All who are 60 years, or older, are eligible for the Nutrition program. If the husband or wife is younger than their 60 years old mate they are eligible to come to the program also.



Emphysema Emphysema is a chronic disease of the lungs. It is -characterized by over distension, e enlargement, and rupture of the tiny air sacs in the lungs. This process causes a loss of effective breathing space in the lungs resulting in severe shortness of breath.

The symptoms of emphysema are cough, shortness of breath, wheezing, and coughing up thick

mucous. Probably the earliest symptom is short-ness of breath on exertion. As the disease progresses, wheezing develops, a harsh cough appears, and shortness of breath becomes severe. The entire chest enlarges over a period of years resulting in the so called "barrell chest" in some patients.

Emphysema seems to be

smoking. Smoking cigarettes may or may not cause emphysema, but it certainly causes a chronic bronchitis which produces the emphysema. Any infection in the lungs makes the symptoms of emphysema much worse and increases the lung destruction in the areas of emphysema.

Treatment is difficult because nothing will reverse the damage in the air sacs. Treatment is designed to correct or decrease any condition causing bronchial the end result of chronic irritation. Any infection bronchitis, asthma, or must be treated with anit-

biotics. Asthma and the bronchospasm that it causes are treated and any allergies are corrected if possible. The most important treatment is to stop smoking. Certain exercises are prescribed to increase the lung capacity.

Positive pressure breathing treatments and oxygen are also used. Cough to help remove secretions is important so drugs must not be given that will suppress this cough reflex. Postural exercises are taught to help the patient clear secretion from the lungs.

Since this severe, often disabling, sometimes fatal disease follows bronchitis,



Boosting Performance Of First-Calf Heifers

The key to a profitable cattle operation is to get a calf from each cow every 12 months. However, first-calf heifers sometimes put a kink in those plans because they tend to have lower pregnancy rates and often fail to rebreed or take longer to rebreed.

"First-calf heifers often experience rebreeding problems due to a number of stress factors." points out Dr. John D. Spitzer, livestock specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension

'For instance, the first-calf heifer is required to perform all the body functions of a mature cow, such as body maintenance, lactation and rebreeding. Parturition itself may place a greater stress on the heifer, especially if she experiences calving difficulty.

A first-calf heifer is also attempting to grow, and this problem is compounded by the shedding of incisor teeth which limits her ability to chew feeds, adds the Texas A&M University System specialist.

on their breeding track fast. Spitzer offers two general management practices which should become standard procedure in cattle opera-

1. Seperate heifers from mature cows the last three months of gestation and through the breeding season. This will keep heifers from having to compete with mature cows for available

2. Breed virgin heifers 20 to 30 days earlier than the regular cow herd to assure early calves. Calving early will give heifers enough time to return to heat during the second breeding season. which would then correspond to that of the regular cow herd.

If a producer is short on feed or is faced with thin heifers at calving time, he should wean calves early or alter the suckling pattern. Weaning calves at 30 to 90 days of age removes one of the primary stresses on heifers and makes more nutrients available for other body functions such as growth and rebreeding. An alternative is to limit nursing to one time per day for 30 to shows heat. This should not begin before 30 days after calving and can run for about 45 days.

Research by Dr. Ron Randel with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station has shown that once daily suckling can dramatically decrease the interval from calving to first heat after calving while having little effect on a heifer's milk production or total calf gain to weaning, notes Spitzer.

'Giving heifers in your beef herd a little special treatment can boost their reproductive performance." contends the specialist. "This can mean extra dollars in future years of production due to ger calf crop as well as increased weaning weights of earlyborn calves.'

This is the season to apply dormant oils for controlling some of the hard-to-kill insects on trees and shrubs. Properly prepared petroleum oils are effective for controlling pests such as scale insects, mites, pecan phylloxera, insect eggs and some hibernating caterpillars. Oils kill insects and mites by suffocation or by penetrating the breathing tubes. Insect eggs are killed because of interference with the gas exchange through the shell.

advantage of being less expensive, give good covering action, residues of oils on fruit and nut trees are exempt from tolerance and oils are safe to handle. However, oils are toxic to most leaves, have low toxicity to many insects and are relatively unstable insolutions

Pecan producers and homeowners who have had problems with phylloxera_ and obscure scale will want to treat pecan trees in the near future. Best results will be obtained when trees are treated just prior to leaf emergence. Use dormant oil at the rate of 3-312 gallons of 97 percent oil emulsion per 100 gallons of water, or 34

pint per 3 gallons of water. When mixing and applying dormant oils, extreme care should be taken to use only the amounts recommended by the manufacturer. Tree trunks and insect infested limbs should be throughly covered with the application. Some trees tolerant to normal applications of oil may be damaged if oil is applied in excessive

amounts. Even normal applications o of oil have been noted to damage beech, Japanese and sugar maple, hickory, walnut, butternut and some spruces. Strict attention should be given to getting through coverage, yet avoiding excessive application of the oils.

This time of year when there are no green forages for cattle, vitamin A deficiency can be a problem. Thus producers may want to suply a supplemental source of vitamin A for cows grazing dry, bleached pastures with little or no green hay.

Vitamin A promotes growth, stimulates appetite, aids in reproduction and lactation, keeps respiratory and other tracts in healthy condition, and makes for normal vision.

Carotene, which supplies Vitamin A, is contained in all green parts of growing plants. Good pastures always provide liberal and rich supplies of carotene and thus have a high Vitamin A value. However, vitamin value decreases after the plant's bloom stage and much of the carotine is destroyed in hay drying field curing.

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

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

But that is exactly what happened! His wife, Kathleen, had a appointment for a check-up with a Doctor on her broken arm. As she and Earl started to leave their home, he glanced outside to where his '73 Nova was parked. Two boys - he judged them to be about 18 years old - were leaving with his car. Another young man was waiting on the corner.

"He hopped in, and away they drove!" Earl shakes his head. "And we haven't seen car or boys since! I had to borrow a pickup to run some errands t today.

"I especially urge those who couldn't come out on Open House night to drop by and view our building," Mr. Lebredo says. "We have such a good atmosphere such a pleasant place - that I want the people of the area to see what can be done to help Lebredo stresses that all

this has been accomplished by donations from local business and individuals. "We a are not funded by the Government, we are not covered b by any public fund drive," he says. "People give from the goodness of their hearts, when they see the work we are doing. We are supported by persons from all religions - all walks of life - and our doors are open to boys from all races, creeds, and colors. All are treated equally here. I have about 15 to 20 boys come in each day. I keep the building open and supervise activities from 3 p.m. to 5 p.m. each weekday, and from 2 to 5 p.m. on Saturdays. In the summer I keep it open from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. A boy doesn't have to live in Ranger to be a member of the Club."

The boys who are enrolled as members, Earl explains,

take care of the equipment. They are encouraged in habits of good character, cleanliness, good citizenship, and respectfulness. But the interest of Earl Lebrado goes even beyond that. "If we find that a boy needs help in serious matters," Earl explains, "We help him. When I need assistance from the community, people are always ready to lend a hand. This has been very rewarding to me."

Boys, Lebredo has learned, can handle a lot of things. Poverty is bad, but a child can cope with it as long as he has parents to love him, even a few clothes to wear, and something to eat. "But a broken home - " he says - "That is the very worst thing that can happen to a child. There is no way a boy c can handle that without being severely hurt. The second worst thing for a boy is to have a lot of time on his hands with nothing creative any constructive to do. That is where the Boy's Club's can really help a community. We have volleyball here - tennis so many things. During the summer I hope to have a program going where studnets will help me various crafts." He pauses for a moment. "We are already seeing results from our program here, but the biggest results will be in the future, when the boys we are working with are grown.

'But all this is possible because of the cooperation from the people of Ranger. I call it: 'The small town with a big heart!' Look at this list of our Officers and Board of Directors.




