'Cotton' Harrison Must Wear Brace

Mrs. T. M. Harrison returned last night from Shreveport, La., where she visited her son, "Cotton" Harrison, who is in the hospital there. Young Harrison was injured while working on a rig in Bellevue field near Princeton on August 6. The crew was attempting to hoist a long pole with a jack, which slipped. When it was seen the pole would fall, a cry to "run" was given, at which all began to run away from the falling pole. As Harrison ran the pole caught him, tore his cap away, with slight injuries to the head, and three vertebrae were crushed and several ribs broken. Mrs. Harrison, according to W. E. Cooper, close friend of the family, stated that Cotton, within a few more days, will be placed in a cast to remain for seven weeks. At the end of this period, he will be put in a brace in which he will have to remain for about a year. At the end of this time, physicians have hopes that he will walk, although nothing definite has been asserted as yet. Harrison was a Texas Christian University football star for the past three seasons, and a former Temple high grider. Mr. Cooper said he was considered one of the best guards in the Southwest conference.

Secretary of State Cordell Hull at the same time announced that he would seek an appropriation of \$500,000 for relief activities in evacuating Americans from the war area of China, particularly Shanghai.

SHANGHAI, Wednesday, Aug. 18 (U.P.)—Fires flashed over great sections of Shanghai at 2 a. m. today, the result of fierce artillery bombardment, but the gun duels suddenly quieted at that hour.

JAPANESE TO DRIVE OUT 100,000 CHINESE

SHANGHAI, Aug. 18 (U.P.)—Japan today launched an offensive designed to drive more than 100,000 Chinese soldiers from the vicinity of this blood-spattered city. Reinforced by regiments of the Japanese home army, the Japanese took the offensive on all fronts and appeared to have established supremacy in the air. A bitter campaign was indicated possibly longer than the five-week Shanghai war of 1932 in which tens of thousands of Japanese and Chinese were killed and wounded. 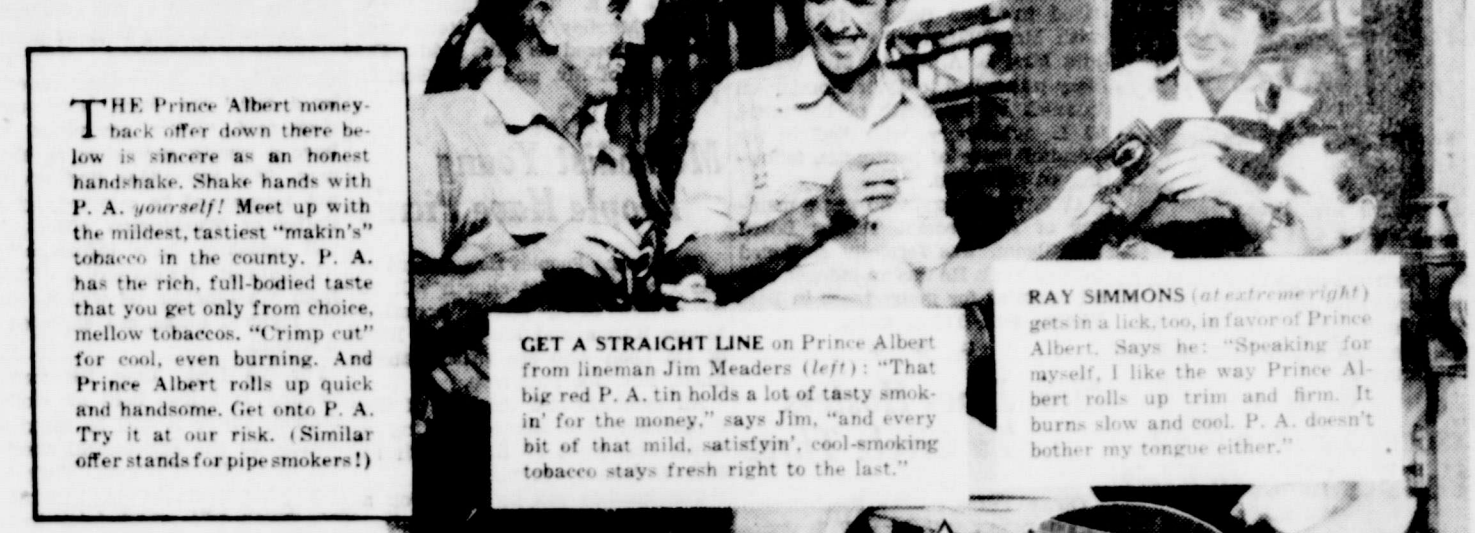

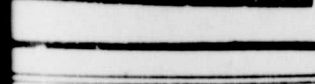
