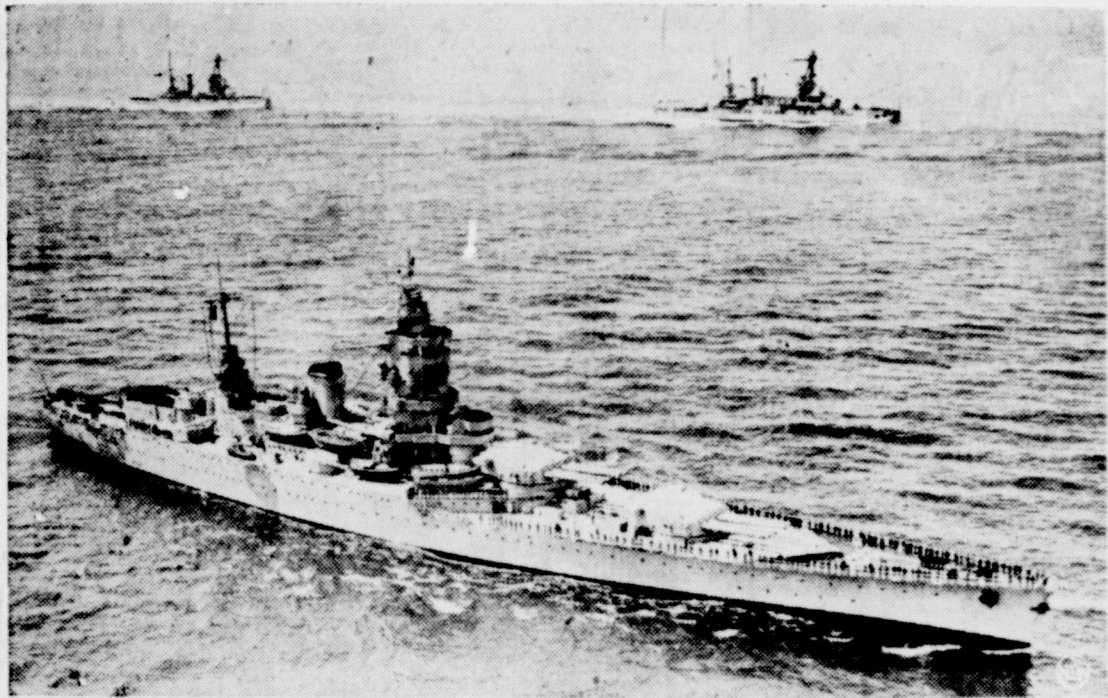

#### NINETEEN MEN OVERPOWERING GUARD, ESCAPE

HUNTSVILLE, June 24 (U.P.)—Seven of 19 escaped convicts from Eastham prison farm were returned to their cells today after the biggest "break" in eight years. They fled Tuesday after overpowering a guard. James Henry Mitchell, 27, serving 72 years for robbery, was the latest captured. Two young men from Crockett caught Mitchell after a two-mile chase near that city today. Two other fugitives with Mitchell escaped into the woods. W. C. Gresham, 30-year-old murderer from Fort Bend county, who had escaped only a month ago from a prison farm in Brazoria county was recaptured near Eastham late last night. O. E. S. Ellingson, general prison manager, said other captures were imminent. A man who forced a taxi driver to take him and a companion to a point near Kilgore last night was identified tentatively today as W. H. Bybee, leader of the break. Officers believed the man's companion was Arthur Whitten, 28, both known to have relatives in East Texas.

#### WORLD NEWS FLASHES ON WIRES TODAY

HARRISBURG, Pa., June 24 (U.P.)—Governor George Earle today ordered modified martial law at Johnstown discontinued at 6 a. m. tomorrow.

CLEVELAND, Ohio, June 24 (U.P.)—Philip Murray, chairman of the Steel Workers Organizing Committee and leader of the steel strike, today offered to accept President Roosevelt as "final arbitrator" in the industrial dispute.

WARREN, Ohio, June 24 (U.P.)—Committee for Industrial Organization leaders ended a general industrial walkout in this steel center today but many union men found doors locked against their return to work. "A contract with the CIO isn't worth a thing," officials of the Brainerd Steel Corporation declared as they barred workmen from their jobs. Three small steel companies were affected by the labor holiday called by the CIO yesterday in a vain attempt to enforce a general industrial strike, in protest against continued operation of pickets and militia-guarded Republic Steel Mills.

WASHINGTON, June 24 (U.P.)—Tom Girdler, Republic Steel Corporation chairman, told the Senate Postoffice Committee today, he would not sign a contract with the CIO even if an election among his employees resulted in the CIO being chosen as their bargaining agent.

#### WEST TEXAS TO GET INCREASE IN OIL ORDER

AUSTIN, June 24 (U.P.)—Oil production for Texas in July was set at 1,385,475 barrels daily in an order issued today by the Texas Railroad Commission. The figures compare with an allowable production of 1,350,262 barrels June 1 and a Federal Bureau of Mines estimated market demand for Texas oil in July of 1,385,100 barrels daily. Increases included West Texas from 172,492 to 177,040.

SAN FRANCISCO (U.P.)—An invention which permits a violin to be played comfortably and without impairing its tone qualities resulted from a music critic's discovery that chin rests affect the tone of a violin. The invention, acclaimed by leading violinists and teachers, makes possible both maximum tonal brilliance and comfort in playing, according to its inventor, Marjory M. Fisher, music editor of the San Francisco News and staff correspondent for Musical America.

WASHINGTON, June 24 (U.P.)—Treasury officials told the joint congressional Tax Committee today that Andrew Mellon, former secretary of treasury, Alfred Sloan, Jr., General Motors chairman, and dozens of other wealthy Americans formed personal holding companies and thereby reduced their income taxes. Internal Revenue Commissioner Guy Helvering emphasized that the methods used were legal. He cited the cases to show the need for legislation to close loopholes in present laws which permit tax avoidance. Other prominent persons mentioned by Helvering as having formed holding companies included Thomas Lamont, New York financier, John J. Rascoe, former democratic national chairman, and several members of the duPont family of Wilmington, Del., and the Fisher family of Detroit. "The atmosphere in which such schemes grow is well illustrated by a recent statement in which J. P. Morgan is reported to have said if the government doesn't know enough to collect its taxes, a man is a fool to pay them. That attitude is fairly general," said Helvering. Helvering submitted to the committee tabulations listing personal holding companies the names of the persons who incorporated them and the manner in which tax deductions were claimed.

DALLAS, June 24 (U.P.)—Organizers for John L. Lewis' Committee for Industrial Organization today carried bruises and vigorous rebuff for their first efforts to organize a strike in the Ford Motor Company assembly plant here. "The three men met employees yesterday in a small cafe across the street from the plant. As they explained their proposal for organization, and if necessary a strike to obtain a wage increase, the employees listened in silence. When the CIO men had finished, a fist shot out and caught one of them on the chin. The three organizers fled; they were pursued and pelted with stones."

#### Red Front Raps Scranton 15 to 3

The Scranton softball team had a hard time getting started last night and went down before the heavy guns of the Red Front sluggers 15 to 3. W. Bailey Little Scranton pitcher hurled a nice game and only gave the Red Front team ten hits but misplays accounted for his downfall. Rylee for the Red Front team gave the Scranton only three hits and Chuck Van Horn who went in to pitch when the game was on ice allowed only two hits. Elliot, little right fielder for the Red Front got three hits out of four times at bat and scored three runs, Elmore also got three hits

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#### 13,000 Volts Fail To Kill Painter

AMARILLO, June 24 (U.P.)—Charles Smith, a painter, felt 13,000 volts of electricity shoot through his body—and he lived to tell about it. Smith stood on a ladder painting a transformer, when the ladder tilted, throwing the painter against a wire carrying 13,000 volts of electricity, many times enough to kill a man under ordinary circumstances. The ladder fell, however, saving Smith's life as he toppled to the ground. Fellow workmen summoned an ambulance. At the hospital the only injury found other than "shock" was a small burn on one hand. Smith described the sensation of the electric charge as "floating."

#### SALESMAN SHOT BY FARMER IN DISAGREEMENT

DALLAS, June 24 (U.P.)—C. R. Wilson, 55, dealer for a farm implement company, was shot eight times with a pistol and critically wounded today as he stood in the lobby of the company's plant. A. W. Morrow, 40, farmer of Rockwall, reported to the sheriff's office a few minutes later and was detained for questioning. He told officers that the shooting followed an argument regarding the purchase of farm equipment.

#### Device Measuring Sound is Invented

FORT WORTH (U.P.)—You would never believe it, but the quietest place in town is not the graveyard but the local night club at 10 o'clock in the morning. That was the discovery here recently of Sound Engineer P. K. Lipscomb of Houston, demonstrating a device by which sound is measured. The sensitive recorder measures sound in "decibels" and can record the sound of your heartbeat. Lipscomb sent out to find Fort Worth's "quietest spot"—and got a few surprises. He chose an isolated spot in the cemetery. No funerals were in progress, but the wind howled and trees creaked while an airplane droned overhead. The "noise machine" kicked up to 48 decibels.

#### TEX. RANGERS FILE CHARGES AGAINST MEN

FORT WORTH, June 24 (U.P.)—New violence was reported today in the Lone Star Gas company strike as Texas Rangers prepared to file charges against strikers accused of interfering with non-union employees. Six alleged strikers confronted five service workers in an alley today and pelted them with rocks. Another workman declared in county court at law that he was struck with a pick handle. None of the fights caused serious injuries. Ranger Captain Fred McDaniel in charge of ten other rangers here, sought the arrest of the accused men. Warrants were issued for alleged strikers who engaged in fights with three separate two-men service crews Wednesday.

#### BURGLARS ENJOY HUMOR EAST BRAINTREE, Mass. (U.P.)

Safe-crackers with a sense of humor broke into the office of the Shepard Coal Company here and opened four safes. Before leaving the thieves placed a burglar insurance policy on a table.

#### PRESBYTERIANS INSTALLING CURTAINS IN NEW BUILDINGS

All forces of the Presbyterian church are busy today at the encampment grounds getting ready for the events here next week. The men and boys lead by the indomitable pastor Rev. M. H. Applewhite are screening the dining hall and kitchen, installing electric and telephone service today, and placing cots and two tents. The ladies are also busy. Circles are making dressing tables, curtaining windows, calculating interiors and generally dressing up the units built by the local church. They are doing a splendid work for their church and for their young people's organizations. Circles one and two are making the dressing tables for the girls dormitory; Circle Two is making curtains for the girls dormitory and calculating the interior of the building; Circle Three is making the curtains for the dining hall and kitchen; The young people of the church are to provide the curtains for the boys dormitory. About 100 cots have been installed and two tents are to be erected, one for the men's faculty and one for the dietician and her staff. A man did rather a unique thing the other day. Thirty minutes after his marriage he took out life insurance in behalf of his bride, and made his will in her favor. The witnesses to the wedding witnessed the will.

That was the most sensible and sound thing a groom could do except get married. And could anything start a man off on a better footing with his wife? Could he do anything that would make his bride feel and perhaps say, "I certainly have a man who will protect me; I am married to someone whom I can trust. I have a mate who is planning for my welfare."

Every man who has a wife should have a will. And he should have life insurance, too, unless he is so rich he does not need it; then by all means he should have it, because he won't feel the cost of it, and something might happen to his money. Yet there are tens of thousands, yes, hundreds of thousands of men who have been married for years who have neither will nor insurance, and who could just as well have both. Why have they neglected this protection of the woman whom they have sworn to protect?

Some men are touchy about making a will and taking out life insurance. Some men pout if the wife even hints that she would like to have things fixed so she wouldn't be thrown into the street should they die. Some men don't like to think about dying. They want to kid themselves along with the idea that they are going to live forever and bring home the pay check, and personally attend to disbursements. They shut their eyes to the reality that all persons previously inhabiting this earth have died, excepting Christ, the Son of God.

Every couple who marry must face the fact that one or the other must die first. If that one is the man, then what about the woman? What sort of fix will she be in? Will she have to get a job at the Five-and-Ten? Will she be obliged to marry to live? Will poverty be added to her loneliness? Or will her husband leave her something to live on? And will he have that something so fixed that those whom he does not want to have it cannot take it away from her?

Life insurance is the quickest way of building up an estate. And the will is the definite way of providing so that the wife will get such of his property as the husband wants her to have. Men who die without wills leave their wives at the mercy of others who may be good or who may be bad; or whose judgment may be bad though their intentions may be good.

BEHIND THE SCENES IN WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON—The difficulty of administering a wage and hour law in the likely event that the pending Black-Connery bill is passed will be considerable. It is not expected to be insuperable, however, and one would find it easier to magnify the trouble ahead if eight states had not had experience administering minimum wage laws of their own.

The federal wage and hour law is modeled closely along the lines of the New York and other state laws. In fact, it was drafted for the most part by the man who wrote the New York law—Ben Cohen, one of the administration's most important and most retiring brain trusters. The big difference is that the New York law applied to women and minors, whereas the federal law would apply to both sexes.

Only a fraction of the population would be directly affected by the bill, since it is estimated that about 3,000,000 persons in the industries to be covered are earning less than 40 cents an hour, and that about 6,000,000 are working in excess of 40 hours a week. The bill leaves local service industries and small businesses to the states and no minimum wage is fixed where annual income exceeds \$1300.

The Senate and House labor committees were told about administration phases by Eleanor M. Herrick, a member of New York's first minimum wage body and who may be appointed to the proposed Federal Labor Standards Board. Mrs. Herrick was a former production manager in the textile industry and served with NRA. She is now New York regional director of the National Labor Relations Board.

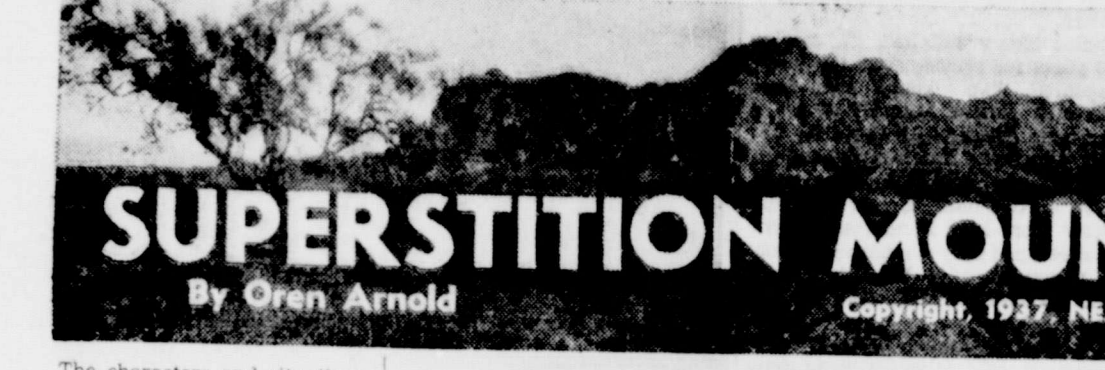

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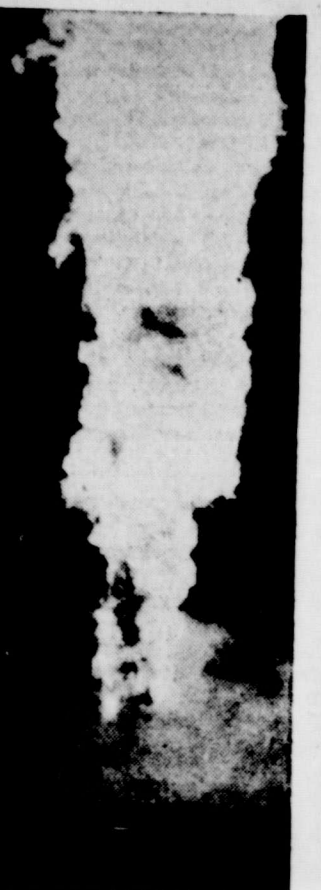

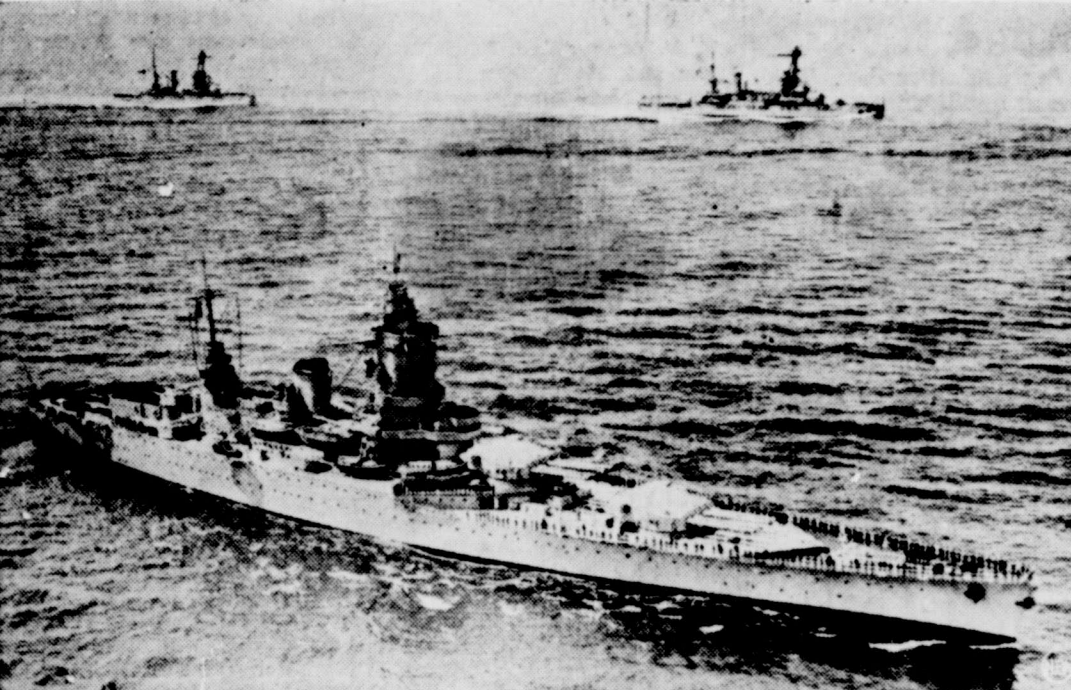

#### NINETEEN MEN OVERPOWERING GUARD, ESCAPE

HUNTSVILLE, June 24 (UP)—Seven of 19 escaped convicts from Eastham prison farm were returned to their cells today after the biggest "break" in eight years. They fled Tuesday after overpowering a guard. James Henry Mitchell, 27, serving 72 years for robbery, was the latest captured. Two young men from Crockett caught Mitchell after a two-mile chase near that city today. Two other fugitives with Mitchell escaped into the woods. W. C. Gresham, 30-year-old murderer from Fort Bend county, who had escaped only a month ago from a prison farm in Brazoria county was recaptured near Eastham late last night. O. E. S. Ellingson, general prison manager, said other captures were imminent. A man who forced a taxi driver to take him and a companion to a point near Kilgore last night was identified tentatively today as W. H. Bybee, leader of the break. Officers believed the man's companion was Arthur Whitten, 28, both known to have relatives in East Texas.

#### France Guards Secrets of the Dunkerque, Mystery Man-of-War



The mighty Dunkerque, super-battleships, slips like a thin menacing projectile of animated steel through calm waters during naval maneuvers off France's west coast. The secrecy with which French naval authorities have veiled the details of its construction makes the Dunkerque a mystery craft, said to be the most heavily armored and fastest fighting craft afloat.

#### PRACTICE IS LEGAL; MORE LAWS NEEDED

WASHINGTON, June 24 (UP)—Treasury officials told the joint congressional Tax Committee today that Andrew Mellon, former secretary of treasury, Alfred Sloan, Jr., General Motors chairman, and dozens of other wealthy Americans formed personal holding companies and thereby reduced their income taxes. Internal Revenue Commissioner Guy Helvering emphasized that the methods used were legal. He cited the cases to show the need for legislation to close loopholes in present laws which permit tax avoidance. Other prominent persons mentioned by Helvering as having formed holding companies included Thomas Lamont, New York financier, John J. Rascob, former democratic national chairman, and several members of the duPont family of Wilmington, Del., and the Fisher family of Detroit. "The atmosphere in which such schemes grow is well illustrated by a recent statement in which J. P. Morgan is reported to have said 'if the government doesn't know enough to collect its taxes, a man is a fool to pay them.' That attitude is fairly general," said Helvering. Helvering submitted to the committee tabulations listing personal holding companies the names of the persons who incorporated them and the manner in which tax deductions were claimed.

#### 13,000 Volts Fail To Kill Painter

AMARILLO, June 24 (UP)—Charles Smith, a painter, felt 13,200 volts of electricity shoot through his body—and he lived to tell about it. Smith stood on a ladder painting a transformer, when the ladder tilted, throwing the painter against a wire carrying 13,200 volts of electricity, many times enough to kill a man under ordinary circumstances. The ladder fell, however, saving Smith's life as he toppled to the ground. Fellow workmen summoned an ambulance. At the hospital the only injury found other than "shock" was a small burn on one hand. Smith described the sensation of the electric charge as "floating." "I felt like I was taking a little ride," he said. "I seemed to be floating around in the air trying to find a place to light. The sensation was not uncomfortable, but rather pleasant, as if I were flying." The accident blew an emergency fuse and caused temporary curtailment in one part of the city.

#### SALESMAN SHOT BY FARMER IN DISAGREEMENT

DALLAS, June 24 (UP)—C. R. Wilson, 55, dealer for a farm implement company, was shot eight times with a pistol and critically wounded today as he stood in the lobby of the company's plant. A. W. Morrow, 40, farmer of Rockwall, reported to the sheriff's office a few minutes later and was detained for questioning. He told officers that the shooting followed an argument regarding the purchase of farm equipment.

#### Device Measuring Sound is Invented

FORT WORTH (UP)—You would never believe it, but the quietest place in town is not the graveyard but the local night club at 19 o'clock in the morning. That was the discovery here recently of Sound Engineer P. K. Lipscomb of Houston, demonstrating a device by which sound is measured. The sensitive recorder measures sound in "decibels" and can record the sound of your heartbeat. Lipscomb sent out to find Fort Worth's "quietest spot"—and got a few surprises. He chose an isolated spot in the cemetery. No funerals were in progress, but the wind howled and trees creaked while an airplane droned overhead. The "noise machine" kicked up to 48 decibels.

#### TEX. RANGERS FILE CHARGES AGAINST MEN

Warrants were issued for alleged strikers who engaged in fights with three separate two-men service crews Wednesday.

#### WORLD NEWS FLASHES ON WIRES TODAY

HARRISBURG, Pa., June 24 (UP)—Governor George Earle today ordered modified martial law at Johnstown discontinued at 6 a. m. tomorrow. CLEVELAND, Ohio, June 24 (UP)—Philip Murray, chairman of the Steel Workers Organizing Committee and leader of the steel strike, today offered to accept President Roosevelt as "final arbitrator" in the industrial dispute. WARREN, Ohio, June 24 (UP)—Committee for Industrial Organization leaders ended a general industrial walkout in this steel center today but many union men found doors locked against their return to work. "A contract with the CIO isn't worth a thing," officials of the Brainard Steel Corporation declared as they barred workmen from their jobs. Three small steel companies were affected by the labor holiday called by the CIO yesterday in a vain attempt to enforce a general industrial strike, in protest against continued operation of pickets and militia-guarded Republic Steel Mills. WASHINGTON, June 24 (UP)—Tom Girdler, Republic Steel Corporation chairman, told the Senate Postoffice Committee today, he would not sign a contract with the CIO even if an election among his employees resulted in the CIO being chosen as their bargaining agent.

#### WEST TEXAS TO GET INCREASE IN OIL ORDER

AUSTIN, June 24 (UP)—Oil production for Texas in July was set at 1,385,475 barrels daily in an order issued today by the Texas Railroad Commission. The figures compare with an allowable production of 1,350,262 barrels June 1 and a Federal Bureau of Mines estimated market demand for Texas oil in July of 1,385,100 barrels daily. Increases included West Texas from 172,492 to 177,040.

#### SPANISH SITUATION DYNAMITE SEEMS NEAR EXPLOSION TODAY

The dynamite underlying the Spanish situation appeared close to being exploded today. The two dictators, Hitler and Mussolini, whether bluffing or not, presented a threat to the peace of Europe which belied their assertion that they want an amicable solution of the conflict. At the same time that a foreign office spokesman in Berlin announced that "Germany considers the Leipzig incident closed" a powerful German fleet was sailing from southern Portugal toward the Mediterranean coast of Spain. The "Leipzig incident" meaning Germany's charges that a loyalist submarine had tried to torpedo the German cruiser Leipzig caused Germany and Italy to withdraw from the International Patrol of Spain. As Germany concentrated the bulk of her fleet in the Mediterranean, Italy was reported to be planning to maintain a battle fleet in Spanish waters "to protect Italian shipping." Britain and France were alarmed by the possibility. The French-British coalition feared that the two fascist nations planned to act on the slightest excuse to move into Spain and insure the victory of the Franco insurgents. Mrs. Gordon Tomlinson was called to Snyder today on account of the serious illness of her mother.

#### FORD EMPLOYEES PELT STRIKERS WITH STONES

DALLAS, June 24 (UP)—Organizers for John L. Lewis' Committee for Industrial Organization today carried bruises and vigorous rebuff for their first efforts to organize a strike in the Ford Motor Company assembly plant here. The three men met employees yesterday in a small cafe across the street from the plant. As they explained their proposal for organization, and if necessary a strike to obtain a wage increase, the employees listened in silence. When the CIO men had finished, a fist shot out and caught one of them on the chin. The three organizers fled, they were pursued and pelted with stones.

# MEDICAL SALVO FIRED ON MASS AMERICAN MIND

 VIENNA, June 24 (UP)—Bitter criticism of American mentality and of American medical practices, resulting from this mentality, were voiced by Dr. Albert Lorenz, son of the famous "bloodless surgeon," Adolf Lorenz in an article on "American and European Orthopedics," published in the "Vienna Clinical Weekly."

Dr. Lorenz, an orthopedist like his father, has spent six months in the United States every year since 1923.

Being an apostle of bloodless surgery, he naturally is disappointed by the readiness with which American doctors undertake operations in order to achieve "quick results."

According to Dr. Lorenz, "the entire life in America is permeated by hysteria and mass suggestion. Hysteria, especially in women, accompanies every orthopedic ailment. . . . It is no overstatement to say that, among the better classes in America, one hardly ever meets a woman patient with normal psychic reactions. A doctor, guided merely by reason and logic, runs up against walls of glass. Hence the surprising popularity of psycho-analysis on the other side of the ocean."

**Calls U. S. Land of Hysteria**  
 "American orthopedic therapeutics are," Dr. Lorenz wrote, "closely connected with general American mentality to which both doctor and patient are subjected in equal measure. It is in conformity with the feminism of the country, ruled directly or indirectly by women for women, that America is the land of mass hysteria and mass suggestion. Mass suggestion reaches its pseudo-scientific climax in the strange phenomenon of American advertising, taught as a pseudo-science at the universities, which means the acme of diabolic bamboozling. This advertising also affects medical practice."

As a gregarious animal, the American, according to Dr. Lorenz, "half subconsciously wishes to standardize and schematize all and everything, to reduce everything to a brief, comprehensive formula. The brilliant formulation of such slogans deceives him on the fact that seldom in life, and hardly ever in natural sciences, the manifold and complicated conditions can be compressed into a brief, glittering slogan. But, because the slogan means more to him than truth, he consciously cripples the latter in favor of the former. An American considers it a personal defeat of his energy, prized above everything by him, if one of his enterprises proceeds slowly. We want quick results! is one of the proudest American slogans. . . . In the domain of sciences this slogan is a complete absurdity."

**Compares Two Types**  
 In his own special branch Dr. Lorenz found that "the American orthopedist with respect to the surgeon suffers from a sort of subconscious inferiority complex. The American orthopedist always takes good care to appear as surgeon-like as possible, because he fears to be thrown into the same category with his ancestors, the bandagists, the teachers of gymnastics and the corn operators. This may be a subconscious reason for their conspicuous readiness to operate upon their patients. Doctor and patient alike are eager for the newest operations. Displaying rich casuistry, the doctor frequently seeks to forestall a colleague, while the patient is afraid of appearing un-modern and un-American. If he does not willingly submit to the new operation."

On the other hand, Dr. Lorenz readily admits that, in contrast to widespread European opinion, American science in all branches is long past the spoon age, and he highly praises American medical literature, although he does not approve of many American medical practices.

**Alkali Looms Large As Texas Commodity**

AUSTIN, June 24 (UP)—Alkali, long a popular comic character of the arid west, has become a highly esteemed citizen and man of business. For alkali loomed large this year as a leading industry in Texas.

One of the state's largest industrial plants is busy night and day at Corpus Christi turning alkali into chemical products from bicarbonate of soda to caustics used in refining crude oil from the great East Texas oil field.

Oyster shells and salt from the Gulf of Mexico, limestone from the hills and prairies, are mixed with crude ammonia and coke in various processes. The salt comes from the Gulf of Mexico by indirect route. It is pumped from wells at Benavides, many miles inland, where it is drawn from 1,800 feet below the surface. A 60-mile pipe line carries it to the manufacturing plant on the gulf shore.

Gypsum is another alkali industry grown into the big business class. The once berated dust of western plains is converted into building materials. Plaster, wall-board and sheet rock are some of the commercial forms in which it is marketed.

**Splenic Extract**  
Aids Bone Knitting

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) — Broken bones heal faster when the patient is fed with splenic extract. Dr. Thomas Foster Wheelon of Richmond, Va., reported in a recent issue of Modern Medicine, a medical magazine published here.

Administration of splenic extract speeds the firm union of the bones and also improves bone condition, the physician said. Since bones are composed largely of calcium, it is probable the splenic extract stimulates the deposit of calcium in the bone.

Dr. Wheelon has been using this treatment since 1931, and reported that in 45 cases only three failed to produce satisfactory results.

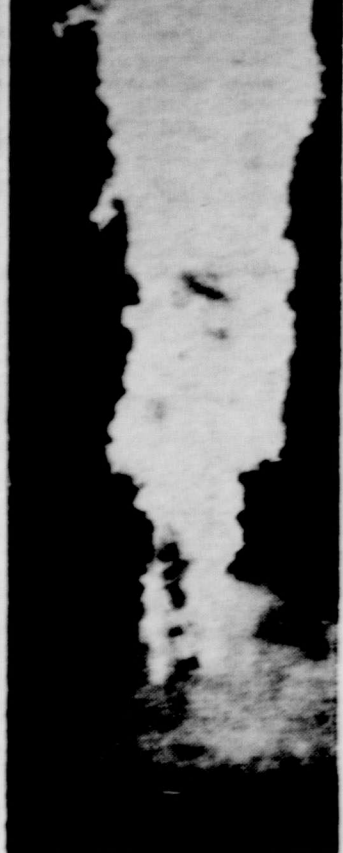

### Texas Wild Turkey Crop Unusually Good

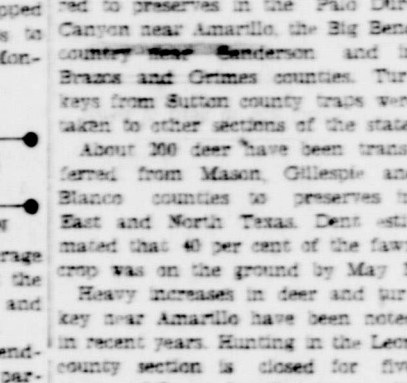
KERRVILLE, June 24 (AP)—The Texas wild turkey crop will be best this year since 1928, according to J. J. Dent, of Kerrville, director of the State Game Preserve. Dent reported a banner turkey year for Texas after he made a tour of the state recently.

A total of 484 turkeys were trapped on the King Ranch in Kinney and Willacy counties and transferred to preserves in the Palo Duro Canyon near Amarillo, the Big Bend country near Terrell and in Brewar and Grimes counties. Turkeys from Sutton county traps were taken to other sections of the state.

About 200 deer have been transferred from Mason, Gillespie and Blanco counties to preserves in East and North Texas. Dent estimated that 40 per cent of the fawn crop was on the ground by May 7.

Heavy increases in deer and turkey near Amarillo have been noted in recent years. Hunting in the Leon county section is closed for five years, while no hunting is permitted at any time on the ranch near Amarillo.

GREAT PLAINS SEEN GUARDED BY TREE BELT

By FRED O. BAILEY

United Press Staff Correspondent WASHINGTON, June 24 (AP)—More than 100,000,000 trees planted in the Great Plains shelterbelt...

The shelterbelt, at which many persons scoffed, is a "complete success," Earl W. Tinker, assistant chief of the forest service, said.

The shelterbelt extends from Texas almost to the Canadian border. It ranges from a few hundred yards to several miles wide. In places there are several stripes of "belts."

CCC Enrollees Aid The forest service has planted approximately 35,000,000 of these trees. About 30,000,000 were distributed to farmers for woodland and shelterbelt planting.

Federal and state nurseries have produced an additional 150,000,000 trees for planting. The Forest Service has distributed more than 50,000,000 trees for private plantings during the past two years.

Their effectiveness will increase as they grow, he said.

"Many thousands of young trees planted during the 1935 season are now 6 feet high and already are bringing about a lessening of wind movement within their protective range," Tinker said.

Some 16 Feet High "Heights up to 16 feet have been noted in some instances," he said. "I saw fields of cantaloupes and watermelons growing in what were formerly dust fields, protected by rows of newly planted trees."

Trees found to have made the best growth were the green ash, cottonwood, Chinese elm, red cedar, and Ponderosa pine.

"Experience gained thus far in shelterbelt and windbreak planting demonstrates the value of this type of work in the Great Plains region where an urgent necessity exists for an extensive tree planting program," the Forest Service said.

Bridge Closed; Bid Made for New Span

Fear of testifying in court is groundless, believes Superior Judge Howard C. Speakman of Phoenix.

The tall, distinguished justice said, "There isn't a thing to fear in court—other than your own truth."

"The same rules apply to all," he declared. "If a person doesn't know the answer to a question, he or she would say so. No witness should stall around and leave the impression he or she is trying to think up an answer."

In Arizona, murder trial witnesses whose false testimony leads to execution also can be put to death if their perjury is uncovered.

"There is no mystery about being called to the witness stand," he says, "simply be yourself."

He recalled a case he once prosecuted in which his "star witness" suffered a severe case of "witness stand fright."

"I noticed he was a bit pale," the judge said, "but thought nothing of it. I asked him to state his name, and he finally got it out after gulping several times. I asked him several more questions, and

he finally answered with considerable difficulty. "Then he seemed to wilt, and asked for water."

As lawyers and court attaches dashed for water, the witness slumped in the chair and fainted. "He was just plain scared when he faced an audience," the judge explained.

SALARIES SET FOR TEACHERS IN SCHOOLS

AUSTIN, June 24 (AP)—A minimum salary for Texas public school teachers elected in 1939 was ordered by a committee of the Department of Education Saturday.

Teachers in elementary and high schools of independent school districts must receive a minimum of \$109 a month for nine months of the regular term, and raises over that amount must be based upon college training, experience and tenure rather than the grade taught.

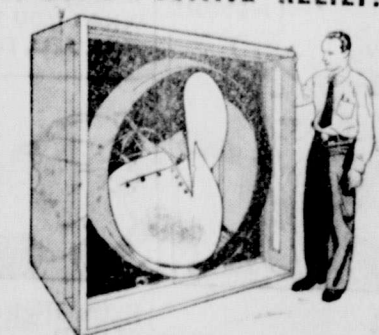

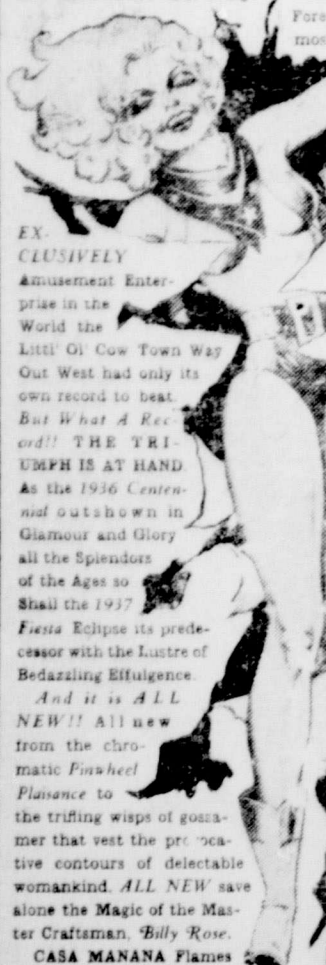

### Federal Staff Growing Larger

WASHINGTON—Uncle Sam's official family is larger now than at any other time since the world war. Civil Service Commission statistics show.

Employees on the public payrolls not counting the personnel of the legislative, judicial and military departments on April 1 of this year. The total includes both civil service and non-civil service officials and workers.

The 629,193 total does not include CCC workers nor the persons on relief. On June 30, 1933, the total was 572,091, making an increase of 257,102 in less than four years and of approximately 5,000 in the last eleven months.

Since 1926, the number of civil service workers increased 18 per cent from 422,309 to 498,725. In the same period non-civil service workers increased more than 200 per cent from 106,242 to 325,534. Since 1933, the number of non-civil service workers has risen 180 per cent while civil service employes have increased 10 per cent in that time.

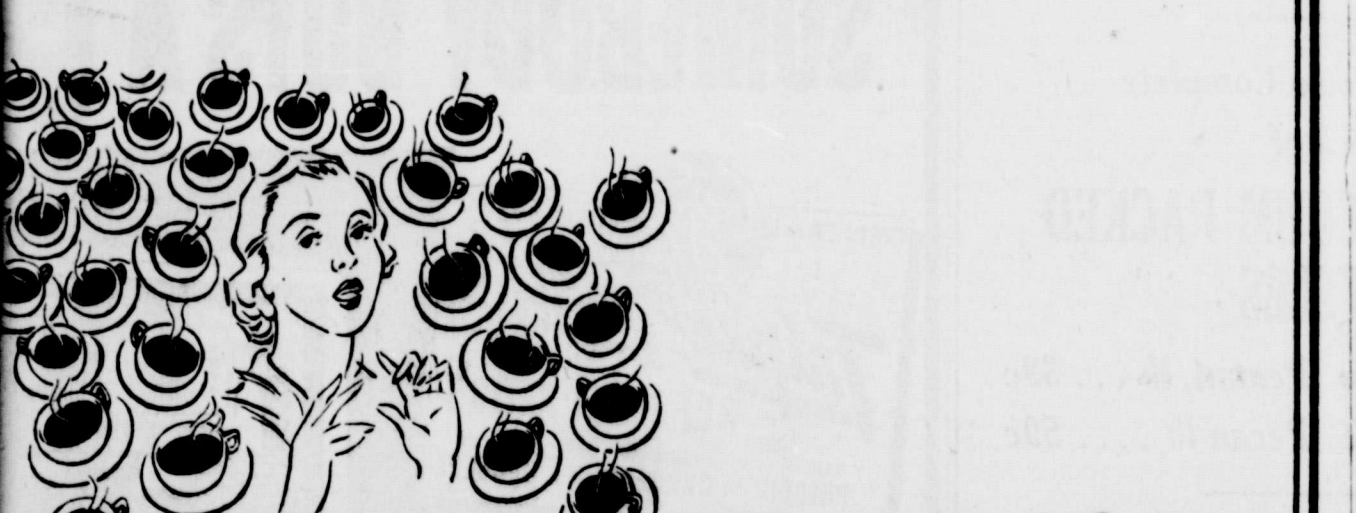

### GIRL TO SERVE LAMPS OF CHINA

CLEVELAND (UP)—Miss Haeng Wong, 20-year-old girl of the Orient will be graduated from Penn College here in July as a full-fledged electrical engineer — and the only member of her sex to stay on at the electrical engineering laboratory after the first year.

It wasn't easy competing with American boys, but Haeng had two important objectives toward which she was working.

First she had ambitions to be an electrical engineer. The petite Chinese girl wanted to aid in the work of lighting the dark corners of China.

The second reason was a boon to the first. She likes to work. Haeng enjoys putting and fussing with radios, electric motors

and high voltage.

She has done so well at Penn that she is being graduated with the credit of five years' work done in three years' time. Since starting her work three years ago she has taken a double-schedule course attending classes winter and summer, six days a week.

Haeng's father gave her the choice of any college subject.

"A good doctor heals his fellow men. A good lawyer saves his country," he told her. "Take your choice."

The indication was that Haeng's father wanted his daughter to learn something through which she could serve her people. It is electricity that is lighting the lamps of China today and electricity that carries thoughts through the air. The country is badly in need of expert technicians—Haeng chose electrical engineering. Her family has been in this country nearly eight years. Haeng's father occupied himself

with various professions during that period. Her family is waiting until she is graduated, then they all can go back to China.

Haeng expects to attend the University of Nanking for the study of Chinese culture. Then she hopes to join the government service as a radio or electrical engineer.

Politics do not interest the progressive Far East girl. But she hopes she can do her share of giving light to China.

### Fishermen Have War To Protect Salmon

ASTORIA Ore. (UP)—Seals are making such heavy inroads on the salmon runs near the mouth of the Columbia river that fishermen have banded together to ask that an extra \$2.50 be added to fishing licenses to finance a war of extermination.

The seals have their breeding grounds on both the Oregon and Washington banks of the big river, and on islands near the river mouth. The most successful way of taking them has been the installation of big hooks near the water's edge.

The state of Oregon now pays a bounty on seals. Fishermen have picked up a few odd dollars by bagging the animals, but most of those shot cannot be recovered because of the deep, fast water.

The Columbia River Fishermen's Protective union reports that the seals are increasing heavily, and have been sighted swimming in great herds after salmon.

### OIL ACTIVITY IN EASTLAND COUNTY AREA

EASTLAND, June 24 — One well was spudded and another had production to mark activities in oil development of Eastland county last week.

Today the Barnett Petroleum Corporation and J. L. Reeves No. 1A Downtain, one and a half mile southeast of Eastland, section 2 E. T. R. R. survey, block 6, 1,000 feet from the east line and 1,250 feet from the south line, had run 6-8 inch casing and cemented pipe in the completion of the well which had shown oil from 1,455 to 1,463 feet.

The well topped the sand at 1,430 feet and, said company representatives, was still in the sand at 1,463 feet. The oil showed gravity of 40.4.

The well was open hole from 825 feet, the depth to which extended 10-inch pipe from the surface. Operators have over 900 acres blocked in the area.

Coincidentally the well spudded was on land owned as the same producer on which the Barnett and Reeves is certain as a producer.

Monark Oil and Gas company was spudded as the No. 1 L. C. Downtain, four miles northeast of Eastland, 200 feet from the north 400 feet from the west of the northeast quarter, section 14, block 4 H. & T. C. R. R. survey.

The well is planned as a 3,400-foot test, a 600 foot offset to the south from a well drilled by New Southern Oil and Gas company during the boom on what then was the Baumgardner land. The old Baumgardner, designated as the No. 3 on the offset tract from which No. 1 Downtain is being drilled, is reported as having been a producer but was lost when casing collapsed and the hole was lost. The other two wells also were reported as producers in the boom.

Hickok Producing & Development company No. 2 Grover S. Cleveland, section 477, S. P. R. R. company survey, eight miles northwest of Cisco, was rigging up in search of

gas production at 4,000 feet as found in the No. 1 Cleveland in 1935.

Hofmann & Page company No. 1 Mrs. M. E. Holcomb, two miles northeast of Eastland, John House survey, was drilling at 1,445 feet.

Gallagher & Lawson et al No. 1, Bobbie Terry, one half mile south of Desdemona, the test being drilled to a contemplated depth of 5,500 feet to test all possible producing strata to the granite, was below 1,400 feet.

Anderson-Drewery, No. 1 Kate Grist, section 36, Lavaca county school land, block NW 1-4, 14 miles southwest of Cisco, was fishing at approximately 3,010 feet.

L. A. Thompson No. 1 Garodifox, league 2, McLennan county school land, block 28, seven miles south of Ranger, was shut down after drilling to 500 feet.

Hickory et al No. 1 W. N. Martin, in the same vicinity as the 5,500-foot Desdemona well, two miles southeast of Desdemona, but over in Erath county, had resumed after shutting down for repairs slightly under 100 feet.

In the Railroad Commission office here R. N. Ragsdale of Brownwood filed application to drill No. 1 John Tabor, H. & T. C. R. R. survey, block 37, Brown county. It is planned as a 2,500-foot well unless oil or gas is found at a lesser depth. It is about two miles northeast of Byrds Store, Texas. Location is 170 feet from the west line and 1,320 feet from the north line of the H. & T. B. R. R. survey.

### Bee Sting Causes Loss of Ball Game

CONCORD, Mass. (UP)—A bee saved the day for the all-star baseball team at Massachusetts Reformatory.

A bee stung Pitcher George Johnson of the West Cardinals team just as he was winding up to pitch. Johnson didn't make the pitch—the umpire called it a balk. A prisoner on third base, who was attempting to steal home, was allowed to score on the balk, tying the game.
