Further questioning, however revealed a practical unanimity on the basic reason for non-attendance at church, Stated in many different ways, it boiled down to the following five points, which may be summed up in the statement that the Protestant church has nothing to offer its members:

1. The church, as a center of charity, has been replaced by secular, civic and county chest funds, administered by businessmen and social workers. And a vast part of relief has been taken over by the government.

2. The church, as a fountain of healing, which once offered miraculous cures through faith and the "laying on of hands", has been replaced as physician by the science of medicine.

3. The church, which once exorcised devils from the mind of man and restored tranquility of soul, is being rechologists, who hold that crime and abnormality are the result of disordered glands, improper nourishment, disease, poverty, ignorance. 4. The church, once the cradle of education and the

founder of many colleges, is no longer the keeper of knowledge and the source of education. Modern science springs from the laboratory. Knowledge is mined and pieced together through countless agencies, most of them secular. Newspapers, magazines, radio, books, motion pictures and nonsectarian schools disseminate educacion.

5. Great art and music, once aspired by the church are now secular and, for the most part, have nothing to do with organized religion.

Most of the people questioned said they believed in God, believed in prayer, but having their belief, felt that the church had nothing further to offer them. In an effort to widen the inquiry, the editors of the magazine have invited their readers to comment on the findings.

"I think the day is not far off when legislation will be enacted to make the fingerprinting of every citizen compulsory," Keller said. "More and more the value of fingerprinting for civil identification is

being realized. "The national bureau of civil identification was organized in 1933 The figures show an average of 50 .-

000 civilians send their fingerprints to be filed each month .That is about one-third of the fingerprints, including those of criminals, entered in the files monthly. As for practical operation of the

movement. Keller said that children could be fingerprinted upon entering school, with an accurate record of family histories, including names of close relatives, nationality, religion and the guardian's occupa-

"One set of the records could be kept in school files," he continued. The others could be kept in state and national bureaus.

The present civil identification bureau in Washington serves many purposes in commercial, civil and private life.

In event of catastrophe, identification often is difficult, he points out. In train and automobile wrecks, casualties at sea, there are many unidentified dead whose identity could be established if universal fingerprinting were adopted.
