveness at a moment's notice."

One of the most notable features of late financial events has been the fine spirit existing between the exchange and SEC. The exchange has in many instances voluntarily gone action in regard to matters with which the law does not deal.

The exchange's service to the investor-especially the small investor, without highly organized facilities for guaging the merit of securities—has been of inestimable value. Financial manipulations are now next to impossible. "Wash selling" has been banned. Dealings on dangerously small margins are outlawed. Every concern listing securities on the exchange is required to make public all pertinent facts bearing on its past experience, present condition and future prospects. A concern which misrepresents not only violates the law, but faces suspension of listing on the exchange.

The upshot of all this is that never before was the investor so thoroughly protected-and never before was it possible to buy and sell securities on so scientific a basis.

'If You Want to Do It Right'

Many years ago when the railroad industry was still suffering acute growing pains, a certain railroad president became aware of the inac quate and obsolete equipment which his company owned, and decided to do something about it. One would naturally think that such a decision would involve the calling in of numerous assistants, a long series of investigations, and the study of voluminous records. But not so with this rails and president. Apparently believing in the old saving that "if you want something done right, do it yourself," he immediately ordered an observation car hooked to the front of a locomotive and journeyed over every mile of his company's property, taking notes on everything from tie spikes to rolling stock and buildings. As a result of this survey, so the story goes, "thousands of new oversize cars were bought, doubling the freight capacity; powerful engines were ordered; and the road was straightened, later called the most magnificent railroad property in

This incident is illustrative of the aggressive leadership and farsighted ability that characterized the "behind the scenes" development and growth of the American railroads.
