S&M Supply Co. Implements Employee's Ownership Plan

An employee's ownership plan and trust was implemented by S&M Supply Company and its subsidiary, Reynolds Mfg. Co., of Cisco for its staff of workers on Dec. 31, 1978, retroactive to Jan. 1, 1978, as announced by J. L. Stafford.

The company, which manufactures aluminum windows and deals in assorted building supplies, has 40 full-time employees and expects to increase that number during the coming year to meet the growing demand for its products.

The new plan will enable employees of the firm to acquire an interest in the company each year as stock is distributed in the form of bonuses. After working for a year, employees will become eligible to participate in the stock bonuses.

Mr. Stafford said the new plan would enable S&H employees to eventually own all of the firm's stock. This, he added, would insure the payroll to remain in Cisco and Eastland County in the future. This company was originally founded and

funded by the people of Cisco and Eastland County to provide payroll for our area. He is the company president, with George Owens, Vice-President, and Letha Stafford, Secretary and Treasurer.

Since its organization some 24 years ago, S&M Supply has expanded by buying the Reynolds Manufacturing Co. and an aluminum window factory. The company has purchased several buildings in downtown Cisco in the past few years, including the home office on East 8th Street, the Reynolds Manufacturing buildings on West 8th, the old Chevrolet building on Avenue D., and two buildings on East 6th Street.

"We organized the Employees Stock Ownership Plan and Trust for two reasons—to reward faithful employees and to be sure that the S&M payroll will always remain in our community," Mr. Stafford said. "The outlook for our company is good. A survey has convinced us that we have the type of people on our payroll who can and will take over to carry out our goals. Our community should continue to grow and prosper and we want our S&M people to always be a part of it."

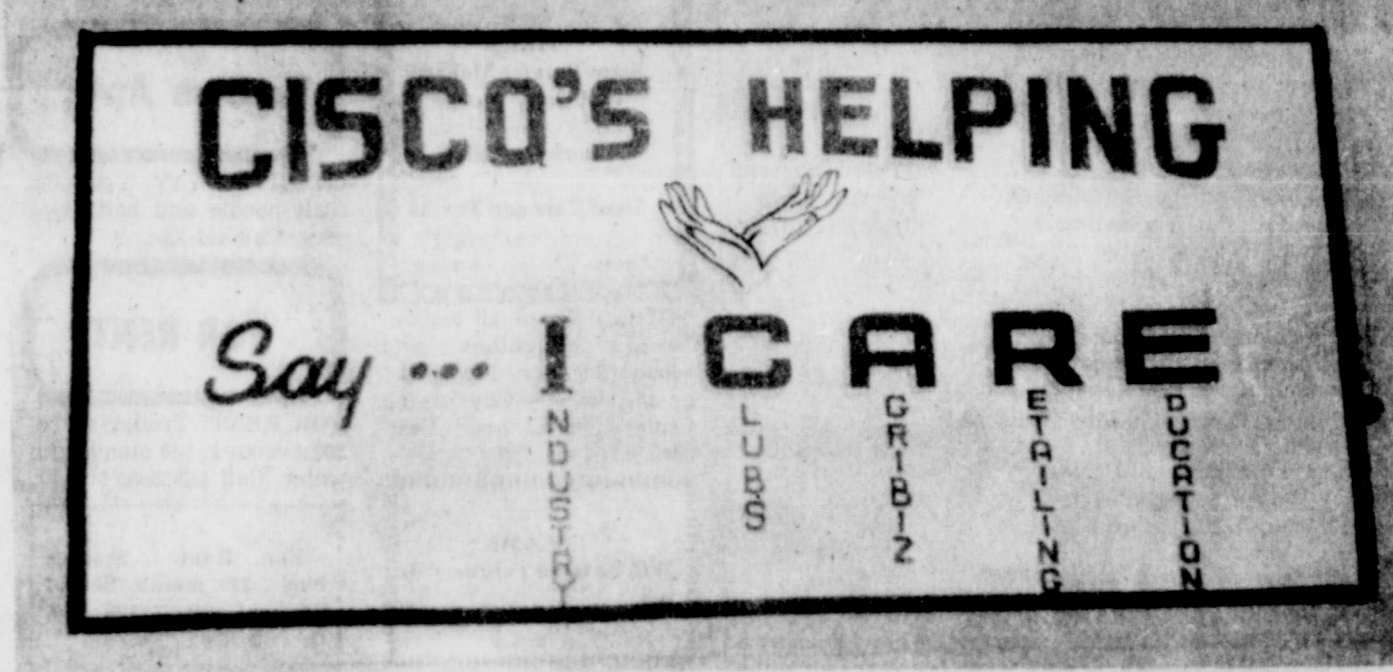


Dollie Cooper Installed As Noble Grand

Approximately 300 people attended the dinner at Cisco Jr. College Agricultural Building. Guests were present from Eastland, Arlington, Abilene, Stamford Breckenridge and Iowa.

Academic excellence awards were presented to Tim Bint and Leigh Eller of Cisco High School, and to Claudia Yeager and Michael Tucker of Cisco Jr. College

by Cisco High School principal Harry Lister and Cisco Jr. College Academic Dean Clois Purvis respectively.

Mr. Bint's grade point average was 98.74 while Miss Eller's is 95.68. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Gerald Bint. He is active in FFA National Honor Society and Senior Who's Who and participated in UIL. Miss Eller is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Sam Eller. She was a class officer for three years, in FHA National Honor Society, pep squad, nominee for football sweetheart and Queen Lobo.

Miss Yeager is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Claude Yeager. Her grade point average is a perfect 3.0. She is 19, and a second year student at Cisco Jr. College where she is a choir member. 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expansion of Cisco Municipal Airport. The completion of the deal between Garl Gorr and the City of Cisco will close a "six-year chapter" on the Cisco Municipal Airport, according to City Manager John Boland.

The city may now pursue the construction of Cisco's airport, incorporating the changes suggested by T.A. C.

A sanitation truck request was tabled by the council to enable an investigation of past years to see what the financial condition as of the sanitation department. The request was for a good, used 1974 truck priced at \$8,000, which would enable the city to have several weeks time to get the present sanitation truck in sound condition.

The council is to meet Monday in a called meeting, for more discussion on the request.

With no back-up sanitation truck, the department is using dump trucks to pick up trash and as a result it takes longer to cover the town. City manager Boland stated there may be instances where someone's garbage is not picked up; if so, he says to call City Hall and someone will be sent to make the collection.

Municipal Court Judge O. T. Killion gave his quarterly report for October, November and December at Tuesday's meeting. His hours spent in the office were 48 in October, 54 in November and 45 in December. The total revenue collected by the court was \$4,551.60 which was broken down as follows: tickets—\$2,556.50; complaints—\$1,587.50; and warrants—\$407.00.

The monthly financial report for December was also discussed. The city

33.33 percent in the General Fund and 22.86 percent in the Water-Sewer Fund. Airport revenues and expenses are currently at 25.11 percent and 23.69 percent of the budget, respectively. Sales tax revenues are at 28 percent of the budget.

The city expanded a total of \$60,702.

In the airport summary, the total revenue for the month was \$504.00 and the total expenses for the month were \$296.00.

The total revenue sharing balance was \$6,303.00.

Total Administrative expenditures for the year are \$19,608 which is 24.81 percent of the budget.

Total Public Works expenditures for the year are \$31,929 which is 24.72 percent of the budget.

Parks-Recreation total expenditures for the year are \$4,526, which is 13.14 percent of the budget.

Total Water-Sewer expenditures for the year are \$54,128 which is 24.41 percent of the budget.

Under Utility Summary the water usage has been 24,265,200 gallons per month. The average water turbidity reading has been 1.8 N. T. U. The average sewer discharge has been 431,760 gallons per day with sewer effluent readings of 21.67 B.O.D. and 17.33 T.S.S.

The payroll summary showed 32 full time and nine part time employees. The net pay received was \$20,196.00 for a number of 3,281 hours worked.

The Sales tax receipts for the month were \$19,819.00 for a total to date of \$27,274.00.

City Manager John Boland stated that copies of the complete financial report are "available at City Hall to be given to persons who so desire it."

an excellent book that has been endorsed by the President's committee on Employment of the Handicapped is entitled, "Mutifamily Housing Shared by the Able-Bodied and the Disabled". This is now available through Battelle Columbus Laboratories, 505 King Avenue, Columbus, OH 43201.

It is intended for planners, public officials, and design professionals and details a systematic approach, systematic approach for planning and building multifamily housing units to be shared by both handicapped and able-bodied persons.

In the guidebook, Battelle identifies eight essential design elements that need to be added, or which require modification of standard design practices, and dozens of other desirable design elements are described in detail. This includes physical and functional descriptions, justifications for the items, and the costs.

The guidebook is an outgrowth of a Battelle study conducted for the U. S. Dept. of Housing and Urban Development, that examined and evaluated the implications of integrating the handicapped in multi-family housing.

A truly excellent guide for both small communities and large cities. Handicapped groups should bring this guidebook to the attention of their city officials.-M.C.R. Illinois

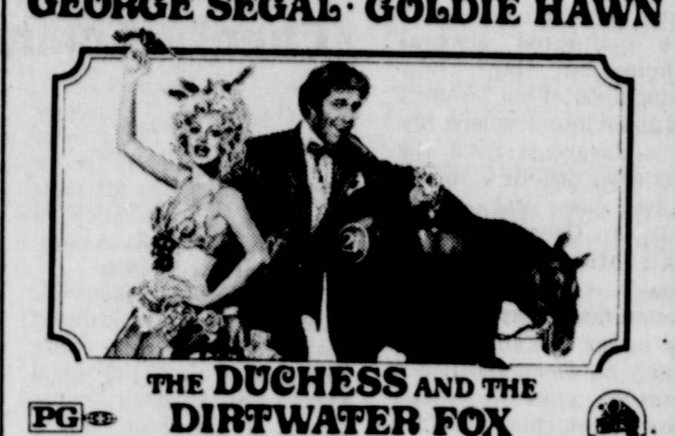

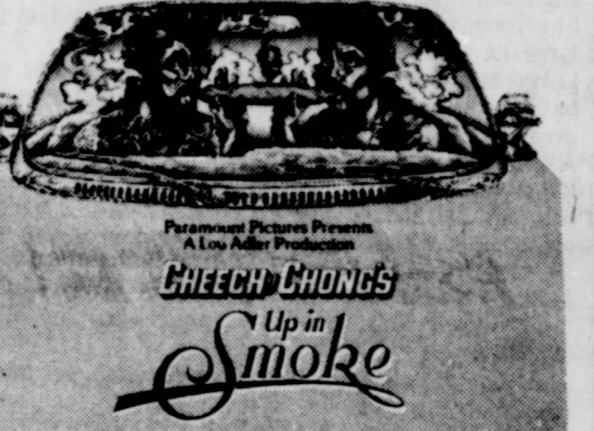

Keeping Well

The so called "common cold" is a miserable disease that seems to affect most of us once or twice a year. It consists of nasal congestion (blockage of the nose or a profuse discharge or both), headache, malaise (just feeling terrible all over), and sometimes cough. The patient may or may not have fever. This unpleasant illness has been said to last one week without treatment of

seven days with treatment. Most often the patient is not sick enough to go to bed so he goes about his daily activities feeling terrible and spreading his disease to others.

Treatment of the common cold is rest. Many medicines have been recommended and some will help open up the congested nose, slow up the nasal discharge and make the patient feel better, but

nothing to date has been found to "cure" the "common cold." The problem with the "common cold" is that it can lead to many complications. Some of these complications are just more miserable for the patient but some are serious illnesses.

Ear infections (acute otitis media) cause severe ear ache and may lead to rupture of the ear drum, mastoid infection and occasionally brain abscess. Many patients have hearing loss following an ear infection.

Sinus infection almost always accompanies the "Common Cold" and may become severe enough to cause problems. Tonsillitis, adenoiditis, pharyngitis, and laryngitis represent infection that may accompany or follow the "common cold." The patient will complain of a severe sore throat and hoarseness and may lose his voice.

Bronchitis and even pneumonia are occasionally seen as complications of a cold. Severe coughing develops and chest pain with high fever may be seen.

Although the "common cold" does not respond well to treatment, many of the complications do respond. Antibiotics seem to have no effect on the usual cold, but have a very dramatic effect on the complications. When you are the victim of the "common cold", you will usually just wear it out. But if you suspect that any complications are occurring, consult your physician for the correct diagnosis and treatment.

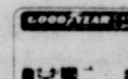

"The last census showed 1117 farm operators in Eastland County," he says, "and in the nearly thirteen years I've been stationed here, I've been on most of their ranches or farms. I go out and demonstrate various things concerning livestock and plants, sometimes on scheduled programs, sometimes for individual needs."

The overall plans for Eastland County in 1979, he explained, were made before the New Year by an Agricultural Committee composed of Eastland County farmers and homemakers.

The program Building Committee meets annually, and its Executive Committee meets quarterly. Arlin Bint of Cisco is Chairman of the Executive Committee, with R. D. Hart of Eastland as Vice Chairman. Mrs. Bernard Campbell of Eastland is Secretary. The Agricultural Committee

chose Home Food Production as the theme for 1979 in Eastland County. In February a series of Vegetable Production programs are planned for adults and young people in different parts of the County. There will also be a Beef Short Course in February, with a County Livestock Show in March. A series of programs and activities are planned for peanut producers. There will also be a number of pecan programs, including a Spring Field Day, a Budding and Grafting School, and a Pecan Show in late fall of 1979.

The emphasis on gardening is simply an outgrowth of the desire of people to produce their own food and save money. A generation ago the work of an Extension Agent was almost confined to the rural areas. Now people from the local towns are asking for information on how they can grow fruits and vegetables.

"This change has some good points," Mr. Gordon says. "By trying to grow their own produce, the town population is drawn closer to rural people. They understand some of the problems of dry weather, insects, and variations in temperature experienced by the farmer."

In the United States, Mr. Gordon says, seven out of ten families grow some of their own vegetables. In 1977 twenty million pounds of fresh fruits and vegetables were produced for home use. This was about \$400.00 worth of food per family, produced at a cost of around \$50.00. "In Eastland County," he adds, "I believe we are running above the National average, with families producing about \$500.00 worth of food on the average. But we have advantages here—more space

and longer growing seasons, which allows for both a spring and fall garden." He calls attention to the better taste of fresh produce, and that it is more healthful to eat. And anyone who thinks he has no room for gardening should pick up a booklet from Gordon's office called "Vegetable gardening in Containers", which gives total directions for food production in confined spaces.

Gordon notes that it is time to begin local gardens for 1979. Onions, cabbage, English peas, mustard, radishes and lettuce can all be planted now.

Agriculture is big business in Eastland County, with an estimated \$23,289,000 gross sales from this source in 1978. Cattle and peanuts are about even in amounts of money, with hay crops, and pecans trailing. The raising of fruit for commercial sales is slacking off for various reasons. Projected gross sales on all Products 1979 are expected to top \$24,700,000. Gordon is quick to point out that this isn't all profit. "It costs twice as much to keep a cow now as it did a few years ago," he states. "The farmers have been faced with inflation, the price of energy the rising price of land, and four years of below average rainfall."

I have always believed in keeping the family farm," the County Agent adds. "That is the best and cheapest way to produce food for this nation that I know of. But I'm afraid the trend is toward business, or co-op farming, due to the cost of production."

Eastland County hasn't been hit as hard as some places along that line, yet we see the effects even here. More of our land is going into the hands of out-of-county owners, either because of purchase for investment, or simply because a local owner dies and leaves his property to heirs who live elsewhere. Absentee ownership is not the best situation for building up land of a community. The trend in our County is toward a gradual loss in rural population, because it is so expensive for young families to get started in farming."

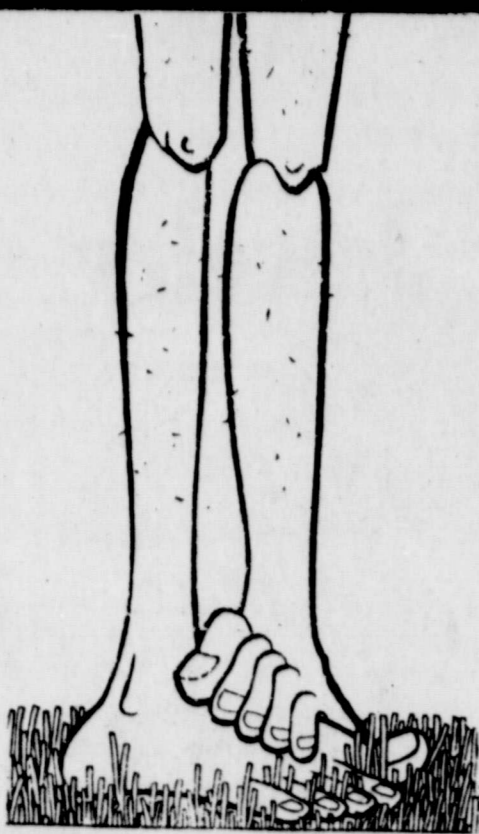
On the American Agriculture Movement, Mr. Gordon states that most people in Eastland County support the objectives of a fair income for the farmer. But opinions are divided on the methods the Agriculture Movement uses to obtain this goal. He lists the rise in this movement as one of the changes in agriculture during 1978. Other events included the quick rise in cattle prices, the poor pecan crop, drought conditions until August, and a good peanut crop. But the worst experience in

Mr. Stenholm plans to remain in close contact with his freshman colleagues in the House in order to assure that the interests of the 17th District of Texas are made known to Members of Congress from other areas of the Nation.

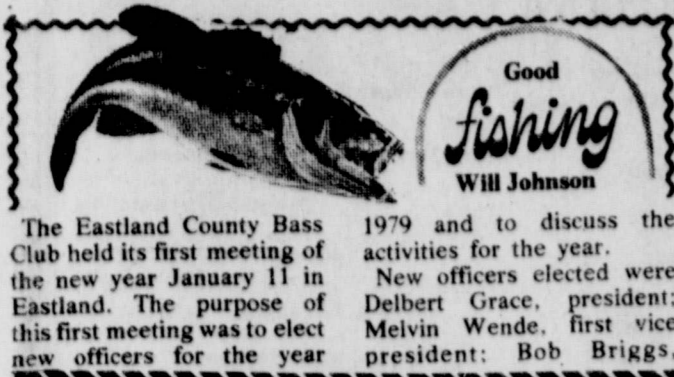

Bell Reduces Rates

While prices of most goods and services are going up, telephone customers found a welcomed exception to that trend Sunday, January 21. On that date, the Bell system reduced its direct dial Long Distance rates between the U.S. mainland and Hawaii.

Weldon Meers, general manager-switched services, for Southwestern Bell, said charges for Long Distance calls between the U.S. mainland and Hawaii were cut by 10 to 11 percent.

A call to Honolulu from Dallas-Fort Worth during the day will drop from 77 cents to 70 cents for the first minute and from 59 cents to 53 cents for each additional minute. This rate applies to a station-to-station call dialed by the customer.

"The reductions will save Long Distance interstate callers almost \$13 million in the first year," Meers said.

"In addition, charges for Wide Area Telecommunications Service (WATS) between the mainland and both Alaska and Hawaii were reduced," Meers said. "The reduced WATS rates will mean a savings of about \$1 million for business customers in the first year."

Meers said the new rates are part of a plan to bring rates between the mainland and the state more nearly into line with charges for the same services in the continental United States.

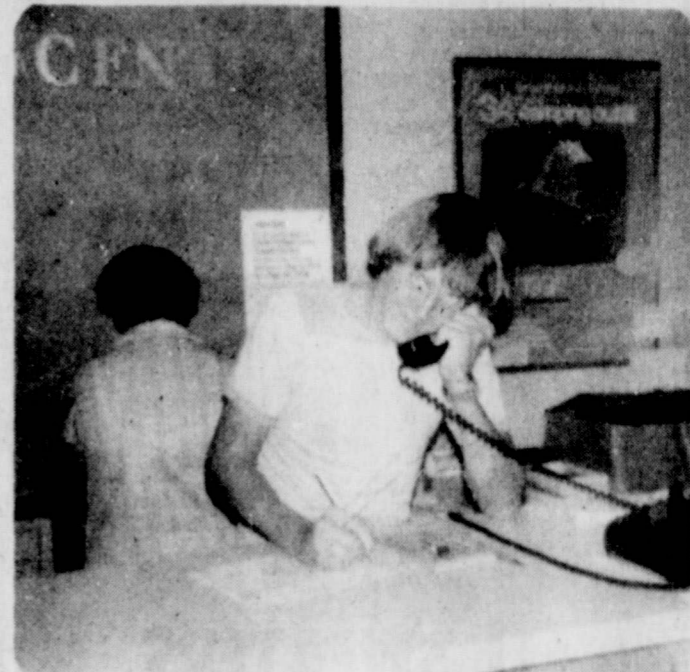

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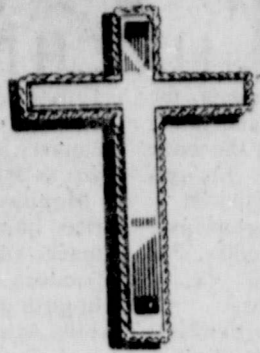

home from the ground up, including all plumbing and electrical work, provided they get the necessary permits. Whether adding a room, putting in a shower or basin or wiring that extra light in the garage, a homeowner must have a permit issued, prior to starting the work, and must pass all the safety requirements just as it would if the work were done by licensed professionals.

Business and rent property come under different categories. No property owner or rentee may do any plumbing or electrical work, which requires a permit, without first having a proper license and \$1,000 bond.

Any time a permit is issued, it should be followed by an inspection. An in-

spection covers such items as proper distance inside property lines, minimum lot size, zone restrictions and structural requirements. Plumbing permit inspections cover the areas of proper materials being used, correct placement of pipes and pressure tests for gas lines. electrical work is governed by the National Electrical Code and inspections should check for correct use of materials, proper construction and installation. An inspection would find violations as not using correct electrical wire thickness, cross connection of plumbing water pipes and not maintaining proper set back requirements.

The City of Cisco has two licensed plumbing inspectors but no full time qualified municipal inspector. To be duly qualified, a municipal inspector should complete a 160 hour course through the Texas A&M system. This course of study qualifies a man to inspect buildings against structural, plumbing and electrical standards.

One area of concern for construction in Cisco is the set back requirements which vary depending upon the specific zoning restriction the structure comes under. Residential structures must be 25 feet from the front property line. This line is often mistakenly thought to be the curb or end of the road, when in fact it is generally several feet further back. When a new home is built next to existing structures, a peculiar set of circumstances arises which

can be handled by a properly trained inspector.

A side yard set back is usually five, to seven and one half feet depending on what is existing adjacent to the new structure. If you happen to live on a corner, it then becomes 10 feet. Rear yards have a minimum of 20 feet, if the structure in question is attached to the house or is classified by its size as a main building. Any accessory building (carports, sheds, etc.) has a rear yard line set back of 5 feet.

About the only thing one can build legally without a permit is an open patio or fence, and there are restrictions on these. Any cement work such as a patio or walkway must have 6 x 6 steel mesh in it. A solid fence may not exceed 2 1/2 feet if built any closer to the front property line than 25 feet. No permit is needed if the backyard fence is 6 feet or less.

Failure to secure a permit could result in costly delays, removal of the construction, a fine and in some cases legal action. When the work is discovered and it has been determined that no permit has been issued the work must stop immediately upon an inspectors request. Construction which is in violation of the City Code must be corrected before any work can be continued. Just because work was started before the permit is issued does not put it beyond the regulations and compliance is strictly enforced. The Code sets out clear legal steps in which the City officials must take in cases of

non-compliance, violation or unauthorized completed work too.

The fees for permits are nominal. Building permits are issued but occur no charge. No electrical permits are issued at the present, although plumbing permits start at \$5.00 with a \$1.50 fee for each fixture. Gas inspections are a flat \$5.00. In addition a \$1,000 bond each is required on plumbers and gas fitters besides a state issued license. More information is available at City Hall.

All permits are approved by the City Manager. Prior approval of work must be received because of the limitations stated earlier in this article and others brought to light in each individual case. Plans and specifications are required to be submitted prior to issuance of a permit", Boland stated, "because these must be checked and given approval in the areas of electrical, plumbing and structural". If a person feels

these requirements are too restrictive or time consuming it is hoped to assure them that the Cisco Plumbing Code, Standard Building Code and National Electrical Code were all designed by professionals for one reason:

the health, safety and welfare of the consumer! "Plans and specifications do not have to be formal, elaborate documents either", Boland continued, "I'll accept it even if its drawn on a paper bag, as long as it is clear and specific to the details of the construction". In some cases the plans aren't available, a carport or prefabricated shed for instance. In such case the homeowners are encouraged to describe what they want to do.

The City's business is in serving its citizens and building is encouraged. City officials are always available to discuss details and work with individuals on specific plans and specifications.
