When is a Man a Mason?

To the question, "When is a Man a Mason?" John Fort Newton made this answer:

"When he can look out over the rivers, the hills and the far horizon with a profound sense of his littleness in the vast scheme of things and yet have faith, hope and courage, which is the root of every virtue. When he knows that, deep down in his heart, every man is as noble, as vile, as lovely as himself; and seeks to know, to forgive and love his fellow-man. When he knows how to sympathize with men in their sorrows, yea even in their sins, knowing that each man fights a hard fight against many odds. When he has learned how to make friend with himself. When he loves flowers, can hunt the birds without a gun; and feel the thrill of an old forgotten joy when he hears the laughter of a child. When he can be happy and high-spirited amid the meaner drudgery of life. When star-crowns, trees and the glint of sunshine on the flowing waters submerge the thought of one much loved and long dead. When no voice of distress reaches his ear in vain and no hand seeks his aid without response. When he finds good in every faith that helps any man lay hold on divine things, and sees religious meaning in life whatever the name of that faith may be. When he can look into a wayside puddle and see something beyond the mud, observe a forlorn fellow mortal and see something beyond him. When he knows how to pray; how to love; how to hope. When he has kept faith with himself, with his fellowman; with his God; in his hand a sword for evil, in his heart a bit of song; glad to live and not afraid to die. Such a man has found the only real secret to Masonry and the one it is trying to give all the world."

Sen. Robinson Death a Heavy Blow

The sudden death of Senator Robinson of Arkansas, the majority leader, has removed one of the most respected senators and astute parliamentarians from the national scene. And it marks a heavy blow to an Administration faced with the first important Senate revolt against its legislative plans.

The work of the majority leader is to line up Senators in support of White House measures. No leader ever worked harder at this, or did it more successfully, than Mr. Robinson. Few Senators, it is felt, could do a difficult and often thankless job as well. The president's program will probably again have as ardent or popular a champion in the senate. Mr. Robinson's death may likewise hasten adjournment. A combination of the intense Washington summer heat and the belief that the introduction of more major bills can only lead to prolonged, futile debate is causing a growing sentiment on the part of Congressmen that the wise thing to do is to pass the necessary appropriation bills and go home.

BEHIND THE SCENES IN WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON.—Certain men very close to the White House, convinced that the Democratic party is going to split and frothing with impatience over the deal, already have begun to list the goats they expect to go galloping—or to be pushed—toward the Republican party. And the sheep they expect to remain in the fold.

Technically, there are 75 Democrats in the Senate and 233 Democrats in the House.

Actually, says a high official about as close to F. D. R. as any White House secretary—and whose name would make a large Page One headline if your correspondent were allowed to use it—there are about 55 senators and 275 representatives who can be counted as Democrats. They will go through for a progressive New Deal program such as has been outlined by Roosevelt, the party leader. This man goes on to talk as if he expected the other Democratic members to be sloughed off.

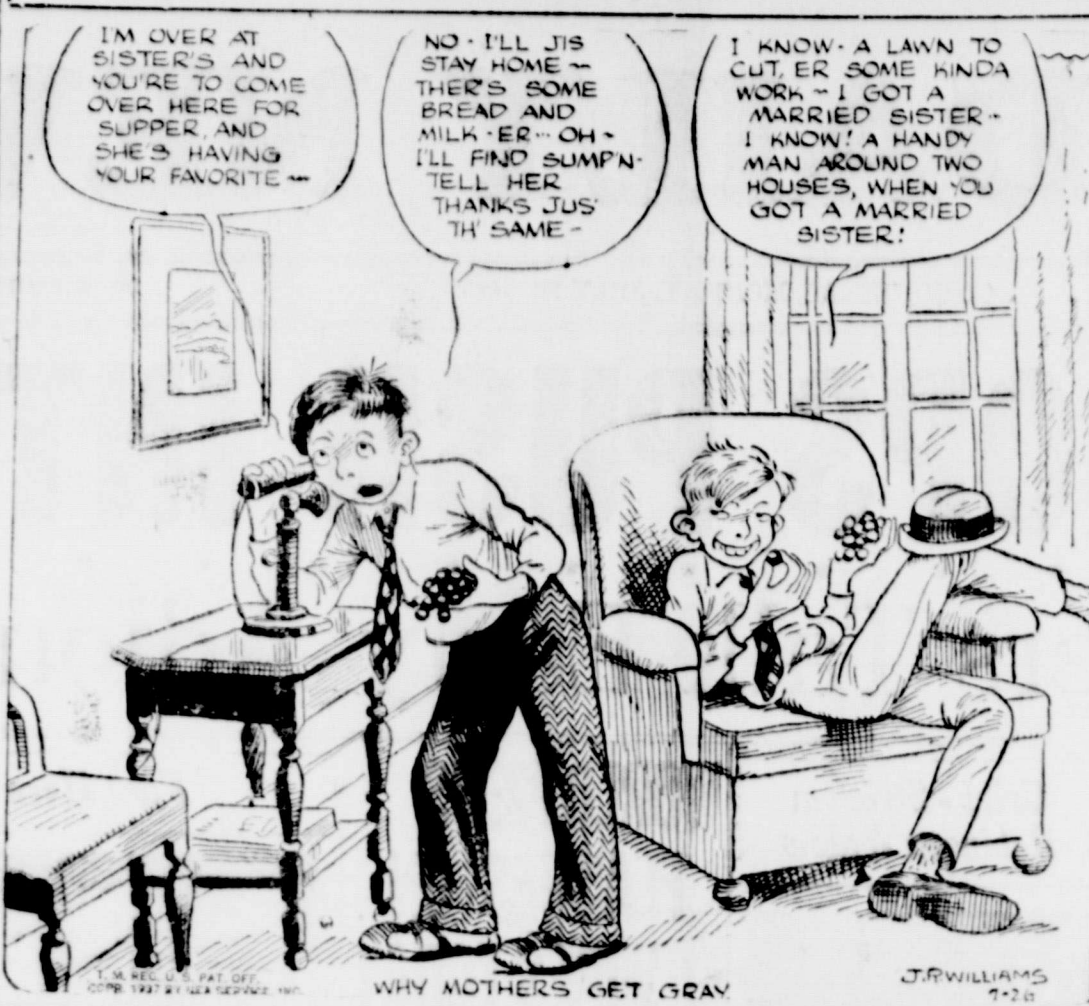
SIGNIFICANT of Republican efforts to honey up to southern conservatives is a bill by Congressman Hamilton Fish of New York, who led a regiment of colored troops in the war.

Fish brings a pretentious memorial or statue here in honor of a southern hero, Gen. Robert E. Lee. He keeps pestering Congressman Kent Keller of Illinois, chairman of the library committee which has to do with such things about it.

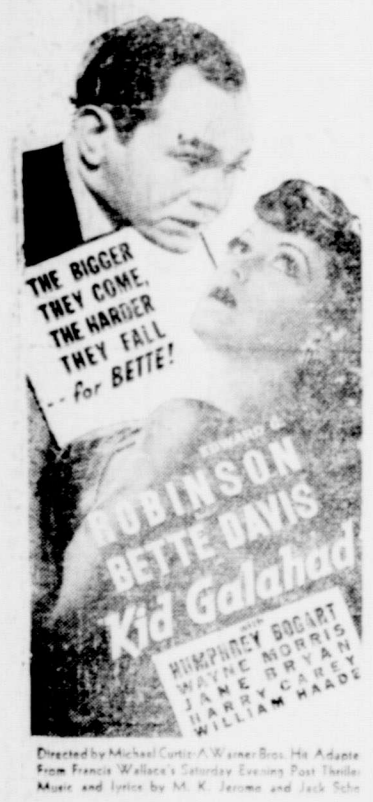

AMENDMENTS TO AID BLIND AND DESTITUTE

There are two Constitutional Amendments submitted in the August 23rd election which would provide financial assistance to the needy blind and to dependent and destitute children. The Federal Government will cooperate with the State in both of these programs. It will contribute in a 50-50 ratio with the State in aid to the blind, and in a ratio of 1 to 2 in assistance to dependent children in other words the Federal Government will contribute one-third and the State two-thirds for assistance to dependent children.

Texas has completed, with the exception of these two services, all of the ten services under the Social Security Act Today we have Federal financial assistance in services for crippled children, for maternal and child care, and for general child welfare under the Children's Bureau of the Department of Labor; public health services, vocational rehabilitation, old age assistance, unemployment compensation and General old-age benefits.

It was not by design that provisions for the needy blind and for destitute children were left to the last, but that a program so broad in its scope as that under the Social Security Act could not be put in effect at once Now that the Legislature has chosen to complete the program in the State and has submitted the two amendments to the August 23rd election, Texas should give them an overwhelming endorsement. The state of Florida voted a few months ago on an amendment which would give assistance to the needy aged, the needy blind, and to dependent children, and the majority for the amendments was 13 to 1. In the more populous centers, the majority was more than 16 to 1. Surely Texas can do as well as Florida! "Texas in the Lead" is the motto of the State Committee for Human Security which is conducting an educational campaign in connection with the amendments.

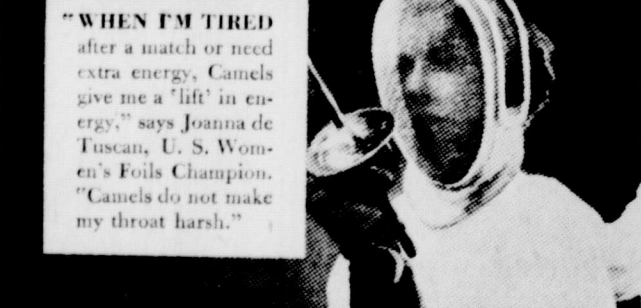
