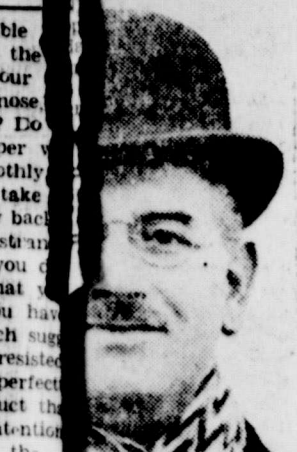

Approve Radio for Philadelphia Cops

PHILADELPHIA (AP) - The police department's 152 red cruisers and 333 motorcycles will be equipped with two-way radio sets, "the greatest forward step in war on crime in the city's recent history," according to Mayor S. Davis Wilson. Mayor Wilson said tests had been conducted "for months" and that they were "very successful." The radio system will enable police to talk to headquarters, instead of the old one-way, headquarters-to-patrol car method.

Ohio Voter Casts First Legal Vote

SPRINGFIELD, Ohio (AP) - When the November election rolls around, 69-year-old Matthew Meehan of Springfield, who for 45 years marked an "X" after the names of the candidates he preferred, will walk into a voting booth here and cast his first legal ballot. Years ago Meehan came to this country from County Mayo, Ireland. When he reached 21 he began voting. Not once in the following 44 years was he challenged at the polls. Two years ago, however, Meehan was told that all of his votes should never have been counted, that every one he cast since his first one—that for Grover Cleveland in 1892—was invalid because he was not a citizen of the United States. During those years Meehan had believed he was a citizen. His father became naturalized here, he told officials of the Clark County Old Age Pension Bureau when they informed him he had to prove his citizenship before he could be granted a pension. The bureau checked old records and informed Meehan that his father had not been naturalized, but that they pointed out, before Matthew was 21 years old. This fact changed everything as far as the younger Meehan's citizenship rights were concerned. Had his father become naturalized before he assumed his father's citizenship. But when the elder Meehan did not become naturalized until his son was past 21, Matthew still remained an Irishman in the eyes of immigration officials. Meehan resolved that he would become a citizen. He took out naturalization papers and when the two-year naturalization period expired recently, Meehan passed the examination with something to spare and won the right to resume casting his votes at election time.

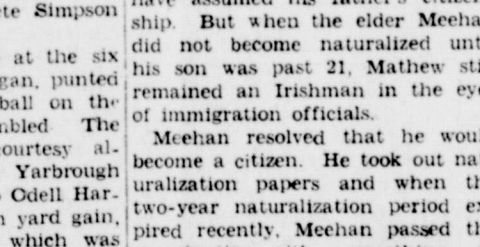
Sidewalk on Fire

Practical Cookery For Autumn Eats

DENTON, Oct. 30.—To clinch the success of a well-prepared meal there is nothing like a spicy relish. Pickles and other such tasty touches add no food value but stimulate the appetite and give just the right amount of tartness to meats and vegetables.

Apple Chutney

Mix together one quart tart apples (chopped), one cup raisins, one large onion (chopped, one red pepper and one green pepper (shredded and chopped). Add one cup vinegar, one-half cup sugar, one tablespoon paprika, and one-half teaspoon salt. Simmer until the apples are rather tender and the mixture is thick and clear. Seal in hot sterilized jars.

Beet Relish

Steam or boil beets until tender, but firm; dip in cold water and remove skins. There should be one quart when diced. Mix together beets, one medium sized onion (chopped). Add one teaspoon salt, two cups vinegar, and one-half cup sugar. Simmer until mixture is clear. Pour into hot sterilized jars and seal.

Slice one orange, one lemon and

one quart cranberries. Mix with one cup sugar. Let stand in refrigerator over night before serving.

Raw Tomato Relish

Chop one peck tomatoes and drain in a bag or colander. Sprinkle one-half cup salt over two cups finely chopped onions and three cups finely sliced celery and drain in colander for two to three hours. Combine tomatoes, onions, and celery. Add two large green peppers (shredded and chopped), two cups brown sugar, one-half cup mustard seed, two teaspoons cinnamon, two teaspoons cloves, and one quart vinegar. Mix well and let stand in a cool place before serving. This relish will keep a reasonable length of time, if kept in a cool place.

Radish Relish

Grind enough radishes to make one pint pulp and enough onions to make one cup pulp. Mix together and sprinkle with one tablespoon salt. Let stand two hours. Drain and press quite dry. Add one pint vinegar, one-half cup sugar, one-half teaspoon mustard seed, one-half teaspoon turmeric and one-half teaspoon nutmeg. Simmer for 15 minutes. Pack in sterilized jars, seal partially and process in water bath for 15 or 20 minutes at simmering. Seal. Let stand several days before using.

JURORS GIVE WARNING ON FARM THEFTS

Apparently mindful of Thanksgiving and the approaching hog-butchering season, members of the 88th district court grand jury of the September term Thursday in a final report warned that "misdemeanors and felony thefts are quite likely to occur from now on in the various farming communities." The jurors returned seven true-bills Thursday, bringing the total for the term to 21 felony and one misdemeanor. Through R. F. Cox, Ogra, foreman, and Vance C. Littleton, Cisco, secretary, the jurors in their written report stated they had been in session eight days and had examined 97 witnesses in the term.

Charged in the indictments returned at the final session were theft of edible meat (two), burglary, receiving and concealing stolen property (two), theft over \$50 and petty theft.

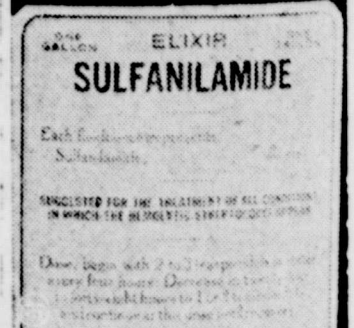
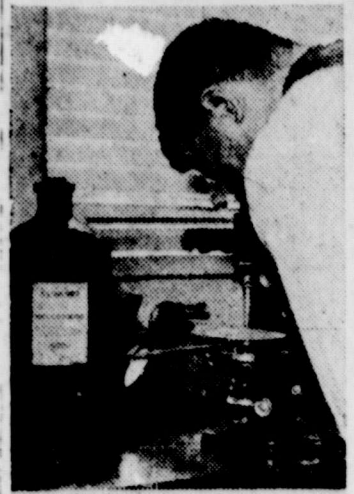
Notable progress financially and otherwise has been made by other Baptist schools, and their leaders will outline plans for the future in their annual reports.
