



Fertilizer Triples Sudan Grass Yield to Watch for Insects

Five acres sudan fertilized early in May with T. V. A. Triple Superphosphate by J. D. Fittman of Scranton, has made three times as much growth per acre as adjoining sudan not fertilized, according to Elmo V. Cook, County Agent.

Pittman applied 100 pounds of fertilizer per acre two weeks beenstrating the high test phosphate essee Valley Authority.

A similar application of the same farm by Henry Pittman has made double the growth of untreated sudan. Soil on both of these farms is windthorst similar to 80 per cent of the soil of Eastland county.
