## **Hopper Alert** Is Sounded

little early to start talking about grasshoppers, but farmers and ranchmen are urged to be ready to stop them this year before they leave their egg beds. Once they begin moving out of the areas where they hatch, effective control becomes more difficult, says H. G. Johnston, extension entomologist of Texas A. & M. College and state leader for the grasshopper control program

He says recently completed surveys show heavy infestations of grasshopper eggs in at least three areas of the state and warns that hoppers can again build up to plague proportions. The weather at hatching time will materially affect the situation, he adds.

The surveys show the danger spots to be in the Brazos valley especially in Robertson and Milan counties; in the Trinity valley in Kaufman and south Dallas county and along the Elm Creek Fork in north Dallas county and in the Panhandle. One area in the Panhandle - along the Oklahoma is termed by Johnston as a threatening area while the other area extending from the north-west corner of the Panhandle southeastward to Amarillo contains infestations of the eggs of the migratory 'hoppers. These are difficult to control because of their migratory movements. The seriousness of the situation in this area will depend upon the weather conditions at hatching time late May - says Johnston. He urges farmers and ranchmen in that section to be ready for an all-out fight should the 'hoppers become a menace to their crops and pastures.


He says the program in Texas will operate the same in 1950 as it did last year. Special emphasis will be placed on the use of insecticides for control rather than on the bait method. Results from last year's program show that toxaphene and chlordane are excellent grasshopper killing chemicals if used at the right time. The use of these chemicals plus neighbor-hood and community-wide cooperation can make control of local infestations a simple and inexpensive job, he says. Every farmer in infested territory should be ready to spray or dust his field margins, fence rows and roadsides just as soon as the hoppers begin

The migratory hoppers must be controlled before they leave the egg beds. They soon scatter over wide areas and thus control be-comes a difficult problem. Win Lone Star State 4-H State Championships

She estimates the value as \$9,300. During one summer when the new house was being built, she cooked for eight carpenters too, all on an oil stove. Now she works in a modern, well planned kitchen. Leora believes planning and management are very important in meal preparation. She gave an excellent demonstration to 50 Bastrop County women in the use of a master mix

## **Yeterans Land Program Beset By Growing Pains**

Bascom Giles, Commissioner of the General Land Office and Chairman of the Veterans Land Board, last week issued an "in-formal memorandum" to the 51st Legislature calling attention to the necessity of expanding the \$25,-000,000 Veterans Land Program at the next regular session.

"Within a very short time," Commissioner Giles pointed out to the legislature, "we will have received a sufficient number of applications to fully obligate the total "25,000,000 authorized by the constitutional amendment. only approximately 5,000 veterans will have been taken care of, When many times that number desire to participate in the pro-

"While we are processing an average of ten applications a day," Giles added in his prepared statement, "we are receiving new applications at the rate of 20 per day. Of the 4,700 applications received, most were signed for only a 90-day period. It was, therefore, to be expected that many options expire unless the sellers were willing to stand with the veteran and with us."

He described the personnel of the Land Program, of which Alvis Smart striped papers in muted co-Vandygriff is secretary, as consisting of "10 appraisers, 2 attorneys and 15 clerks, stenographers and

"Our incoming mail is averaging approximately 200 letters per day," he stated, "and most of these letters require personal attention.

Listing the program's progress to date, Giles said that 1,600 farms and ranches had been appraised with approximately 72 per cent approved for the contract 500 purchases had been completed at an average price of \$5,750, an average of \$52 per acre

## Bean Acreage **Allotment Plans Are Being Made**

Dry edible bean growers in Bailey County today were urged to cooperate fully with Production d Marketing Administration county committeemen, who are now starting to set up dry bean acreage allotments throughout the

county.

H. E. Schuster, chairman of the County PMA Committee, said that committeemen already are at work gathering reports of bean acreage during the past 3 years.

The reports will be used to es-

tablish 1950 farm acreage allot-ments for beans of the following classes: Baby Lima, Cranberry reat Northern, Pea and Medium White, Pink, Pinto, Red Kidney Small Red, Small White, including Flat Small White, and Standard Lima. The allotments will be based generally on the farm's bean acreage history for 1947, 1948, and

"Any farmer who operates farm which produced dry edible beans of the allotment classes in VISIT IN ARIZONA any of these years should contact the county PMA office if he has with her son in Cottonwood, Ariz.

not already furnished a commit-teeman with bean acreage data for his farm," Mr. Schuster said. If any farmer intends to plant beans on a farm in 1950 where no beans were planted during the period 1947, 1948, or 1949, he should file an application for a bean acreage allotment with the county PMA office NOT LATER

THAN MARCH 1, 1950." Mr. Schuster reminded growers that price support of 1950-crop dry edible beans will be available only to those farmers who have acreage allotments established for their farms and who plant within their bean acreage allotments.
