China Conveys Profound Regret Over Bomb

OFFERING TO MAKE REDRESS IMMEDIATELY

WASHINGTON, Aug. 31. (UP)—The Chinese ambassador today conveyed to Secretary of State Cordell Hull the "profound regret" of the Chinese government for the accidental bombing of the Dollar liner, President Hoover and offered to make immediate redress.

JAPS CARRY WAR TO CANTON'S GREAT PORT SHANGHAI, Aug. 31. (UP)—Japan carried the war into south China today and began operations designed to close Canton, the last great port of entry for Chinese military supplies.

Foreign experts still believed that the Japanese intend to occupy China's central capital, Nanking. Other developments in the past 24 hours included: Officials of the Dollar liner following yesterday's unintentional bombing of the President Hoover by Chinese fliers, ordered other vessels of their fleet to avoid Shanghai.

'CHUTE JUMPING GROWS POPULAR AMONG FRENCH

By PETER C. RHODES United Press Staff Correspondent PARIS, Aug. 31. (UP)—Parachute jumping has finally become a popular sport in France, and it is expected that thousands of Frenchmen will have earned their "diplomas" after leaping from the 250-foot parachute tower in the Exposition grounds before the end of the summer.

One of the greatest attractions of the Exposition, the tower was finally opened on August 4 and immediately became the mecca of young people. The first leap was made by Pierre Cot, Minister of Air "We hope," he said when he reached earth, "to popularize such towers until we have many of them throughout France. It will help to break down the natural fear of people and make them really air-conscious."

Young people who tried the tower after him said it was difficult to get "air-conscious" when a cable overhead and on the side made falls impossible. Only the first fifty feet of fall give the real sensation to them. The tower demonstrated its safety on the opening day by catching one enthusiast half-way down and hoisting him back to the top of the tower. The crowd roared at their first sight of a "mounting" jumper.

If the parachute tower holds less thrills than the scenic railway, it won a large audience because of its cooling effects in the sweltering summer heat, hundreds waited patiently to earn a five second drop through space which would give them the benefits of a real breeze.

MANY CHILDREN WON'T CARE FOR PARENTS; GET PROPERTY

AUSTIN, AUGUST 31. (UP)—Texas is caring for old people whose property will go to children who do not support their parents either through inability or ingratitude, a senate economy committee heard today as they studied old age assistance.

Beard member John Wallace said there is one instant in which the state is helping an old couple whose son-in-law is worth \$250,000. "We did not help the old folks until we had a written statement that he refused to help," Wallace explained.

How such children profit was explained by Wallace. If an old couple has property not easily sold, and the children will not help, the state cares for the old folks. When they die the property goes to the children.

LOANS INSURE FARMERS GOOD PRICE RETURN

WASHINGTON, Aug. 31. (UP)—The administration today made \$200,000,000 available to southern cotton farmers who agree to follow a production control program which congress has promised to pass early next session.

Loans of 7 1/2 cents a pound was plus a subsidy to insure growers a return of 12 cents a pound was offered to farmers who agree to cooperate in whatever program congress devises for controlling 1938 production.
