Allred Makes Appeal For Public Program

CITES NEEDY WAITING FOR ENACTMENTS

SAN ANTONIO, Oct. 16 (UP)—Governor James V. Allred called upon the public last night to join his fight for enactment of the legislature out of its tax-economy deadlock, and "show the filthy interests that the people are going to run Texas."

Allred broadcast his appeal over the Texas Quality Network from radio station WOAI. He reminded citizens that only eight days remained for the legislature to act, that nothing as yet had been accomplished but if "the people let your wishes be known, I'm sure a majority of the state senate and the legislature as a whole will respond."

With the OK of a physician, the governor left a sickbed to drive here from Austin and present his address. An attack of influenza had settled in his eyes and he wore dark glasses to protect them.

Allred, without mentioning names, accused a senate economy bloc of confusing the issues before the legislature's tax session by delving into personalities "by bitter denunciation and abuse" to serve the selfish interests of oil and utility companies.

He said he had been bitterly criticized for calling the special session, but denied that he had been injured in the criticism. "The time is here for cool temperate and measured appraisal of the situation," he said. "I am not concerned over who wins out in this petty bickering, but I am deeply worried that the poor and needy people will be made to suffer for it."

"Hundreds of destitute children need a decent standard of living now," he said. "Over 100,000 old citizens of Texas need continued assistance now. Hundreds of destitute blind need a lifting hand now."

"Hard worked and underpaid teachers need adequate assurance of security in their old age now. The sagging credit of the state and the deficit demand a balanced budget now."

"Won't you help me fight for these things?"

Representative E. H. Thornton Jr. of Garveston, suggested a joint effort to take a voluntary appropriation tax of 8 or 10 per cent now. That will take care of the deficit increase which Auditor Tom King says is \$4,500,000 a year.

"We ought not to reduce the elementary appropriation, but the other would be wise to volunteer. If they don't, they are liable to find themselves taking a 25 per cent slash at the next regular session. Its members are going to be elected on an economy program."

Thornton believed that the senate would vote about \$3,500,000 a year more taxes for Social Security projects.

DEADLOCK IN LEGISLATION THREATENED

AUSTIN, Oct. 16 (UP)—Two distinguished young Texans, Governor James V. Allred and Speaker Robert W. Calvert, Saturday night held the answer to a problem that threatened to nullify the 30-day special session called September 27 to raise taxes.

The problem involved not only these two, but members of both houses and the Attorney General's department.

When legislators were convened, Allred submitted for their consideration only the topic of raising money to pay for old age assistance and other Social Security projects and to reduce the general fund deficit. The senate took matters in its own hands, however, and passed a bill reducing departmental appropriations almost \$5,000,000.

Scott Gaines, first Assistant Attorney General, moved that the state economy bill was not within the Governor's call. The decision is Calvert's however, and he could rule differently. He admitted the say-by-drink liquor bill on advice from the attorney general's department.

Unless Allred submits economy, or Calvert differs this time with the state's legal advisor, a deadlock is impending.

The \$5,000,000 house omnibus tax bill is in the Senate State Affairs Committee. The senate has shown little indication to go forward on a tax bill until the house does likewise on the senate-passed economy bill.

House members were ready to call their bluff and hold up all action on the economy measure until the senate adopts some tax bill.

ICKES PRAISES OIL STATES IN CONSERVATION

HOUSTON, Oct. 16 (UP)—The oil industry and five oil producing states had words of praise today from Secretary of Interior Harold Ickes for the progress made in conservation, but also admonition that this nation's petroleum reserves were all being drained too fast.

He gave special praise to Texas in which more than half of the nation's oil is located, for stopping waste of oil in the great East Texas field and for ending the waste of millions of cubic feet of natural gas in the West Texas field.

"Outstanding is the control of production in the East Texas field, which makes possible an ultimate recovery of oil from that prolific source much greater than could be achieved by the methods employed less than a year ago," he said.

Texas average was 1,465,100 barrels daily, an increase of 10,600 or 4,860 barrels over the federal quota.

NATION'S CRUDE OIL TAKES BIG RISE FOR WEEK

HOUSTON, Oct. 16 (UP)—The nation's daily output of crude oil rose 25,675 barrels this week to a total of 3,610,000 barrels, the oil weekly estimated today.

For the period ended today average production was 23,500 barrels daily above the market demand for October as estimated by Bureau of Mines.

ITALY AGREES TO WITHDRAW 5,000 TROOPS

LONDON, Oct. 16 (UP)—Italy agreed today to partial withdrawal of volunteers, probably 5,000, on both sides in the Spanish civil war and Britain and France reserved the right to freedom of action if the plan does not solve the non-intervention crisis.

The program calls for a symbolic withdrawal of a certain number of volunteers and then recognition by Britain and France of belligerent rights to both sides in Spain.

In the month of September alone, the United States exported arms and munitions for a total of 400,000,000 lire. Of this total, 290,000,000 was absorbed by the Soviet Republic which in turn reshipped the arms and munitions, furnished by the United States to Red Spain.

At the time of its organization only one other county federation was functioning, that of Mitchell county.

The International Congress of Military Medicine and Pharmacy (which includes all branches of medicine, surgery, sanitation and dentistry) will meet in the United States in 1939 on invitation of President Roosevelt.

The congress was sponsored by King Albert and Queen Elizabeth of the Belgians, and was conceived and organized in 1921 by Col. Jules Voncken of the Belgian military medical service, and Dr. William Esman Bainbridge, captain and medical director in the U. S. Naval Reserve.

are discussed. The country in which the congress is held submits an official report on each question as does another nation selected for its special experience in the subject under discussion. Valuable contributions on each question are also received from other countries. Toward the close of the congress, general conclusions are drawn up and are accepted only if they have the unanimous approval of all delegates. If there is any point that is not clear, or on which all cannot agree, the matter is tabled for a future meeting when added experience or further deliberation may solve the question in doubt.

The permanent committee of the congress, appointed at the first meeting by the King of the Belgians, is the working and managing unit. It consists of one member from each of eight nations—Belgium, France, Great Britain, Italy, Spain, Brazil, Switzerland, and the United States of America (which Dr. Bainbridge represents). The meetings of the committee are held before, during and following the congress sessions and in alternate years when necessary.

Headquarters in Liege

The central bureau of the congress is located in Liege, Belgium, and here also is conducted another branch of the daily working activity of the organization—the international office of medico-military documentation, which is under the supervision of the Secretary-General Col. Voncken. At this office are collected documents, books, articles on military medical topics, and various material relating to the medical services of all countries. Accredited representatives of governments are at liberty to utilize this office for reference, and there is a department that answers technical questions re-

ceived by mail from all over the world.

Immediately after past wars, certain phases of medical surgical and sanitary experiences have been summarized. The result of a battle on the life or limb of the combatants, the immediate treatment given, special operations performed soon after the infliction of an injury, have become part of medico-military history.

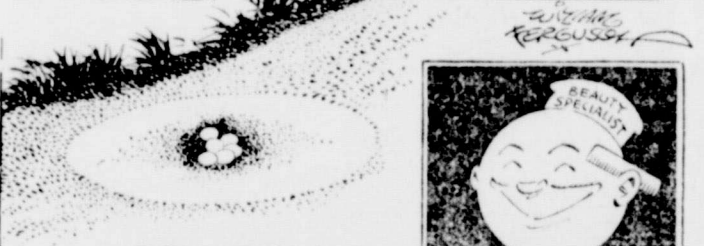

Man is Pardoned Without Country

STILLWATER, Minn. (AP)—On a ragged patch of ground near Stillwater prison where he served 19 years on a murder charge, Stevan Forster, 73-year-old German subject is living as a free man, but "a man without a country."

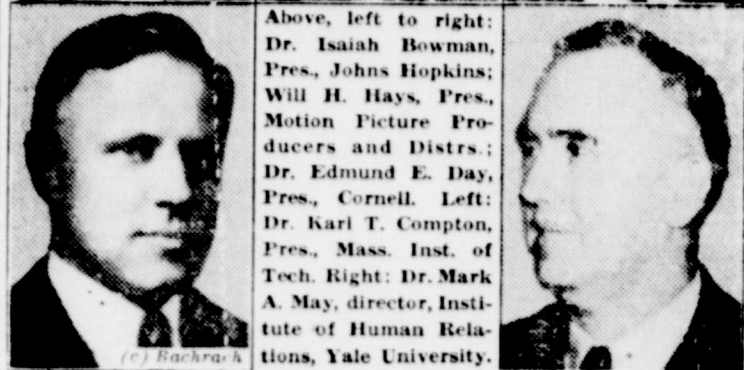

EDUCATORS APPROVE FILMS

NEW YORK — Motion picture vaults are mines of educational gold, a committee of eight distinguished educators said in a report to Will H. Hays, president, and the board of directors of the Motion Picture Producers and Distributors of America.

The committee, which spent four months examining and appraising short subject films, declared: "If education is to be adequate for the future needs of our increasingly complex life, it must avail itself of every modern device for teaching. The motion picture is destined to take its place beside the text book, the laboratory and the workshop as a factor of major significance in education."

Summary of Findings: In its survey, the committee appraised 1,592 pictures, of which \$49 were rated as acceptable for school use without change, 234 as acceptable with minor changes, while 475 contained usable elements. Thanking the committee for its work, Mr. Hays said: "Since the organization of our Association in 1922, we have constantly pursued as one of its purposes the development of the classroom usefulness of motion pictures. Thomas A. Edison said years ago, 'Educators are all book-minded now, but they will find the motion picture in time.' Your report fulfills that prediction. It is gratifying that you have found such a high percentage of pedagogic values in the films examined."

Values To Be Developed: "These values will be developed for the classroom in a field and with a technique separate from the essential service of theatres in furnishing wholesome entertainment."

In addition to Dr. May, chairman, President Compton, President Bowman and President Day, pictured above, committee members are: Frederick H. Bair, superintendent, Bronxville, N. Y., public schools; Royal B. Farnum, director, Rhode Island School of Design; Willard E. Givens, executive secretary, National Education Association; and Jay B. MILLIONS VIEW ART EXHIBIT AT EXPOSITION

DALLAS, Oct. 16 (AP)—More than 1,000,000 persons have viewed Tulane University's exhibit of art and archaeology specimens collected by research and excavation in Mexico, Guatemala and other countries of Latin America, on display at the Texas-Pan American exposition.

Silas K. Love, representative of the Department of Middle American Research of Tulane University, New Orleans, estimates that 90 per cent of the people who visit the exposition see the Middle American exhibit from Tulane and that before the exposition closed Oct. 31, approximately 2,000,000 persons will have viewed it.

Franz Blom, director of Tulane's Middle American Research department, explained that "it is no longer the intent of this institution to keep behind stone walls and barred doors of its own museum buildings the marvelous art and archaeology Tulane has collected over a long period of years by research and excavation in Mexico, Guatemala and other countries."

"The purpose of this policy is to create pride in the ancient civilizations of the Western Hemisphere; to show how these cultures affect and influence the art and ethnology of modern times; and to prove that the Aztecs, Mayas, Incas and other peoples of ancient times on the American continents were more interesting, were greater artists and craftsmen, and in certain instances, more advanced socially than were those of more exploited civilizations such as that of Egypt."

The archaeology display includes Mayan skulls, one of which has teeth inlaid with turquoise; Guerrero stone masks; Toltec and Aztec pottery and carved marble; Huasteca shell ornaments, carved jade, Mayan dolls, while the ethnology display presents pre-Columbian textiles, Mexican and Guatemalan dance masks, looms and other apparatus of industry wearing apparel and personal ornaments. The Colonial period exhibit displays original writings, books and scripts, ancient Cortez documents, Aztec and Mayan linguistics and
