

And he should have life insurance, too, unless he is so rich he does not need it; then by all means he should have it, because he won't feel the cost of it, and something might happen to his money. Yet there are tens of thousands, yes, hundreds of thousands of men who have been married for years who have neither will nor insurance, and who could just as well have both. Why have they neglected this protection of the woman whom they have sworn to protect?

Some men are teachy about making a will and taking out life insurance. Some men pout if the wife even hints that she would like to have things fixed so she wouldn't be thrown into the street should they die. Some men don't like to think about dying. They want to kid themselves along with the idea that they are going to live forever and bring home the pay check, and personally attend to disbursements. They shut their eyes to the reality that all persons previously inhabiting this earth have died, t excepting Christ, the Son of God.

Every couple who marry must face the fact that one or the other must die first. If that one is the man, then what about the woman? What sort of fix will she be in? Life insurance is the quickest way of building up an estate. And the will is the definite way of providing so that the wife will get such of his property as the husband wants her to have. Are Begun in Texas

MARLIN, June 23 (U.P)-Work has begun nine miles north of Marlin on the Brushy Creek Watershed Studies, one of 10 watershed studies projects being established in the United States by the U. S. Department of Agriculture, Soil Conservation Service.

Already the government has purchased 841.3 acres of land for the project at a cost of \$76,000. In addition, it is estimated that buildings to be erected will cost \$50,000 for its expected life of 30 years.

Detailed observation and experiments in erosion, rainfall, water control, run-off, soils and conservation methods will be under the direction of Ralph W. Baird, manager of the project.

Baird was formerly connected with the Tyler soil erosion control experiment station and succeeded D B. Krimgolf, assistant director of watershed studies projects in Washington. Krimgolf located the first of the 10 projects allowed by Congress in Coshocton county, Ohio in 1935.

The Brushy Creek project is co-operating with the Texas Experi-ment Station of A. & M. College and the Temple and Tyler soil sta-tions. In addition to the 841.3 acres purchased by the government, cooperative agreements will be made in Falls county for observation on 5,000 acres surrounding the project site for checking and comparitive


