

# **Cisco I.S.D. Tax Rendition** Forms For 1979 Are Now **Available At Tax Office**

Rendition forms for the 1979 tax year are now available at the Cisco ISD tax office located at 610 Avenue D. State law requires that each local property owner render his or her property for each tax year between January 1 and April 1. Property to be rendered is both real property and personal property. Included in these categories are mobile homes which are considered real property if located on land owned by the mobile home owner, or as personal property if located on rented or leased land. **Renditions are not difficult** to fill out and can usually be filled out in a few minutes. HOWEVER, it is important for each property owner to fill one out by April 1, 1979. If then the state law requires the School District tax assessor to place a fair market value on the property and place it on an unrendered roll. While the property owner is at the tax office, he or she

should ask about the \$5,000.00 homestead which the exemption school district will grant to those qualifying for 1979. If you have any questions concerning either the ren-ditions or the homestead exemptions, please call 442-1299 or come by the school



A TDWR analysis of Service cooperative obrainfall during the year serving stations, when Tropical Storm Amelia's remains dumped torrents of rain on the western North Central Texas community. Another example of bizarre weather was the 12 to 15 inches of rain which fell in much of Guadalupe Mountan National Park in late September when Tropical Storm Paul moved inland into Mexico. Other heavy rains over short time periods cited

by the study were: 1-day rains of 10 to 15 inches in areas that lay within Amelia's path across central portions of the State, including 15.20 inches at World's End Ranch (Edwards Plateau), 14.29 inches at Haskell (Low Rolling Plains), and 11.60 at Kerrville (Edwards Plateau); nearly 16 inches of rain at Victoria during a 3-day period in mid-September as a result of a tropical depression that moved inland from the Gulf of Mexico; and 10.79 inches at Refugio (South Central) on June 1. The study reports that, by contrast, from February 13 to May 20--or a period of 97 consecutive days--no measurable rain fell at Presidio (Trans-Pecos); Imperial (Transthe State. Pecos) was not far behind with the second longest string of dry-weather days--Analysts emphasize, however, that while she is likely to be remembered as a killer storm that wrought unparalleled destruction in parts of central Texas, Tropical Storm Amelia

played a significant role in reversing the drought situation in several areas of the State. By spilling torrents of rain on a broad area of the parched Edwards Plateau in the first few days of August, the storm's remnants singlehandedly terminated a lengthy spell of severe drought that had plagued the region since late summer of 1977.

However, the storm expired before it could bestow enough rain to alleviate leaders.

snowstorm occurrence as well as the amount of snow marked 1978 as one of the snowiest ever in the northern third of Texas. Too, a heavy snow fell in the northern High Plains as late as the first week o of May. In fact, the winter of 1978 was the snowiest ever in recorded weather history for most of northern North Centeral and East Texas. A total of five snowstorms lashed the region during January and February, leaving several inches of snow on the ground each occasion. The Dallas-Fort Worth area measured more than 13 inches in Feburary and experienced the most snowfall-17.6 inches-in any single winter since 1898. Snowfall was heavy in the High and Low Rolling Plains too, but these

regions usually receive the greatest number of snowstorms and the heaviest amounts of any area of the State. The most unusual feature of the snow season there was the lateness of the last significant snowfall--the first week of May. The winter was typical in the southern third of the State,

sequence fell. The winter of 1978 made history with up to 10 times the n normal amount of snow falling in northern North Central Texas during January and February. Cumulative snowfall totals amounted to at least 15 inches in many areas, while numerous points near the **Red River measured from 20** to 25 inches. The 5 to 10 inches that accumulated during January was enough to mark that month as one of the snowiest ever.

Oklahoma Peanut Growers Association, Southwest Peanut Growers Association and Texas Peanut Producers Board, concluded that production cost data reviewed justify an increase in both the quota support and contract additional price rates equal to the increase in the index of prices paid by farmers. Individual peanut growers should therefore carefully examine their own operations in determining produce whether to additional contract peanuts in 1979, Self said.

The group voted unanimously to recommend that growers who contract their additional production to shellers in 1979 not obligate themselves to deliver their quota peanuts to the shellers as a condition of the sale of the additional peanuts. Self pointed out that conditions may arise during the marketing season that would increase the price of quota peanuts and if so, the grower should be in a position to take advantage of any advance in the farmers stock peanut market.

Self said that if shellers fail to increase the 1979 contract price for additional peanuts the tonnage of such peanuts produced by growers will, in all likelihood, be substantially curtailed.

# Industry Spends Billions **To Protect Environment**

The U.S. petroleum industry, operating in Texas and other producing and processing states, is very much involved in protecting the environment. Its commitment to this purpose calls for the expenditure of a significant amount of money.

In 1977, the industry nationwide spent in excess of \$2.5-billion on environmental protection. That contrasts with approximately \$11.6-billion in net income for the nation's 18 largest integrated oil companies during the same year. And it represents an increase of more than \$147-million over similar expenditures in 1976.

Environmentalism in recent years has become an emotionally-charged political, social, and economic issue. But, the outlay of private capital by oil and gas producers and processors to protect the environment has been going on for a long time. Environmental protection expenditures by the U.S. petroleum industry during the 1968-76 decade totalled some \$13.4-billion.

However, despite these expenditures, bureaucracies armed with an ever-increasing array of environmental regulations continue to confront the industry. Producers and processors now must respond to numerous federal statutes with particularly far-reaching effects. These include the Clean Air Act and its 1977 amendments and the Water Pollution Control Act and its 1972 amendments. Many of the regulations coming from these laws are unnecessary, particularly here in Texas. They amount to regulatory overkill. Example: The Environmental Protection Agency has issued regulations that threaten injection operations in which water and other fluids are pumped underground to increase petroleum recovery. These regulations are unneeded in producing states, such as Texas, which have long histories of successful regulation of such operations. Example: The EPA also has proposed that vapor controls be placed on storage tanks with a capacity of 952 barrels or more. The industry operating in Texas already is installing such controls on large tanks in populous areas. But, such a requirement on nearly all tanks in all locations, however remote. is going to cost more than it is worth. Example: The Texas Parks & Wildlife Department wants oils and greases discharged with produced brine into the state's waters limited to a level that industry spokesmen are convinced cannot be achieved. Oilmen ask instead for regulations adequate to protect marine life in onshore and offshore waters, yet not so restrictive as to hamstring the production of oil and gas. This country needs legislation that will provide for reasonable environmental conservation and protection, yet not put an end to business activity --including energy development.

Q. Is it important to pay attention to any unusual sounds your car might suddenly make? What kinds of sounds should I listen for?-H.T., Austin.

A. It is definitely important to listen to the sounds your car makes, from both a safety and a moneysavings (preventive maintenance) point of view. Next month, this column will begin a series which will explore this subject further. But for right now, listen for squealing when braking. It might mean your brakes need relining. Or, for disc brakes, a very unusual squealing might indicate a problem. If the carsqueals as you turn the steering wheel, it might be wise to check the steering belt. Both of these reasons for "squealing" could signal dangerous repair needs. And especially during winter months, listen for an uneven rumbling in your exhaust system. A hole in your muffler or tailpipe could cause carbon monoxide poisoning.

#### Q. We are always hearing about how far we should or should not follow the car in front of us? What do you say?-Worried, Houston.

A. A standard answer is at least one car length for every 10 miles per hour. Recently, a major oil company has promoted the "two second rule"-which means you should allow a two second interval between your car and the car ahead of you. Select an object on the roadside and count the time it takes you to reach it after the car ahead of you has reached it. "One thousand and one, one thousand and two." If you reach the object before "one thousand and two" you are definitely following too closely. Alright for ideal conditions. At night or in bad weather, you should obviously allow more distance.
